

North Wellington Election Protest.

We stated yesterday that the Speaker had overruled all objections in reference to the petition against the return of Col. Higinbotham, and has decided to hand it over to a Committee.

Dominion Parliament.

Ottawa, May 2. Mr. Mackenzie asked if the statement that the Governor-General would assent to the Oaths to Witness Bill was correct.

The Premier replied in the affirmative. Mr. Holton urged that the reasons for the extraordinary delay in obtaining his Excellency's decision should be explained to-day.

Sir John A. Macdonald, in angry tones, declared he would not be lectured by Mr. Holton; that he knew the obligation of his oath as a Privy Councillor, and would not break it to please the member for Chateaugay.

On the motion to go into Supply upon the supplementary estimates for the current year.

Mr. Mackenzie brought up his resolution condemning the proceedings of the Government in relation to the Inter-colonial Railway section No. 5. In a closely reasoned and vigorous speech, he reviewed the errors connected with the policy of the Government from the inception of the scheme.

He showed how the precipitancy with which the work was commenced without necessary information had led to the most disastrous results and the failure of contractors, and the delay and pecuniary loss resulting therefrom.

Mr. Mackenzie, in the Inter-colonial Railway section No. 5. In a closely reasoned and vigorous speech, he reviewed the errors connected with the policy of the Government from the inception of the scheme.

He showed that the Commissioners had undertaken in the instance of the Government, in effect, to pay a large sum of money not within the terms of any contract they were authorized to make, and without the sanction of Parliament.

He alluded to the fact that at least one member of Parliament was interested in an interest in the contract, and that if the Government could not get their pleasure in dealing with these great sums of the public money, no limits could be fixed to the powers they might usurp.

He moved in conclusion a long resolution setting forth all the facts and conclusions of the motion, and the Commissioners as a gross violation of the public duty, whilst it ignored the plain terms of a public contract.

Hon. Dr. Tupper followed and in terms of, for him, unusual moderation replied to Mr. Mackenzie's speech. He accepted the motion as a direct vote of want of confidence. He defended the route chosen in 1868, and the mode of construction determined upon.

VALIDITY OF NOTES.—Mr. J. H. Cameron has introduced a bill, which provides that no bill of exchange or promissory note shall be invalid, either because it is not stamped, or is insufficiently stamped, or that any formality as to the date or erasure of the stamps affixed thereto, has been omitted, that a wrong date has been placed on such stamps, but no recovery shall be had, nor any verdict or judgement be rendered in any court upon such bill or note, unless before such recovery, verdict or judgement, stamps to the value of one quarter of a dollar upon every one hundred dollars payable in and by the said bill or note are affixed and cancelled upon such bill or note.

It is stated that a minute in Council has been passed approving of Col Robertson Ross's scheme for the military defence of the North-west. He proposes to place 200 men in summer at Fort Garry, and 300 in the winter; 50 mounted rifle men at Portage LaPrairie; 100 at Fort Francis; 50 at Carleton House; 50 at Fort Pitt; 50 at Fort Victoria; 100 at Edmonton, and 150 and a Custom House at Kootena Pass. It is possible in view of Indian troubles and American whiskey traders that the force will have to be organized for service during the present season.

THE LAND GRANT TO DODGE.—The Newmarket Era has confirmatory evidence that the now notorious Dodge, of North York, has obtained the land grant in Manitoba from the Dominion Government. It says that the first transaction was effected last fall, after the election, and that a second grant was secured, adjoining the first timber limit, since he went to Ottawa to attend Parliament. It also states that Dodge has already decided not to face his old Reform supporters in North York, but will try his chance in North Simcoe.

Perhaps one of the most noticeable instances of the power of public opinion is the fact of so many members of the U. S. Congress disjoining the back pay they had voted themselves. The press with remarkable unanimity called the transaction "stealing," and the result is that numbers of the members are either returning the money to the Treasury or applying it to some public object.

The Ottawa Times on the authority of all the British Columbia members, except one, denies that they are seeking representation in the Cabinet since the retirement of Sir Francis Hincks.

Prince Edward Island has a debt of \$3,400,000, which is not so bad for a little place.

The Hon James Brooks, a noted journalist and politician died at Washington on Wednesday.

Manitoba Items. Of the seventy-five soldiers who will be discharged on the first of May, about fifty will remain here.

In one day, Thursday last, a saw-mill was put up, got into running order, and turned out some fine lumber.

One of the individuals who formed the firing party at the Scott murder, was in the neighborhood of the Fort last week, and took occasion to boast of the part he had taken in the matter. A bystander, who overheard him, took him to the scene of the execution and administered to him a castigation which will take the boast out of him for some time to come.

In Winipeg eleven new houses are almost completed, and there are twenty-nine more commenced.—Free Press.
