Continuing, the C. P. R. man referred to the letter sent by Wm. Thomson and Co., to the common council which states that fourteen sailings of that line will take place a month. "This must mean four sailings", said the C. P. R. man.

"The letter is misleading because borth accommodation has been furnished for the Furness and Head line, at the C. P. R. wharf, and if the South African cannot find a berth there they will be found a berth on this side, where the C. P. R. will deliver the freight without any cost to the steamship company or their agents. That only leaves the Manchester line at No. 1 berth, with a sailing of once every ten days, which would mean reserving No. 1 berth for


