

As a self-governing Dominion Newfoundland has been called upon to do her part in filling the gaps. Public Notice

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alternatives as regards the method of payment:-

(a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Resesrve men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

The following form is to be compiled and forwarded direct to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, Newfoundland, at the earliest possible date:-

AUTHORISING DISPOSAL.

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.

In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to obtain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.

"FOR VALOUR" IN AIR FIGHTING LONDON, May 1.

Via Reuters Ottawa Agency. The wonderful exploit of a young Manitoba airman, in a fight in the air which won him the Victoria Cross, is officially told to-night. The recipient is Second Lieutenant Alan A. McLeod, son of Dr McLeod of Stonewall, Man He is only eighteen years of age and had served in France less than two months and in the service only a year receiving part of his training in Canada. The official story says the Victoria Cross has been awarded to 2nd Lieut. Alan A. McLeod, who, whilst flying with an observer, Lieut. W. nond, in a bombing machine, gunning hostile formations, was attacked at a height of five thousand feet by eight enemy triplanes. By skilful manoeuvering he enabled his observer to shoot down three of these out of control. Lieut. McLeod was by this time wounded five times and a bullet penetrated the patrol tank and set fire to his machine. He then climbed out to the left bottom plane, controlling the machine from the side of the fuselage, and by sideslipping steeply, kept the flames to one side, enabling the observer to continue firing until the ground was reached. The observer had been wounded six times and when the machine crashed in "no man's land" Lieut. McLeod, despite his own wounds dragged him away from the burning wreckage at great personal risk from heavy enemy machine gun fire. Although again wounded by a bomb, Lieut. McLeod managed to place Lieut. Hammond in comparative safety, before he fell himself from exhaustion and loss of blood. It is understood that Lieut. McLeod is in a London hospital and







Newfoundland, but St. John's in particular, have, for past years been used to burning what is commonly known as "North Sydney Coal," mined at Sydney mines by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company. Roughly estimated your imports of the said goods were between seventy and eighty thousand tons of North Sydney

Whilst this conflict has been in progress, wires have been pulled and all means used by Capitalists to dominate the above named Company, eventually resulting in United States Capitals ists assuming control; not for the value of the Coal Mines but for your Iron Ore deposits located at Bell Is-

Since the new management assumed control they have gradually withheld supplies of coal from Newfoundland, until to-day they have stopped all shipments to Newfoundland for the present season. The excuse being that they want all for their own use. Why? To manufacture Steel, and that not necessarily for War purposes. Whence comes the Ore for said manufacture? From yours. Hence, the day has come, when, if they must have their Ores from this location at Bell Island, then, they should pay for it. Surely, an export duty of say \$3.00 per ton (which it can stand) might make them sit up? The remedy is in the hands of your Government. Your Government will say: "the Dominion Coal Company will see to our supplies." Wait and see, and perhaps go heatless in your homes.


