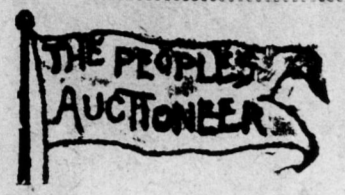

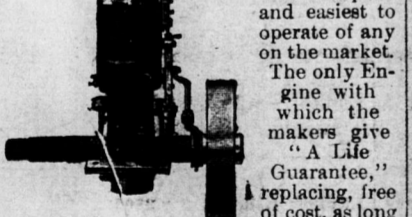

### That Forgetfulness.

We direct the attention of our readers to a letter which appears elsewhere in this issue. It deals at some length with the Hon. Donald Morison's plea that he forgot the law which imposed a penalty of \$20 a tree on a licensee who cuts on ungranted Crown lands. "Enquirer" proves conclusively what we had already pointed out more briefly, that Mr. Morison's defence is inconclusive, even if accepted, as the Governor accepted it. Mr. Morison has had the experience of a quarter of a century in connection with the grants of Crown lands. Clearly, the main object of the Crown Lands Act is to set forth the terms and conditions on which a person may become licensed to cut timber over limits set forth in his license, and not elsewhere. Even if the Governor accepted Mr. Morison's plea that he forgot the penalty of \$20 a tree, there is nothing in Mr. Morison's letter to show that an application had to be made to the Governor in Council, of which notice must be given, that a license had to be granted, a survey made, and bonus and annual rents paid for the right to cut for sale on ungranted Crown lands. If this is not so, what is one of the main objects of the Crown Lands Act? Moreover, the Government is the guardian of these resources and Mr. Morison is one of these guardians.

As "Enquirer" points out, even suppose this penalty clause had not been there, there were other clauses there setting forth the course to be pursued and the conditions fulfilled before even a licensee could obtain timber off Crown lands adjoining his limits.

With these conditions Mr. Morison was fully acquainted. What then is the value of Mr. Morison's plea that he forgot what the penalty was directed against?

As a Minister of the Crown he was a Public Trustee of these Crown Lands, and had a duty to say who should be licensed to cut timber, how then can his plea be held to clear him of giving advice which was a grave

infringement of his duty as such a Trustee?

To make his plea satisfy even the standard of credulity set by the Governor, he would have to convince people that he had forgotten there was any Crown Lands Act at all in force, and that he had also forgotten there existed the commandment, "Thou shalt not steal."

### Hurt at Wabana.

At 3 p.m. Saturday, as a number of men were going down No. 2 slope of the N. S. S. Co. at Bell Island in cage cars, the middle section went off the tracks and the after section broke in the frame of the car, which jumped the rails. Most of the men jumped and escaped injury, but three brothers, Derby, of Lance Cove, and a man named Dave, of Kelligrews, were hurt. The latter was badly cut about the arm and shoulder, and several stitches were put in the wounds to close them. The man narrowly escaped death and several might have been killed had not the engineer checked the cars quickly.

### Shipping Arrivals.

The s.s. Brand, six days from Philadelphia, arrived here at 3 p.m. yesterday, bringing a cargo of anthracite coal to A. J. Harvey & Co. The Brand is only chartered to make one trip.

The schr. Jenny Jones reached port last evening from Cadiz after a passage of 40 days. Strong head winds were met after reaching the Grand Banks. She brought a cargo of salt for H. R. Silver.

The s.s. Louisburg, two days from Philadelphia, entered port last night with a load of coal for the R. N. Co. After discharging the steamer will go on dock for repairs.

The inter-brigade shooting contest for the Blackwood cup takes place at the Rifle Range on Wednesday. Formerly the brigade shoot was always looked upon as the most popular event of the season, but there is an apparent waning of interest this year. ## Flynn Was an Easy Victim for Col'd Champion.

Ringside, Las Vegas, N.M., July 4.—Jim Flynn's whole hope expired to-day in the ninth round of his scheduled, 45-round bout with Champion Jack Johnson. Flynn's face was chopped and cut frightfully by Johnson's deliberate blows, and in the ninth round Captain Cowley, of the New Mexican State Police, pushed his way to the ring and declared the contest ended as a brutal exhibition.

For three rounds Flynn had realized his inability to defend himself, and frantically tried to butt his way to victory. At times he leaped a foot from the ground endeavoring to crash his skull against the champion's jaw. Again and again Referee Smith warned him to stop, and Flynn made no defense.

"He's holding me, he's holding me," he would declare to Smith, and in the next clutch he would try it again. When the police interfered, Referee Smith, through the announcer, awarded Johnson the fight.

Johnson made no serious effort to hurt Flynn at any time during the nine rounds. Apparently he held himself in check even when Flynn's butting tactics were at their worst. Johnson bore not a single mark of the fight beyond a slight cut inside his lower lip.

Wife of Suicide

Is Daughter of Deposed Ruler of Turkey.

San Diego, Cal., June 29.—It developed to-day that Mrs. Frank S. Faber, the handsome Turkish widow of Dr. Frank Faber, who committed suicide here yesterday, is a daughter of Abdul Hamid, the deposed ruler of Turkey. The couple were married in Constantinople ten years ago. Dr. Faber was then dentist to the Turkish Court.

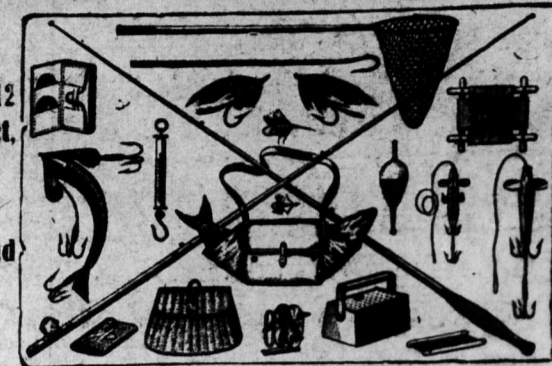

## What Law Did Minister of Justice Morison Forget?

Doubt that the stars are fire.  
Doubt that the sun doth move.  
Doubt truth to be a liar.  
But do not doubt that I forgot the law.—Shakespeare (with apologies).

Editor Evening Telegram.

This astounding question is agitating the public mind to-day, and the whole matter is of great public interest.

D. Morison is Minister of Justice. Two charges were made against him. The one with which we are now concerned is: that in 1909, whilst Minister of Justice and Attorney General, and endeavouring to sell a timber property situated on a river in Orange Bay, White Bay, of 80 square miles, he wrote a letter to R. W. Strong, his quondam friend, who was then in Boston, containing the following words:

"The man who holds limits abutting on a river can log and drive his timber the cheapest, and until some other person locates behind him there is nothing to prevent him from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown land."

Mr. Morison has since explained that "getting" means "cutting". Since Morison has received a "complete vindication" (as the Chronicle puts it) the people are taking notice of it because the charge is very grave and very serious. Morison's answer is only "I forgot"; and the Governor's (Sir Ralph Williams) vindication is a message to the world that a Minister of Justice should be "honourably acquitted" and retained in his office if he says he forgot the law and you believe him when he says so; although if otherwise he would be a "rogue and a fool." Quod verum tutum.

If we always remember that D. Morison was Attorney General and Minister of Justice when he wrote that letter, we can appreciate how serious is the charge, and how ridiculous the defence. The correspondence has been published and we find that Mr. Morison makes a very nice distinction in his answer of April 20th, 1912, wherein he says: "I wrote this letter to Mr. Strong while I was Minister of Justice. . . . It was not written by me as Minister of Justice." Of course not; but he did not tell Strong to keep his position dark. Has Mr. Morison been lately reading about Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde? And did he lend the book to His Excellency?

As Minister of Justice and Attorney General, whose duty it was to conserve the law and to prosecute offenders, when necessary or required, can Mr. Morison be trusted for a moment when he says he forgot the law? Will he go into Court and take a prisoner's word for it, as the Governor took his, and let him go free? Suppose A. W. Bishop had pleaded that he did not know or had forgotten what the law was about casting away schooners, would the Hon. D. Morison as Attorney General have told the Court that that was a good answer and let him go free, if he had the power?

There is a distinction, however, that should be drawn in Justice to Mr. Morison, namely, that Bishops of offence is punishable by imprisonment, whilst a Minister of Justice who writes such a letter is not liable to imprisonment, and so long as his plea of forgetfulness of the law is accepted he is subject to nothing—save public opinion. Otherwise he should be subject to dismissal.

Mr. Morison must certainly remember that in or about the year 1905 a certain firm was charged with having purchased logs cut on ungranted Crown lands, and the firm was informed that they were liable to a fine of \$20 a tree, although they had bought and actually paid for the logs. Would the firm have got free if they had pleaded (like Morison) that they forgot or did not know the law? Mr. Morison says that he knew that a man could be fined for purchasing (and of course paying for) logs so cut, but he apparently thought that a man could cut logs without fine—that is, cut without paying.

Now let us examine for a moment what law the Hon. D. Morison, Minister of Justice, H. M. Attorney General, ex-Judge, etc., etc., FORGOT.

In his answer of April 20th, 1912, he says he forgot (in part) section 28 of the Crown Lands Act, 1903. That section, put plainly, reads: "The holder of a license, or his assignee, servant or agent, shall not cut timber on any Crown lands (other than that defined in the license) and shall not purchase timber cut on such lands under a penalty for every tree cut, to be recovered by suit before a Magistrate or Justice."

It will be noted, of course, that "the adjoining Crown land" was not included in the license of the Orange Bay area.

Mr. Morison explains in his answer that "my remembrance of the law was that the holder of a license might cut logs on adjacent Crown lands, but could not purchase them." This means that he forgot there was a "prohibition" under a penalty of \$20 a tree, against cutting logs on the ungranted Crown land adjoining the Orange Bay area (and this was in a "Local Option" district too).

In Justice to him again we will quote a little more of his answer: "I emphatically deny what Mr. Cooker insinuated that I as Minister of Justice intentionally and designly advised Mr. Strong that any person holding the area might steal logs from adjacent Crown lands. I had no such idea in my mind." (Or he might have added, in the Minister of Justice's mind).

Governor in Council, to be not less than \$2 per square mile, and to be paid within 30 days from the date of the approval of an application for a license. The said bonus is to be paid on the whole area applied for.

Second (Section 23)—The Governor in Council may grant licenses to cut timber on Crown land for a period of 50 (now 30) years after notice of intention to apply thereof has been published in the Royal Gazette for a period of one month prior to such application and stating boundaries, etc., and there shall be paid in addition to the said bonus an annual rental of \$2 per square mile in advance, the first year's rental to be paid within 30 days of such approval.

Mr. Morison does not say he forgot these sections. And if he did not forget them, what then? These sections say in plain words that timber may be cut on Crown lands, only upon application being made to the Governor in Council, and approved, and a bonus of \$2 a mile and a rental of \$2 a mile paid in advance. And was not Mr. Morison one of the "Council" when he wrote that letter? And these sections are as much the law as that other section (38) which he says he forgot.

Mr. Morison informs us that for 25 years he has been advising clients about conditions in their timber licenses. Then we take it that he must have known of the above sections when he wrote that letter. And if he must have known of them, what answer is it to say merely that he forgot there was a penalty of \$20 a tree or cutting? It may be quite true that he did forget about this heavy penalty. But if a man may not cut timber on Crown lands at all (excepting for fishery purposes, vessels, etc.) without a license and paying \$4 per acre bonus and rent, in advance, and if he does go out and cut it, without license and paying rent, then he surely would be up against the law. This is the Minister of Justice did not cut timber, but if he, as Donald Morison, wrote Strong advising him that here was nothing to prevent the holder of a limit from getting a good deal of timber from the adjoining Crown lands until some other person locates there, is it, or is it not, advising contrary to the above section? And if it is, what are we going to do about it, because Morison was Minister of Justice?

What did the Governor do? It will have been noticed that the Chronicle lost no time in informing the public that the Governor conducted "an exhaustive enquiry." But is, or was, the Governor aware of the above sections of the Crown Lands Act? Did he notice that his Attorney General did not refer to them in his answer of April 20th in reference to the letter to Strong? If His Excellency did notice these sections, then he must have noticed that his Attorney General did not say whether he forgot them or not, and the Governor did not ask him. Did His Excellency deem it necessary in view of Morison's letter to the Premier of April 10th, 1912 (before the charge was made), wherein he devotes columns to a description of the Crown Lands Act and how timber limits are obtained?

The attention of the Governor, of Premier Morris and of Minister of Justice Morison, as regards this charge, seems to have been centred on that penalty law only; and these sections (22 and 23) seem to have been lost sight of. And if so, was the inquiry "exhaustive"?

Sir E. P. Morris, the Premier, volunteers that it would be "perfectly ridiculous" to think that Attorney General Morison remembered the law (the penalty law) when he wrote that letter to Strong. His Excellency the Governor says that if Morison remembered the law (the penalty law again) he should be branded a rogue and a fool. Now we would respectfully ask the Governor and Premier Morris and Morison himself if that penalty section was the only law, the only section in the Acts, which touches this case and which should have been remembered? Did Morison remember sections 22 and 23 above mentioned, or should he have done so? These questions do not seem to have been in the mind of any of them in the inquiry on this charge. Then was this an exhaustive enquiry? Again, suppose there was no penalty section at all, but only sections 22 and 23, is Morison (whilst Minister of Justice) justified, in advising Strong as he did, whether he forgot these sections, or any section, or whether he didn't?

In the light of the above is it not proper that Attorney General Morison should answer these questions, and that Premier Morris, having given an excuse for Morison which is absurd, should be asked to justify his Attorney General's letter to Strong? And in the meantime we can wonder whether His Excellency will consider it his duty to ask Donald Morison whether (in forgetting) he also forgot sections 22 and 23 or not.

In the meantime also all Magistrates and Justices should make a note of His Excellency's decision and write to Hon. D. Morison, Minister of Justice, etc., etc., for a copy. Is there any good reason why the Magistrates and Justices should not follow and apply the Governor's decision to cases? If there is, will somebody kindly state it?

STOCKHOLM, July 7.  
The inauguration of the Olympic games on Saturday, proved a spectacle probably never equalled in the history of Athletics from the days of ancient Greece. It was not only a beautiful and memorable scene, but a solemn ceremony which moved spectators deeply. When the members of the Swedish Royal family entered their decorated box, all present stood with bared heads and gave a loud Swedish cheer, while the sharp, clear call, blown by the corps of trumpeters, sounded far and wide, and announced the opening of the games. A large group of singers started the Swedish National Hymn, which was joined in by thousands of spectators. The arrival of delegations from the three Scandinavian countries, Sweden, Norway and Denmark, and teams representing other nations, called forth a hearty welcome. A little file of three athletes following the flag of the Rising Sun of Japan, got a warm round of applause. The whole body marched around the track, then musing itself in the green oval, facing the royal box, the standard bearers proudly holding on high the colours of the various nations, forming the front rank, directly opposite the King. After religious exercises, the Crown Prince made a brief speech, and King Gustave formally declared the Olympic Games open.

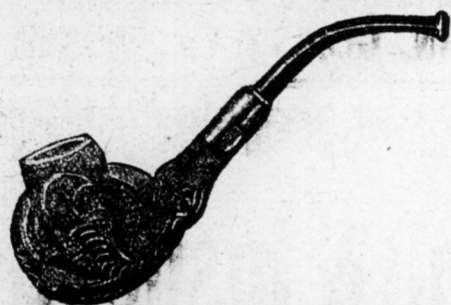

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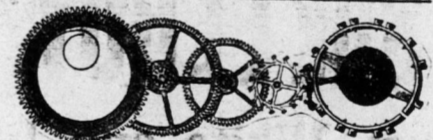
