Six years later this new party carried the country and has administered its government almost without interruption to this hour.

C. P. R. Montreal Train Wil Carry New Coach for First Time To-day-Vancouver Express Improved.

The first steel passenger day car to The first steel passenger day car to be operated by the Canadian Pacific Railway left Toronto as part of the 9 o'clock Montreal Express yesterday morning. It is an experiment on the part of this railway and was brought down from Montreal by a special engine in order that it could make its initial run from here. This is in order that it may finish the trip at Montreal, where on its arrival it will be inwhere on its arrival it will be spected.

The new car, which is the product of the C.P.R. Angus shops at Montreal, is constructed entirely of steel and is the first steel day coach yet seen in the Toronto Union Station. The steel car is fireproof and cannot be teleped in case of collision. It is elecc-lighted thruout.

A big improvement in the train equipment between here and the west was marked by the trip from Toronto last night of the Toronto-Vancouver Transcontinental Express, carrying the new Glen series electric-lighted observation buffet-library car. This car, which is finished with the highest grade mahogany and walnut inlaid. grade mahogany and walnut inlaid work, contains library room, for which the C.P.R. furnish a large number of books; drawing-room, containing 18 armchairs; smoking-room, containing eight chairs; a large private compartment and very wide observation platform, on which a number of special chairs are placed. This car is available to all passengers holding first-class tickets. The train goes right thru from Toronto to Vancouver without

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

Controller McCarthy of Toronto thought that the fact of fifty busy business men being on hand for the discussion pretty nearly settled the question as to whether there was to be a good road. 


