"You have some?" he said. "Very well; I understand. But if you should need any, you have but to apply to my friend or to write to me."


He stopped and looked at her beautiful head, as it lay on her arms, with keen scrutiny. He would have preferred to have seen her face.



\$5 a week. "It seems a good deal,"  
she admitted, "but most of my friends  
spend about that. I don't really see  
how one can do it for less and live  
decently."

As I listened to her, there came  
into my mind two different and yet  
similar complaints to which I had  
listened.  
The first was from a woman whose  
husband earns in the neighbourhood  
of \$2,000 a year. "I've done my best,"  
she said, "but I can't keep our house-  
hold expenses below \$22 a week, and  
when clothes and spending money  
and doctor's bills and all the unex-  
pected extras have to come out of  
the \$17, she doesn't leave much  
to save, but simply can't see how we  
could live comfortably on any less."

The second statement came from a  
sweet little wife whose husband's sal-  
ary is \$25 a week. "We spend exactly  
\$17 a week on our housekeeping," she  
said. "I wish we could save more,  
but we really can't live comfortably  
on any less with things costing as  
they do."

And now I suppose you want to  
know what I'm aiming at with all  
these figures?  
Just this. The tenacity with which  
standards of living and incomes cling  
together.

For the woman with the \$80 a week

income, the minimum on which one  
could decently keep house was \$50.  
The woman who had to reckon on \$40  
a week managed it on \$23; and the  
wife who had to help her husband  
spread \$25 over all the family needs  
got along on \$17. Each one said she  
was doing the best that could be  
done. And yet if the \$80 wife had  
been put in place of the \$40 or the  
\$15 wife, I know she would have  
managed very nicely. But because  
she had the \$80 income to help spend,  
she got an \$80 point of view.

Do you know how the foreign born  
tortoise who so often pass our Ameri-  
can hares is the race for wealth  
manage that miracle? They just  
don't let their standards of living  
keep up on the heels of their in-  
comes all the time. They keep the  
first stationary, or nearly so, while  
the other increases.

Yes, I know the American standard  
of living is a precious thing, and I  
know it is natural and right for peo-  
ple to want to have pleasanter sur-  
roundings, better food, etc., etc., as  
soon as they are able to. But I do  
think we could keep a somewhat  
wider gap between our incomes and  
our standards of living if we would  
try to do so.

The ability to save is not a question  
of possessing any particular amount  
of money. Like Boston, it's just a  
state of mind.

Of course there is such a thing as  
keeping one's standard of living too  
far below one's income, but I know  
very few people who do it. More of  
us need to remember that if we were  
earning \$5 or \$10 less a week, we  
would still manage to live quite com-  
fortably on that much less, and to  
ask ourselves why we can't do it any-  
way.

## Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.  
**CARDIFF, Oct. 14.**  
Over 400 Welsh coal miners are  
believed to have perished this morn-  
ing in the Universal Colliery Pit  
near here, when an explosion shut-  
tered the works after 930 men had  
gone down the shaft. About 600  
had been rescued up to noon, when  
fire broke out and hindered the res-  
cue work. Entrance to the rescuers  
was found by way of an adjacent  
shaft. Many pathetic scenes were  
witnessed at the pit-head, where the  
wives and children had gathered. A  
similar explosion occurred in the  
same pit 13 years ago, when 120  
miners lost their lives, only one be-  
ing rescued. The fire in the colliery  
was the first since the disaster, when  
the mine was closed for good. The  
cause of the explosion, and everything  
is being done to cope with it.

**HALIFAX, Oct. 14.**  
The Rappahannock docked here at  
7 p.m. with 19 Russians rescued  
from the Volturno. The s.s. Cran-  
mum left Brooklyn on Saturday for  
the scene of the disaster. She is  
equipped with searchlights and car-  
ried a large supply of sail cloths for  
shrouds and lumber for coffins.

**LIVERPOOL, Oct. 14.**  
The Carmania anchored in the  
Mersey, at 1 a.m. Capt. Barr receiv-  
ed the newspaper men and told the  
story. He told how he had gone in  
ten miles away, had been urged by  
wireless to return. The Carmania di-  
rected the rescue work on the fleet  
that arrived quickly on the scene.  
Capt. Inch, he said, acted with great  
bravery, considering he was "one  
against so many terror-stricken peo-  
ple."

**HAVRE, Oct. 14.**  
The La Touraine has arrived with  
42 survivors, including 8 children  
from 3 to 12 years of age. whose  
parents had perished in the hol-  
ocaust, or were aboard other steam-  
ers. The little ones laughed and  
talked with the passengers, by whom  
they had been made much of since  
the rescue. Two older children with  
their mothers, 27 Polish peasants,  
and 3 of the Volturno's crew, made  
up the 42 rescued.

**NEW YORK, Oct. 14.**  
A wireless from the Kroonland

says that spontaneous combustion,  
through mingling of the chemicals  
which formed part of the cargo of  
the Volturno, is the explanation giv-  
en by survivors for the tragedy. She  
has 89 passengers aboard, including  
Capt. Inch and the wireless operator  
bound here. It is thought the boxes  
containing the chemicals were  
smashed open by the rolling, and  
the chemicals were scattered about.  
Capt. Inch, though wounded  
and weak, refused to forsake the  
ship, until convinced that he was ab-  
solutely the last person capable of  
leaving it. There is unanimous  
praise for the splendid work of the  
wireless operators, Seddon and Pen-  
nington, who stuck to their duty,  
when their cabin was unbearably  
hot, for hours, only leaving when the  
floor began to warp beneath them.

**LIVERPOOL, Oct. 14.**  
The owners of the Uranium Line  
believe the Volturno disaster was a  
deliberately planned plot. Capt.  
Tinsley, manager of the line, lately  
received threatening letters, one of  
which was received just before the  
Volturno sailed, saying, "If you don't  
listen to our demands, one of your  
boats will be burned." Tinsley and  
the owners believe that a bomb was  
placed in the hold. They claim there  
has been trouble over the immigra-  
tion trade, and efforts have been  
made to clean out undesirable from  
the service.

Capt. Tinsley absolutely denies the  
truth of the foregoing story, and says  
that he never said a word to anybody  
about having received a threatening  
letter.

**LIVERPOOL, Oct. 14.**  
The steamer Devonian arrived to-day  
with 50 survivors including a baby  
whose mother had flung it into the  
sea, to escape the flames. Arthur  
Hazlewood, a seaman of the Devonian,  
an sprang overboard and rescued it;  
also a little girl of four years whose  
nationality is as yet unknown.

**PEKING, Oct. 14.**  
The Chief of the Peking Mounted  
Police was executed yesterday. He  
was arrested Oct. 30th, during the  
ceremony of inaugurating President  
Yuan Shi Kai, and confessed the  
rebels had bribed him to attempt the  
President's assassination, as he was  
taking the oath of office.





## Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, To-day.  
Capt. Inch of the Yothorne sent his story of the catastrophe by wireless last night from the Kroomland, on which he is being brought to this port. Narrative is as follows: At 6:05 a.m., Oct. 9, lat. 49.12 north, long. 34.51 west, fire was reported in hold number one by the chief officer. At 6:55 a.m. flames burning through number one hatches, setting fire to fore-castle. Stowed ship down and kept before wind, which enabled us to put steam extinguishers in operation, also three fire hoses from deck connections. Flames gaining rapidly, reaching height of foremost light, imprisoning water below, which were burned to death. In fore-castle a series of explosions now occurred, wrecking the saloon hospital amidships, the compass and steering gear being also damaged by explosion. I gave orders to get help by wireless as soon as flames burnt hatches. It seemingly being impossible to save the ship, I had boats provisioned and swung out. Ship was rolling heavily. Boats numbers thirteen and five were smashed, but number two lowered to water with passengers and stewardess in charge of chief officer Miller. After this boat left the ship she capsized, throwing the occupants into the water. She afterwards righted herself and several of the crew got back into the boat, the chief officer being one of them. Number six boat was lowered and got away safely filled with passengers in charge of fourth officer Langsell. Number seven boat in being lowered caught under stern of ship, the boat being completely wrecked. Meanwhile the chief engineer, two seamen and myself fought the fire and apparently subdued the flames. I gave orders to send no more boats away as I had received word from the Carmania that she was on her way to us. She arrived with us by 11 a.m. Life belts were served out to each passenger. Passengers now became calmer and food was served out to them. At 9 a.m. the bunker was found to be ablaze, it being impossible to stop the fire in bunker on account of gasses. Water tight doors were closed and water was poured down number two hatch on fire, but fire was gaining all the time. ## Campaign Opened

Special to Evening Telegram. IN HARBOR GRACE DISTRICT BY GORDON, MOSELL AND GOSSE.  
Special to Evening Telegram. FAY ROBERTS, this afternoon. The Liberal Union team commenced their actual campaign in Harbor Grace district last night, with a meeting at Bryant's Cove. The hall was packed with voters when Abram Morgan took the chair and introduced Mr. George Gordon in homely but eloquent and telling style. In making his initial bow to Mr. Grace District as a politician, Mr. Gordon scored the Graballs with telling effect for their mismanagement and neglect of local affairs; condemned their unpopularity and showed how local public works were in a worse condition than had been twenty years ago. He was warmly applauded and his speech was punctuated with rousing cheers. Capt. George Gosse, who was the second speaker, gave the appreciative audience a pleasant surprise. He made an excellent speech and his pointed criticism and sarcastic references to the black Graball record were enthusiastically received. Captain Gosse is an effective platform speaker and is a tower of strength to the Liberal Union team. He took as his subject the great benefits the F.P.U. has bestowed on the fishermen and the absolute necessity of ensuring further benefits from the organization by Sir Robert Bond and W. P. Coaker.  
The meeting was closed by a speech from Dr. Mossell, the third member of the Liberal team. His remarks were devoted to a review of the record of the Morris Party. His speech occupied an hour and a half and even at the end of that time the delighted audience were shouting to the speaker to go on. ### The Actor.

There is also the bar-storming actor, who subsists mainly upon applause in the form of hard-boiled eggs, and the plastic plunk of the cabbage. Just at present there is quite a demand for stages upon which to locate actors who are now engaged in haunting the Riato, and the home of the free lunch. It is estimated that there are something like 9,000 actors for every stage, at the present writing, a condition which is causing a mournful depression in the market price of grease paint and false whiskers. Some actors never retire from business until the management has to screen in the stage with wire netting, while others grow better with age, and are held in grateful memory long after they have made their bow before a curtain which never descends.


