

THE Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Ladies of the Protestant Orphan Asylum of the City of Montreal, was held in the house of the Institution, St. Catherine Street, on Thursday, the 15th January, instant, the Rev. Robert M'Gill, of St. Paul's Church, presiding,—when the following Annual Report was submitted, read, and adopted:—

#### Montreal Protestant Orphan Asylum.

Even as time, in the course of its silent but certain progress, has almost imperceptibly brought round the Thirtieth Anniversary of this Institution, so has the charity itself, gliding in humble usefulness through its career, attained that period of time when its Directresses are again called upon to lay before the Corporation and the public,

"The short and simple annals of the poor."

With one bright and cheering exception, the transactions of the past year have been unmarked by any unusual occurrence; and, under a kind Providence, its inmates have enjoyed many privileges, and a more than ordinary freedom from sickness.

This happy exception has already been made known to the public, but the Directresses deem it their bounden duty to record in their Annual Report, so bright an instance of gratitude as the case of Robert Finnie affords. If, on the one hand, the Ladies feel an honest pride in the consciousness of having discharged their duty to the subject of this notice, on the other hand, it is with unfeigned pleasure that they acknowledge that their care has been most amply rewarded.

The circumstances of this case, as so ably set forth by a gentleman of this city, and published in the public

journals, will doubtless be remembered by many, but for the benefit of those at a distance, who may feel an interest in this Institution, they are now repeated in a more condensed form. During the prevalence of the first cholera in 1832, the party referred to lost both his parents by that pestilence, and with many others, was received into the Asylum. The same care and attention which were bestowed on all were extended to him, and, at the usual period, when fit to be sent forth into the world, he was bound an apprentice to Mr. Wm. Gunn, of this city, from whose care and good example he not only acquired a knowledge of his trade, as a cooper, but doubtless those good principles which have ensured his subsequent prosperity. At the expiration of his apprenticeship, the wide world lay before him: his active mind led him to try his fortunes in the new El Dorado of California, and there, by the blessing of Providence, his success was ample. In the midst of this prosperity, a copy of the "Montreal Herald" was sent him by a friend, containing the first of the Ladies humble appeals in aid of their Endowment Fund. Nor was this appeal in vain to the heart of their former protege. Filled with that most beautiful and amiable feeling-gratitude, he immediately responded to it by the transmission through his kind friend and former master of a Bill of Exchange for £50, on a Mercantile House in New York, which was duly honored. Happy must he have felt to be able thus to repay the care taken of him in his state of helplessness, and gratefully have the Ladies recorded to his honor, in the Register of the Institution, this noble trait of gratitude. It is humbly hoped that others, on whom the sunshine of prosperity has also beamed —and there are several such from out this Institution—may be prompted to do likewise, di lo sanatamunio ad I

The constant demand on the Asylum for new apprentices, and the many favorable reports received of the spiritual and temporal welfare of those indentured, would lead the Ladies to infer, that their care in the bringing up, and instruction of their young charges, meets with approbation, thus affording them a fresh stimulus for continued exertion. Such, indeed, has been the demand for children, that the Directresses have been able, in late instances, to obtain from the parties recipient, a stipulation for the payment of good wages (according to circumstances) for the last two years of the child's apprenticeship, and this, over and above the twenty shillings per annum, deposited at interest in the Savings' Bank for the benefit of the child, to be paid at the expiration of the term of service.

After these preliminary remarks, the Directresses proceed to show the present state of the Institution, its wants and means.

The building is advancing towards completion. The balance of money subscribed for building purposes has been employed towards the adaptation of a part of the premises for the purposes of an Infirmary, now in progress of execution; so that in case of contagious diseases, there may be a perfect isolation between the sick and the healthy.

Both for the purpose of health and economy, outward sashes were made for the windows in the west front of the building (here the dormitories are situated); but the Ladies candidly confess, that, in incurring this expense, they have anticipated that some benevolent individual, or individuals, will be prompted by a kindly feeling to place at their disposal the small amount of their cost, and thus relieve the fund for ordinary expenses of a charge it can but ill afford.

The more immediate want, and that which is most sensibly felt at this period of the year, not only with a

view to comfort, but also of economy, is that of a proper heating apparatus, by which a very great saving in fuel would be effected.

The attainment of this important measure must be de-

pendent upon the future kindness of friends.

The state of the funds of the Society will be seen by the Treasurer's report. There, it will be found that, to complete the absolutely necessary repairs and additions, the Ladies have been obliged again to encroach on the fund for general purposes, to the amount of £38 18s. 8d., the Building Fund having been long since exhausted. It will also be seen that the amount received from annual subscriptions has not increased over the last year, and the amount of casual donations has greatly diminished.

Whilst on the subject of finances, the Directresses beg leave most earnestly to renew their appeal, not only to the benevolent in general, but particularly to the members of the Corporation, on the subject of the two most important sources of revenue—the Annual Subscriptions and Endowment. Members of the Institution are entreated to make known and urge the claims of the Orphan upon all who can afford, not only the sum which creates membership, but also upon all who can give any small amount annually. The young members of families, and children in particular will deem it a privilege to be permitted to contribute to a Charity expressly for children if properly invoked-thus early creating an interest in their young minds, which will naturally lead them, when their parents and friends, the present patrons, shall have passed away, to assume their places in the management and support of this useful Institution, whose wants they have thus relieved. band and over-

The usual average number of children have partaken of the benefits of the Asylum, of whom eight have been advantageously placed, two restored to relations in England, and only one death has occurred. Among those thus provided for, it is a subject of great pleasure to record that three girls have been adopted into worthy and respectable families; thus, by Divine Providence, these little ones have been placed in far more favorable circumstances than, in all human probability, they would have been, had their natural parents been spared to them. denob asoliw shorid
