

Newfoundland Pays the Price

that Mr. Albert Kelly, of Cupids, was one of the unfortunate victims who perished on H. M. S. Viknor, a steamer converted into an auxiliary cruiser which was recently reported los with all hands off the coast of Ireland An uneasy feeling existed that Sea man Kelly was unlikely to have been the only Newfoundland reservis aboard and unfortunately this uncer tainty resolved itself into a certainty when a despatch arrived this morning that of the crew of 258 men, ther were 24 of the Royal Naval Reserve Men from Newfoundland. This statement was made after the publication of the casualty list last night. We immediately communicated with the Prime Minister to know if it was possible to obtain the names of the men, or if there was anything official in relation to the matter, and received the wing reply:

"Up to one o'clock to-day the Government had received no information in relation to the names of those who have been lost; nor indeed of the fact that any Newfoundlanders had been lost on the ship. On Wednes-day, the 27th instant, I received a message from Rev. R. H. Maddock and also from Mr. Walter M. Kelly, of Brigus, Conception Bay, asking for information regarding the same matter I immediately requested His Excel-lency the Governor to cable the Admiralty to obtain details, but so far nothing has been received. After reading the public despatch this morning I called upon His Excellency the Governor, and he is hoping to have a reply early during the day. Immediately upon the receipt of information regarding the names of those lost, if the news should unfortunately be true, arrangements have been made to tele graph the same to the relatives of the missing men."

Canada Should Act.

The Norwegian sealing steamer Njord has decided not to clear from a Newfoundland port for the seal fishery, as was the intention origin-ally. The reason given is that the owners will not go to the expense of the installation of wireless apparatus that the Act passed at the War Sessio last September, makes imperative. Hobson reviewed the situation in Europe

conduct by both sides in the present war and to the arbitary treatment of American ships, he declared the situation closely parellelled conditions which led to war with France in 1800 and to that with England in 1812.
