





## Cured Herring. Although this market remains quiet

and buyers continue to adhere to a policy of buying from hand-to-mouth. here are indications of improvement, which, considered in the light of present day conditions, are at least hopeful. It is noted that the domestic trade has been taking on small quantities of Newfoundland Scotch cured herring of late, and local importers report that New York buyers have been seeking quotations of more liberal quantities than have been selling. This new condition is at variance with the outlook of a few weeks ago when it was reported that some 25,000 barrels of Newfoundland Scotch herring were yet to be shipped from St. John's to New York. Moreover, it is reported from several points in Newfoundland that the pack of herring during the winter and spring was far and away superior to the pack of last fall. In explanation of this improvement in the quality of the Newfoundland herring of the spring and winter pack it is stated that the lesson of last fall "brought packers to their senses." According to inspectors for the Newfoundland Government who have latey completed inspections at Green Bay, the quality of the herring being shipped from there to-day is in every respect superior to that shipped last winter. New York importers doubtless will be glad to learn of the improved quality of the Newfoundland herring, for it is recognized that one of the most serious drawbacks this season has been the uncertain and general inferior quality of the offerings. So far as could be learned the prevailing prices in the market are unchanged. Holders are asking from \$16 to \$18 and even \$20 for fancy large fulls, while small herring can be purchased from \$12 and up, according to size and quality. The stock of winter and spring herring now in New York is variously priced at from \$12 to \$16, the greater quantity being held at the lower figure. Further shipments of new stocks will be coming forward from now on, and it may be expected that before cooler weather there will be a liberal stock on the spot in New York .- N.Y. Fishing Gazette, Aug. 9.

### Salt and Pickled Herring

The market being without feature and practically no demand in evidence, except for an occasional order for export, the salt and pickled herring situation has attracted little attention in the trade of late. There have been a few offerings of split in New York at the prevailing market quotations, and it is understood that sales have been effected on the basis of the prevailing prices in small lots, but there has been no outstanding development in this department. While there are holders who still continue to maintain their prices for splits at \$8 and \$9 per barrel for large, there are stocks of good quality to be had at \$7 per barrel, and it is probable that most holders of Newfoundland splits would be willing to sell at this figure. Round herring, on the other hand, has so long been a "dead letter" in the market that there is practically no interest shown in it. Those who hold light stocks of this grade are free to state that they have not been able to move it at any prices, and many have expressed a willingness to sell at buyers' terms .- N. Y. Fishing Gaz-

Two Derby winners have died at sea. Blue Gown, the hero of '68, was sold to a wealthy American for £4,-000, and died on the voyage across the herring pond. 



### Nitrates.

Supply.

During the great war one often heard the alarming cry about the shortage of nitrates. What if we should be cut off from the nitrate fields of South America? was the question often raised.

For the time being, we receive practically all of our nitrate supply from the great lake in Chili. Sodium nitrate, also called Chili saltpetre, is found in natural deposits in desert regions along the west coast of South America, especially near the boundary lines between Peru, Chili, and Bolivia. The territory is now chiefly owned by Chili. The deposits extend about 220 miles in length, and the average width about two miles.

There is practically no rain in this nitrate district. Water and fuel are both very scarce; so much so, in fact, that they are employed as economically as possible in refining the crude ore. The sodium nitrate crystals are only partially pure when they are drained and dried in the sun, and then packed for shipment as crude

the turmstion of the mirate beds or lakes is attributed to the decomposition of sea plants under such conditions of temperature and humidity that the ammonia produced was converted into nitrate by the action of the nutrifying baccilus, an organism found in the soil. The region being rainless, the sodium nitrate was not washed away.

The chief use of this material is in making gunpowder and explosives. matches, fireworks, and in certain metallurgical and analytical operations. It is even employed for curing meat. It can be prepared into excellent chemical fertilizer. Still nearer home to most of us city folk, it can be used in making "laughing" gas, which is what the dentist gives his patient to put him to sleep preparatory to pulling out a troublesome

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
