### NEWS BY CABLE.

BELFAST, June 25.

The arson squad caused extensive damage to the Episcopal Church at Ballylessin, near here, to-day.

London was a city of roses yesterday, when Alexandra Day was celebrated. Nearly thirteen million artificial roses were sold by 20,000 women and girls, dressed in white.

LONDON, June 25.

An Exchange Telegraph Company's despatch from Shangnai, says that the town of Kalgan, 325 miles northwest of Peking, was sacked last night. The foreigners in the city were not harmed. There are no details as to the looting of the city, nor as to the fate of the Chinese troops stationed there.

LONDON, June 25.

Letters of a very intimate character written by Queen Victoria to the Duchess of Gordon, will be sold at Sotheby's on July 21st. In one letter dated 1842, when King Edward was a baby of two months; and his sister a year older. Queen Victoria wrote, "Our little girl is now at a very amusing and interesting age and is very lively and intelligent. Boy is a fine strong child, though not as pretty as his sister was at his age."

ROME, June 25.

By a concordat between the Holy See and Servia, signed yesterday, formal recognition is given to Catholicism in Servia. The Pope has appointed an Archbishop for Belgrade and a Bishop for Osnerhat, whose salaries will be paid by the Government. Religious instruction in the schools is allowed and a seminary is to be subsidized. Mixed marriages are to be regulated by the Canon law and church property to be held inviolable. Prayers for the King will be offered in all the churches.

LONDON, June 25.

the rival Irish factions in the House of Commons. Premier Asquith was asked to take special steps to prevent arms entering Ireland from the States in response to an appeal from John F. Redmond, leader of the Irish Nationalists to Michael J. Ryan, President of the United Irish League, Philadelphia, for aid to the Nationalist Volunteers in Ireland. Lloyd George, who replied in behalf of the Premier, declined to make any representation on the subject to the American Government. Arthur Lynch, Nationalist, then tried to carry the war into the Unionist camp by inviting Lloyd George to ascertain how much money American heiresses had furnished to foment civil war in Ireland, but hilarious shouts from the Opposition of "Where is Harcourt?" reminded him that there were American heiresses in both camps. Robert Vernon Harcourt, the Radical member, is a son of Lady Harcourt, daughter of John Motley, former United States Minister in London.




