

To the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.

4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. A Fund to provide higher education for the children of the Clergy.

6. To provide bibles, prayer books and religious publica-

tions, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Church-Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being Members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment, and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund; (b) the capital arising from the Commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, (e) the interest of the Sustentation Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, Bergerville, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Commissary General Irvine, C.B., C.M.G., Quebec, the Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society.

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ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon, 2nd February, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair.

After prayers the minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Committee were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

The accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Bishopric Endowment Fund, Local Endowment Funds, the Church Society and Diocesan Board were adopted and ordered to be printed.

The report of the St. Francis District Association, giving an interesting account of the work of the Church in that portion of the Diocese, was read by the Secretary and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report.

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected.

Twenty-four new members of Corporation were elected.

The Hon Counsel were re-elected.

Eighteen members were elected to serve on the Central Board.

The members of Clergy Trust Committee and Diocesan Board were elected.

The following amendments to Art. XII of the By-laws were introduced:—

"That the word ten in line 3, clause 2, be struck out, and fourteen substituted; and that the words five in line 4 be struck out and 7 substituted." (Mr. C. Judge.)

"That after the word committee in first line of clause 3 the following words be inserted: 'With the advice and

consent of the Investment Committee appointed by the Central Board." (Mr. G. Veasey.)

Geo. Veasey, Esq., having resigned the position of treasurer of the Clergy Trust, the following resolution was carried unanimously:—

Moved by Comy. Genl. M. B. Irvine, C.B., C.M.G., seconded by John Hamilton, Esq.,

"That the Church Society have learned with great regret that Mr. Veasey finds it necessary to resign the treasurership of the Clergy Trust Fund, and desire to express to Mr. Veasey their high appreciation of the faithful and valuable services he has rendered during the last nine years with so much assiduous labour and watchful care."

Resolutions of thanks were unanimously adopted to the Honorary Counsel and to the Auditors.

ON PATRONAGE OF THE PARISH OF QUEBEC.

A By-law was read for the first time, declaring: "That the right of presenting an Incumbent or Minister to the Parsonage or Rectory of the Parish Church of Quebec, shall vest in and be exercised by the Lord Bishop of Quebec, with the concurrence of the said congregation, in the manner provided by the Canon of the Diocesan Synod now numbered XIII, or may hereafter be provided by future Canon, subject nevertheless to the right to this Society of repealing the present By-law, and resuming to themselves the said right of presentation whenever they may deem proper."

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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1886.

(Presented to the Church Society, February 2nd, 1887.)

In presenting the Forty-fifth Annual Report, the Central Board would desire to call special attention to the great need of systematic offerings for Church work. If each member of the Church would become a regular subscriber there would be no need of spasmodic appeals.

Our giving either for Missions, Church building, Schools or other Christian work should not depend upon temporary impulse, emotion or excitement, but it should be done on deliberate principles, such as should guide any one who professes himself or herself a Christian.

Your Board would also beg to remind members of the Society of the following words in article V of the By-Laws, viz: "The annual subscriptions shall be considered due on the first day of January in each year."

The present mode of payment, as a rule, is to delay till the last week or even the last day in December, and yet the Treasurer is expected to find funds for the regular quarterly disbursements.

It is much to be desired that the subscriptions should be collected and forwarded to the Hon. Treasurer as promptly as possible after the 1st of January in each year, and that the Local Treasurers in the several Deaneries should remit the offertories immediately they are received from the various Missions and Parishes.

From the following comparative statement it will be seen that there is a deficiency in the total amount received, as compared with last year, of \$553.91:—

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

The following grants have been paid during the year, viz:—\$400 towards maintaining eighteen Day Schools, \$100 as outfit to two Clergymen, and \$150 to the Endowment Fund of St. Peter's Church, Cookshire. It is with regret that the Board has again to report its inability to pay the long promised grants to the Parsonages at Magog and Valcartier. An application has been received for a grant towards the Parsonage at New Liverpool, but from the lack of funds it must be held over for future consideration.

It is satisfactory to notice a slight increase in the General Fund, as compared with the last return of \$60.62.

Your Board is of opinion that if the Clergy would lay the requirements of the fund before their people, a sufficient amount would readily be given to place the fund in a satisfactory condition.

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The Cathedral Church, which has done so much for the Missions of the Diocese, has given very valuable aid to the General Fund for many years. Recently an effort was made to increase the number of regular systematic subscribers by means of a well drawn up circular, but unfortunately it has met with no response. This failure your Board thinks should serve as a warning not to be content with circulars, but that personal application should be made by collectors competent to explain the operations of the Society and its claims upon the liberality of Churchmen

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual Grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a Grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the Interest of the Invested Capital of the Sustentation Fund, administered by the Diocesan Board.)

An account of the Missionary operations of the Society will be found in the report of the Diocesan Board. It is satisfactory to notice that the receipts for this fund shew an increase of \$12.81 over last year, notwithstanding the large amount which has recently been subscribed for extending Missionary operations in certain parts of the Diocese.

Your Board has much pleasure in drawing special attention to the very able and interesting report from the Deanery of St. Francis, which bears ample testimony to the progress of Church work in that section of the Diocese.

PENSION FUND.

(For Aged and Infirm Clergymen.)

It is with regret your Board notices a decrease in the receipts for this fund during the year of \$534.37. There are now three clergymen on the Pension List.

There has been a slight decrease in the receipts during the year of \$47.37.

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The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Committee, and will, in the opinion of your Board, tend much to further the interests of this branch of the Society's work:—

That the Secretary-Treasurer, when ordering Books or Tracts for the Depository, do submit the order list to the Committee, and that he is hereby authorized to make selections from various publishers, provided nothing is sold to the actual detriment of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge.

EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

Your Board notices with regret a falling off in the receipts for this fund during the past year of \$45.60. No grant was received from the General Fund for this object last year, and there is no prospect of any assistance from that quarter during the present year. It is therefore much to be feared that but little aid can be extended to the clergy for the year 1887-8. There are at present six children upon the fund.

EDUCATION.

The various schools aided by your Society have been carried on with much efficiency during the past year.

In consequence of the very limited amount to the credit of the *General Fund* from which grants are made for educational purposes, a reduction has been made in the sum given to several of the schools for the coming year.

The following report has been received from Mr. G. W. Willis, School-Master on the Labrador:—

"So soon as the peol were settled in their winter quarters, I opened school in a small school-house, lent us

by the Congregationalists at St. Paul's or Esquimaux River. My school material being very limited and the building small; I was obliged to limit the number of scholars to twenty, and that number included pretty nearly all the Church children in the settlement from six or seven years of age up to about fifteen. A number of older boys and girls expressed a wish to attend, but for reasons above stated I was unable to receive them. The Reverend J. Eames opened a night school for them (twice a week) with a roll of about twelve scholars two of them were Roman Catholics.

There are a number of Roman Catholic children in this locality, some of whom would have attended had I given them any encouragement, but this next winter having more school books, &c., &c., I may be able to take some of them, although the school-house will scarcely be able to accommodate over eighteen or twenty scholars.

The school-house was visited by the Missionary, Rev. J. Eames, shortly before he left the coast, and the children were examined in the branches taught. He expressed himself well satisfied with the work done and the progress made.

On the roll 20, twelve girls, eight boys; average attendance, 17. Subjects taught: Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Spelling, Geography, also a little Grammar and History of Canada (Dr. Miles' first book).

School opened and closed with prayers.

At Sunday School all the Church children are taught the catechism. A Bible class was held by Mr. Eames for the older boys and girls.

Of the twenty scholars all are Church children, except

four who are Congregationalists.

The above school was kept going till the month of March, when the people all scatter for their summer homes, outside on the Islands. I then move up to another harbour and give instruction to a few children that I had not heretofore been able to reach and remain with them till the month of June.

In the county it is impossible to keep school very long in one place, as the people live only five or six months in their winter home, and then move outside ten or fifteen miles to their summer houses where they carry on their fisheries."

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ifteen their From the above interesting report your Board learns with much satisfaction that school work is progressing on the Labrador and that the people value the benefits of a sound education. It is much to be hoped that Mr. Willis will be able to enlarge his school-room before next winter and thus be able to receive all those into the school who are desirous of attending.

The Colonial and Continental Church Society has generously aided the Education Committee with a grant of \$386.37 towards assisting the payment of salaries of teachers during the past year.

Before passing away from the subject of Education it may be well to notice what has been done in one of our poor and struggling Missions, and which should serve as an incentive to others.

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In the Mission of Bourg Louis some years ago it was found next to impossible to secure teachers for the three District Schools when the Clergymen resolved to try and educate their own teachers with the following result: Two young men were trained in the Mission who subsequently obtained first class Diplomas. They however soon migrated to Bishop's College, where they graduated; one of them is now in charge of the large and important Mission of New Ireland and the other is Principal of the Academy at St. John's near Montreal. Before they left Bourg Louis others were trained to succeed them and the three schools were occupied by native teachers, two with Model School Diplomas and one with an Elementary. Bourg Louis has for years past been celebrated for its excellent staff of teachers who have steadily remained in their positions, and more than this the schools have furnished teachers for other localities.

ENDOWMENTS.

One new Endowment has been formed during the year, viz: that for St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.

Eight Missions have raised the required amount to entitle them to the generous aid given by Robert Hamilton, Esq., towards increasing their Endowment Funds, viz, Richmond and Melbourne, Rivière du Loup (en bas), Ireland and South Inverness, Malbaie and Point St. Peter, Kingsey, Brompton, Stanstead and Cookshire. The Endowment for St. Sylvester will become available during 1887, having reached \$3,600.

Very great difficulty has been experienced by the Investment Committee during the past year in securing suitable investments for the various trusts under the Society's management.

OBITUARY.

Among those who have been removed from us by death since our last report, we may mention:

Miss Kate Mountain, a Life Member, and previous to her removal to England, one of our most active Church workers.

Miss George, another Life Member and annual subscriber, has been called from us full of years. She was a link which bound us to the days long gone by, having attained the advanced age of 98.

Lady Estcourt, known to but few of us, in addition to her Life Membership, contributed for many years to the Mission of the Magdalen Islands.

J. V. Gale, Life Member and ever a liberal subscriber to to the Society's funds.

The Rev. H. D. Sewell, M.A., once so well known as one of our active elergy, but for many years past Rector of Headcorn in Kent, England, a Life Member.

William Chapman, Thos. Poston, Thos. Benson, G. W. Usborne, Life Members, and Mrs. Jamieson, one of the Society's regular supporters, have also gone to their rest.

These we may well remember, as among those for whose "good examples" we bless God's holy name.

The chief point to be observed in the above statement as compared with that for 1885 is that both receipts and expenditure are considerably less, the former by about \$1050 and the latter by over \$800.

The decrease in receipts is due to the heavy reduction in the S. P. G. Grant, not to a falling off in the assessments which have been paid on the whole with regularity. Vacancies in a few Missions during part of the year is the cause of a reduction in the Expenditure.

A slight increase in the Mission Fund collections and in the revenue derived from the Sustentation Fund and Clergy Trust Fund has added somewhat to the balance existing at the close of 1885; but as all the Missions now, except Labrador, have resident elergymen your Board anticipates that a portion of that amount will be required during 1887.

Your Board desires to express its grateful satisfaction at the increase in the subscriptions to the Mission Fund. The increase in itself is not large but taken in connection with the liberal response to the Bishop's special appeal on behalf of a similar object, it is worthy of note as indicating a warm interest in the missionary work of the Diocese.

The special appeal referred to was made by the Bishop at the request of the Synod after a deputation of clergymen from the Deanery of St. Francis had presented a memorial to your Board setting forth the pressing needs of their District, and had also addressed the Synod on the subject.

The memorial drew the attention of the Diocesan Board specially to four neighbourhoods in the Eastern Townships, which offer peculiarly favourable openings for additional work, and urged that as soon as the funds at the disposal of the Board admitted and suitable Missionaries could be found, four additional clergymen should be appointed to the spiritual charge of those four fields, either as independent missionaries, or as placed for the present under the oversight and supervision of the nearest clergy.

Deeply impressed with the necessity of extending the Missionary work of the Church in the District in question and in the District of Gaspé, the Synod requested the Bishop to issue a pastoral letter on the subject and appoint a Committee to secure a guarantee fund of \$1,500 per annum for three years.

Your Board has great pleasure in reporting that as the result of the action taken a sum of \$1,082 has been subscribed annually for the three years and donations to the amount of \$647.72 have been received in addition. Thus \$1,300 per annum is guaranteed for the three years from the Parishes of Quebec. The Deanery of St. Francis have also taken steps to raise at least \$500 per annum among the congregations of that District.

The money received is in the hands of Commissary General Irvine, who has kindly consented to act as Treasurer for this special fund, and will be applied to the object proposed as soon as suitable men can be secured by the Bishop for this difficult and important work.

The grant of the S P. G. will be continued to the Diocese for 1887 without further reduction. This grant

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now amounts to only a little more than half the sum received from assessments.

Twenty-two years ago your Board reported that only \$2,981 had been received from assessments and the same year we received over \$9.500 from the S. P. G. The proportion has altered in inverse ratio with a balance besides in favour of progress.

The reports of the Clergy, which are annexed, are, most of them, of a very interesting character and indicate more than ever that substantial progress is being made in the Missionary work of the Diocese. The details presented can searcely fail to convey the impression that the Missionaries of your Board are doing their work faithfully and efficiently and that amidst many discouragements and trials, as well as much kindly sympathy and aid, they are laying fast the foundations of the Church and building up her walls strongly and securely.

The Parish of Bury has ceased to be connected with the Diocesan Board since the month of October last, and the Revd. Mr. Bernard has accepted the charge of St John's, Melbourne, which was re-opened in the month of November.

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Report of the St. Francis District Association of the Church Society for Year 1886,

The amount of practical interest taken in the missionary work of the Church has been said to be the best test of the spiritual life equally of the individual and of the parish.

If this be true, as we believe it to be, the work which we are associated to promote is not a mere matter of dollars and cents, but is one of the highest spiritual ministries in the kingdom of Christ. A real interest and a progressive interest in Missions is what the Christian heart. in estimating a healthy spiritual life, looks for most anxiously. What progress then has our Society to announce?

Take first the money given to help Missions outside of our

Diocese.

The Treasurer of our Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society tells us that the total amount contributed by the Diocese of Quebec, for the three years ending last July, was \$8,978.

The amount for the last year of the three, was \$3,342. Of this sum, the District of St. Francis contributed a little more than one-fourth, viz: \$900. And of the whole amount sent from the District the Parish of Sherbrooke contributed nearly one-third. What is still more satisfactory, is the steady annual increase in these contributions for missions outside the Diocese. For example the amount sent from Sherbrooke last year was \$158; this year it is \$287.

This was money sent out of the Diocese. If we add to this the money sent out of the individual parishes to help the Missionary work of the Diocese itself, the whole amount contributed this year for extra parochial purposes in St. Francis-or rather in 14 parishes which have reported (6 having sent in no report) has been \$1,690. Last year in the sa of thi parish say, their came from

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the same parishes it was \$1,425, a gain of \$265. The honor of this, however, cannot be equally claimed by all the parishes. Six parishes out of the 14 lell off, we regret to say, by the sum of \$200; the remaining 8, increasing in their contributions to the amount of \$465. Of this \$310 came from Sherbrooke, \$105 from Bishop's College, \$22 from Kingsey, \$20 from Cookshire.

No reports from Richmond and Melbourne, Danville, Dudswell, Drummondville, Bury, Ascot Corner and Westbury.

There is one event in this year's religious history of this District of the greatest importance in itself and very significant as a token of a growing missionary spirit among us. At the Deanery meeting on this day last year, the pressing and growing need for an extension of the Missionary work of the Church in this District—an extension on a large scale—was anxiously discussed by the clergy, and issued in a resolution to bring the matter formally before the Bishop and the Diocesan Board. This was done last July and at the suggestion of the Diocesan Board, the subject was also brought before the Synod, then in session.

The memorial laid before these bodies, followed up by the oral statements of the clergy of the District best acquainted with the facts, excited the warmest interest in Quebec, and it was unanimously resolved by the Synod to request the Bishop to issue a Pastoral Letter appealing to the Diocese in general for the sum of at least \$1,500 a year, for three years, so as to obtain the services of at least three additional clergymen for St. Francis District. The Church people of this District ought never to forget the loving zeal shown in their behalf by the Quebec Committee, the Rev. Messrs. Fothergill and Von Iffland and Mr. George Lampson, who went to work so vigorously that within a few days of the

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issuing of the Bishop's Pastoral, they had raised more than the share assigned to Quebec. It may here be explained that the clergy in talking this matter over among themselves thought that about \$1,000 might be expected from

Quebec and \$500 from St. Francis.

On hearing of the generosity of Quebec, the clergy of St. Francis were of course deeply moved; and though they felt that they must postpone bringing this claim before their congregations until after our present anniversary, nevertheless at their late ruri-decanal meeting the \$500 was assessed in fair proportion among the several parishes of the District, and all the clergy present pledged themselves to raise in their congregation, or, failing this, to pay out of their own pockets at least the sums so assessed. No doubt the liberality of Quebec will provoke an equal liberality among us who are immediately interested, and more than \$500 will be obtained. Indeed we have good hope that enough will be contributed to secure the services of four additional clergymen instead of three.

This simple statement of fact sets forth, much more eloquently than any words could, the rapid growth both of the work of the Church, and of an earnest missionary spirit in our District and Diocese. Who could have believed ten years ago that in December, 1886, eleven out of the 20 clerical charges in our district would be self-supporting parishes; and that in addition to raising \$1,800 a year for the work of the church outside their own parishes, the clergy would voluntarily pledge themselves to raise \$500 a year more for opening three new missions within the District? May we are not say, humbly and thankfully, 'This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous to our eyes?'

ACTON.

The Rev. Louis C. Wurtele reports:-

During the past year the usual Sunday services were regulary kept up. Matins and Evensong in St. Mark's

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were Mark's Church, Acton Vale, and either Litany or Evensong in the Danby Church. Every second Monday evening also Divine Service was held in a private house in West Wickham. Besides these services, a service was held in St. Mark's Church on the chief festivals.

The average attendance at Church was as follows:—In St. Mark's Church, at Matins, 41, and 18 at Evensong; in the Danby Church, 37, and 12 at West Wickham. In all, during the year, I have held Divine Service 177 times, and

just as many sermons were preached.

I am sorry to report the removal of Mr. and Mrs. Unwin from our little congregation. In the beginning of the year they went to reside in New York. They were invaluable Church members, and Mr. Unwin was our Lay Reader as

well as People's Warden.

As the roof of St. Mark's Parsonage needed repairs, it was decided to cover it with sheet-iron. The Canada plate was bought at \$2.35 per box. As a box covers 10 feet square, it cost very little more than good shingles and is much more durable, as by having a coat of paint put on every 4 or 5 years, it may last for 30 years. We succeeded in covering one half of the Parsonage at a cost of \$65, which includes price of plate, nails, paint and painting, and the nailing on of the plate.

We are still a struggling congregation.

During the year, some have died, others have removed elsewhere, but these families, I am happy to state, have been replaced by others. The misfortune of such a state of affairs is that no sooner do we get thoroughly acquainted with a family when generally it has to remove beyond our jurisdiction, and it takes time and judgment to become intimate with new families.

We have not yet diminished our Parsonage debt; it still remain at \$900; but the Trust and Loan Company have taken off one per cent of interest. We have now to pay 7

per cent instead of 8 per cent, as heretofore.

The woolfen factory in the village is doing good work, and at present the looms are kept working until 9 in the evening, and orders have been received which will give work for 6 months to come. There is still hope that better and brighter times are in store for the future of Acton Vale.

ASCOT CORNER AND WESTBURY.—(Received late.)

The Rev. W. Price reports:-

My services and pastoral visiting have been regularly

kept up throughout the year.

The new church at East Angus has been built at a cost of about \$1,000. The plan has been furnished by the Rev. T. S. Chapman, and is the same as the one built by him at Dudswell. We hope to have the Church consecrated at no distant date.

A horse shed is being built at Ascot Corner and is

greatly needed.

The attendance at all our services is encouraging.

A Ladies' Guild has been established at East Angus, the President of which is Mrs. Hall, who is a most energetic worker in behalf of the Church, and my grateful thanks are due to her and also to her daughter, Miss Alberta Hall, who is never absent from her place at the organ on Sundays. The Guild held their sale of fancy work and realized the sum of \$75, which is to be spent in carpeting the chancel of the Church.

The Lord Bishop has been amongst us since my last report, and 24 received the sacred rite of Confirmation.

Baptisms—Adults, 1; Infants, 11. Marriages, 4; Burials, 5. Offertory, \$130; Other purposes, \$900.—Total, \$1030.

BARFORD.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:-

At the close of another year I have to report respecting the work of this Mission. I am thankful to say that I have been enabled to keep my engagements, with but few exceptions. There is little change to note, but, undoubtedly, change is taking place, and in due time growth will become more manifest. I cannot now enter minutely into the character and condition of the different stations. A few notes will be given respecting each.

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Dixville.—Congregation might be much larger. If not grown in numbers, has advanced in seriousness and deyoutness. The new church answers expectations. appertaining to worship, decent and orderly, and progressing in comeliness. The adopting of the Offertory as a part of every service was considered a bold step, and displeased some, but good has come of it, both as bringing blessing to the givers, and helping to pay expenses in a scriptural way. The Sunday School plods along: it would be larger if our only aim was to bring children together. Since instruction in the faith and practice of the Church and good discipline are insisted upon, only those children come to whom these are agreeable. We deem that a small school, well kept, is more beneficial than a large school badly kept. Our thanks are due to the teachers for their patient endeavours. I expect a supply of lamps in a week or two, when we shall be able to have evening services on Saints' and other days in the week. I wish I could report that the assessment was easily raised and promptly paid. There is considerable strain; this, however, will diminish, as the Saviour is more loved and becomes loved by more.

St. Lawrence.—Congregation small in summer, and smaller in winter; no falling back, if no increase. Two young ladies—Miss Ward and Miss Jack—have been very helpful in conducting a Sunday School during summer, and in teaching the children to sing. A blessing must come from their labour of love. The Church has undergone necessary repairs; the ground around has been smoothed, and the fence whitewashed, giving an appearance of greater neatness.

Stanhope.—Congregation good and the work is encouraging. There is sore need of a weekly instead of a fortnightly service. The fortnightly Sunday School continues, taught by myself. Could I only find teachers, how much more benefit would be possible! I recall with pleasure that the assessment has been paid in advance. It lightens one's burden considerably when he sees all dues promptly paid.

Perryboro.—Congregation good, as usual, and is made up of members of almost every house in the neighbourhood that is not Roman Catholic. The communicants are in good proportion to the congregation, above the average, in fact. I record with pleasure the adoption of the Offertory for every service. This congregation thus falls into line

with the Church's practice, and an offering on the first day

of the week becomes a part of divine worship.

Hereford.—This station is not now regularly ministered to, owing to its failure in duty to the Mission Board. However, I occasionally visit the locality as travelling missionary. There are a few who care for our ministrations, and I am glad to give what help I can.

I cannot enter into the matter of spiritual advance. The larger the surface of country the Missionary covers, the less can he do for the deepening of the spiritual life. Great indeed is the need of more missionaries in these parts, that, the Holy Spirit aiding, the dry bones may be made to live. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth more labourers into His harvest."

BISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The Rev. Dr. Adams reports:—

One of our students, the Rev. M. G. Thompson, M.A., was ordained Deacon by the Bishop of Quebec, on Trinity Sunday, at Danville. The Rev. J. Eames, B.A., was ordained Priest at the same time.

One student has been confirmed during the year. In September we had an entry of ten new students, all of

whom are candidates for Holy Orders.

The Holy Communion has been celebrated every Sunday and on Saints' Days. Special celebrations have been held on the days set apart once a term for the meeting of the Missionary Union. On November 18 (Thanksgiving Day) a special celebration was held, when there were 30 communicants. There have been in all 50 celebrations of the Holy Communion in the Chapel, from December 1, 1885, to November 30, 1886, and an average attendance of seventeen at each.

Several students have worked with success at neighbouring Missions, and students have been usefully employed in taking Sunday work for the Clergy. The Principal has visited Milby monthly to celebrate the Holy Communion

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and preach. Mr. Sharpe and Mr. Carson are now in charge of the Milby Mission. The Rev. A. Judge, of Cookshire, having recently obtained permanent lay help, the students do not at present visit Sandhill and Johnville. Mr. Murray has worked in these Missions up to November,

In the College there has been formed a branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, which has been joined by nearly every member of the resident body. A

branch has also been formed in the School

There has been a considerable interest in the work of Missions—Foreign and Domestic—during the year. The Union numbers in College and School about 90 members. The Missionary offertories and subscriptions have amounted to about \$130.

We have had Missionary addresses or sermons from the Bishop of Algoma, the Rev. A. H. Judge and the Rev. Dr. Wright, of Montreal. Thirteen of the boys were confirmed in the spring by the Bishop of Quebec, one of them having been received into the Church by Baptism a few days before. Another baptism took place on December 10, 1885.

During the Michaelmas Term a voluntary devotional reading of the Greek Testament has been held weekly. The Epistle to the Philippians has been read and the

attendance of students has been good.

Three classes have been kept up every Sunday in the School. In the senior class the Gospel of St. John has been read; in the intermediate class, the Prayer Book (especially the Catechism and the Communion Office) has been studied. In the junior class, the Collect Epistle and Gospel for the Day has been taken.

The offertories in the Chapel have amounted to \$278.35, besides \$29.97 subscribed by members of the Missionary

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Dr. Roe reports:—

The only College Missions under my charge during the past year have been Johnville and Lake Megantic. The students, bowever, who served Johnville, took the services at Sandhill on the same day. I have been assisted in the work at Johnville by Mr. George Murray and Mr. Henry Wright.

This Mission station has now passed from under our charge to that of the Rev. A. II. Judge, who, owing to the appointment of a licensed lay-reader to help him, soon to be replaced by an assistant-curate, has undertaken the pastoral charge of the entire Township of Eaton, including both St. Luke's Church, Sandhill, and the Mission station of Johnville. I need not say how thankful we are to see the work at these places assume this position of permanency and pass under the charge of so zealous and loving a pastor as Mr. Judge. We have been working at Sandhill upwards of ten years and upwards of three at Johnville. The services at Johnville have been once a fortnight on Sunday afternoon, followed by classes for the young people. At the Confirmation held by the Lord Bishop at Sandhill on the 28th of March last, I had the satisfaction of presenting six candidates from Johnville, prepared by myself as

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carefully as the time at my disposal would permit, in addition to the instruction given them by the students.

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entf as There are now in Johnville and its neighbourhood fifteen Church families, besides three families more, a portion of which belong to us.

Nearly four years ago very urgent appeals were made to me to supply the settlers at Lake Megantic with religious services from the College. The distance—70 miles from Lennoxville by rail, and seven miles additional by bush road—created a serious difficulty. Nevertheless the work was undertaken and carried on for nearly a year, but was suffered to fall through by the people on the spot, owing to their failure to collect the subscriptions, which were abundantly sufficient, required to pay the railway fare and board of the student serving them. Some months back they applied to have the services restored again, and we have done so, the work—a fortnightly Sunday service at Agnes and Ditchfield—being undertaken by Mr. Joseph Miller King, a Divinity student, of the Diocese of Montreal.

Before we consented to renew these services at Lake Megantic, the Rev. W. C. Bernard, of Bury, kindly went out at my request, and reported to me fully on the condition of things there. He also on the same occasion gave them a Sunday service and baptized a number of children for the settlers.

The number of families belonging to the Church at Lake Megantic, within a circuit of ten miles, is twenty, and six adults not reckoned in families.

The statistics of St. Luke's, Sandhill, will appear in the report of the Rev. W. Price, under whose charge it has been during the past year.

Contributed for expenses of the missions:—Johnville, \$25; Lake Megantic, \$25.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. T. L. Ball reports :—

Brompton.—The death of Mr. Webb and removal of Mrs. Mack to Lennoxville have caused a general feeling of discouragement. Fully one-half of all contributions for Church purposes was from this family. I am happy to say this estimable lady has promised still to keep the Mission

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of Brompton among her works of piety, and I have no fears, if the families remaining in the neighborhood are true to the Church in their midst. \$200 has been added to the Endowment Fund exclusive of interest during the year, \$150 of which was the generous contribution of Mr. Hamilton, and the remainder raised in the township of Brompton. At the Falls, monthly services regularly held in the school house, the people here have contributed \$15 raised at a social entertainment to the Endowment Fund, and \$13 towards the assessment of Brompton Church by Diocesan Board.

Windsor Mills.—The congregation here is a transitory one, 25 souls at least moved away in October, being thrown out of employment by the burning of the Paper Mill. The Ladies' Association has been the principal supporter during the year. The Church has been enlarged and paid for with only \$50 raised outside the congregation. This, with the assessment, rent of rooms for Missionary and other expenses has taxed their energies severely, but with a little help from the men they have met all the bills, and there is not a single dollar of debt against the congregation from any quarter.

Hardwood Hill.—The congregation has pushed on their Church building as rapidly as could be reasonably expected. If they do as much next year with what funds we have

the Church will be ready for use in the Autumn.

BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

The Church services have been carried on without interruption during the year. The attendance has been remarkably good.

From July to September, the usual Sunday Evening Service was discontinued to enable me to go to Lake St. Joseph and St. Raymond. Through the kindness of Mr. fears, ue to o the year, Mr. ip of held d \$15

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ening ke St. f Mr. J. G. Scott, manager of the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway, a hand-car was sent every Sunday afternoon to convey me from the Bourg Louis Station to the Lake, where the steam yacht of Mr. Robert Sissons was in readiness to take me across to the Lakeview House, where the service was held in the drawing room, the Telegraph Office being used for a vestry, and the piano, under Mrs. Ritchie's excellent management, furnishing a good accompaniment for the congregational singing which was very bright and hearty.

The same novel conveyance landed me at St. Raymond

in time for Evening Service.

Since the departure of the visitors from the Lake, I have had service at St. Raymond in the afternoon and at

Bourg Louis in the evening.

The Holy Communion has been celebrated fortnightly on Sundays, and during the warm weather, on the Festivals. It affords me great pleasure to report an increasing interest in the majority of our people in this Principal Service of the Church, the number of Communicants having more than doubled during the latter half of the year. With reference to Baptisms, I should mention an interesting trip to Beaudet Station, over fifty miles north of St. Raymond, to baptize four children.

Our three schools have been working very successfully. The school houses have been put into an excellent state of order, and there is every prospect of successful work in the future. The teachers have, during the week, taught the Catechism to the pupils and imparted to them other religious instruction, but I discover after long experience that no week-day teaching can really make up for the systematic training of the Sunday School. Our people are now generally most eager for their children's mental and spiritual improvement, and I have consequently strong hopes of being able soon to report a flourishing Sunday School:—

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The Rev. W. C. Bernard reports:-

The work in this parish since my last report, up to the time of my leaving, at the end of October, was carried on in much the same order as last year. Service at St. Paul's, Robinson, every Sunday at 11 A.M., preceded by Sunday School at 10 A.M. Holy Communion on the first Sunday in every month; Evening Service on every fourth Sunday, and service on the greater festivals and during Lent.

Once a fortnight I had service at St. Peter's, Lingwick, in the afternoon, and St John's Church in the evening, or vice-versa, St. John's in the afternoon and St. Peter's in the evening. These services, in addition to the regular morning service at St. Paul's, made the work for every other Sunday, as follows: Sunday School, three services and thirty miles drive.

On the alternate Sundays the work varied, being, one Sunday, afternoon Service at Canterbury School-house, the other Sunday afternoon Service at Bown's School-house, and a second service at St. Paul's in the evening.

The fortnightly service at Barterville on Thursday evenings was still kept up throughout the summer months by Mr. Judge and myself, the same as last year.

Instead of monthly services at Hardwood Flat, as last year, I held service once a fortnight on Wednesday evenings.

On the 7th of October, a harvest festival service was held in St. Paul's Church; the Church was prettily decorated with leaves, grain, fruit and flowers. The Reverend Geo. Thorneloe, of Sherbrooke, who kindly came to Robinson for the occasion, preached a very impressive sermon to a congregation of about one hundred and eighty people.

The Parish of Bury, where the Church has been established for forty-eight years, became self-sustaining at the beginning of the present year, but still remained in connection with the Diocesan Board.

At the end of September the congregations of St. Paul's and St. Thomas' being six months in arrears, and that of St. Peter's three months in arrears in their dues to the Board, the Secretary of the Board sent notice that unless the arrears were paid up by the 15th of October the Board would consider its connection with Bury at an end; the

outports paid up most of their indebtedness, but St. Paul's Church, in the Village of Robinson, where the Congregation averages 130 people, paid nothing of what was due; consequently after the 15th the Parish of Bury was notified that its connection with the Diocesan Board was at an end.

So for myself, having the option of remaining in Bury and looking to the people for support, or accepting work elsewhere under the Diocesan Board, I chose the latter, feel-

ing that it was useless to attempt to remain.

I regretted leaving the work in the parish for many reasons, yet was convinced that if the people would not raise money enough to support their Church while they were in connection with the Board they would be less likely to do so when cut adrift from the Board. There are plenty of people in the parish, and they are abundantly able to support the Church if all did their duty according to their means, but the duty of giving to God's Church systematically from principle is a duty which the majority of the people of this parish have yet to learn.

There are two generous offers of aid towards the Endowment Fund still open to the people of the parish. Upon leaving I urged upon them the advisability of meeting

these offers, and I trust that they will do so.

CACOUNA

The Church Warden reports:-

The Church of St. James the Apostle was open for Divine Service from Sunday, the 4th July, to Sunday, the 5th September, 1886, inclusively, with daily Morning Prayer throughout the season, the Rev. Thos. Adams, D.C.L., of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, being the Incumbent.

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A new chancel at the east end of the Church, a west entrance and a very pretty south porch were erected early in the year. The Chancel was consecrated on the festival of St. Bartholomew by the Lord Bishop of Niagara, acting for the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. The following clergy were present:—Rev. Canon Mulock, of the Diocese of Ontario, Rev F. J. B. Allnatt, D.D., Rector of St. Matthews, Quebec, Rev. E. Davis, M.A., of the Diocese of Huron, Rev. R. C. Tembs, M.A., of Rivière-du-Loup, Rev. W. Price, of Westbury, and the Incumbent. The Incumbent preached on the text: "That ye may eat and drink at My table in my Kingdom," taken from the Gospel for the day, St. Luke XXII, 30.

Special collections made in the Church on 1st August for the Mission Fund, \$570.19; 15th August, for the Pension Fund, \$70.12; 24th August, at the Consecration Service,

\$23.35.—Total. \$663.66.

Ordinary Sunday and Holy-Day collections, \$208.37.

The following sum was received for the Church Improvement:—By subscription, \$395; through offertory, St. Matthews, Quebec, \$20; Proceeds of a concert at Cacouna (half to be devoted to interior fittings), \$54.—Total, \$469. Grand total, \$1,341.03.

CAPE COVE.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster reports:—

Very soon after having sent in my last report, in which I had occasion to refer to our numerical and financial weakness, the mission was suddenly overtaken by a misfortune, which certainly has not improved our prospects in any respect.

This was the failure of the firm of Chas. Robin & Co.—an event which took every one by surprise—not one, even among the officers of the company, being prepared

for it.

Its immediate effect upon this mission was the withdrawal of the annual grant of one hundred dollars, which had for many years been paid towards the Percé assessment. This has been followed by a reduction in the staff of the company, and by the removal of many of their people from the mission. On making known our loss, the Diocesan Board, with its usual kindness, agreed to receive for the current year an assessment of eighty dollars, instead of one hundred and sixty-five, which had before been paid.

The reduced assessment has been duly collected. It is probably about as much as the congregation can raise at present, for with the exception of one mercantile firm, the people are in narrow circumstances, and are, besides, few

in number.

The trustees of the insolvent firm, who paid a visit to the coast in July, were kind enough to grant twenty-five dollars towards the Percé assessment. This was all we could fairly expect. Whether, in the event of a new firm being formed, an increased grant may be hoped for, is more than I can say; it is as yet doubtful whether a new firm will be formed.

But we can hardly expect the same liberal treatment that we have received in days gone by, for, whatever the faults of the old company may have been, we must, in simple fairness, acknowledge their liberality in Church matters, and the well-known readiness of their agents to contribute towards every good work.

Cape Cove has not been directly affected by the failure,

so of course the assessment remains as before.

During the past year a school-house has been built at L'Anse au Beaufils, to take the place of the building burnt down in 1885. Though it is in use, it is not yet finished internally, and is far from comfortable.

The school-house, No. 1, Cape Cove, has been finished,

and is now in occupation.

The building of these school-houses has heavily taxed

the small number of rate-payers in both districts.

Through the valuable aid of the Church Society, for which all feel grateful, we have been enabled to keep the three schools in constant operation; though in one of them, from causes I need not enter upon, the attendance was for a time very unsatisfactory.

At the Easter meeting, an effort was made to raise funds for the much needed re-painting of St. James' Church. The sum of one hundred dollars for that purpose has since been collected, but circumstances having delayed the work,

it has of necessity been put off till next spring.

The Church above-mentioned has been improved inter-

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a new carret in the chancel.

I am glad also to report the improvement of the Parsonage, by the clap-boarding of both ends, at an expense of about sixty five dollars. This was much needed, as the house had become so cold and draughty as to be barely habitable in severe weather.

I need hardly add that the usual services have been held with regularity in both Churches; the Sunday-schools also have been well attended, though the number of children

in the place is not so large as in former years.

I would gladly report that the congregations are growing stronger in every respect, and better able to support

the Mission; but this I am unable to do.

Year after year young men and women leave us, to seek employment elsewhere, and these seldom return. And few years pass without one or two families selling their farms and going forth to some other part of Canada or to the United States, where the conditions of making a livelihood are supposed to be easier than they are on the coast. Not that the mere "making a living" is very difficult here; but there seems to be little progress—"no encouragement" as the people themselves say: little or no circulation of money. The fact is, the want of remunerative winter work paralyses the whole coast.

Should we live long enough to see the Bay Chaleur Railway down here, there is little doubt this part of the country will take a new lease of life—perhaps I may add—and of liveliness; for no place can be duller than it is now.

The Rev. J. Foster reports:-

The services of the Church (three every Sunday) have been kept up as usual, without any disappointments owing to bad roads or ill health.

The services at both the Churches in the Parish are as well attended as they were last year.

The two Sunday Schools are in vigorous operation, and are well attended by the children of the Parish.

COMPTON.

The Rev. G. H. Parker reports:-

I enclose a financial statement for the past year. I regret that the usual annual subscriptions to the Church Society have not been collected, but I have not had them collected, as the removal of families from the Parish and the building of a new Church have taxed the resources of the people to the utmost.

I have two matters of great interest to the Parish to report, viz.: the erection of a new Church and the re-open-

ing of the Ladies' College.

The Church, which was to have been completed for occupation this winter, will not be finished till May of next

year, when we hope to have it consecrated.

The Diocesan Ladies' College was re-opened in September last under most favourable circumstances. The first term closed on December 4th, and it is only right to say that the success, so far, has surpassed the most sanguine expectations of the corporation. There is an excellent staff of teachers, an efficient and kindly matron, and what may, in all fairness, be called a very nice lot of pupils, 31 in all, 19 boarders and 12 day scholars. The members of the corporation are all most anxious to do all in their power to make it a first-class school in every respect, to maintain proper

discipline, and at the same time to give the pupils as much liberty and amusement as any reasonable person could expect. I sincerely hope the school may continue to prosper and become a source of strength to the Church in the Diocese, and a little interest on the part of the Laity and Clergy will certainly make it so.

I ought to add, that through the generosity of the mortgagees, who have given up their interest for the last two years, the building has been put into a good state of re-

pair, made warm and comfortable.

COOKSHIRE,

The Rev. A. H. Judge reports:

Nothing has of late years been done more likely to give the Church in this parish a fresh accession of strength and power, than the action of the Synod, in providing for the erection of a new Mission out of the District now under my pastoral case. At present the ground to be covered by the clergyman is so extensive, and the number of people requiring his care so many, that thorough work in any one locality is extremely difficult, indeed, almost impossible. While one part is receiving his attention another seems to be neglected and a feeling of hopelessness overcomes him as he straces to grapple with his work. But with the parish divided there will be for each Incumbent, a whole township, with two excellent churches, and ample scope for real missionary work to any extent in adjacent parts. A decided step in this right direction has already been taken in the appointment, by the Bishop, of Mr. Thomas Lloyd, as assistant in the parish, with the promise shortly of the complete equipment of the new Mission of Newport. I verily believe that (D.V.) this action will result in the building up of the Holy Church, to the glory of God, and the saving of many precious souls.

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St. Peter's Church, Cookshire.—The parish priest is sometimes tempted to measure success and progress by the material advancement of his work, and while not forgetting the spiritual part, yet fail to give it the paramount position it should have. And when a passing cloud crosses the clear sky of an heretofore steady advance—as now is the case with us, in a difficulty our new position of self-support brings upon us—it is with deep thankfulness that I am enabled to report a year with many signs of spiritual wellbeing and growth, in the increased Sunday congregations, the increased and thoughtful congregations at the week-day Lenten services, the reverent and full communions, but especially in the earnestness and steadfastness of the class of nineteen persons presented to the Bishop for Confirma-These things I report with gratitude.

In things material the year has been marked by the largest collections ever received for the Church Society and for Foreign and Domestic Missions, together with an addition of \$200 to our Endowment Fund, made through Mr. Robt. Hamilton's second offer to the parish—an offer which the Girls' Friendly Society has enabled me to comply with by placing in my hands \$50 to acquire Mr. Hamilton's \$150. I may add that the same generous benefactor of the parish has made us another advantageous proposal open until January 1st, 1889. The societies and guilds in connection with this Church continue their useful work. The Girls' Friendly Society and Young Men's Friendly Society in drawing the young people to the Church, and the Guild and Women's Auxiliary in their respective fields of work. In speaking of St. Peter's Church, I must not omit to mention the gift of a new chancel carpet, acquired through the painstaking effort of a lady of the congregation ever active in good works.

Christ Church, Island Brook.—Mr. Lloyd, whom I mentioned above, has been stationed in this village, and is doing most effective work. The people have now a monthly communion and service every Sunday, while all work in connection with the Church is brightening and looking up. A week-day service and instruction has been instituted and the congregations then and on Sundays are very good. I

now serve this station but once a month.

St. Matthew's Church, Randboro.'—The year now closing has been an important one to this mission in many respects.

On the 4th April, the Bishop administered his first confirmation, when three candidates were presented. The large congregation present evinced a profound interest in the solemn rite. Again on July 7th the Bishop was with us and then consecrated the new Church, and also a small burial-ground. It was a "great day" for the people, who filled the Church at the two services held. The deep attention with which those assembled listened to the admirable words of the Bishop, and the thoughtful and eloquent sermon of the Rev. Geo. Thornloe, was proof enough of the interest all felt in the solemn acts of the day. During the year a chancel carpet, matting for the aisles, and sanctuary chairs have been provided, and as I write, a bell of 570 lbs. weight is on the way from Baltimore, U.S., for our little Church. We hope to ring it on Xmas Day. Attending these proofs of the love the little band of faithful ones have for the work here begun, there are not wanting many signs of religious life, deep and true, in many families. The Guild has worked with zeal and devotion, and to the ladies connected with it is owing in no small degree the success of the year. This mission with Island Brook form the new district to be cut away from the Parish of Cookshire.

St. Luke's Church, Sandhill.—I have been in charge of this mission so short a time that I cannot this year, with any fullness, report upon its prospects or present state. A fine Church Hall is being erected close to the Church and is

now nearing completion.

The fortnightly services at Barterville and Learned Plain have been regularly kept up. The Sunday School at "Brazels," still receives the assiduous care of a lady of St. Peter's Congregation, who reports 14 names on the roll

and an average attendance of 9 scholars.

Before closing this report I am compelled to mention a most cheering work opened three months ago at Scotstown, some 20 miles by rail from Cookshire. Around large sawmills and a pulp mill a vigorous town is growing up, and already several Church families have settled in the place. The Incumbent of Bury and myself opened a mission here and received so much encouragement that we decided to establish it permanently. Since Mr. Bernard left the neighbourhood the work has been continued. A good corner lot has been selected in the village, and over \$300 subscribed for a church which we hope to build in the spring. Service is held here fortnightly.

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ass pe M of It is not possible to look upon such results as these and be blind to the fact that the Church's opportunity in this region has indeed come. Let but faithful priests, filled with love and zeal for the cause of Christ, be put over the work, and sustained awhile, and the fruit will not be wanting.

DANVILLE.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:--

In the ordinary routine of a Country Mission, there may be very little of interest to the readers of the Society's report, whilst to the Incumbent in charge, whose anxious eye is ever looking for signs of spiritual growth, and more earnest effort, there may be much to disappoint and much

to encourage.

Of this Mission, I can say, that whilst there are some things to discourage, there is much to be thankful for. A growing love for spiritual things, manifesting itself in more regular attendance on the means of grace, more willingness to help on the Church work, is very frequently seen, for which I am truly thankful. Danville, the head quarters of the Mission has had two services every Sunday, and on all principal Festivals. A monthly Communion, with celebrations, on other appointed occasions. The Congregation at Danville averaged for the year, 99 at morning, and 34 at evening service. The distance that many live away, prevent them from attending evening service. The increased assessment has been cheerfully and liberally met, and if our people remain as they are, there is nothing to prevent this Mission from becoming self-supporting at the expiration of the present agreement with the Board, if not before,

Two services held during the year, are worthy of notice. The first, "A Service of Song," which was well rendered by the choir, whose efforts were much appreciated by a large sympathetic Congregation, was followed by an excellent sermon from the Rev. A. J. Balfour on the "Duty and Importance of Praise." The second was a "Thanksgiving Service for the Harvest," which was heartily offered by a grateful Congregation. The expression of thankfulness was very much intensified by the fact, that all around the worshippers, were evidences of God's bounty, the Church being tastefully decorated with the fruits of the earth. A very earnest and instructive sermon by Rev. T. W. Fyles made this a truly solemn service, and in results a profitable one for this part of the Mission.

We have been favoured this year by two visits from our beloved Bishop. The first was for an Ordination Service. at which the Rev. Messrs. Eames and Lloyd were advanced to the priesthood, and M. G. Thompson, well known and beloved by this people, was admitted to the Diaconate. It is not too much to say, that this service, so kindly given to us by our Bishop, made quite an impression on the community, resulting in good first to our own people, and secondly, to those outside by calling their attention to the Church's way of ordaining her Ministry. His Lordship's second visit was for Confirmation, and the solemn demeanor of the candidates, the impressive and instructive lessons given us by the Bishop will long remain in the minds of the peo-31, of the 37 confirmed, became communicants at once, making at that service, 88 communicants, the largest number communicating at any one time in Danville Church.

In addition to the regular services held in the Church—services with more or less regularity were held in the Valley Road School House, Bilton and Pinacle School Houses, alternately, Nutbrown School House, Quarry School House, Leet School House, Mrs. Hall's. Nicolet Falls—with occasional cottage services, where school houses were not available. These services were always well attended, and many people were thus brought to see the beauty of our worship, which otherwise would never know anything about it. Our Sunday School contains the names of 40 scholars, who are taught by five faithful teachers. The attendance of the children has not been so regular as we could have wished, but we hope for improvement as time goes on. A second Sunday School was conducted by Mr. Mountain, during

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the summer months, in the Pinacle School House, which was very well attended.

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Troutbrook.—There is not much in the way of change to notice in this old and well-established congregation; still there is improvement even here. This congregation has had a regular Sunday Service, with occasional services on the principal Festivals, and special services during Holy Week. Also a monthly communion. At all of these services the attendance has been more regular than on former years—nearly every family represented. The communicants have also been very regular, the same people coming month after month to partake. It is only fair to say that Troutbrook people have always been ready to do their part towards the work of the Church, and, so far as their means allow, do it cheerfully.

A new organ has been purchased for the Church at a cost of \$105, \$75 of which was paid down at the time of the purchase. Seven persons were confirmed at the Bishop's last visit, all of whom became communicants at once. A very successful Sunday School is held here during the summer months. For the past year it has been under the superintendency of Mr. John Wilson, who is assisted by four faithful teachers. There are 45 names on the roll, with a yearly return of regular attendance. The former Superintendent and Lay Delegate, Mr. James Ewing, has been taken away by death, but he has left a record of a life spent with God, and in devotion to His Church. His end therefore was peace.

Lorne.—This Congregation having now a regular Sunday service, with services on principal Festivals and on Holy Week, and a monthly Communion, progresses in many ways. The increase in spiritual things is seen in more regular attendance on Divine worship, and in the devotional and hearty way in which that worship is rendered. It is seen in financial matters by the prompt and cheerful way in which the assessment is paid, and other contributions for Church work given. A new organ has been purchased for this Church, at a cost of \$105, \$75, of which was paid down at the time of purchase. A Sunday School attended by 43 scholars is superintended by Mr. J. P. Stockwell, who is aided by three devoted teachers. Eleven were Confirmed in this Congregation, all of whom became communicants on the following Sunday, making in this place, 48 communicants.

Kingsey Falls.—Of our success here, I cannot speak very hopefully. For want of a suitable place to worship in this

little congregation is badly broken up, and only occasional services have been held since August last. But still it exists, and a few services from time to time in Mr. Waller's house keeps it together, and that is about all that can be said

at present

Contributions given by Quebec friends, at the solicitation of Mr. Kennedy, will enable us to build a small Church in the spring, on the site purchased by the people, when I have reason to believe I shall have something more encouraging to report of Kingsey Falls In making the returns for the year, I regret to find a falling off in our contributions for outside work. This is due in part to the facts of having to purchase the Organ referred to above, but mainly, because of the slow and difficult sale and low prices of farm produce. I mention this, because I know it is not from unwillingness, but from necessity that we are behind this year. I cannot conclude this report without expressing my thankfulness to all my wardens for there cheerful and heartly co-operation, in the work of the Church. Also to Sunday School teachers, members of the different choirs, and collectors.

It is to the readiness and self denying labours of these

zealous ones, that much of our success is due.

I also acknowledge with gratitude many substantial proofs of the good will and affection of all my people. All of which shew an appreciation of my feeble efforts on there behalf.

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DRUMMONDVILLE

DUDSWELL,

The Rev. T. S. Chapman reports:—

I have been doing my best during the past year to maintain three Sunday services and two Sunday Schools in my two Churches,—morning and evening at St Paul's, Marbleton, and afternoon at the Good Shepherd, Dudswell Centre. The general attendance at both has been fair. About the 1st of May last I received an unfortunate wound, which with a subsequent illness laid me practically aside until the 8th of August, when I availed myself of leave of absence granted by the Bishop, returning home early in October. The Mission, however, did not suffer materially during this period, as services were given, and emergencies met by the kind aid of the Rev. Dr Reid, the Revds. Judge, Bernard, Price and Thompson, with some ministrations by a Lay Reader from the Diocese of Montreal.

This year has been an eventful one of heavy trials of "mind, body and estate." I returned home a little restored in body but broken in spirit, to find the newly made grave of Mrs. Chapman, who was suddenly summoned away from this life of trouble, to join the great majority, during my absence on the Pacific Coast, without the possibility of being present at her funeral. The affliction is heavy to bear—but, " all our sorrows are angel blessings sent to bring us safely home." Death may remove, but it cannot sever,

they are

" Ours still in that sweet forever, They wait to welcome us above."

Our Model School is doing good work under Miss Hepburn, who holds a McGill diploma and is a teacher of good ability and experience. I am sorry however to report that this year for the first time in sixteen years we have been obliged to reduce our scholastic year from ten months to nine, in consequence of a deficiency of funds. Two very successful Xmas trees were given at my two Churches to the Sunday School children. A very nice triplet stained glass window, with the subject of St. Paul in one of its panels, by Spence, was placed in the chancel of St. Paul's

Church during the year. The Ladies' Guild of St. Paul's is working hard to raise funds for further improvements.

It is perhaps sufficient for a financial statement to say that this Mission, although one of the weakest in the Diocese and labouring under a heavy railway tax, has been trying now nearly two years to be self-supporting.

DURHAM.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports:—

Although disappointed in some of my hopes regarding the temporalities of the Church, and although the people committed to my charge have not been as prompt and faithful to their engagements to me, regarding the Stipend as I felt warranted in expecting when the last report to your Society was made; yet I am far from being discouraged even with respect to these matters, relying as I do upon Almighty God to make them right in His own good time: while at the same time, in matters purely spiritual, I have much cause for thankfulness, having received many plain assurances that God was at work in our midst.

In Upper Durham, the congregations have been, if possible, better than last year,—sometimes the Church being crowded, and the ordinary members being nearly always in their places; and the average attendance upon Holv Communion has been greater, I think, than ever before. I have noticed that some who used not to be regular, at either Church or Holy Communion, have become so this year in regard to both. And if only one in a year should be found to turn thus, it is surely a great matter for thankfulness, and a sign of God's presence.

The Sunday School at this station is still a success under the conscientious and perservering uperintendance of Mr. J. Crowe. The sum of \$20 has be a raised to buy books for it, and the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge has kindly made us a grant of a like amount, in value, from their own publications, to supplement it. A number of the parents too are now taking "The Dawn of Day"

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s under of Mr. books wledge value, umber Day" In L'Avenir as well, the attendance upon the Sunday services and monthly Communions has been very good, at least during the summer and winter months. During the latter I held cottage missions in this part of the parish, alternating fortnightly, with special week night services in the Church, and think the effect was good. The cottage services met with as much favour as ever, and the Church services seemed to be sensibly affected by them, the attendance at the latter being in some cases remarkable, and continuing generally good, until the roads became bad in the ring. These were followed, after Easter, by a confirma-

lass, and as a result, I humbly hope of the whole work, of an persons were confirmed when the Bishop made his visit to us in July; two others being prevented by circumstances from receiving the rite. This is the largest number I have ever presented to the Bishop in L'Avenir; and four of the number, and one who was not confirmed, were baptized as adults just before the rite was administered. I am thankful to say too that some of this class seem to be full of promise for the future, having become regular and devout communicants, and that I am not without strong

hope concerning all of them.

In South Durham, I consider the progress very marked and am now specially encouraged in this field. The congregations have been very steady, the services hearty, and the attendance upon Holy Communion better than I have seen it for many years. In one part of the district I have held during the summer months fortnightly services in a private house, for the benefit, chiefly, of some aged persons living near together who are unable to attend Church, giving them, also, once a month, a celebration of Holy Communion. These services were conducted in all cases with due regard to the formalities of the Church's ritual, and with the same care as would be used in the sacred building itself; the effect being noteworthy, and full of encouragement. Several attended besides those for whom the undertaking was begun; while others who had been prevented from coming expressed a strong desire to attend, and a hope that the services would continue till they were able to do so; all seeming to have a high appreciation for such a special means of grace. Unfortunately on account of the bad weather and roads, these services have been discontinued for the present, and I fear cannot be kept up during the winter; for although they are held in the and

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time, it is not easy for aged people with infirmities to come together, even from a short distance at that season. I must not forget to mention that when we celebrate Holy Communion on these occasions, there is always an offertory, and that the sum thus raised, although very small, we think worthy of being devoted to the cause of Missions. All who attend very gladly give, and as I read the offertory sentences, one by one, at my own request, the worshippers advance and lay their money on the table which, for the time being, is the Lord's Table. This is, of course, not as we should do in Church, and I should not like it there; but in our simple home service it seems to me impressive, as I think it helps to make all associate their giving more with the idea of an offering, and to connect it less with that of mere collection.

Besides the encouragement received in the performance of the public acts of my office, much comes to me in other ways; for which I am very thankful. Your Society will be aware that a great part of the clergyman's work will concern things which cannot be published, which do not belong to him or to the world, and which he is in honour bound to respect as private property. Such things relate to private ministrations to the sick, bereaved and afflicted, to conversations at the family fireside, talks had with private individuals, "ghostly counsel" asked and given, &c. But I may say, generally,—as it is an important part of the work—that God has been with me here also, and that, as a result of His blessing, much confidence, love and esteem, with many kindnesses, have been shown to me by those to whom I have tried to minister.

I omitted to mention in its proper place an interesting point connected with the public ministrations in Upper Durham. It relates to the observance of the Saints' Bays; a matter which I think is, generally, a difficulty in country parishes, and has always been so hitherto in this parish. Quite a change, however, has now, thank God, taken place in the views and feelings of many regarding it. I first made it the subject of a special sermon in which an attempt was made to show the practical utility of keeping the days, their connection with the whole scheme of teaching in the Church's year; also to answer objections, remove false impressions, &c. By the favour and blessing of God—I ascribe all to Him—I got new light myself upon the subject; the result was beyond my hopes. Quite an enthusiasm seemed to spring up among some of the members regarding

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the observance of the days, and I have been generally well supported ever since in my efforts to keep up the custom. Instead of having merely one service in the day, we have two:—Shortened form of morning prayer with ante communion at an early hour; and evening prayer, with an address at 7 p.m. The former I do not expect to be well attended, but a fair number come, and one elderly person, in order to give encouragement and support to the movement, walked four miles, on one occasion, to be present. The evening service has been particularly well attended. I give a short address, explaining the Church's teaching for the day, and often take advantage of the occasion to catechize the young upon it, having asked them, when giving notice of the day, to find out all they can, before hand, about the holy person whom the Church associates with her teaching. The interest does not seem to die out, and I earnestly pray may never do so.

Other matters now call for some attention. Our Harvest Festival in L'Avenir was, as usual, very successful; over \$30 was raised by means of it, which has been applied to the payment of a debt against the congregation. One was held also in Upper Durham, not so successful in a pecuniary way—for it was rather hurriedly gotten up, but at the same time very enjoyable. For this latter, and many other entertainments given during the year, we are indebted largely to the kindness and spirit of Mrs. Blackwell, who procured a great deal of help for us from Richmond and Melbourne. To the kind friends who came to assist us on

these occasions we are very thankful.

A Ladies' Guild was started last winter in connection with the congregation of Upper Durham, under the presidency of Mrs. Crowe, which met from house to house while the roads were good. The members generally seemed to be very enthusiastic there about keeping it up. I hope it may be continued again this winter, but do not feel sure about the matter just now. A Church Fair was held in the beginning of July for the sale of the articles made, by means of which the sum of \$62 was realized. This amount and \$10 since secured were paid out on account of a new organ purchased last winter.

The offer of \$150 made by R. Lamilton, Esq., of Quebec, to increase our Endowment Fund, which I was sorry the people felt obliged to decline, last year, on account of the conditions, has been very kindly repeated with much more

favourable conditions attached to it; and I think, this time, will not be allowed to slip by us. \$100 of the amount we are to raise in order to secure the gift has been subscribed for in Upper Durham, and I feel sure that L'Avenir will

raise the balance required—that is, \$50.

It will be seen from the financial statement appended that the amount given to the Foreign and Domestic Mission Funds is larger this year than last; but I am sorry to say that the sum raised for all outside objects is not so large this year. One of the mission cards sent out was not returned to me at the time appointed, nor has it been yet received. I presume some accident has prevented its coming in; but am obliged to close my report without it. The following have been received:—

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EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. J. Boyle reports:-

Nothing very exciting has transpired in this Mission dur-

ing the past year.

The ministrations of the Church have been duly attended to at both my stations. The congregations attending Divine Service, all drawbacks considered, have been encouraging. This is especially so during the summer months.

The leading event of the year was a visit from our beloved Bishop in October last, when his Lordship confirmed twenty-four candidates, ten of whom received the Holy Communion immediately after being Confirmed. I may here mention, one of the candidates was a French Canadian, formerly belonging to the Church of Rome; but now professing to be an attached member of the Church.

I am happy to say financially we have done reasonably well, both towards local demands as well as to charitable objects abroad, as the following statistics will show:—

Baptisms, 8; Confirmed, 24; Marriages, 3; Burials, 3. Receipts—Amount of Offertory, \$40; Pew Rents, \$200; Other donations and collections, \$108.59.—Total, \$348.59.

Expenditure—Assessment, \$200; Church or Parsonage improvement, \$6; Other purposes, stable and glebe, \$100; Church Society, \$32.18; Bishop's College, 8.04; Domestic Missions, 2.37,--Total, \$348.59.

GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:-

Divine Service has been held regularly in the churches of this mission during the past year and has been on the whole well attended. It is still unfortunately the case that a great number of young men are obliged to seek employment out of the mission during the summer months, but most of them manage to return and spend the winter at home. The proposed extension of the Baie des Chalcurs Railway to Gaspé Basin is looked forward to as a panacea for many such inconveniences. I hope it may prove so. There has been during the year more than the average amount of siekness and death.

St. Paul's Church, Gaspé Basin.—There is still much ne-

cessary work to be done round the Church to carry off the water from the rear of the building and prevent injury to the foundation. The Church requires a fresh coat of paint. The church-wardens have had the necessary line fences on the glebe renewed. The congregation of St James provided the material, the Basin congregation the labour.

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St. James Church. Southwest Arm, Gaspé Bay.—A meeting of the Vestry was held last January and was very numerously attended. All matters mentioned in my last report concerning the building of a new church were considered, and it was determined to ask the Bishop's sanction to obtain a site as near as possible to the present property and to build a new church thereon. It was also agreed that when the people in the Township of York were in a position to build a new church on that side of the water the people of Gaspé South would return them an equivalent for labour or material contributed to the building at present contemplated.

A building committee was nominated, who at once set to work and this year has witnessed the purchase of the site, the contribution of material for the frame and boarding in, and the erection of the frame. The ladies of the congregation have not been idle; they held a bazaar last November, and, thanks to their own exertions and the generous help extended to them by the Basin congregation and the patronage of the vessels in port, they realized \$432, clear of all expenditure.

In addition to the five schools in the mission, a sixth has been built and is now in operation, but not for long, owing to the want of means. Aid to this school would be a good expenditure. I hope it will eventually meet a want long felt by my predecessors as well as by me.

HATLE AND WATERVILLE.

The Rev. A. Stevens reports:-

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I have nothing of an unusual character to mention in regard to my work during the past year. The services at the various stations have been kept up as heretofore. As much time as I could spare from other duties was given to visiting from house to house. Since the first of January last this has been a self-supporting parish. To enable us to become self-supporting a small increase had to be made in the assessment. This increase has been fairly well met.

The Wardens are of the opinion that if all the members of the Church would contribute according to their means it would be an easy matter to meet the necessary expenses.

At Hatley the congregations have been larger than formerly and the number coming to the Holy Communion has been also increased. Some much needed repairs have been made upon the outside of the Church, and when we succeed in giving it a fresh coat of paint, as we hope to do next summer, the Church fabric will be in a good state of preservation.

At Waterville we have felt the loss of several old friends of the Church. Some have been called to join the Church triumphant, others removed to different parts of the country.

The services here have been very well attended throughout the year. The singing has great'y improved. The members of the choir and especially the organist, Miss Ball, deserve great credit for their regularity in attending the choir practices and for being in their places on Sunday.

A new stained glass window has been put in the chancel as a memorial of those who were instrumental in building the Church about forty years ago. This window is a great improvement upon the old one and adds much to the beauty of the sanctuary.

From Massawippi and Libbytown, I have nothing new to report. Both places afford interesting fields for Church work, and which I regret to say, I have not with my other duties felt able to give. The numbers present at the services and the devout attention both to the prayers and the teaching were all that one could desire.

These outward signs of progress are, I trust, but a faint indication that our people are also growing in spiritual things.

During the past year I have had many evidences that

God's Spirit is leading some at least among us to the appreciation of a higher life.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:-

The Sunday and other services of the Church have been held regularly at St. Stephens' Church and the Church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, throughout the year. The attendance has been good, unless the weather was stormy. At the urgent request of Mr. E. G. Palmer, agent for the Messrs. Hall, I have again begun to hold a monthly service at Becancour Station. I began to hold these services in June. I generally have a congregation of 16, chiefly composed of the members of Mr. Palmer's family, and the family of the late David Johnston, of the Johnston House.

Our Sunday Schools have been very well attended during the past season. St. Stephens' Church school has an attendance of some 50 children. I superintend this school myself. Mrs. Roe has a Bible class for girls, and Miss Roe has one for boys—both classes well attended. Mr. John L Brown, church-warden of the Church of the Ascension, superintends that school, which numbers about 30 children; he is assisted by Mr. Austin and Miss Mary Morris. The singing and chanting is very good in both Churches. My daughters have charge of the organ and singing at St. Stephens' Church, and Miss Ellen Brown is organist at Church of the Ascension, ably assisted by her sister, Miss Barbara Brown, and Miss Dorothy Young in the singing and chanting.

We had an official visit of inspection from the Rural Dean, Rev. J. B. Debbage, B.D., on the 17th March. The Rural Dean was accompanied by the Rev. R. Hewton, Upper

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ean, aral per Ireland, who drove him down from his mission, and conveyed him to Leeds the same evening. This is the first visit we have had from a Rural Dean for nine years! Mr. Debbage was very painstaking and careful in examining into Registers v. 1 Documents, Insurance, &c. We would be glad to have him call again soon on his official rounds!

In June last, a branch of the "Woman's Auxiliary Missionary Society" was organized at St. Stephens' Parsonage, under the presidency of Mrs. Roe; it now numbers sixteen women. They meet once a month for a few hours in the evening, open with singing a hymn and prayer, and then employ their time, two or three hours, in doing some kind of work, to be disposed of hereafter for Foreign Missions. While they work, one reads from some Missionary Magazine—the "Church Missionary Intelligencer," the "Net," "The Gleaner," and "Our Work."

It is most gratifying to us all here, to see how very much interested the women are in the accounts read to them of missionary work. The people in our rural parishes never, or scarcely ever, have heard of the great work that is going on for the Lord Jesus, in the distant parts of the world. Only a month ago, my youngest daughter, read to them the Diary of the late Bishop Hannington written when a prisoner, just before his martyrdom.

The vivid picture he there jots down of his sufferings and endurance and *taith in God*, I am told produced a feeling of *deep emotion*, indignation loudly expressed at his barbarons treatment, pity for his sufferings; wonder and admiration at the patient, almost Christ-like manner, he

displayed.

I do not anticipate much pecuniary benefit towards the Missionary Fund, but I am fully persuaded in my own mind, that these women's meeting's are priceless, not to be estimated by dollars and cents. They seem to have a wonderfully harmonizing effect upon the heart, leading those that hear these accounts of heroic suffering to enquire more of the Master, for whom they have cheerfully devoted their lives; and shall we not hope to love Him and follow Him more faithfully.

I am sure there is no branch of the work in our Missions, it reverently and prayerfully carried on, more calculated, under the Divine blessing, to influence the heart and conscience, and lead the people to think more of Christ, "and to sur-

render their hearts to Him," than these Women's Missionary

meetings.

We have lost several members of the Church during the Some have died, others have left this part of the past year. Robert Gunston, an old and respected member Province. of the Church, died in the early part of the year, his aged widow died lately, both sincerely pions Christians. John Sturgeon, one of our oldest members, was killed, being thrown from his waggon and died instantly; he leaves a large family of sons and daughters, members of the Church. William Joliffer, a middle aged man, very well conducted. and a good Christian, lost his reason, and committed suicide, his old father near ninety, dying a few days after, from the shock sustained by his poor son's awful death.

Major O. Hunter, one of our principal members at Campbell's Corners Church, removed with his family to Danville in the fall; we miss him very much, in many ways, as he was always foremost in helping in all Church work.

The financial arrangement with the Diocesan Board has not been carried out satisfactorily. I have written to the Lord Bishop, and explained the reasons why it is so. So I will not enter into particulars here. No doubt his Lordship will lay the whole matter before the Board. I may be permitted however to say that there are a number of persons in this Mission who put their names down for sums which they have never paid, now running for three or four years, and the Church Wardens say they cannot collect from them! So a considerable amount of arrearage has accumulated.

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IRELAND.

The Rev. R. Hewton reports:-

During the past year the work in this Mission has gone on as usual, steadily and without excitement. There is a marked increase of communicants and some improvement in the attendance at ordinary services. The responding and singing are heartier and those taking part in them, seem to be more earnest. A spirit of devoutness, especial-

ly among the young, is becoming more manifest

I am sorry to have to report that my health failed last summer, and I was compelled, at the urgent request of some of the congregation, to take a holiday. Accordingly I left the Mission in charge of Mr Fred. H. Wood, Lay Reader, went away for two months and visited the Gulf Ports, from which I returned much improved in health. Here I may state that Mr. Woods' kindness in this respect deserves notice. He is ever ready to help in furthering the cause of Christ, and his work is altogether a labour of love, as he has never, to my knowledge, received the slightest acknowledgment in the way of emolument. During my absence, Rev. T. L. Ball, of Windsor Mills, my predecessor in this Mission, Rev. Peter Roe, of Inverness, and Rev. R. W. Colston, of Portneuf, conducted services for me. They have all my most sincere thanks.

Our Thanksgiving Services were very successful. The Churches were decorated with the produce of the field in a manner well calculated to show the merciful and abandant Providence of God. Mr. Colston preached very instructive and interesting sermons to large and attentive

congregations.

The benefactor of the Diocese, Robert Hamilton, Esq., has again given us encouragement by donating a liberal bonus for the augmentation of our Endowment Fund, provided we made up \$50, which was promptly done, thus adding to it the handsome sum of \$200.

Our best thanks are due to Mrs. Williams for a bundle of useful and warm clothing, which has been distributed.

The general depression in business is felt very much here; consequently at one time the assessments were not so promptly paid as usual. We are living in hopes that the expected wave of good times will strike us soon.

We have been visited with a great deal of sickness last spring and this autumn. Diphtheria carried off several victims. Typhoid fever also is prevalent in the mining districts.

Owing to so many home calls we have not been able to

do so much for the Church Society as last year.

Trinity Church, Maple Grove—Services were held in this Church every Sunday and chief Holy-days, with special services and a course of lectures during Lent. The Ladies' Association is still in active existence under the presidency of Mrs. F. H. Wood. This organization was the means of procuring part of the money required for the Endowment Fund, a beautiful carpet for the chancel of the Church and a set of iron altar-rail standards.

A new fence has been built round the Church graveyard, and one side of the Church roof has been re-shingled.

I expect to have the Church school going again. A gentleman from Ottawa, Mr. Joseph Ringland, has been engaged to teach. He brings the highest testimonials as an efficient master.

Mrs Henry Wood still continues her valuable services

as organist.

The Sunday School has been conducted by Messrs. W. G. Stewart and Henry Wood. Attendance good and scholars attentive and appreciative. Mr. Stewart has also a Sunday School in his own house at hours when there are

no services in this part of the Mission.

Christ's Church, Lower Ireland.—Services are held in this Church every Sunday and on chief festivals with special services and lectures as in Trinity Church. The singing has improved here owing to regular weekly practices which I instituted lately. We have secured the services of Miss Maggie Cross, of Maple Grove, as organist, which helps to make the services much more cheery.

Mrs. Little, Mrs. Wm. Johnson, Miss Bessie Porter and Miss Kerr collected money for procuring a carpet for the chancel, choir steps and cocoa nut matting for the aisle. They raised also the required amount for the Endowment

Fund.

I collected sufficient money to purchase a set of polished brass altar-rail standards. Thus our wants are being gradually supplied. We need a bell (for which I have \$100), a new organ, and a Baptismal Font. I hope to have all of these before many years.

There are two Sunday Schools in this part of the Mission. That held at the Church is conducted by Mr. Peter

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Mis-Peter Ward and is successful. The other is in the tenth range school house and is in a flourishing condition. They have raised \$20 to secure the nucleus of a Sunday School library.

A very successful Christmas tree was held in the Church hall on Christmas eve. There was a large number of pre-

sents and the Clergyman was well remembered.

Here as in the other places I must again testify to the unabated kindness of the people towards their Clergyman. He is never without their sympathy and support in everything he attempts. In this way his labours are made lighter and his burdens more easily borne.

St. Luke's Church, Adderley.—Matters run on about the same here as last year. Services are held every second Sunday and are well attended. Communicants are regular. We have secured a set of duplex burner lamps, which render it possible to hold evening services when necessary. The money was collected by Mr. James Henderson, Church Warden. I intend giving a few evening lectures this winter on Church principles and teaching.

Keongh's Range.—I am sorry to say that on account of failing health I was obliged to give up these services for a time. However they are resumed again and are held monthly on Sunday evenings. They are well attended, and I hope will eventually become a good Church congre-

gation.

Black Lake Station.—Services were discontinued here also, owing to the above mentioned reason. I have taken steps to arrange for opening them up again after New Year. The prospects seem brighter and more encouraging than ever, and I hope to have a good report to send in from this station at the end of next year.

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The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:-

It is a pleasing duty to begin my report with sincere thanks to Mr. Robert Hamilton, the friend of all the Churches and congregations in the Diocese, for another generous gift of \$150, to which we added \$50; increasing our Endowment Fund by \$200. This gift was placed to the credit of the Mission in January of the present year.

The services have been regularly maintained throughout the year—congregations about the same as formerly, Sunday Schools show a marked improvement in numbers and regularity of attendance. The relations between dergyman and people, cordial and pleasant.

In July last the Venerable Archdeacon Lonsdell took up his residence in Kingsey. I am greatly indebted to him for assistance in the services at Spooner Fond, and have been much cheered by the sympathy and wise counsels of an elder brother in Christ.

At the suggestion of Mrs. Lonsdell I have opened a Bibleclass for adults at Spooner Pond, and except when bad weather made travelling impossible, the attendance has been very good indeed, the Church being half filled.

I have to thank W. John Wadleigh, snr., for the gift of a valuable horse, also my thanks are due to Messrs. John Wadleigh, Henry McMannis, John Moore, and Joseph Lodge for a liberal supply of hay. I am indebted to my people generally for unvaried kindness and many timely presents. "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places."

Without knowing what other Missions may be able to report, I think our special collections will compare favorably with them if account is taken of the smallness of our numbers.

Our assessment not being fully subscribed for, is a sore tax upon the ingenuity of the Church Wardens to meet it.

The attendance at Holy Communion shows no falling off—some taking advantage of the opportunity of communicating twice in the month. St. Paul's, and Spooner Pondbeing only four miles apart, fortnightly communion would be possible to all communicants of both congregations.

Let us hope that some day people will understand that more spiritual life is the promised result of more spiritual food. In addition to other collections we sent the sum of \$8.04 to Compton Ladies' College

LAKE BEAUPORT AND MONTMORENCI.

The Rev. W. S. Vial reports:—

The services have been conducted with regularity during the past year and have been well attended. For the music we are indebted to Miss Annie Montgomery, who plays the harmonium and conducts the singing, very rarely missing a service in spite of long distance and sometimes of bad weather.

The Church has been further improved since last report by outside painting, &c., the substitution of a new lancet shaped window at the east end for the old ordinary house window, and of a decent vestry at the west end instead of an old faded curtain in the chancel.

Besides these improvements a long felt want has been supplied by the getting a new altar and altar cloth—the latter made by St. Matthew's Guild. Towards this \$15.75 was kindly collected by Miss Etta Montgomery from the people themselves, who showed great willingness to do what they could, besides which other friends contributed. But such handsome additions to our little Church could never have been obtained had it not been for the kindness of the Guild which made a gift of the beautiful work, be-

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that ritual sides a grant of \$10 to pay for the materials; and there is still another gift to mention, viz.: a complete set of fair linen, the smaller pieces from the Guild and the long cloth from Miss Price and Miss Pruman (sister Mary), the former supplying the linen, while the exquisite work was done by the latter.

This kind encouragement has awakened a new interest, and I trust a loving and lasting one, in the Church.

LEEDS.

The Rev. J. Kemp reports:-

In this Mission there is little new to report. The usual round of services and other parochial work, with but little variation, forms the substance of the same story told from

year to year.

St. James, Leeds.—This congregation as yet holds its own, the attendance being quite as large as in former years. We have a Sunday School here in the summer season, which is served by the faithful Mr. Bayne, assisted by some ladies of the congregation, and in which, once a fortnight, I take part myself. Mr. Bayne's long and faithful services were. I am glad to say, recognized, as were those of the organist, by the congregation getting up a small present for each. Services here each Sunday, morning and evening alternately, or I may say particularly each Sunday evening and once a fortnight in the morning.

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St. Mork's, Kinnear's Mills.—Here the services are morning and ofternoon alternately, except on my Broughton Sundays, when the morning service is omitted. The congregation is much smaller than it was, owing to removals. Several families that used to attend St. Mark's, now go to Inverness or Lower Ireland, where they properly belong. I regret to say we have no Sunday School here—can get no one to take charge. Holy Communion bi-monthly.

Broughton.—The Protestants are selling out and French taking their place. There are only about fifteen families left, of whom about twelve are normally Church, but some of them practically nothing—never attend, never contribute. Services here once in six weeks; Holy Communion

once a quarter; no Sunday School.

Beattie Settlement—Service here once a fortnight on Sunday afternoon during the summer season, with other services during the winter. About 20 Church families are settled in the neighborhood, who turn out every week and contribute a small amount to the Leeds assessment. I also hold other week services in school-houses, thus bringing the Word to those who seldom attend Church.

Visiting.—The visiting has not been so thorough this year owing to Mrs. Kemp's protracted illness, making it difficult for me to leave home save for public services and visiting the sick. Besides I am getting old and the worse for wear, and do not feel able to do as much as I once did, or to face the storms and snow-drifts. The statistical report will tell

the financial story.

St Sylvestre, St. Giles and St. George.—Last winter I took charge of this Mission for three months, the Lord Bishop kindly giving permission for me to employ Mr. John Smith as lay assistant, who rendered good and efficient service, and was very well received by the people. Mr. Smith went twice to St. George and once to Cumberland Mills, where he was warmly welcomed and his scrvices appreciated. He also took St. Giles and St. Sylvestre several times, or took my services in Leeds, when I went to those places to administer the Holy Communion. I was twice at St. Giles and three times at St. Sylvestre. There were severe storms last winter, and the congregations were small.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports:-

It may be well to explain with regard to the financial statement that the item "Church Society" is made up of subscriptions \$80.05, and Toanksgiving offertory for Pension Fund \$14. "Objects outside" are offertory for deaf mutes \$5.35, and for King's College, Windsor, \$5.60. To Foreign Mission, the Missionary Union has contributed

\$6, and to Domestic Missions \$51.40.

Our Missionary Union has now been in existence upwards of ten years. Sometimes vigorous, sometimes feeble, so far as numbers are concerned. First established in quiet humility by a few pious women who agreed to meet together once a month, to pray for the extension of Christ's Kingdom, it still continues its unassuming work. During the past year it has become without losing its individuality, a part of the "Woman's Auxiliary" to the Canadian Church's Board of Foreign and Domestic Missions. Once a month we meet for prayer and reading missionary intelligence. We collect funds for the support of an Indian child in the Wawanosh Home, and we hope to be able to extend our work in collecting for the Mission field generally.

I may also notice our Woman's Guild established for work in the parish. Of its usefulness and efficiency we have again and again had ample proof. More than once has it come to the assistance of the Wardens when the contributions of the congregation have fallen short. A few weeks ago, the Guild paid for the shingles for re-roofing the Church, and has now undertaken to pay for the enlargement of the Sunday School room just completed, which gives us a hall large enough for lectures and all kinds of

social gatherings.

There is nothing to report in connection with the parish beyond the ordinary work of the year. The regular services and celebrations of the Holy Communion have been held without interruption. On Easter Sunday we had two celebrations, and one hundred and ten communicants. The average thirty-fiv

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e parish thar serve been tad two ts. The average number of communicants for the year is about thirty-five.

LEVIS AND SOUTH QUEBEC,

The Rev. M. Geo. Thompson reports:-

Having only been in charge of this Parish since the first of last September, I am not in a position to speak accurately of its prosperity. Since my arrival, the Sunday and Wednesday evening services have been regularly kept up. The Sunday services have been fairly well attended, but those on Wednesday evenings not nearly as well as I should like. I have held occasional services at Hadlow, which are well attended, and are always hearty. Mr. Drake kindly gives us the use of one of the rooms in his house for this purpose.

The Sunday School, which is held on Sunday afternoon, has a membership of forty scholars, with a regular attendance of about twenty-four, and in addition to these a number of children at Hadlow, who are too young to walk to the Parish Church, are taught by Mr. Sample at his own house. On the occasion of my moving into the Rectory the ladies of the congregation presented me with a purse of \$27, towards furnishing my study, and besides this, I must acknowledge many kindnesses received from many of my parishioners since my arrival. Through the efforts of our kind and efficient Church Wardens—Messrs. T. A. Poston and S. T. Brown—the Rectory has undergone many repairs, which have added much to its comfort and appearance. The windows of the Church have also had to be repaired, which, with some smaller things that had to be attended to, have largely increased our expenses. However, we hope soon to be able to get all settled. A Ladies' Guild has been started in connection with the congregation which promises to be helpful and beneficial to us all. Mr. Ashe, of the Observatory, Quebec, kindly came over a few weeks ago and gave us an interesting fecture—for which kindness we were all very thankful.

Lastly, I have to thank the Revds. Dr. Roe, M. M. Fothergill, T. Richardson, R. Ker and L. W. Williams for help in my work; but especially must I thank the Revd. T. W. Fyles, who is always ready and willing to help me in every

possible way.

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports:-

There is not much of an exceptional nature to report this year. The work of past years has been continued with little change. Yet I feel that we have better ground of hope for our Mother, the Church. It is particularly gratifying to me to record the awakening of interest among the younger members of the two principal congregations. They have not only greatly strengthened my hands by the assistance rendered in different ways, but also by sustaining my spirit which, in the midst of cares and trials, is tempted to give way.

In Magog a Ladies' Guild was formed shortly after New Year, and it has done good work already, attaching the members each to other and bringing all, I trust, nearer to the Common Head. All who work for God have their

reward with them whilst occupied in it.

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The Sunday School record is comforting, both in Magog and Georgeville. A new school was opened in the Currier District (four miles from Magog) by Miss Merry, whose experience for several years past recommended her to the undertaking, and I cannot speak too highly of it. Assistance was kindly given her by Miss Cummins during the summer months.

In Magog the balance on the Parsonage has been lessened by \$260.

In Georgeville the debt on the tower has all but vanished through the diligence of the Ladies' Guild.

A third Guild is being organized in the Bachelder district under bright auspices. Here I have a very interesting service fortnightly on Sunday afternoon with a steady attendance of 30-40.

Fitch Bay—My last formed outstation has had a good deal of opposition from the combination of several denominations on the spot, but I have had no little encouragement, and especially from my intercourse with a man who had boasted of his infidelity all his life till near the end, when he despatched a messenger for me. His very striking change of conduct before death left, I trust, a good impression on many.

Georgeville has decidedly improved in financial matters. Dr. Keyes, a strong advocate of the envelope system, being made Warden, has met all liabilities to the Board and has also paid about \$20 on the arrears that hung over us for years.

Mr. Talbot, Warden of many years' standing, who saw the struggling Church through many difficulties, died very suddenly in a ripe old age and was buried in the little yard where he had seen many laid away, a large number of friends gathering to show respect and sympathy. The number of funerals is great, the number showing the increased demand for the ministrations of the Church.

Magog is determined to profit by the offer of Mr. R. Hamilton to increase the Endowment, but as the sum is not complete it cannot appear in this report.

MALBAIE AND POINT ST. PETER.

The Rev. G. R. Walters reports:-

I am happy to report that I have been able to keep all my appointments for service with some degree of regularity, both Sunday and week-day, Fast and festival, throughout the year, with the exception of a three weeks' vacation, taken out of my Mission in the month of August.

My Sunday services in St. Peter's Church, Malbaie, are generally very well attended, and I am pleased to notice a marked increase, both of young and old persons, at the regular monthly celebration of the Holy Communion.

In this, I feel that my preaching and exhortation has not been in vain, for many come now regularly who used never to come at all. Our regret here is the loss of so many young people from the Mission, who helped us with our singing in Church. They have gone off to our large cities to seek employment. I am now forming a choir of boys, and I hope some of the young men who can sing will come to the front and help us in this respect. I purpose placing them in the chancel, thus I hope this summer to throw more brightness into our services.

At the Corner of the Beach, I have given them on an average two or three services a month, though I am only supposed to go there once a month, and on that day to give morning and afternoon services—this I do—returning to Malbaie, generally in time for evening service, unless otherwise hindered. My other service at Corner of the Beach being of an afternoon between my regular monthly visit. Here the eleven families, who comprise the Mission, all assemble regularly, and take their full responsive part in the service, and are regular attendants at Holy Communion. At the Barachois school-house, eight miles from here, I have been going for service, during the summer, once a month; here the Methodist preacher from "Cape Ozo" comes also monthly. I am sure for the "two families" who call themselves Methodists, that live near there, he might as well

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spare himself and horse the long journey. I cannot conceive why the Methodist conference do not entirely abandon this "Barachois de Malbaie," for whenever I preach at the school-house, his so-called followers come with my own people, send for me when sick and pay a small subscription to our assessment, whilst I am told many fail to pay to him at all. Thus, I think, where the Methodist adherents are so few, it would be a better policy to leave them to return, as I think they willingly would, to their true mother, the Church.

During the winter months, I have a regular service once a fortnight, in the evening, at the house of a Mr. Syveret (a member of our Church) in the New Line, about five miles from here. It is away here that most of my people live during the winter months, moving back here from the seaside in order to be near the firewood. I muster sometimes upwards of fifty persons, in a large room, and very hearty is our singing and responding. Many old persons who are unable to come to Church, being so far away, attend here, and many other of my people, who have less excuse to offer for being absent from these services than on the Sundays at Church, because this service is held in their midst. I have got to like these meetings so much, that I am sorry when the winter is over in this respect. I believe much good comes from these cottage meetings.

During the past summer, I am glad to say, we were enabled to take advantage of the very kind offers made us by Robert Hamilton, Esq., and another generous unknown "Friend Indeed," we suppose living at Quebec. Acting upon the advice of Mr. George Fanvel, of this place, I undertook the personal canvass, from house to house, throughout my Mission, and succeeded in raising the required \$100 to meet the offer of \$100 from Mr. Hamilton, and also \$50 to meet the offer of \$150 from our unknown friend. Had we been able to raise \$80 instead of \$50, this unknown friend would have given us \$240. However, we have till next summer given us, in which to raise the necessary \$30, and thus secure the balance. So we have this summer been able to add to our Endowment Fund \$150 from the Mission, and a bonus of \$250 from these kind benefactors, making a total of \$400.

Here I must thank Mr. George Sears, of New York, for his kindness in sending \$25 for this Endowment Fund, also \$30 from kind triends in England, in which way the sum was made up. My Sunday School has been attended by about 45 children during the summer. I suffer from the want of a couple of teachers to take an interest in a class, Mrs. Chas. Holton has come to the rescue in this respect as often as she has been able, though very often I have to take the whole in one class and centre their attention, old and young alike, as best I am able. My Lending Library is very much appreciated. I can see this by the way books are taken and returned. I am only sorry that we have not more books. I would be glad should any kind friend having a few books suitable for a lending library, and willing to dispose of them, if he would box them up and send addressed (by 88. Miramichi) to Point St. Peter.

We look forward with pleasure to a visit this summer from his Lordship the Bishop. I fear I shall not have such a large class to offer for confirmation this year as when he last visited us, when I presented 83 persons. I am happy to say I have this year taken up all the collections for outside objects which I am expected to do. Still I am sorry they have not been larger. This shows our true financial condition and is really a fair way in which to judge the worldly prosperity of my congregation, though oftentimes we have suffered financially owing to the inclemency of the weather on the particular Sunday when the special offertory was to be taken up. In the month of June my congregation formed a kind of "Bee" and set to work and put a new paling fence around half of our church yard; the other half was built by contract at a cost of twenty dollars. We have now a neat fence enclosing the whole of the burial ground.

We have just paid our insurance of \$20 to the Imperial

Fire Insurance Co.

I wish to thank those members of our Church who helped us with our Tea Party, which brought us in \$83. I must thank also Mrs. Williams for her accustomed goodness in sending us a small bale of warm articles, and to Mrs J. Hamilton for a barrel of warm clothing for our poor; also to Mr. William Withall (late of Quebec), now of Montreal. for upwards of \$30 worth of articles to the same fund.

I must acknowledge the great help the wardens have received this year from Mr. Arthur Collas, of the firm of Messrs. John and Elias Collas, by whose exertions nearly

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all the year's assessment has been collected in, and at a time when the amount of assessment looked far in the back ground.

There is, I am thankful to say, a good Church feeling existing throughout the mission. The only drawback in the way of doing more for Church work is, the people as a whole are really unable of themselves to do so. Whilst our assessment increases over us, my people do not grow any richer to meet the increase.

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Thomas Blaylock reports:-

The year opened with a black outlook for this parish.

The failure, early in January of the two great fishing firms of Messrs, Chas. Robins & Co., and LeBoutillier Bros., was a financial disaster that threatened ruin. It will take years to recover our former standing. From a self-supporting parish, we are put back into the position of a Mission again, as regards our power of raising the sum necessarily required to retain our former status.

Messrs. Chas. Robin & Co. have been, from the first, the chief pillars of the Church here in Paspebiac. The very buildings owe their existence to them and their employees. They have also ever been ready to aid in all works of charity. The loss of the firm's subscription of \$144.00 per annum was a very heavy blow, as was also the loss of their gifts to the special collections.

To make matters worse, and the trial harder, most,—I may say nearly all,—of the parishioners in Paspebiac who were regularly employed by them as ship-carpenters and block-makers, &c., have now lost their work, thus lessening their ability to keep up,—much less to increase—their subscriptions in order to cover the deficiency.

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True there are some here as elsewhere who "could if they would" but lack the will. They forget the command of the Prophet Malachi "Bring ye all the tithes into the store-house, that there may be meat in mine house, and prove me now herewith saith the Lord of hosts." They care little for the promised blessing; see, "if I will not open to you the windows of Heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it."

The trustees of the firm of Chas. Robin & Co., however, kindly sent me a cheque of \$50.00 at the end of the year, which will I suppose be, for the present, their subscription, as on their visit here, they gave me to understand, that the former amount would have to be, very materially, decreased.

The Church has also sustained a great loss in the removal of J. E. Hue, Esq., the late head agent of Messrs. LeBoutillier Bros. He was for the past two years an active church-warden and always a generous giver in matters connected with Church work. The present church-wardens are equally well disposed, but if the Board had not so generously come to our rescue we should have suffered much as the financial report for this year compared with last shows.

Even New Carlisle has not been unaffected by the

troubles in Paspebiac.

Codfish, formerly, was almost the only article of commerce for which the people received cash. Farm produce had to be bartered always. Now the price of everything the people have to sell must be taken out in goods, so that money is scarce; indeed there is little in circulation. The professional men and Government employees who receive stated salaries are almost all Roman Catholies, where as formerly many were members and supporters of the Church. Every one complains of very hard times, but we may, I trust, look for some improvement shortly. We are told that the Baie des Chaleurs Railway is to be built as far as Paspebiae during 1887. If this proves true, it will give work to many, and I hope bring back some of our young people who have left in great numbers to seek work in other parts to the great loss of the Church here.

I have written at some length about our material troubles, but I might have dipped my pen in much blacker ink, and

yet, not have gone beyond the mark.

Parish work has been much the same as in the past

years, with the same number of services in both churches, and occasional services at Hopetown. During Advent however I was confined to the house by illness, when Mr. Webb, of New Carlisle, kindly acted as Lay reader. I am also indebted to the Rev. F. E. J. Lloyd, of Shigawake, who preached the Thanksgiving sermons for me.

Mr. A. T. Caldwell, the energetic church-warden of New Carlisle, met with a sad loss in October last. His only son, a bright and promising youth, was accidentally shot through the hand and died a week after. Young as he was, faith in the Saviour upheld him in his sufferings, and he entered

into rest, confidingly and resignedly.

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The Model School in Paspebiac, which I gratefully acknowledge owes its continuance to the grant of the Church Society, is doing good work. It has had to encounter much opposition, from those who do not appreciate educational advantages. Formerly there was only an ordinary common school and I have encountered much ill-will in trying to improve matters and place a good education within the easy reach of all. The removal of Mr. Hue was a loss of \$50.00 a year to its funds, which seemed a deathblow to the school, but the grant of the Church Society set it on its feet again and many of the people are beginning to see the advantage of it. More will in time do so, when they realize that it is for the good of all and not a few. Amongst the subjects taught are Latin, French, Algebra, Euclid, and the usual first year Model School subjects. Especial attention is given to religious teaching in accordance with Church doctrine.

Miss M. Caulfield, formerly of St. Johns' High School, is the present teacher. She gives universal satisfaction, and we hope to be able to retain her services for another year at least.

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ularly turch, Halesboro', and the village Church, with the exception of a couple of Sundays when the roads were impassable. An attempt was made to give the people living in the vicinity of Batiscan an occasional Sunday service, Mr. Irvine Johnston, of Batiscan Station, kindly gave the use of his house. Unfortunately Mrs. Johnston fell ill, and as there is no other English speaking family in the immediate neighborhood, the nearest being ten miles off, the idea had to be dropped. I hope only for a time. I regret this very much, for in the adjoining parishes of Ste. Genevieve, St. Stanislas, St. Prospère and Ste. Anne de la Pérade there are a few families, the majority Church people, who only see a clergyman very occasionally. In all these families there are children whose ignorance of the very rudiments of our Holy Religion is simply appalling.

During the past year we have succeeded in paying off a small portion of the debt on the village Church, thanks to kind friends in Quebec and Sherbrock.

Through Miss Colston's exertions we have \$60 on hand to repair Christ's Church, Halesboro. This very necessary work will be begun as soon as spring epons.

The past year has been a very sickly one. New of our families have escaped having at least one case of serious illness. During the year I have paid ever 250 visits to the sick. More than six times the usual monber. As some of these sick folk lived at a great distance from Portneut, the work has been very heavy. In one case each visit necessitated a journey of fifty miles by call and about twenty-five by road.

Through the exertions of the congregation of Portneuf Village, a very fine Chapel Organ, from the factory of Mason & Hamlin, Boston, has been purchased for the Church. I append the usual statistics.

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The Rev. G. V. Housman reports:-

In speaking of the Church work connected with the Cathedral, it very naturally becomes divided into two sections; first, that which has reference entirely to the Parish, and secondly what is done for objects which are not Parochial.

In Quebec, as well as elsewhere, the poor receive the sympathy and the assistance of those who are able to give them a helping hand. In referring to what is being done for the needy it should be well known that there are public institutions supported in a great measure by the liberality of members of our Church, and the Cathedral congregation has never been backward in meeting the calls which are made for these charitable objects.

It is a pleasure to know that there are homes provided for our aged and infirm men and women, also there is an Asylum for orphan boys and another for orphan girls. Thus the destitute are well cared for.

But in speaking of work more exclusively done by the members of the Cathedral congregation, there are some which are worthy of particular notice.

I would say therefore that a special collection is made every winter to provide fuel for the poor, net exclusively for those living within the Cathedral district, but the charity finds a much wider scope. Then there is a clothing society, ably managed by several kind ladies of the congragation, which supplies the wants of those who are scantily clad, and in many other ways the poor are not allowed to be in actual want. From the offertory given on Christmas Day the poor receive a most acceptable donation in food and money.

Another undertaking which claims special notice is the Cathedral Guild. A large number of ladies meet weekly, some employing themselves in making useful articles which have been ordered and others engaged in fancy work which forms a considerable portion of the things which are disposed of at an annual bazaar. The object of the Guild is to provide funds for building a new room for the Cathedral Sunday School, which is much needed. The success which has hitherto attended the efforts of the ladies has been most encouraging for the future.

There is also a "Band of Hope" which has fully answered the expectations of those who had taken much interest in its establishment. The young people who have joined it seem enthusiastically to enter into the good work, and future satisfactory results may be confidently anticipated.

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I have already alluded to good works done towards those who are not included within the limits of the Parish Of course I refer in a large degree to the aid afforded to Missionary work. It will be unnecessary to enter into particulars on this subject, as detailed accounts are made known in other ways. It is right however for me to say that annual contributions are made, not only after appeals on specified Sundays in the Cathedral, but there is great liberality shown in subscriptions and also in what is given privately, but this cannot be further alluded to. Looking to the support of our own Diocesan needs the report of the Church Society will supply all the information which is interesting. But liberality is not confined to home claims. "The Society for Foreign and Domestic Missions" is not overlooked, as the published accounts will show, and many other commendable objects of a like Missionary character are generouslyaided. Our Sunday School has promised Rev. E. F. Wilson \$20annually towards the support of the "Wawanosh Home" and the children have faithfully given their little contributions once a month, so that we have been able to make our half-yearly remittances with great regularity.

This report is prepared in answer to a request conveyed to me by the Secretary of the Church Society. I am sorry

QUEBEC-ST. PAUL'S CHURCH.

The Rev. Thomas Richardson reports:—

In reply to your intimation that the Central Board would be pleased to receive a report from me of our Parochial doings during the past year, I would merely remark that in such a small Parish as ours, there is, I am afraid, very little to write about that can be of any public interest.

The Services in Church throughout the year, have been every Sunday morning, with a celebration of the Holy Communion every other Sunday, every Festival throughout the year, every Wednesday and Friday morning and every Thursday evening during the season of Lent; morning and evening prayer every day during Holy Week, and every Thursday evening during Advent. The services on Sunday morning and on the week day evenings are well attended: the responses and singing bright and hearty. At Easter and Christmas our little Church is very nicely decorated by the members of the congregation.

I have also to report that during the year we organised the St. Paul's Parochial Branch of the Women's Auxiliary of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, and after much deliberation, the members of the same agreed to clothe one of the Indian girls at the Wawanosh Home, and in the Fall, they sent a box filled with everything that was required for such a purpose; and in connection with the same, we have a meeting in the Church, on the first Thursday in each month, when papers are read bearing on some part of the mission field, and a small collection made on behalf of Domestic and Foreign Missions, the chief object being to arouse an interest in missionary work.

Our branch of the Church of England Temperance Society flourishes, and I hope will do a good work; and the same may be said of our Sunday School.

On Advent Sunday Hymns Ancient and Modern were used in our Church for the first time.

We have to thank the Rector and Churchwardens of the Cathedral for their generous help for many years in the way of clothing and fuel for our poor, and we have also to acknowledge with many thanks the sum of twenty dollars from Robert Hamilton, Esq., towards our Poor Fund.

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with much gratitude the many acts of attention and kindness that I have received from all the members of my congregation, and the hearty response they always make to my slightest wish.

From the financial report it will be seen that when the paucity of our members is borne in mind, our collections and subscriptions will be found equal to any other congre-

QUEBEC-ST. PETER'S CHURCH.

The Rev. M. M. Fothergill begs to report:-

That during the year the services have been conducted with regularity. Celebration of the Holy Communion every

Sunday and on the principal festivals.

Last Lent the Rector was much indebted to the Rev. F. E. J. Lloyd for an admirable course of lectures, which proved of great value and were evidently blessed of God, as seen by the increased number of communicants at the early celebration on Easter Day.

The Sunday School has been well attended—great regularity on the part of both scholars and teachers. The school numbers nearly 100. The children are pledged to \$10 per annum to the Rev. E. F. Wilson for the Wawanosh Home. This year they sent an extra \$5 for one of the proposed new Homes. An extremely pleasant Sunday School festival was held last summer at the Island of Orleans.

The Women's Auxiliary has done a good work by not only increasing the amount of money raised for missions, but also by stirring up a missionary spirit in the congregation, which has resulted in sending a quantity of useful articles of clothing, etc., to the Diocese of Algoma. Several of the children have organized a Children's Auxiliary which meets every Wednesday afternoon, and much interest is

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manifested in the work. The Guild, which meets every Thursday at the Rectory, has also been strengthened during the year by the addition of new members. The object in hand is to provide the necessary funds to erect a Church Hall for Sunday School, temperance meetings and other purposes, a very great need in St. Peter's, as the present school-room under the Church is cold, damp and unhealthy; in every respect a most unsuitable room for parish gatherings.

A branch of the Church of England Temperance Society with Band of Hope has for years been in operation in St. Peter's, but for want of a pleasant meeting room, not a great success. Still good has been done and precious souls re-

claimed from the sin of drunkenness.

Confirmation classes are annual with an annual Confirmation on Palm Sunday. This year the Rector has three classes—one some three miles from town—Mrs. Gugy, with great kindness, providing him a conveyance each week to attend the class.

The re-opening of the Woollen Factory has brought some new members to the Church. The factory is well managed by Mr. W. H. Naylor, and it is much to be hoped that this useful industry will prove a success and serve to increase

our old country inhabitants.

The Envelope System has been introduced and with success, though the Rector regrets that all the members of the congregation have not yet adopted the system. Daily service had to be discontinued through lack of funds to heat the Church. The great drawback in St. Pter's parish is the want of means for the carrying out of the work of the Church.

The Rector desires to express his heartfelt thanks to the teachers of the Sunday School, to the organist and members of the voluntary choir and to the Church workers generally for their punctual attendance and assiduous care with which they have conducted their several and most important duties. His thanks are also due to the Rector and Wardens of the Cathedral wich, as well as to kobert Hamilton, Esq., and E. J. Price, Esq., for their kind and generous aid in assisting the poor of the district.

In November the Lord Bishop kindly licensed Mr. Rowland J. Fothergill (who had completed his course at St. Augustine's College, Canterbury), as Lay Reader until his

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. Rowat St. til his ordination in October or removal to some other sphere of duty.

The duties at the Marine and Em—nt Hospital have been attended to as usual during the par. The number of immates has been exceptionally small. Every facility is afforded to the Chaplain by the authorities for the proper performance of his duties. Thanks are due to Mrs. Simpson, of Hyde Park Square, London, for regularly sending valuable papers for the patients.

In concluding this report the Rector would say that he is cheered with hearty services, regular and fair congregations, a good Sunday School and many willing workers, but disheartened at the many wants, viz: a new organ, a Church hall, altar cloths, linen, library books, etc., etc.

From the statistical table attached it will be seen that the parish has increased its Church Society subscriptions and offertories by \$18.13.







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RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports:-

During the past year Divine Service has been held in St. Anne's Church, Richmond, twice each Lord's Day and chief festivals, once on the Saints' Days and many times besides on week days and nights; in St. John's Church, Melbourne, once each Sunday.

In addition to the above, what with cottage and school-house lectures in remote districts, my appointments during the earlier part of the year numbered eight per week, at each of which an address or meditation was given.

The Holy Eucharist has been celebrated at St. Anne's thirty times, and many times in private to the sick and aged. Our Special Lenten Services were attended with, seemingly, a growing interest throughout; once only did the number present, even on a Wednesday afternoon, fall short of fifty. The natural and hoped for result of this wide appreciation and better use of the Church's Retreat was that never before during my incumbency did so large a number (134), and they so devoutly, draw nigh on Easter morning to partake of the Holy Communion; and never did that blessed day appear to shed brighter or happier rays upon our little flock. Two elements from without contributed to the joy of that day; through the kind offices of Mr. Green and Mr. Brooke unusual care had been bestowed upon the musical part of the Service, and with very marked effect; and furthermore, a number of valuable gifts and thank-offerings had been made to God's House and on that day dedicated to His Service (viz) a beautiful altar cloth, eight feet in length, from the Kilburn Sisters; a handsome brass corona, with richly illuminated shades, from Mr. and Mrs. C. P. Cleveland; a pair of brass vases from Mrs. Lloyd and Mrs. Ready; a Brussels carpet for the Sanctuary and Choir, and matting for the nave, from Mr. Wilcocks, Church-Warden; and a kneeling cushion, twenty-four feet long, worked in wools, rich in colours and design, the handiwork (and many long months it occupied), and the loving gift of Mrs. Wilcocks. Subsequently a set of numerals on porcelain, one hundred in number, were given by Mr. Harkom. When the parishioners are led to make such offerings to God one cannot but feel very thankful.

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But alas! here as elsewhere, all kinds of soil are to be found, so that one has often much to sorrow for, as well as to rejoice over. The good impressions of Holy Week, with

some, how transient are they!

The Church in this Parish has recently sustained a heavy loss in the removal of one who for many years was a most efficient church-warden, a most regular attendant upon all the ordinances of religion, an exceedingly generous contributor to all good works, and one too, who was willing, when need required, to act, and ever acceptably to the people, as Lay Reader. Such men we can ill-spare. This however we know, that wherever Mr. Wilcocks' ho ae may be, he and his family will deem it their privilege as well as duty, thus as far as lies in their power, to further Christ's work at home and abroad.

The Sunday School in connection with St. Anne's has now a very efficient staff of teachers, ten in number. We have endeavored, by means of special services, to familiarize the children with the Church's service, as well as with her history and principles. "The Story of Christmas," "The Story of the Cross," and "The Story of the Resurrection," set to appropriate music, with a few minutes' address between the parts, have in turn formed services at once inter-

esting and instructive.

The children's winter entertainment was, in some respects, the most successful affair of the kind we have had, the little ones having had long and patient training therefor at the hands of the Honorables Mrs. and Miss Aylmer. Advantage was taken by the congregation, at this gathering, to present the rector with a purse of \$67, for which kind expression of good-will, and for the sympathy which prompted it, they have his grateful acknowledgment. The scene of the children's summer outing was, again, the home and grounds of Col. and Mrs. Ready, especial friends of all the little ones of the congregation.

The Ladies' Missionary Union has sent, this year, to the Treasurer for Domestic Missions the sum of \$34.73. A branch of the Woman's Auxiliary has been formed in this Parish, and with it the Missionary Union has been amalgamated. In May last we had the privilege of a visit and an address from the Bishop of Algoma, the collection, on which occasion, amounting to \$16.03, was given to his Diocese. Mr. Journeaux and Miss Cleeve, our two faithful

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, were led to thankcollectors in behalf of Algoma, have this year sent \$87.50 to that Diocese:—this makes \$874 thus sent, the aggregate of many small offerings. The Women's Guild is still in active operation; nor would it be easy to estimate our indebtedness to the members of that body. The sale of their handwork this year realized \$500 net; and a concert conducted by them, \$80 more. Our wish is to establish a Men's Guild or Club, in connection with the Church,—assured that with their active co-operation much further good, and that in many ways, might be accomplished.

The debt upon our new Church still amounts to \$4,300. During the past year \$750 was paid on account of principle

and interest.

Unfortunately a fresh responsability has lately been

thrown upon the congregation of St. Anne's.

During my absence in England, the Rectory with almost its entire contents, and the outbuildings with theirs, were burnt to ashes. The Rev. H. S. Fuller, whom I had left in charge of the Parish, and in occupation of my house, narrowly escaped with his family, a like fate. The building, which was old, was insured for \$700; my furniture, library, &c., for \$1,000—little more that one third of the value. Both amounts have been promptly paid by the "Royal."

With characteristic kindness, purses of \$130 from St. Anne's, and \$20 from St. John's congregation, were with little delay presented to Mr. Fuller:—he too unfortunately having lost many of his personal effects. It is probable that steps will be taken in the early spring to provide the Parish with another Rectory:—this time in closer proximity to the Church, the old one having been more than a mile distant therefrom. We have in the bank, including the insurance money, \$1,100 towards this object. I am exceedingly sorry to say that our Communion Vessels, (a beautiful solid silver set, costing \$228,) and Altar Linen, were in the Rectory at the time of the fire, and were destroyed. On representation of these facts to them, the same kind Christian workers who gave us our Altar Cloth, immediately made and presented to us a new set of Altar Linen, putting thereon much fine needle-work.

Though the notice given them was very short, I received their present in time to bring back with me from England. In common with many other congregations, scattered all over the Christian world, we are much indebted to them, and ver Mr. Ro St. And I am al the ad and a During though

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eived land. d-all hem, and very grateful. I am happy to say that, stimulated by Mr. Robert Hamilton's generous offer, the congregation of St. Anne's have recently added \$150 to their Endowment. I am also thankful, for its sake no less than my own, that the adjoining Mission of St. John's, Melbourne, for three and a half years vacant, has now a resident clergyman. During the interregnum, I attended as far as I was able,—though very sensible throughout of the inadequacy of these ministrations,—to its spiritual needs.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese held Confirmation in St. Anne's Church in June last, when sixteen candidates re-

ceived the Holy Rite.

Double that number had been under preparation. Some of the absentees were amongst the volunteers, under canyass at the time.

On resigning, in July last, her position as organist, Miss Fowler received from the congregation of St. Anne's Church a purse of \$85, as a small mark of their indebtedness and gratitude for her long and faithful services. Mr. G. Aylmer Brooke, B. C. L., takes her place.

RIVIERE DU LOUP (en bas).

The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports:—

Rivière du Loup is the chief town on the St. Lawrence below Quebec. It is French and situated in the heart of an extensive French country. With about twenty-five Protestant families resident and as many more visiting the neighborhood in summer, for it is a watering place, it is the centre of the sole Protestant ministrations for nearly a complete circuit of a hundred miles radius, excepting the summer chaplaincies of Tadousae and Cacouna. At the present time however the scattered work of the Mission lies chiefly within the North-Western and Eastern radii of At had r

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the Saguenay and the Intercolonial Railway.

Fraserville.—Here in a situation of modest retirement stands the little grey sanded Church with its square belitower pinacling above the trees. On the sunny side, under the plumes of low spreading firs, lie the sleeping ones, among them three clergymen, nearest to the Church the aged E. G. W. Ross, who for 25 years was the faithful missionary in this vast district. I can never look upon his grave without thinking of the many unknown hardships that must have been his when prosecuting his Master's work in a climate so harsh and in those rude days when the present facility and comfort of travel were unknown. No wonder his latter years found him a bed-ridden invalid and all crippled with rheumatism.

The little Church has now seen well nigh half a century and, notwithstanding associations very dear, must in the near future give place to a new and more commodious structure. For the meanwhile its seating capacity has been enlarged by the erection of a gallery across the west

end.

The aisles are now comfortably matted; on the altar are usually flowers to tell of God's tenderness, and at Christmastide the wide spraying and interlacing fronds of the evergreens produce a very pleasing effect against the white walls otherwise so blank, but too decrepid to admit of such permanent tinting and illumination as one would like to see. Here the sounds of hearty worship are heard every Sunday morning throughout the year. Miss Hill continues faithfully to preside at the organ, and with a devotedness no less worthy of praise to carry on, with the assistance of Miss Tambs, her little Sunday School.

In the porch hangs, map-like, our "Automatic Tract Distributer." This consists of a system of pockets holding an assortment of tracts so as to display their titles. Above are the words "one cent each, help yourself and pay below." Below is a money box with a card telling the object of the proceeds. The object just now is the payment of the

matting.

In this very simple way, occupation is provided for the waiting moments of early comers, much good seed taken home in both senses of the term, and at the same time some practical object furthered.

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for the taken e some At one opening of the box I found that some good soul had managed to squeeze through the aperture a two dollar bill.

To the left of the church yard entrance and within only a yard or two of the Church stands, as an accomplished fact, the Parsonage, long contemplated and assiduously worked for by our kind visitors. The building is commodious and gives general satisfaction both with regard to its external appearance and internal arrangement. It is solidly and warmly built of "deals on on the flat."

Its comfort is appreciated by the Incumbent as well as the advantages it affords him for earrying on the work of the parish. Two instances of noble generosity here call for hearty and grateful acknowledgement. First, a bateau load of lumber from Chicoutimi, given by Messrs. Price Bros., of Quebec; and, secondly, a donation of \$132 worth from Messrs. King Bros, of Rivière Ouelle.

It was this latter firm, it will be remembered, that gave so generously the lumber for our church-building at the Portage, to which, in so large a measure, is due the Church's success at that place.

When I brought my sister from the Townships to keep house for me, it was very gratifying to find carpets had been laid and the rooms otherwise prepared for us through the kindness of Mrs. Ferguson, Miss Telfer and other thoughtful friends.

Mr. Robert Hamilton, to whose munificent generosity we, like most all the missions of the diocese, owe the existence of an endowment fund, this year made another kind offer with a view to the augmentation of the same, namely, of \$100, provided we raised a like sum for the same purpose. To encourage us still further, our respected citizen, Mr. J. A. Jarvis, promised an additinal sum of fifty dollars. I rejoice to say that we succeeded, and thus at once increasing our nucleus of \$600 to \$850.

How truly heart strengthening it is for a clergymen to find himself thus furthered in his efforts, especially in the case of one who labours under the drag of languid health and depressing sense of many consequent shortcomings.

The Station.—Most of the resident Protestants live in this neighbourhood, and are for the most part connected with the railroad. The usual Sunday evening services have continued steadily, with the exception of a few of the fine sum-

mer evenings, when they were transferred to the Church. It is a great drawback here that we have still only a school-house to worship in. It seems almost impossible in such a place, with its inconvenience of arrangements and diversity of associations, to secure that fervor of devotion and reverence of demeanor that our Liturgy contemplates. I am glad to say, however, that the responding is good, the singing hearty and the attendance improved.

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No little attention is bestowed upon the children who constitute a most interesting and promising portion of the community. In Miss Robinson they have an excellent and enthusiastic teacher for their day school, and they are very fond of their Sunday School which Mr. Hill still continues to superintend with warm and unabated interest, aided by Miss Martha Nixon as first assistant, Miss Jessie Hill as organist and librarian, and Miss Annie Hill as secretary.

To have such constant and devoted teachers as these prove to be is very gratifying, and I am pleased here to acknowledge gratefully my hearty appreciation of their services.

In addition to his Sunday School work, Mr. Hill has also been wont to hold supplemental meetings of his class on Tuesday evenings for searching the scriptures.

Recently we have organized a branch of the "Ministering Children's League." The object of this association is to promote unselfishness and kindly thoughtfulness for others. The motto is: "No day without a deed to crown it;" and the one simple rule is that "every member must try to do at least one kind deed every day." From the heartiness with which the idea has been taken up much practical good is anticipated.

The children's Christmas Tree was as usual a great success, and the mirth of the occasion was greatly enhanced by Mr. Fred. Waterson acting the part of the venerable and mysterious Santa Claus, assisted by Masters James Hogg and Frank Brown as sprites in grotesque attire.

The Friday evening meetings, described in my last report, continued regularly until the setting in of the past season, when the pressure of other work obliged us to relinquish them. By request I am about to resume them.

Renewed interest is awakened in our parochial library, which, with Frank Brown's assistance as librarian, is being managed with more efficiency than formerly.

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l library, , is being An acceptable donation of literature has just been received from certain kind ladies of the Women's Christian Association, Quebec.

The railroad between here and Edmonston, connecting the I. C. R. with the N. B. line, is in course of construction; when completed it may possibly increase our English community, and call for mission extension in that direction.

OUTPOSTS—Notre-Dame du Portage.—This village lies six miles to the west, and extends for a considerable distance along the margin of the St. Lawrence. It is purely a summer station, there being no Protestant residents whatever.

The Church building is now quite out of debt. Capt. McAllan, who has shown a particularly lively interest, and last year collected in Montreal \$129, again this year kindly sent us \$20 more.

The visitors consist chiefly of mothers and children. On account of the latter being so numerous, as well as to relieve the pressure of attendance, we services are held each Sunday.

The singing is thoroughly congregational and good, and though the majority of the worshippers are unaccustomed to the Church service, yet, with the aid of paged prayerbooks, we secure excellent responding. Indeed, but for these paged prayer-books, it would be difficult to get along at all. I only wish, as I have said before, that we could procure larger copies, correspondingly paged, for many whose sight requires a larger type.

The addresses at the children's service are based on a large catechetical diagram that hangs on the wall, facing the congregation. This serves admirably to fix the attention and to keep the teaching in due order of thought.

Thanks are due to Miss Newton for kindly officiating at the organ, and the Incumbent feels himself under many obligations to Mrs. Douglas for much hearty hospitality.

The appreciation of the Church's work here was shown by a surprise presentation last year of \$110 to the Incumbent, as a personal present.

Bic.—Though the scenery of this place is exceedingly beautiful, but few families as yet make it their summer resort. I regret to say that we were only able to give them one service this season. We must try and do better next year, and perhaps start a little church, for which a site has already been promised.

Rimouski, Father Point and St. Flavie.—These receive attention throughout the year, but the Protestant residents, by removals, have become reduced to only one or two families at each place, and my visits, though still attended with pleasure, are not so frequent as formerly. In summer there is generally the addition of a few visitors.

Trois-Pistoles will likely call for ministrations next year as a regular outpost, as I understand that the mills at the "Bridge," three miles from the station, are to be re-opened. At present there is but one Protestant family there.

Sault-an-Cochon.—This lumber establishment, on the north shore, is reached by way of Hatté Bay. Two visits are usually contemplated in the course of the summer. This year we failed. The difficulty is to time the crossing of the yacht with a clergyman's opportunity, the former being dependent upon the wind, the latter involving an absence of ten days or more. Most of the members of the three families constituting the little community, however, have had their turn of absence and opportunity of communicating, and regularly every Lord's Day, Mr. Grant Forrest, the manager of the establishment, kindly officiates as lay-reader. Nevertheless, I cannot but regret not having made one visit at least, for Sault-au-Cochon holds a warm place in my heart.

There is also a Church family now at Bertsimis, twenty-

five miles below Sault-au-Cochon.

Saguenay—St. Etienne.—About fifteen adults, and as many children—Protestants—visited twice and seven services held. As at Sault-au-Cochon, the esteemed manager, Mr. Hugh Blair, assembles the little community for wor-

ship every Sunday.

Grand Bay.—Visited twice and four services held. At my last visit there were but seven adults. The former local manager, Mr. A. Blair, who used kindly to hold Sunday service, opening his house for all who chose to attend, has removed to Chicoutimi having been promoted to the chief management of the lumber establishments at both places.

L'Anse au Foin.—One Protestant family. Twice visited

and two services held.

This place is somewhat difficult of access. On my last visit, the tide being out, I had about two miles of pick-a-backing and clod-hopping, one of my boatmen kindly

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n my last of pick-an kindly furnishing the back as we came to pools. It was very amusing. A visit to Mr. Anderson's cosy home is always enjoyable.

Chicoutimi.—This is the capital of the Saguenay district. Of the Protestants here 18 are adults who, with but one exception, are all communicants. Visited three times and

nine services held.

It has not been found possible to reach the few scattered ones some 60 or 70 miles beyond in the neighbourhood of Lake St. John.

Their dreadful isolation will however soon be broken by the completion of the railroad from Quebec. A connecting line will no doubt follow between the lake and navigation at Chicoutimi. This, with the completion of the road under construction to Rivière du Loup before referred to, will form a continuous and magnificent summer circuit from the States round to the Ancient Capital that must become a famous route for tourists. So we may hope by-and-bye to have a church at Chicoutimi and as the centre perhaps of a summer chaplaincy for the district.

On my last round I came down the river to St. Etienne by night on the tug "Belle" towing out to the St. Lawrence a laden vessel. I supped on board ship with the captain. He was a Swede and an exceedingly pleasant man. He had followed the sea 30 years and had never met with a single mishap. What he dreaded was a calm, "For then," said he, "I am as helpless as a babe, but," he continued, "in a storm I glory, then it is God and I. and

we manage her."

Within 48 hours the "Oscar I" was a total wreck on the rocks of Little Escoumains. I mention this incident as one of the many illustrations of the text "Let him that thinketh he standeth....."

From St. Etienne next evening, I took the "Belle" to Tadousac to catch the "Union" returning on her last trip.

She did not appear however till late next morning, owing to the blinding storm, so fatal, as we have seen, to the Swedish bark. The delay gave me the opportunity of a little Sunday service at the one English home in Tadousac.

The "Union" arrived at Rivière-du-Loup wharf at 4 P.M., and there I had to put up for the night, owing to the blocked state of the road, instead of going on as I had intended for evening service at the Station.

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enjoyable in visiting these outposts.

One meets with such warm welcome and hearty hospitality at each place; and everything is done in a most generous way to facilitate the Missionary's movements from place

to place.

Our method of collecting for Missions, described in a letter to the Bishop which appeared in the report of last Synod, has again proved successful; only through the Bishop's urgent appeal on behalf of Diocesan Missions, a field in a truer sense Domestic has claimed the attention. Vide subscriptions to Mission Fund, Church Society, which, together with other offerings including \$2.79 for the Jews, make a total for Missions of \$97.61, with two or three collecting cards yet to come in, and this independently of visitors.

The other special offertories required are Church Society, Pension Fund, \$7.31; General Fund, \$1.50; Bishop's Col-

lege, \$3 78.

The total raised in the year for Church purposes, including Mr. Hamilton \$100, is \$850.

Finally, I desire to record emphatically my grateful acknowledgement of the able and opportune assistance, in July and August, most kindly rendered by the following occasional clergymen: the Revds. Canon Richardson and Evans Davis, of London, Ontario, H Pollard, of Ottawa, A. Bareham, now of Quebec, W. Bernard, now of Melbourne Ridge, and especially, as usual, good Bishop Hamilton, who from Cacouna took four services here, at Fraserville, incluing a Confirmation.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. J. Eames reports:--

I was inducted into this mission on the 11th July last by the Rev. J. P. Richmond, Incumbent of Gaspé Basin, acting for the Rev. Rural Dean Lyster, whose absence was unavoidable.

A poor year's fishing—in fact the poorest ever experienced by the oldest residents of this mission—renders it an act of the keenest self-denial on the part of some to give their accustomed quota towards paying the quarterly assessments of the Board. On the whole, notwithstanding these dist is truly

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erienced in act of we their essments lese discouragements, there is much to be thankful for, and reason to take courage for the future.

A debt incurred in repairing the Parsonage has been wiped out by the proceeds of a bazaar and tea given by the ladies of the congregation, thus freeing the Church property entirely from debt.

The services have been regularly kept up much after the same order as that adopted by my predecessor, of whose energy and zeal while laboring in this mission proof is not

wanting.

At St. John's, Sandy Beach, services have been regularly held every Sunday, except one, and on the first Sunday of every alternate month, morning and evening, and also on all the chief holydays and festivals. At the Barachois, five miles distant, I hold an occasional weekly service. All these services are well attended and much carnestness evinced, which is most apparent from the goodly number that present themselves at the Lord's Table. During the summer months my Sunday School roll showed the names of eighty children and nine teachers. To the latter my warmest thanks are due for the kind and painstaking way in which they performed the duty entrusted to them, as also to Mrs. Forsythe, who spared neither time nor pains to render the musical part of the service hearty and harmonious while she was with us. The winter attendance at the school is about half of the above number, owing to distance and bad roads.

Peninsula.—Owing to unexceptionally fine weather during the few months of my incumbency I have been able to keep up the regular Sunday services and to give an occasional week-day service. The congregation are much interested in and warmly attached to their little Church, and attend with great regularity. The responding and singing are very hearty and cheerful.

A good Sunday School is in operation, in which the children are carefully taught the Church's truths. Altogether the good work is progressing favourably in a quiet unostentatious way. May God still continue to prosper His work here.

Little Gaspé.—At this point I have endeavoured to keep up the fortnightly services; but this is not at all times practicable especially in the spring and fall, when it is almost impossible to cross the three miles expanse of bay by boat. On two occasions, in order to meet my appointments, I was

forced to drive around the Bay a distance of twenty-seven miles in a blinding snow-storm. Not the difficulty of meeting my Sunday appointments, but the lack of that amount of pastoral care which I fervently desire to give and which is so necessary here, in order to do effectually the great work of the Church, is that which I deplore. The people here, are with a few exceptions, warmly attached to the Church, as has been manifestly shown by their liberal contributions to Church purposes; and I feel confident, that many of those who are now nominally something else, would return to us had they weekly ministrations of the Church and the needful presence of a pastor in their midst. It is therefore fondly to be hoped, that at some time in the near future this want will be supplied. Shortly after my advent here, I re-opened a Sunday School which had been started by my predecessor some time ago. It is now in operation and progressing as favourably as I could expect.

In conclusion, I would say, that much has been done within the past two years, and I trust that, with God's blessing on my efforts, the good work will continue to go

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The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:-

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The Services in this Parish during the past year have been as follows:—

At St. Peter's Church every Lord's Day, morning and evening; once a month (children's service) in the afternoon; Saints' Days and chief festivals in the morning; every Wednesday evening.

At Chillas' School House, Orford, once a fortnight in the afternoon; East Sherbrooke every Thursday evening.

The Sunday School has been faithfully maintained throughout the year with the usual brief summer holiday. We have something over two hundred names on the roll, seventeen teachers, two librarians and a superintendent.

The Church Temperance Society is quietly working on and is much indebted to the various Clergymen from a distance who, during the year, have addressed its meetings. The children of the society, under the instruction of a band of zealous ladies, among whom Miss Hallowell was, as usual, prominent in helpfulness, and aided by several young men of the parish, gave a most successful Dramatic Entertainment at midsummer, the proceeds of which amounted to \$129.13. This amount was distributed as follows: the Free Reading Room, \$50: the Mission Extension Fund, \$50; the Society's work (water fountains for the city), \$29.13.

The Ladies' Guild, which continues to support a child at the Wawanosh Home, Sault Ste. Marie, has been as active as usual during the year.

Besides providing a beautiful altar cloth for St. Peter's, it has raised a considerable sum towards missionary purposes. The parish is deeply indebted to its earnest ladies; may they long have the power and will to work for it. The Master's blessing will surely rest on those who thus labour for Him.

The Children's Guild has given \$50, the proceeds of its year's work, to the new Home for Indian children in Assiniboia.

A branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society was established in May last, and has been working quietly and faithfully ever since. It has now forty-three members. It has already sent five barrels of books and clothing to Algoma and has collected

in cash \$54.90. Its collectors are visiting our people sys-

tematically every month.

About eighteen months ago a Home for emigrant children of the Church was established in Sherbroke by the "Waifs and Strays Society" of London. It is purely a Church Home. Its object is to provide permanent homes for the children in Church families only.

The children are placed out, upon fair conditions, either as adopted children or as servants. Some forty or fifty girls have already been provided with comfortable homes

in this way.

The affairs of the Home are managed with a considerable expenditure of time and pains, by a local committee of ladies and gentlemen, the Rector of the Parish being chairman

and A. H. Anderson, Esq., secretary-treasurer

It is much to be desired that the Clergy, far and wide, would interest themselves in the work of the Home: (1) by helping to make its existence and aims known to their people; (2) by securing good places for the children and keeping a watchful eye upon them afterwards. If they would do this we are persuaded that the Home might become a source of strength to the Church as well as a blessing unspeakable to the children befriended by it.

We have just lost the valuable services of Mrs. Bradburn, who has been matron of the Home from its establishment, and who has shown singular energy and wisdom in the management of the children. A suitable successor has been

found in Mrs. Osgoode.

A generous friend of the Church, who wishes to remain unknown, has given to St. Peter's a beautiful and costly altar rail. The rail itself is of light, neatly moulded wood The standards which support it are of polished brass, the work of Messrs. J. & R. Lamb, the design being the Passion flower.

The need of increased Church accommodation has long been felt; and after careful deliberation plans have been secured and measures taken towards the erection of a Church in East Sherbrooke.

Already some \$2,800 have been promised towards the good work, of which \$455 have been paid. It is our intention to begin building as soon as weather will permit in the coming spring.

One difficulty in so large and widespread a Parish as this must always be Parochial visitation. With the coustant next clerg of vi

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sh as constant demands made upon his time by other duties, it is next to impossible, even by the most rigid system, for one clergyman to do all that ought to be done here in the way of visiting.

To assist me in this direction I have established a Parochial Visiting Society. Dividing the Parish into Districts, I have assigned to each District one or more visitors. The duty of these visitors, who are for the most part ladies, is to make a monthly visitation of their respective Districts and to report to the Rector immediately in case of need or sickness, and in any case at a monthly meeting held for that purpose.

This society will, I believe, be of great use in promoting sympathy and good will among our people and in keeping the clergyman thoroughly acquainted with the people's condition.

On the 27th June, the Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited the Parish and Confirmed 28 persons, who were at once admitted to Holy Communion.

To the officers of the Parish and to the various lay helpers, male and female, the Rector is deeply indebted for court-cous and efficient help on various occasions.

Above all must be acknowledged the deep debt which Rector and Parish alike owe to the Revd. Dr. Reid, who throughout the year, with unwearying cheerfulness, has continued to give his very valuable assistance both in public and private ministration.

Our prayer to God is that he may long be spared to the Parish he has served so well.

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The Rev. F. E. J. Lloyd reports:

I was appointed to this Mission in September, 1886, consequently I have only been resident for a little more than three months. During that time Sunday services have been regularly held in the Churches of St. Paul, Shigawake, St. James, Port Daniel and of L'Anse-aux-Gascons. Days' services have also been held without intermission in the two former. Since my advent to the Mission I have organized a monthly meeting of the Sunday School teachers, under the profound conviction that unless our Sunday School teachers are themselves instructed in the doctrine of our most Holy religion but little success can attend their well intentioned efforts on behalf of these scholars. The Sunday Schools are well attended and the little band of teachers are faithful and attentive to their self imposed task. I cannot forbear mentioning with gratitude and admiration the zeal and devotedness of Mr. William Skene, Mr. Norman Dow and Mr. Thomas Acteson, superintendents of Shigawake,Port Daniel and L'Anse-aux-Gascon Sunday Schools, respectively.

In consequence of the large number of services to be held throughout the Mission on Sunday, the Mission Priest has not found it possible,—although recognising its importance he would gladly have done so—to eatechise the Sunday scholars every Sunday in accordance with the requirement of the Church as expressed in the prayer-book: still in order to test their progress in the rudiments of the faith, he has been able to catechise the scholars attending Shigawake and Port Danier Sunday Schools once a

month.

The leaflet system of instruction which I have never considered satisfactory and which obtained in the Mission schools for a considerable period, was superseded during the locum tenency of the Rev. Dr. Roe last summer by the introduction of the truly admirable Quebec Catechisms, by the use of which one is able to impart definite instruction in the doctrine and practice of the Church.

A series of social gatherings, to which admission is tree, has been instituted in Shigawake, to be held fortnightly, it

is hoped, throughout the winter.

The Holy Communion is celebrated monthly in the two

principal Churches and at L'Anse-aux-Gascons once in

every two months.

I regret to say, that in consequence of their inability to obtain remunerative employment, nearly all the young men of the Mission have emigrated to the United States of America. It is hoped, however, that when the much talked-of Baie-des-Chalcurs Railway is an accomplished fact, that many of them will return to the paternal roof.

In conclusion I have to acknowledge with unfeigned gratitude the many kind gifts which have found their way to the parsonage since I came into residence in the Mis-

sion.

STANSTEAD AND BEEBE PLAIN.

The Rev. Wm. T. Forsythe reports:-

Having only been in this parish since the middle of June I cannot report much in detail concerning Church work in it.

During the period which elapsed between the removal of Rev. G. Thorneloe and my arrival, the parish was in charge of Rev. H. J. Petry, who faithfully discharged the duties of Church services and pastoral visitation, and by his zeal and genial nature won the hearts of the people.

The services of the Church remain substantially the same in both parts of the parish as they were in the time of my predecessor, whose excellent organization and general management of parish matters leave scarcely anything to be de-

sired in the way of alteration.

The only alterations are the addition of an early celebration, monthly, at Christ Church, and a fixed monthly one at All Saints' Church; and children's service held at intervals on week days

The Wednesday evening services in Christ Church are

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still maintained, although the paucity of attendants is often distressing. It is hoped that these services will be in time developed into daily services.

The Sunday School at Christ Church is still a weak point in our work, but a strenuous effort is being made to revive

it, and to make it more useful and successful.

The Church day school continues to prosper under Miss Hepburn's able management. Of this lady's faithful and patient training of the young, not only in the ordinary routine of secular study, but also in Christian and moral principles, all members of the Church cannot but speak with great praise.

The Ladies' Guild still carries on its useful work. A bazaar in the winter and a strawberry festival in the summer brought in considerable sums for Church purposes.

At Beebe Plain no great additions or improvements have, this year, been made to the Church fabric, as all efforts were directed towards paying off a debt which remained upon the tower recently erected, which debt, I am glad to say, has been nearly liquidated.

The town clock has been placed in the spire, and is a great addition to the Church and also a great convenience

to the village at large.

The attendance at the Sunday services has maintained its usual average. The Sunday School work here is most encouraging, the attendance of children being good and the zeal of the teachers most commendable.

A small confirmation class is being held in both Churches. I have not been able as yet to commence services in any out-station, but hope to do so soon on week-days, the whole of the Sunday being occupied in the three (and on two Sundays in month four) services of the two Churches.

I cannot close without expressing my gratitude to my new parishioners for their many great kindnesses shewn me in entering upon my new sphere of duty.

The Rev. W. G. Faulconer reports:-

With regard to St. Sylvester Mission, as a whole, I am glad to say there are very evident signs of spiritual interest and progress; but as I have had scarcely time to organize the work generally, therefore I must beg to be excused making a lengthy report this year--trusting however there may be more matter of interest in the future.

Baptisms, 9; Marriages, 2; Burials, 3.

THREE RIVERS.

The Rev. J. H. Jenkins reports:-

The most noteworthy incident which occurred during the past year was the visit of the Bishop in March, for Confirmation. Eleven young persons then received "Laying on the Hands" and were admitted to the full Communion of the Church.

In September, the Rector and Church Wardens, with the sanction of the Bishop, sold a strip of land belonging to the Church to the Corporation of Three Rivers for \$240, \$150 of which were added to the Endowment Fund, the balance applied to the improvement of the Church property.

I am sorry to say that the exodus of Church people from this place still goes on. Four families left during the past year, and I hear of two more who will probably go before May, and none come to replace them. Ten years ago the Church people here numbered over three hundred, and now, all told, they amount to one hundred and four, so that the prospects of this Parish in the future are far from being bright. Other Christian bodies (except, of course, the Roman Catholic) have also suffered largely from emigration. In 1876 the English-speaking population of Three Rivers was nearly nine hundred; I doubt if they now number three hundred. The services of the Church have been held with the usual regularity; Festivals and Fasts duly bidden and public service held; Mattins said daily during the summer, special evening services during Advent and Lent. The latter are generally well attended.

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. S. Riopel, M.D., reports:-

We have this year built a new fence around the graveyard, and dug a new well at the Parsonage. An acre of land has

been added to Church property.

This, in addition to the new Parsonage just completed, is a good beginning in the way of renovation. But a great deal yet needs to be done. Outbuildings are wanted, the roof of the Church must be renewed, and the stones pointed for the mere preservation of the building; the inside also needs repairs, the mode of heating is very defective, causing the Church to be very cold in cold weather. How shall we get these wants supplied? Many of our people have mortgages with heavy interest to meet, school and municipal taxes, Church dues and the many expenses incidental to farm life. Their farm produce and their wood is selling this year at a very unusually low rate, and their potatoe crop was a comparative failure.

About twelve years ago we could count among our members quite a number who had become independent farmers, but an emigrating epidemic removed them, and we were left with those too much encumbered with debt or too poor to leave. In three years land went down to one third the

former value.

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reaction, however, has taken place within the last two years, and we hope for better things. But the vacant farms have been purchased by young men, and it will take some years for them to pay off their land, especially since the money has to be raised on soil that was exhausted by the previous owners.

The attendance at Divine Service has continued very good. There is evidently an appreciation in every respect of the ministrations of the church. We have had the benefit of musical services through the kindness of Miss Ross, of

Lorette.

Again we have the pleasure of thanking Mrs. Montizambert, Miss Macadams, Judge Andrews and other kind friends for providing towards our Christmas tree.

WEST FRAMPTON.

Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:-

During the past year our diminished numbers have struggled bravely to meet their obligations and calls made upon them. The assessment and other claims have been met, and nearly all the families in this part of the Mission have responded to Mrs. Debbage's appeals for subscriptions to the Church Society.

The services have been maintained with few exceptions during the past year. I was absent one Sunday in order to give services at St. George's and Cumberland Mills. A good deal is said about clergy having holidays. I have been more than eighteen years in the Ministry of the Church in this Diocese, and I have not had a month's holiday during the whole period. And I have not spent more than eight or ten Sundays out of my own Missions.

His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese was here for Confirmation in October. He confirmed fifteen in West Frampton and five in Cranbourne. Several of the candidates were married persons. His Lordship's visits are always appreciated. The people do not hear many different preachers here. Besides the Bishop's we had a sermon from the

LIST

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Revd. E. Sewell, who spent part of the summer here. Mr. Sewell has kindly made us a present of two candlebras. These are now hanging in our Church and are much admired. Our thanks are due to Mr. Sewell tor his gift.

During the summer, improvements were made in and about both of the Churches of the Mission, which thus have fresh marks of being cared for. The people still attend the services well. The communicants in West Frampton are generally near thirty, and in Cranbourne eight to ten. On Christmas Day we had thirty-six communicants in the Church here. I often think that the good attendance at the services in Cranbourne is largely due to the little organ which kind ladies in Quebec enabled us to acquire four years ago.

Our temperance meetings are better attended this winter than last, and more interest is taken in them. There were about sixty persons at the last meeting, a good portion of whom are total abstainers.

Our school, thanks to the continued help from the Church Society, still works on. We have had another change of teachers, but have been fortunate in securing the services of a good teacher from Inverness, Miss Elvidge. At the time of her arrival here we had a pleasant tea meeting in the school house for the school-children, in order to welcome their new teacher. At the same time I had the pleasure of presenting Mr. John Bartholomew, Church Warden, with a small sum of money from the people in recognition of his long and gratuitous services to the Church.

As in previous years, I have received much kindness from the people.

That for 1886 being the largest contribution from this Diocese in any one year. In this year contributions for Domestic Missions were received from every parish or mission except Dudswell, Levis and Cape Cove, and for Foreign Missions from all except Dudswell and Levis. In most cases every congregation in the parish or mission sent an offering. Those for Foreign Missions were devoted to the work of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, from which this Diocese has received in the past and is still receiving substantial aid. Those for Domestic Missions, not appropriated, will be distributed by the Board of Management.

Your Committee has not unfrequently heard it said, that the Diocesan Funds would suffer from the efforts of the Missionary Society to create interest in its work, and would therefore call attention to the following statement, viz:

which so forcibly recalls the promise of Our Lord, "Give and it shall be given unto you."

Your Committee would remind you that under Canon XIX of the Provincial Synod the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society consists of all persons who are members of the Church.

That the Bishops of the Ecclesiastical Province, and the Clerical and Lay Delegates, for the time being, of the Provincial Synod, form the General Board of Management.

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That when the Provincial Synod is not in Session, the affairs of the Society are managed by a Board composed of all the Bishops, with two Clergymen and two Laymen from each Diocese.

This Board of Management meets three times in each year, and has met during the past three years at Hamilton, Toronto, Kingston, Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec; a missionary meeting having been held on each occasion, when much interesting information was brought before the

Church members at those places.

The Board issues two appeals annually, with a view to bringing the great missionary work prominently before the members of our Church, and to an offertory collection being made in every congregation in the Ecclesiastical Province on the Sunday after Epiphany for Foreign Missions, and the Sunday after Ascension Day for Domestic Missions; by Foreign Missions being meant those to the heathen, by Domestic Missions those in Algoria and the great North-West.

Your Committee believes that in many congregations nothing is done beyond reading the appeals and taking up the collections, but trusts the time is not far distant when active measures will be introduced into every congregation to induce all its members to take advantage of the great privilege offered them of aiding in the extension of Christ's Kingdom here on earth.—with this object a Branch of the Women's Auxiliary to the Board of Management has been formed in the Diocese, and local or Parish Branches have been started by the Congregations of the Cathedral, St. Matthew's, St. Michael's, St. Peter's, St. Paul's and Trinity Church, all of the City of Quebec, and also by the Congregations of Lennoxville, Cookshire and Windsor Mills. Such an organization is a necessity in every parish, if the missionary efforts are to be successful.

Your Committee does not however wish to ignore the fact that there are collectors in some other congregations

who have done and are doing good work.

Appended is a letter from the Rev. R. C. Tambs, Incumbent of Rivière-du-Loup, for which we ask your careful perusal; it shows the results that can be obtained from pro-

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viding the people with information, the opportunity for giving, and working on a system—and your Committee desires to place on record its appreciation of the zeal displayed by Mr. Tambs in the missionary cause, the large amount of \$106 raised by him, having been mainly collected at places on the St. Lawrence where there are no regular services or congregations, and which he visits once or twice in the year, as opportunity offers.

A monthly magazine, to be called "Our Mission News," is shortly to be published—it will be the organ of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, and we ask for it a

liberal report.

The accounts of the Treasurer are annexed.

My dear Lord Bishop.

On receipt of the Missionary Board's last appeal on behalf of Domestic Missions, I took occasion to address my congregation as follows:

"The Church is a Missionary Society. The Provincial Synod, regarding itself as representative of the Church in this as in other respects, appointed sometime ago a board for the systematic management in the Province of the Church's missionary work. Hence these biennial appeals and missionary offertories.

"This movement on the part of the Synod was an important step in the right direction, but it has admittedly

fallen short of what was aimed at.

"Now, what is still wanted, it seems to me, is some method by which the principle recognized by the Synod will be brought home specifically and definitely to each member of the Church; some method by which each one will be led to feel that he, that she, is a member of a missionary society, and that there rests upon each one a consequent responsibility which they cannot shirk without in a way disowning their Baptism. I propose, therefore, to make this little experiment. I am going to draw up a complete list of all the names connected with the congregation, men. women and children. This list I shall divide up among collectors; and these collectors I shall expect to get opposite every name a subscription towards Domestic Missionsnot opposite the name of every family—but opposite the name of each member in every family. Every one must give something, be it ever so small—say five cents, or even one cent. The one care must be to see that none is exempt. not even infants, for I reason that the same leve that commits them to the arms of God's mercy in baptism can well make some little thank-offering on their behalf in this appropriate direction."

Such, my Lord, was the manner in which I laid my suggestion before my people, and so warmly did they approve of it, that I was encouraged to extend it to my outstations. I may say also that all were given to understand that this general collecting throughout the district would be repeated periodically.

And now as to the result:

Here it must be borne in mind: 1st, that the summer visitors had nothing to do in this matter whatever; 2ndly, that our resident families number less than a score, and 3rdly, that at each of the outposts there are not more than three and four families.

Well, the result was this, that instead of the usual Church offertory of between three and four dollars, there was handed in to me, for transmission to the Board of Domestic Missions, the handsome sum of not less than one hundred and six dollars and thirty cents (§106.30.)

And not only was there this surprising financial result, but every one belonging to the parish was made to feel, as probably they had never felt before, an interest in the extension of Christ's kingdom, and all were the happier and the better for it.

I have written the above, thinking that your Lordship might make some use of it just now, when, as I understand, several members of the Board of Management are in town in connection with this their work. would dislothat

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Lordship derstand, in town Were the above method adopted throughout all the parishes of each of our dioceses, I feel a sanguine assurance that the mission work of our Church in this Dominion would receive at once a most amazing impetus, that there would be removed from us the long standing shame of disloyalty to our Lord's great missionary command, and that God, even our own God, would give us His blessing.

Your Committee would therefore recommend that the range of their investments for the future be extended, so as to cover first mortgages on farms or other similar property, in the most flourishing districts in Ontario, after personal inspection by one of the Board.

In consequence of the clergy who are immediately interested in the Clergy Trust Fund residing at a distance from Quebec, and experience shewing their inability to attend the meetings of the Board, and inasmuch as the funds are more than ample to guarantee them their annuities, the necessity no longer exists for their being members thereof; the Committee therefore beg to recommend that the following words in art. XII, sec. 3—"Two of the clergy being elected from number of those directly interested in the contemplated commutation"—be expunged.

Your Committee further recommend that the officers of the Committee be *ex-officio* members of the same. If this course is adopted, the Committee will be enlarged to thirteen members, and the difficulty in obtaining a quorum

will thus be removed.

That the following amendment to Art. XII, line 3, clause 2, be now finally adopted, viz:—"That the word ten in line 3, clause 2, of Art. XII, be struck out, and fourteen substituted; and that the word five in line 4 be struck out, and seven substituted.—Carried.

That the following By-law, to be numbered Art. XVI, "On the Patronage of the Cathedral Church of Quebec," be now finally adopted.

Whereas the Congregation of the Parish of Quebec, known as the Congregation of the Cathedral, have requested that the appointment of Rector of the Parsonage or Rectory of the Parish Church of Quebec, at present vested in and exercised by this Society, shall in future be made by the Lord Bishop of Quebec, with the concurrence of the said Congregation, in the manner provided by the Canon of the Diocesan Synod, now number XIII, which said request has been approved by the said Lord Bishop; and whereas, under the Consolidated Statutes of the late Province of Canada, chap. LXXIV, sec. 4, being an act respecting Rectories, this Society has power and authority, by By-law, to transfer to and vest in such person or persons as they may think fit, the right of presenting an Incumbent or Minister to such Parsonage or Rectory.

Therefore, with the permission of the said Lord Bishop, and to meet the wishes of the said Congregation, be it and it is hereby enacted, that the right of presenting an Incumbent or Minister to the Parsonage or Rectory of the Parish Church of Quebec shall vest in and be exercised by the

Lord Bishop of Quebec, with the concurrence of the said Congregation, in the manner provided in and by the said Canon number XIII, or as may be reafter be provided by future Canon; subject nevertheless to the right to this Society of repealing the present By-law, and resuming to themselves the said right of presentation whenever they may deem proper.—Carried.

I hereby ratify and confirm the amendment to Art. XII, line 3, clause 2; and also the By-law numbered Art. XVI, "On the Patronage of the Cathedral Church of Quebec," finally adopted at the Special Meeting of the Society, held at the National School, on Friday, the first day of April, 1887.

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1887.

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I. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures, for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or,—Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,—Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebee, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,—For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday Schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,—As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.
