A great amount of fish caught off the Labrador Coast during last season and cured at Newfoundland fishing ports remain unsold. This is explained as largely due to the fact that because of differences in exchange rates and other abnormal conditions, there has been a very poor




Slowly but surely the Meigle began to lessen the distance caused by an hour's advantage gained by her




