The debate raised by the explanations made by the Commissioner of Crown Lands was resumed by Mr. Cumberland, who declared he was free from party trammels, and would judge every measure on its merits, not on party principles.

Mr. Sexton, in a very able speech, declared that the Government was not a coalition, and that it should receive the hearty support he had given to its leader in Opposition. He expressed too, his hearty approval of the arrangements of the Cabinet, by which all classes and sections were ensured a voice in the national council.

Mr. McCallum promised to give the Government a fair support, and to judge it by its measures.

Mr. Lander denounced the President of the Council for increasing the number of the Executive Council, and for pressing a vote against the late Government when eight constituences were unrepresented. The Toronto Telegraph has for a week past been parading a batch, of affidavits, sworn to by settlers in the Raid on Concert Saloons in New York.
