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THE STOCK RECEIPTS SHOW LARGE INCREASE

Conservative Estimate Places Value of Animals Delivered at Toronto Cattle Market During 1902 at Over Ten Million Dollars.

After consulting some of the leading cattle dealers as to the average value per head of the live stock delivered at the cattle market The World has taken as a fair estimate the following figures: Cattle, \$40 per head; sheep, \$4.50 per head; and calves, \$6.

At these figures, which are very conservative, the total value of live stock received at the Toronto Cattle Market during 1902 amounted to \$10,401,033 or \$1,327,711 more than the previous year.

Claims of Caron's Friends. Trainmen claim that this is exactly what Agent Caron would have done after No. 5 had gotten out of the way, had he had time.

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


SOME WHO ARE ASKING FOR YOUR VOTE AND INFLUENCE

Ald. John Dunn, who asks to be sent back to Council as a representative of Ward 5, has for a number of years served the city faithfully and well.

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


