ALASKA BOUNDARY QUESTION.

United States papers on the Pacific Coast are once more handling the Alaska boundary question, pointing out an alleged disagreement between the Canadian and American surveyors and the possibility of friction before an agreement is reached. All this talk is mere guess work. A comparison of the two surveys show that at Forty-Mile Creek, Fort Cudahy, the largest settlement on the Yukon, the 141st meridian, the international boundary as run by the American surveyors only. Shows a difference of six feet from that defined by Mr. William Ogilvie, the well-known Canadian surveyor. 

These caretakers and Indian "punters" about the middle of September go through the various ponds, already thickly populated with ducks coming from the north, and build blinds, which from time to time they visit and renew up to the time the clubs commence shooting, Oct. 20. Thus the birds become thoroughly familiar with both blinds and the sight of men. Now comes the opening day and, with the ponds crowded with birds tame enough for domestic fowl, our so-called preservers sally forth to the slaughter. With the immense territory controlled, new ponds are taken the next day and so on, and fresh "batches of barnyards" are obtained each day for the sportsman.

Mr. Editor, if space permitted, I could give some interesting inside information as to the making of our game laws, but, having already trespassed too far on your valuable space, I will only call your attention to the most glaring injustice in the present laws, re prohibition of the shooting of plover in the spring. We are prohibited from shooting these birds from between Dec. 15 and Sept. 15. This date practically prohibits plover shooting (except golden plover) in Ontario.

I enclose you a statement from one of the oldest and best known shooters

I enclose you a statement from one of the oldest and best known shooters in Canada, and refer you to the best authorities in natural history for verification of the facts stated. I would like to ask our lawmakers, if the argument, that because geese do not return in any great numbers in the fall, they should be shot in the spring, is good, why the same rule should not govern the plover. The best protectors of ducks are the birds themselves. With open shooting grounds birds soon become wary, and become in every sense of the word "wild" and not at all like the domestic fowl found on the preserves, and I venture to say that three times as many ducks are killed each year on the Long Point reserve alone by its club members as are killed by all the shooters, market or otherwise, who have to do their shooting outside the sacred limits of the preserve.

I shall now give you my reason for thinking these birds should be shot in the spring of the year when going north. Curlew, unless killed at that time of the year, cannot be killed at any other season; also the Red-Breast, Red-Shank, Black-Heart, Yellow-Leg, in fact all species of plover that pass us. Now, what is the use of the Government protecting these birds to be killed in the States all winter long?

I have given you the real habits of these birds, having shot them for fifty years, and I have never known them to change their habits. I have enquired of a number of gentlemen, who had shot them for twenty-five or thirty years before I began to do so, and they all agree that there should be no law for the Sandpipers.

Now duck shooting commences Sept. 1, plover shooting not until Sept. 15, when all these species have gone south. except the Golden, Yellow-Leg and Black-Breast. (Signed),


