

The Niagara escarpment, over which the great cataract tumbles, is a potent natural divider, and the probability is that the system of savigation below the Falls will have to remain permanently different from that which is practicable above. Our own vessel men are pretty well agreed that fourteen feet depth is the best which is likely ever to be achieved in the Welland Canal, although, as we have said, it is practicable enough for vessels loaded down to sixteen feet to lighten two feet and get through. The Welland Canal limit, therefore, must also be regarded as the limit of what is practicable below the Falls.

But in connection with all this there is something more to be said, which must not be forgotten. Perhaps it can be shown that there exists below the Falls the making and the material of an extensive and valuable traffic, which can be economically done with vessels capable of passing the great Niagara barrier. The "colliers" that do the Nova Sootia coal trade, or a great part of it, are not large vessels; and for this class of vessels it is an important recommendation that they are very oheap to run. Between the grain trade of the upper lakes on one hand and the large Nova Scotia coal trade, via the St. Lawrence, which both can be and ought to be developed and built up, on the other hand—we may see important differences, if we look for them.
