



Chinese farmers are now driving ox teams and ploughs over land that was once the proudest possession of a monarch whose glory rivalled that of has so far given it little prominence. It was about 100 years before Alexander the Great conquered Egypt, or late in the second century B.C., there arose a king in the comparatively small China who by conquest founded an Empire which lasted until almost the present day. This was Shih Huang Ti, known as the "first emperor," whose rule, ending in 209 B. C., marked the close of the feudal period and the beginning of the empire in Chinese history. He subdued the feudal princes, built the famed great wall of China and successfully defended the country from Tartara from the north, standardized money, transportation, writing and other things, which aided centralization and destroyed as much of the ancient classics and traditions as possible, with the idea that the history of the

Chinese Empire should begin with his reign. Among the feudal kingdoms which the emperor subdued was that of Yen, the Capital City, of which-Yen Ching is now to be excavated. Yen Ching was a city of immense areas and probably of very considerable population. The high development of art at that time is believed to promise that relics to be found will furnish an arch-

aeological of singular interest. Yen Ching, however, is but one of the many cities in China which offer a fertile field for the seeker of archaeological treasures. In Northern China, along the banks of the Yellow River, early Chinese civilization flourished. Search among the ruins of this country should disclose relics of the Tang dynasty, which furnished a brilliant period in ancient Chinese



Flour For Many Millions Comes From Minneapolis.

Minneapolis, March 10. (A.P.)---Minneapolis maintained its title of "Mill City" in 1923, during which year flour to feed approximately 1,000,000 people, or almost onehird of the population of the United States, was shipped from the mills of the city.

Figures announced by the secre-

tary's office of the Chamber of Commerce show that 54,966 cars, or 15, 458 740 harrels of flour were shipped from here during the year 1923. Usng the millers' unofficial estimate of alf a barrel per capita consumption year, based on previous years tabulations, the flour shipments total would indicate that about 31,000,-000 men, women and children were fed with bread and breadstuffs from

the local production. Totals for 1923 were considerably owen than the 1922 figures, the mills here running much below capacity most of the year. In 1922 60,449 cars containing 17,444,892 barrels

were shipped The 26 local flour mills have a normal capacity of practically 100,-000 barrels flour production a day, but insufficiency of suitable wheat raised in the northwest in recent years has curtailed the operations of the mills.

The mother of a child who is a consistent small eater should make a study of food values in order to plan out meals that will supply the maximum of nourishment with the minimum of hulk,

Duchess of Atholl Now Member of Parliament

NOTED FOR DEMOCRATIC MAN-

London, Feb. 20. (A.P.)-Rubbing elbows with plain folks is nothing new in the life of the Duchess of Atholl, who, from the angle of aristocracy, outranks all the other members of the new House of Commons The wife of a soldier, she nursed the wounded near the firing lines in two wars, that with the Boers in South Africa and the more recent war. At ome in Scotland she has a big say in all that has to do with public ducation and, through her social welfare activities during many years, has gained the reputation of the 'under dog."

The duchess, like Lady Astor, is petite and has a similar penchant for ropes of pearls to adorn the neck. But she is not so vivacious nor so girlish in physical contour as the Virginia-born viscountess. For one thing she is older. She was born 50 years ago, the eldest daughter of a Scottish knight, Sir James H. Ram-

A few months after her marriage in 1899 to John George Stewart-Murray, eldest surviving son of the then Duke of Atholl, the Boer war began. Her husband was ordered out and the next June she followed him to South Africa. There she ministered to the hospitaled "tommies" and was especially kind to the Scottish Horse, and irregular corps raised by her husband, then a marquess, in South Africa. Returning from the war, the duchess began writing "The Military History of Perthshire," which she did with such thoroughness that it required five years to complete the two volumes. In the world war she followed her husband again, this time to Gallipoli with the Scottish Horse, and then to Egypt, where she aided in Red Cross

Despite her work as a leading member of the Perthshire Education Authority and her labors with the poor of the Highlands and Lowlands, and the organizing of nursing associations throughout Perthshire which embraces more than 1,600 square miles, the duchess dipped into politics with ardor several years ago. In the elections of January and December, 1910, when the Marquess Tullibardine contested the contituency, she was his chief of staff. speaking and canvassing almost laily. This year, when she stood for Parliament herself, she got in by the slim majority of 500 in a district that has 25,000 voters. 


