Adam, the sinless man, was tempted and fell; Christ, "the second Adam," the sinless Saviour, in like manner met man's arch-enemy and vanquished him. As the garden was a fitting type of Adam's innocence, so the wilderness in which Christ met Satan, correspond-ed to man's condition of moral desolation through sin.
