Mr. E. H. Davis' Apology.

The Patriot denies that Mr. L. H. Davis is the author of the article in its columns entitled "Bundling Legislation," to which we referred last week. It is said that the writer in the Patriot sought to patch Mr. Davis' shattered reputation, and bolster up his waning popularity at the expense of those whom he was pleased to call "Tory Legislators." It was in defence of the Conservative party, and to show Mr. Davis' unsoundness that we stepped in. We have no objection to Mr. Davis' doing the best he can for his clients, but we are not going to be told by the Patriot that in receiving a retainer from the liquor traffic to impede or overthrow the laws which forbid the sale of intoxicating beverages, Mr. Davis is aiding the cause of Temperance. That is rather too ridiculous, particularly when we remember that it is owing to his discovery of what he alleges is a conflict between the Scott Act and the License Act, that the wheels of Justice are now stopped, and that run to-day holds high carnival in the City of Charlottetown.

The Patriot last week quoted at some length from the Herald to prove that Mr. Davis did not allow the License Act to pass unaltered. That is not an answer to our charge against him. We placed in our issue a bill which was not amended, and we do not ask the Opposition to go back to the original text of the bill when it was before the Committee, and voted upon a number of amendments which were proposed, but that he never discovered the conflict between the Scott Act and the License Act, he now contends, existed until his palms were greased by the liquor dealers of Charlottetown. The Patriot claims that it is absurd to hold members of the Opposition responsible for the blundering legislation of the majority in Parliament, and that "representatives who are opposed by the principles of a bill can hardly be expected to follow closely its details." What we ask, is the use of sending an opposition to Parliament not to scrutinize closely every measure which the Government propose? We do not ask the Opposition to make laws, their duty has been well defined—to oppose every thing and propose nothing, but we expect them to watch the Government when they attempt to amend and upon the vigilance of the Opposition very much depends. Mr. Davis knew that the Liquor License Act, being a Government measure, would almost certainly pass, and it was therefore his duty, as a member of the Opposition, and if we accept of his authority, an aspirant for his leadership, to have examined every detail of the bill, and to have pointed out its provisions that brought in question legal and parliamentary knowledge with which he is credited by his friends. If we are to believe Mr. Davis, that he has not a particle of knowledge of the law, we cannot acquit him of gross ignorance or neglect of his duty in not bringing the circumstance to the notice of the House of Commons, and demanding the rectification of so serious a blunder.

The Patriot asks us to believe that "Mr. Davis is doing a public service by trying to find out what the Act means, and that it will be no loss, but a gain, to the cause of temperance, to have the whole question of the License Act settled by the decision of the Courts." This is a most extraordinary argument, and if it be sound it would tend to the destruction of the Temperance Alliance, who may be supposed to have a very deep interest in the settlement of the question, should join hands with the liquor dealers, and make a business of it. As an undertaking, it is not only a nuisance, but a disgrace to a journalist to point out a blunder, and attract public attention thereto, in order to their speedy removal. At any rate, we shall not follow the questionable example of Mr. Davis, who decided to improve his position by publishing the whole of the Scott Act in the Patriot, and we are also required in the postal service of the Province. Our observations to-day have been directed at the postal system, but there are matters of detail in the service which demand attention. We have no time to go into them just now, but will merely say that when occasion arises for promoting any one of the staff, he whose services is the longest and best qualified, and whose qualifications he is otherwise fully qualified, we are informed that this wholesome rule is not followed.
