Prohibition in P. E. I.

(St. John Globe.) be able to judge how the new act will work in promoting the temperance cause and the prosperity of the people. Practically, the people of Prince Edward Island have had prohibition for more than twenty years. The Canada Temperance Act has been in operation for that period in all parts of the province except the city of Charlottetown, and it has been in operation in Charlottetown except for two brief periods, 1891 to 1894 and 1897 to the present time. In the counties the Scott Act has not been disturbed since it was first adopted—in 1878 counties the Scott Act has not been dis-turbed since it was first adopted—in 1878 in Prince county, in 1879 in Kings, and in 1880 in Queens. There is the usual differ-ence of opinion as to whether or not the act accomplishes any good, but the majority of the people certainly thought it was an excel-lent law to have on the statute books, and have kept it there. The prohibitory law ap-parently was designed for two purposes—to affect the city of Charlottetown, where the people did not favor the federal law, and to provide severer penalties than the Scott Act imposed. The prohibitory law provides \$100 fine for the first and \$200 for the second offence, with proportionate terms of imprisoffence, with proportionate terms of impris-comment in case of default, and for a third ofment in case of default, and for a third ofnce imprisonment for eix months without

Decline of British Agriculture.

London Daily Mail. agriculture still pureues its painful course. The area under corn crops in Great Britain, which a generation ago, in 1870, was 9,548,000 acres, has fallen to 7,355,000 acres; that is to say it is less by one-quarter than it was then. The area under green crops has also fallen almost as heavily, while only the acreage laid down in grass and clover shows an increase. In horses, cattle, sheep, and pigs there is a slight advance in the period, but not such as to keep pace with the increase in population or to compensate for the diminished corn production. 
