Any person who is the sole head of family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manliobs, cant must appear in person at the Do minion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain daughter, brother or sister of intending

Daties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of and occupied by him or by his father mother, sou, daughter, brother or sis

In certain districts a homesteader good standing may pre-empt a quarter section slongside his homestead. Price

Daties-Must reside upon the home stead or pre-empfion six months in each of six years from date of home stead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty

his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchae ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$7.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a louar worth \$300.00.

#### Italy at War.

The entrance of Italy into the war, on the side of the Allies had doubtlessly been anticipated i the chancellories of Europe, and practically by the whole world, for some time. It would seem that her entrance into the fray should provide, Great Britain France, Belgium and Russia with a powerful ally likely to prove of especial value in the operations in the Dardanelles. Also it will close a gateway by which Austria has been receiving large quantities of supplies. The importance of these facts is not to be underestimated. In the active campaign on land or sea Italy should have a fine showing. Her army, on war footing, numbers 3,320,000 men made killed and 20,000 wounded. up as follows: Permanent army, 734,401; mobile militia, 320,170; territorial militia, 2,275,631. Four armies have already been organized, each of from two to four army corps and one division of cavalry. 




