BORDEN PLEDGED TO REIMBURSE DEPOSITORS

Fact That Farmers' Bank Certificate Was Procured Fraudulently Makes Case an Exceptional One, Says Premier — Legislation to Give Relief Next Session.

OTTAWA, June 6.—(Special.)—The prime minister this afternoon made an announcement of interest to the depositors of the Farmers' Bank, saying in substance that they would be reimbursed at the next session of parliament.

A question upon the order paper furnished the text for the announcement. The question was: "Is it the intention of the government to reimburse the depositors of the Farmers' Bank? If so, does the government propose to act in like manner with the depositors of the Bank St. Jean and the Bank Ville Marie?"

Borden Defines Position. Mr. Borden replied as follows: "It appears from the report of the commission appointed to investigate the matter of the failure of the Farmers' Bank (a) that the issue of the certificate of the treasury board authorizing the bank to commence business was procured by false and fraudulent representations on the part of the promoter and subsequent manager of the bank, W. R. Travers. (b) That in the commissioners' opinion it was incumbent upon the treasury board, before issuing its certificate, to have investigated certain charges made to the department of finance, that the amount required by the Bank Act to be paid up in respect of subscriptions had not been so paid, and that if the true facts had been disclosed the certificate of the treasury board would not have been given, and thus, the bank under the management of Travers would not have been authorized to commence business.

Case Exceptional. "The case is of exceptional and indeed unique character, both with regard to the fraudulent means by which the certificate was procured, and in respect of the results which followed, involving the ultimate loss of all monies placed in the bank by the unfortunate depositors. The man who fraudulently procured the certificate in the name of the bank was enabled to attract those deposits by the unwarranted assumption of powers in violation of plain statutory conditions. While the direct subsequent cause of the loss was the fraud and dishonesty of the bank's manager in the administration of its affairs, there is nevertheless a certain connection between the loss and the power and status with which he became vested upon the granting of the certificate. Having regard to these considerations the government considers that the depositors are entitled to a reasonable measure of relief, which will be provided by legislation to be introduced at the next session of parliament.

CANADA TO PAY FOR WARSHIPS BRITAIN HAS DECIDED TO BUILD IF BORDEN RETURNS TO POWER

Premier, in Vigorous Condemnation of Senate, Declares Will of the People Will Prevail and Canada Not Be Allowed to Remain in Humiliating Position — House Duly Prorogued.

OTTAWA, June 6.—(Special.)—The house sat in committee of supply until nearly five o'clock this morning, passing all the supplementary estimates and making provision possible at four o'clock this afternoon. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, as administrator for the government, gave the royal assent to a number of bills this afternoon and complimented the members of parliament upon their assiduous attention during the session to the business of the country.

Today's session of the house evoked a declaration of policy by the government on the question of the Farmers' Bank, some discussion of the white slave traffic in respect to newly arrived immigrants and a desultory post-mortem debate on the naval bill.

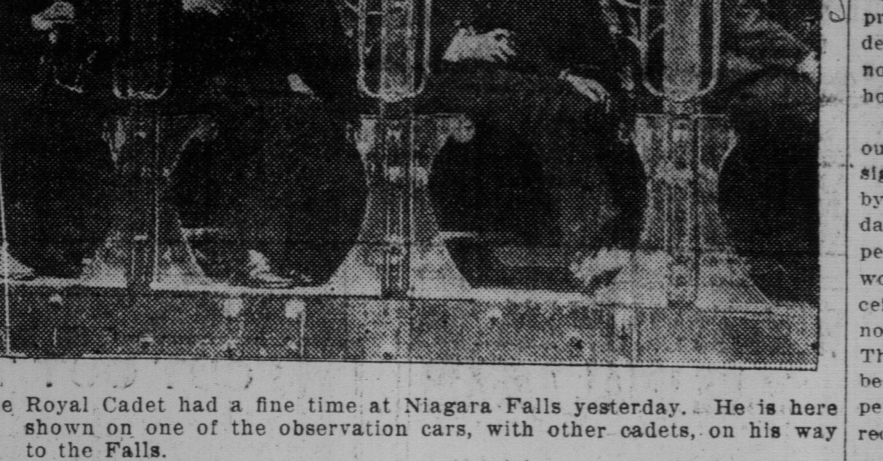
BORDEN SEES SOLUTION. "In view of the fact that our proposals were made on the basis of information supplied us by the British Admiralty," declared the prime minister, "it may yet be possible to make right that which has been made wrong. Press despatches state that the three ships which Canada was to have constructed will be built by the British taxpayers. It is impossible for us to make any advances to that end, because technically the bill has been defeated by parliament, the really only by a few partisans who do not represent the real desires of the Canadian people.

"These ships which are to be built by the admiralty are to be of the same type as we proposed to build. They are also to be used for the same purpose.

"This being so, I say, Mr. Speaker, that it is our intention if we remain in power, as we undoubtedly will, to bring down at a later date a proposal for the acquiring or construction of three battleships as was proposed by the naval aid bill of 1912. We hope that long before these vessels are completed we may be able to do what a partisan majority has not prevented us from doing. We shall take over and pay for these ships for the use of His Majesty and the common defence of the empire."

QUESTION OF PANAMA TOLLS MAY CAUSE TREATY TO FAIL

United States Senate Adopts Clause Exempting American Coastwise Vessels From Payment of Tolls, and Chances For Proposed Treaty Being Accepted Are Remote.

Special to The Toronto World. WASHINGTON, June 6.—The renewal of the general arbitration treaty between the United States and Great Britain, which expired yesterday, was taken up in the senate this afternoon and pressed for action.

Unless an amendment is incorporated exempting the question of Panama Canal tolls from those that may be submitted to arbitration, or a declaratory resolution to that effect is adopted and made part of the ratification, the treaty must fail.

The settlement against renewing the treaty seemed even more pronounced than did the feeling in favor of the exemption of American coastwise vessels from the payment of tolls when passing thru the canal. The clause granting such exemptions was adopted at the time by the overwhelming vote of 44 to 11. As the pending treaty must be approved by a two-thirds vote, its chances for being accepted are regarded as remote.

DR. VOGT APPOINTED MUSICAL DIRECTOR

Succeeds Late Dr. Fisher as Head of Toronto Conservatory of Music.

Dr. A. S. Vogt was appointed musical director of the Toronto Conservatory of Music on a motion of Sir John Gibson at a meeting of the board of governors yesterday afternoon. He succeeds the late Dr. Edward Fisher. For many years Dr. Vogt has been a member of the teaching staff of the conservatory. He is probably most familiarly known in Canada, the United States and Europe as conductor of the Mendelssohn Choir, one of the greatest musical organizations in the world.

When the position of head of the conservatory was made vacant by the recent death of Dr. Edward Fisher, the name of Dr. Vogt at once suggested itself. He will enter on his duties immediately.

CARPENTERS GO BACK TO WORK

Strike Ends Today With Men Getting Forty-Five Cents and Eight-Hour Day.

The carpenters' strike is at an end. After being at loggerheads with their employers for a week, over 2000 carpenters decided at a disorderly meeting in Association Hall last night to return to work on Monday for 45 cents an hour, and an eight hour day.

After a great deal of disorder and heated discussion by speakers, who were dissatisfied as to some minor details and who still wanted the men to stay out, a vote was taken and the following resolution was moved and carried by a large majority: "Resolved that this mass meeting is of the opinion that enough bosses have signed the agreement to establish a prevailing rate, and that we do hereby declare the strike off tomorrow at noon, and that all men demand 45c per hour."

Over 200 firms, practically all those outside the Builders' Exchange, have signed the wage agreement submitted by the strikers, and commencing Monday morning upwards of 2000 carpenters will take up their tools and work, on two conditions—that they receive the demanded wage, and that non-union labor be kept off the jobs. They claim that shortly Toronto will be made a closed city and that a carpenter in order to make his living will require a union card.

TORIES HOPE TO WIN NORTH GREY

Colin Cameron, Barrister, of Owen Sound, Gets Nomination After Much Balloting.

OWEN SOUND, June 6.—(Special.)—The Conservative convention held here today, to choose a candidate to contest the north riding of Grey at the impending by-election, was largely attended, there being about three hundred delegates present. Colin S. Cameron, barrister, of Owen Sound, was the final choice after a tedious afternoon's balloting.

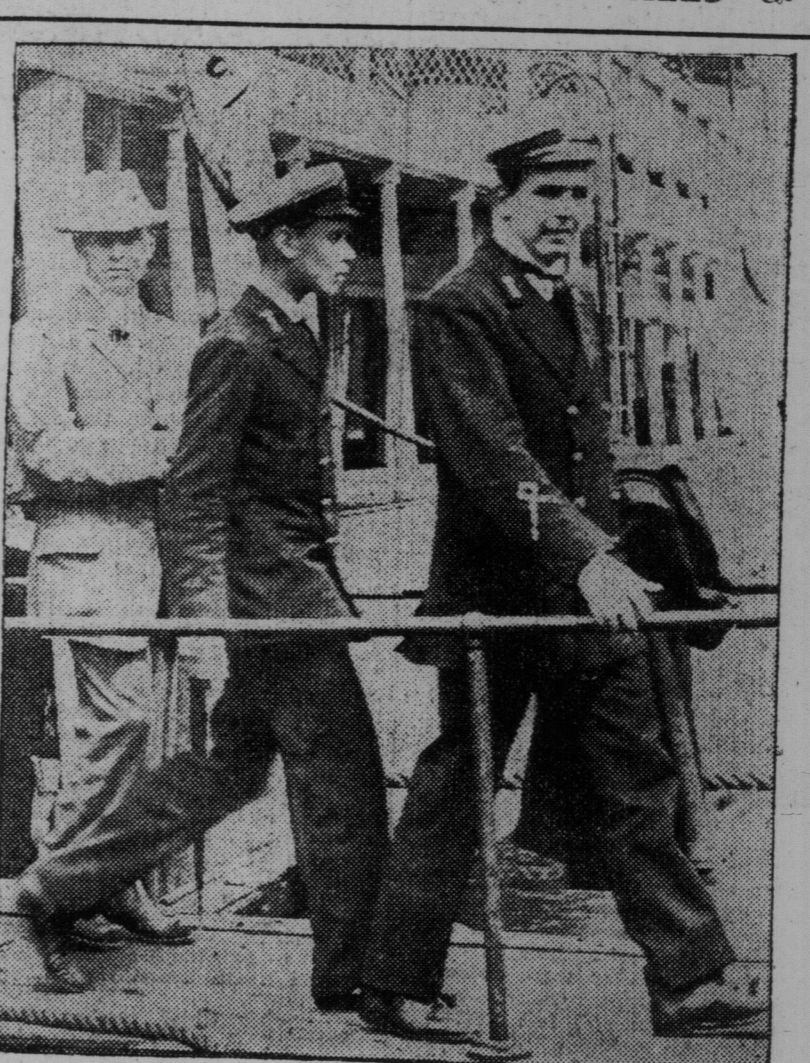

LONDON, June 6.—The "Pilgrims" banquet to welcome United States Ambassador Walter Hines Page, given tonight at the Savoy, was one of the largest, most distinguished and representative ever held under the auspices of that association. The ambassador sat between the veteran Earl Roberts, the club's president, and Foreign Secretary Sir Edward Grey, while the company included most of the past and present cabinet ministers, diplomats, authors, artists and captains of industry, both British and American.

Ambassador Page was most cordially received. He was welcomed in speeches by Earl Roberts and Sir Edward Grey, the latter of whom was the recipient of a great ovation when he was referred to by the other speakers as "The peacemaker of Europe."

STATE PRISONER GIVEN LIBERTY

Miller Evaded Camera Men and Was Whisked Away Quietly to Montreal.

OTTAWA, June 6.—(Can. Press.)—Richard C. Miller of Montreal, prisoner of the Canadian Parliament since Feb. 21 last, was released from the common jail of Carleton County at 5:45 p.m. today. Technically he was free at 4 o'clock, immediately on the prorogation of the parliament, but on being notified to remain in jail until the sun had gone down, so as to enable him to escape the battery of camera men which had been gathered in the vicinity for several hours previous to the hour set for concluding the business of parliament.

WOMAN ACCUSED OF POISONING HUSBAND

Mrs. Grace Beemer of Blenheim Township Is Taken to Woodstock Jail to Be Held For Trial—Inquest Showed Beemer Had Swallowed Strychnine.

WOODSTOCK, June 6.—(Special.)—Charged with the murder of her husband, Frederick E. Beemer, a highly respected farmer of Blenheim Township, by administering poison, Mrs. Grace Beemer was today placed under arrest by Inspector Return of Toronto and County Constable Markie and lodged in the county jail at Woodstock. Mrs. Beemer appeared before Magistrate Wall of this city, but as the crown was not ready to proceed a remand for one week was ordered.

The Beemer family is well-known thruout Blenheim Township and the affair has caused a sensation. Eight small children were left alone on the farm when the mother was taken to jail this morning, but they will be looked after by the Children's Aid Society. The farm on which the Beemers resided was very heavily mortgaged, it is said, and the family was not very well to do.

Strychnine Found. In their little home four miles east of the village of Drumbo, Mr. and Mrs. Beemer lived together until March 26, when Beemer, after an illness of three days, passed away under peculiar circumstances. Symptoms pointed to strychnine poisoning, and when the doctor in attendance refused to grant a burial certificate an analysis of the stomach was ordered. This revealed the fact that one grain of strychnine was contained therein.

Admitted Buying Poison. At an inquest which was held following Beemer's death it was stated that during her husband's illness, Mrs. Beemer had administered several doses of salts, and that after each dose Beemer became worse, the pains and convulsions increasing.

Mrs. Beemer admitted having purchased several grains of strychnine to kill rats and crows, but stated that during her husband's illness there had been none of that poison in the house. That Beemer did not commit suicide was indicated by the evidence of the doctors and others that through his illness he expressed a strong desire to recover.

HE KISSED A MULE BUT "NEVER AGAIN"

The Fine Was Thirty-Three Dollars and He Needs the Money.

Special to The Toronto World. FORT WORTH, Texas, June 6.—Because he kissed a mule, J. H. Kelley, a laborer, was fined \$33 by the city police court today. He was arrested by Patrolman Stanley, who explained to the court that he found Kelley on the street fondly caressing a big brunette mule, kissing it on the nose. The animal refused to reciprocate.

Kelley declared he was intoxicated and said he thought the animal was a young woman. He pleaded leniency, promising that he would never, never kiss a mule again; but the judge sternly imposed the highest fine the law allowed him.

HONOR MEMORY OF OLD CHIEFTAIN

Notable Speakers Pay Tribute to Services of Sir John A. Macdonald.

LARGE CROWD PRESENT

Scene in Queen's Park Was Pathetic, Imperial and Inspiring.

Like a huge outdoor school under the trees of Queen's Park a band of loyal-hearted Toronto citizens assembled yesterday afternoon to draw life-lessons from the career of Sir John A. Macdonald, the great Canadian patriot, who passed from the scene of his labors 22 years ago. Sunny skies welcomed the rally of Conservative forces and the commemorative services which followed were of an inspiring nature. Ranked on the platform were stalwarts of the Ontario Legislature and a mass of telegrams and letters witnessed the regret of representatives from all the provinces at their inability to be present. The approach and conclusion of federal sessional business had necessitated their presence at Ottawa. The addresses of the day, however, were hearty in spirit and welcomed with applause by a representative congregation. Dreadnoughts and banners, and in the rear, the stone monument of the former statesman, standing erect in flowers from all parts of the Dominion, constituted a scene in turn pathetic, imperialistic and cheering.

The management of the demonstration was under the control of the Centre and South Toronto Conservative Club. The Chief Speaker, Premier J. K. Plummer of New Brunswick was the chief speaker of the day and his Toronto reception was flattering. His purpose, he declared at the outset, was to "set forth the truths from the life of the man whose career was that of Canada for a quarter of a century."

"It was only a few years after the troublous times of '37 that Macdonald's name began to appear in public life," he began. "It was never dimmed in following days." From this he went on to show that the difficulties which surrounded his early political life only served to aid the plan of confederation. Out of the swirling troubles he had grasped the possibilities, and, dropping personal matters and political differences, he had thrown his whole soul into his project.

Cartier of Quebec, one of the greatest men of the country, had come in with his following and from all other provinces came the leaders to join in the great scheme.

The Liberal-Conservative party had been born in Sir John's ministry, when six Liberals and six Conservatives had joined in the leadership. The best of the Liberals and the best of the Conservatives he felt they were. "And in the moment of triumph Sir John, the leading figure, was generous enough to give part of the credit to Cartier," declared the speaker. "He was always generous and broad-minded, and his charity has repaid him in the memory of the people until this time."

The premier then undertook a brief review of the history of the time, describing the individual nature of all the provinces and the intensely provincial feeling which all maintained. Then he came to the completion of the scheme of the great leader with the construction of the railway to link up the provinces.

Public Service Repays. "But why should we come here if we do not learn anything," he asked. "We should learn that it pays for a man to become a public servant. He gave life and talents and everything, and that, too, in an age when materialism was threatening to engulf all minds."

Broadmindedness was another lesson to be carried away. Not to be narrow and sectional, but to be restricted in view, proved a great gateway which opened a career for Sir John. It was in a glimpse of genuine imperialism, however, that the grand old statesman had led the Dominion. The work he had done had followed directly in the wake of his vision of a greater British Empire. Turning on those men who predicted a schism between the east and west, he denounced them as most unworthy. It was the duty of all to bind all parts together, and to have all differences settled in a broad and generous spirit.

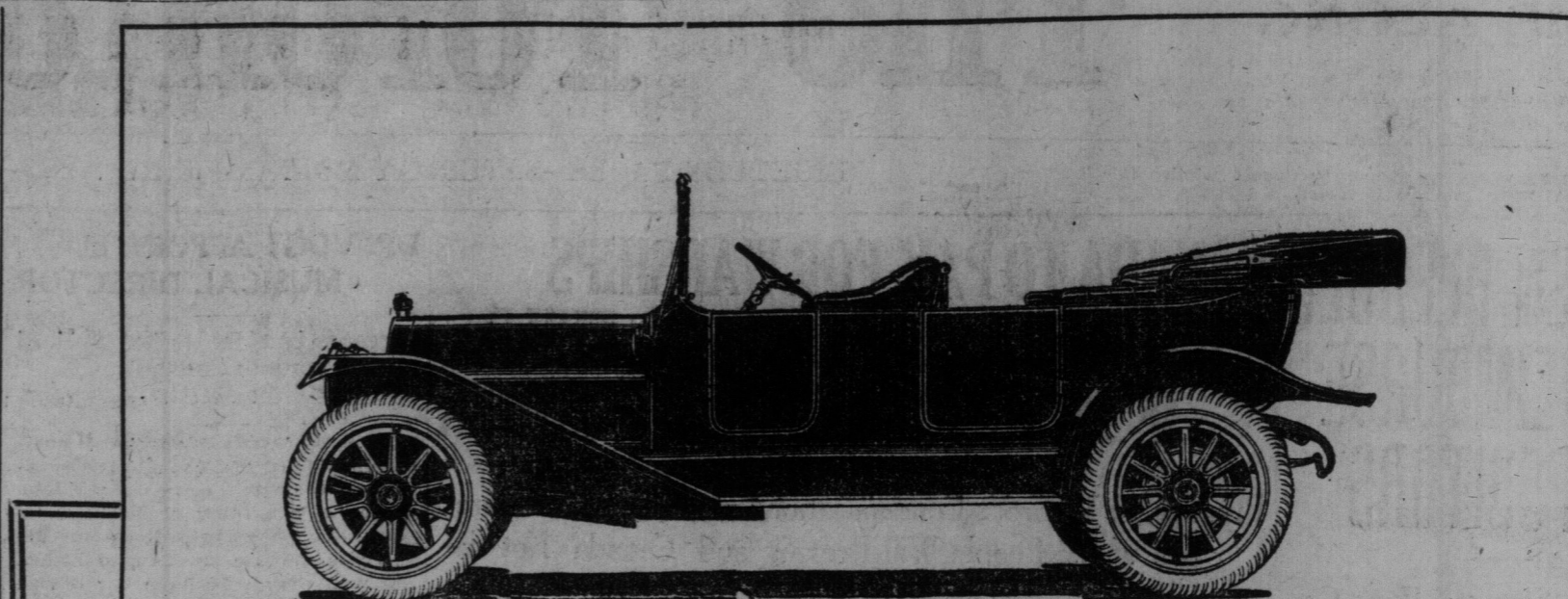
Two things there were, viz: Strength in the bonds of the Dominion and the imperial bond of empire. "I like to tear the frills off a thing. I am a plain man," he cried in denouncing the senate restriction of the naval policy. "In fit time we are paying a part of our own bills or more." His desire was to merge the might of all together, and to stand on a Nation Builder.

"Sir John was a nation builder, a great man," said Hon. Dr. Pyne. "We meet here with feelings of joy and sadness. Our sadness is because twenty-two years ago today he passed from this mortal sphere. But our feelings of joy are at the commemoration of the battle of Stony Creek, which was fought one hundred years ago."

Sir John, he stated, was the man who had united and welded all the parts of the Dominion into one. He had lived long enough to see the C. P. Railway leading east to west, over, he was the one who had hatched the national policy which had hatched so much for Canada. "Canada is to become a great nation," he declared. "But if we are to follow him it must be with the arms of the empire and beneath the Union Jack."

Sir James Whitney, who was suffering from hoarseness, spoke in brief. "I could not stay away from this gathering, I could not refrain from taking some part in perpetuating the holy memories of this man," he said. "The man whose whole aim was to establish British institutions on this continent. His aim, as he expressed it, was to make Canada one of those great auxiliary nations which buttress the empire about the world. And his works have followed him."

Regrets Senate's Action. Referring to the senate Sir James felt that all would feel sorry of that impression which would be carried

around the world following the recent action. "I notice that the first lord of the admiralty has stepped into the breach and ordered three dreadnoughts," he said. "These Canada asked for, wanted, would have sent and will send."

As a son of Canada Mayor Hocken wished to express a great pleasure at being able to add words of honor to the foundation-layer of Canada. He had caught a vision of Canada of today and tomorrow. His courage was unexampled and the projects he had pushed thru had wrought inestimable benefit. Above all he had taught Canadians to believe in themselves, and the seeds of this courageous belief were watered by campaign after campaign, until the Dominion stood today firm within the empire. No man in Canada today dared stand on a platform as in 1891 and say the things said then.

He remembered the time when apprentices were forced into the States by his national policy. It was fitting to periodically come together and rededicate themselves to the old doctrines.

Floral Remembrances. Cables of gratification from Baroness Macdonald and Sir Hugh John Macdonald of Winnipeg were read, as well as tributes and letters of regret from Premier Borden, his colleagues in the cabinet and every province of the Dominion. 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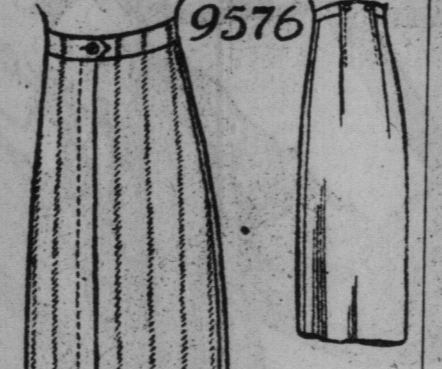

PRESERVING CANADA'S HONOR.
 In declining to admit the claim of the senate to control the parliamentary situation and to force a general election, Mr. Borden has assumed the only position consonant with the place of the house of commons in the constitution of a British state. The prime minister has commanded and still retains the confidence of a substantial majority of the elected representatives of the people and while that condition exists the government is amply justified in refusing submission to a senatorial majority nominated for party reasons and using its power for party purposes. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has evidently followed the lead of Mr. A. J. Balfour in practically declaring that in or out of office he will dictate the policy of the government and even force the dissolution of parliament. Mr. Borden can no more afford to yield this extravagant demand than could the Liberal leaders and party of the United Kingdom.
 Mr. Asquith overcame the arrogance of the hereditary house of lords by the menace of new peers in sufficient numbers to secure a Liberal majority. Mr. Borden does not need a club of this kind for in the natural course of events the day will soon come when the balance of power in the senate will be changed. Therefore he will remain at his post and hold his naval policy unchanged. Before the battleships, whose construction the Liberal Government of the United Kingdom will now accelerate in consequence of the unparliamentary action of the Dominion Senate are completed, the prime minister hopes to redeem the honor of the country by refunding their cost to the motherland.

"DEBORAH."
 Judge Morson has done the community a great service in vindicating the purpose of high-minded dramatists like Mr. Legrand Howland, and clearing the reputation of the ladies and gentlemen who presented his play of the stigma cast upon them by an ignorant and incompetent critic, like Mr. Coburn. Unfortunately, Mr. Morson and Col. Denison, who appeared to pride themselves upon knowing nothing of psychology or dramatic art, and without hearing any intelligent evidence, acted upon Mr. Coburn's diseased view, "Five of the city's six daily papers," to borrow The Telegram's pet phrase, apparently without having seen it, rushed into editorial depreciation of the play, and public opinion was entirely misled. No healthy-minded person seeing the play could sink from its lofty atmosphere into thoughts of impurity or immorality.

The World, from the first, recognized Mr. Howland's elevated purpose and its brilliant realization, and the weekly papers, Saturday Night and The Courier, also did this justice. The Globe and other papers said such plays should not be permitted, evidently not having seen "Deborah."
 "Deborah" is not a problem play in the ordinary sense at all. It has practically no suggestion of passion. Its great moral is the sanctity of maternity, and the lesson, almost untaught today in any public way, that the object of the sex relation is parentage within the marriage bond, and under the sanctions of society. The prevalence of such teaching would prevent such tragedies as that of the young man sent to prison by Judge Morgan yesterday. He is an example of the suppression which Mr. Coburn would enforce. The Star went so far as to say that "the theme of the play is the right of the woman to experience motherhood, regardless of morals." Just why such a misrepresentation of the play should have been made, it is difficult to conceive. The same paper declared that "nobody would care to discuss the story of the play in his home." It is such homes as The Star would evidently establish that furnish the victims, active and passive, of Judge Morgan's court.

It is to be regretted that the "Committee of Forty" does not proceed in a more intelligent manner. Plays and farces by the dozen appear in which mockery of the marriage relation and contempt of parentage are the leading motives, while the whole sex relation is turned into indecent jest. These plays are passed over by Mr. Coburn and his type, and a play at the other pole of the moral standards of conscience, like "Deborah," is fastened upon as immoral. No wonder men like Shaw and Chesterton think the world is topsy-turvy.
 Mr. Howland's play represents the awakening conscience of society on these questions and the higher ethical standard demanded by educated and pure-minded men and women. If the

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church had recognized the need, the stage would not have to preach these lessons, but as we have already suggested, the church should exhibit no jealousy of the toiler in the vineyard who does that which itself refuses to do.

CLEVELAND'S NEW CHARTER.
 On July 1, the electors of the City of Cleveland, Ohio, will vote on a proposed new charter, which in some ways is of a novel character. It provides for a council of 26 members, elected from wards for a term of two years, whose functions will be purely legislative, and have no concern with administration. Unusually large powers will be vested in the mayor, also elected for a term of two years, upon whom is conferred wide administrative powers, and who must accept direct responsibility for efficient city government. He will appoint the directors of departments, six in number, comprising those of fire, public safety, finance and public utilities. The administrative officials are carefully graded in power and responsibility, and are subject to civil service rules.

Politics are sought to be eliminated from civic affairs by the provision that there shall be no party primaries and that candidates will be nominated by petition only. Voting will be on the preferential system, by which the elector expresses his choice in order of preference, the object being to secure majority rather than minority rule. All elective officials are subjected to recall upon petition signed by 15,000 electors in case of officials selected at large, and 600 electors in case of officials elected from wards. The proposed charter also provides for the initiative on a petition signed by 6000 electors, and a further 5000 electors can compel submission to the people. Any ordinance must be submitted to popular vote if required by ten per cent. of the total vote at the previous municipal election.

In recommending the charter to the electors the commission that prepared it urge in its favor the following considerations: It establishes a simplified election system by which the fullest freedom is granted and guaranteed to the voter in the choice of candidate for public office. The elective officials are made responsive to public opinion and responsibility is definitely fixed. An adequate accounting system is created, the rights of the city in matters relating to franchises and utilities are carefully guarded and the right to regulate existing utilities is guaranteed. Through the merit system permanent and expert service is assured, while provision is also made for full publicity of official records and for the easy amendment of the charter. Mayor Baker strongly commends this, the first home rule charter in Ohio, to public support. It is the end of a 12 years' struggle for home rule, and the mayor claims, with a model not only to the cities of the state, but to other cities and other states that have not yet come to see that upright, efficient, city government can only come through home rule.

PEOPLE MUST DECIDE DREADNOUGHT ISSUE

London Times Says No Naval Policy Can Be Carried Out Otherwise.

LONDON, June 6.—(C.A.P.)—The Toronto correspondent of The Times says this morning: "Outside the ranks of the active partisans there will be a deep and angry feeling that the humiliation of Canada is now complete, and we have lowered our prestige through the whole empire by a discussion as to whether Winston Churchill's proposals are adequate under the changed conditions."
 The Times, for instance, regarding Canada, says: "Political controversy there should take its course free from any suggestion, however shadowy, of imperial influence or concern. The British Government has provided for the benefit of the Canadian people, and at the request of their elected representatives all information on matters of fact which is necessary to a clear understanding of the naval problem."
 "This much is now clear: That no naval policy, whether temporary or permanent, can be carried into effect without a reference to the electors. Whether or not the reference be made at once or in what form are matters outside the scope of inter-imperial discussion."

TORONTO MARKET IS MUCH FIRMER

C. P. R. and Brazilians Enjoy Generous Rallies, Which Had Effect.

GENERAL LIST STEADY

Advances Made in Many Stocks, But Rails Suffer Profit-Taking.

A much more cheerful feeling permeated the Toronto Stock Exchange yesterday. Early quotations for C. P. R. and Brazilians from the London market had much to do with this. There was again the same small investment demand as has appeared for three or four days and the two had considerable influence on doers who are anticipating trouble. New York and other operators who had worked for the decline in C.P.R. felt the strength of the past again and some hasty covering of shares rallied the shares to near 222. Considering that the price touched 213 3/4 earlier in the week the rally is of respectable proportions. Local buyers tried to scalp Brazilians all day on the short side, but ended up by being beaten nearly a point. The stock after selling early closed to 89 gradually appreciated until offerings were held at 90. The above two active issues pretty much indicated the movement in the rest of the market. Mackay common rose 2 points from Thursday's low and New York City was only obtainable at about an advance of a point.

Exceptions in the market betterment occurred in Toronto Rails and Steel Company of Canada. The former was subjected to profit-taking and a little bear pressure, while the steel stock was influenced by actual liquidation. There was a fair investment demand for the bank shares, with dealings in Imperial, Union, Commerce, Royal, Standard and Merchants.

Sentiment produced by the recent shake out has not entirely disappeared and it is considered that several days of at least steady work will be required to entirely restore confidence.

REAL DAMAGE TO WHEAT IN KANSAS

Sensational Reports Give Prices Sharp Upturn—July Shorts Alarmed.

CHICAGO, June 6.—Sensational crop damage from Kansas counties, heretofore believed safe from harm, gave wheat an upward whirl today. The close was firm at an advance of 5-8c to 1c net. Other leading staples all showed gains; corn 1-16c to 1-8c, oats 1-8c to 3-8c and provisions a shade to 2c.

Six hundred thousand acres of wheat in Salina, McPherson and Ellsworth counties, which have been credited with an average condition of 80 per cent, were declared by experts to have reached a condition of 50 per cent. The last named figures were said also to make wide allowance for possible benefit from future rains.

Because of hot winds, a huge share of the grain in the section named was asserted to be actually dead, and the situation in general far worse than had been supposed.
