



The Supreme Council was called from labor at 1.30 o'clock p. m. The Supreme Council, after recess, resumed labor in the Fourteenth Degree, at 2.30 o'clock p. m., and a number of brethren were admitted.

The Sov.: Gr.: Commander then delivered his Annual Address as follows:

#### PEERS AND BROTHERS :---

As we meet in Annual Session to discharge our duties and to interchange fraternal greetings with each other, we can rejoice over the fact that our membership in this Supreme Council is unbroken, and that we have not to mourn through death the absence of any familiar face. Whatever disadvantage we have in the smallness of our numbers, we gain from our limitations the advantage of being brought closely together, and of being, as I am sure we are, very dear to each other. Some of our sister Supreme Councils, with whom we are on most intimate terms, are not so fortunate as we are. A touching letter from the Supreme Council for Ireland announces the death of Ill. . Bro. . EDWARD HORNSBY, one of the most active of the nine members composing that body. The Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States lost in the year one of its active members, Ill. . Bro. . JOSEPH D. EVANS, of New York, long its Grand Minister of State, a man of much intellectual power; WILLIAM SEWELL GARDNER, distinguished as a jurist in Massachusetts, active as a Mason, a Past Grand Master of his Grand Lodge, and Past Grand Master of the Grand Encampment K. T. of the United States, and Ill. . Bro. . JOHN WOOLVERTON, of New Jersey, besides two oi its Emeriti and several of its Honorary members.

Invitations were courteously sent to me, and, no doubt to other members of the Supreme Council, to attend the Annual Session of the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction, U. S. A., held in September of this year at Boston, and the Biennial Session of the Supreme Council for the Southern Jurisdiction, held in Washington, commencing on the 15th instant. I regret that it was impossible to take advantage of either invitation, and to shew respect, by attendance, to the distinguished Masons who control the Rite in the United States. My hope is that we may be able to greet some of them at this Session, to assure them that we rejoice at their prosperity, and at the knowledge we have of the success which is crowning their efforts to sustain the henors and uphold the interests of the legitimate Scottish Freemasonry.

Our relations with all the Supreme Councils with which we are in corres pondence are of the most agreeable kind. I have asked the Supreme Council for Italy to appoint near us a representative, as we have one with them. I have also intimated to the Supreme Council for Brazil that I would be glad to appoint a Representative at their Grand East, as they have at ours.

Early in the calendar year, the Grand Secretary-General, at my request, issued a circular to our members throughout the Dominion, directing their atten-

tion to the re union or conference of Rose Croix Masons, to be held at Brussels, on 29th March last, offering specially to accredit any of that degree who might be able to attend, and asking any one who might be so disposed, whether able to attend or not, to contribute a paper to the topics to be discussed. Unfortunately no one of our members was in a position to be present at Brussels. I have not heard whether any papers were sent in from Canada, beyond a brief one forwarded by myself, on the question of the uniformity of the Rose Croix Ritual, the fate of which I never ascertained. The Conference was, I believe, held, but no report of its transactions are yet at hand.

The Supreme Council for San Domingo, celebrated, in February last, with great rejoicing, the fiftieth anniversary of the initiation into Freemasonry of Ill... Brother JACINTO DE CASTRO, the Sovereign Grand Commander. The eminent services to the fraternity within that jurisdiction of this illustrious brother during his long career, the good judgment, the wise conservatism, the devotion to Masonic principle which he has displayed, would justify us in marking this event in his life by some special recognition. It would be a graceful act to place him upon the roll of our honorary members.

At the request of Ill. . Bro . ALBERT PIKE, of the Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction, U. S. A., a circular was sent to all of our bodies, warning them against fellowship with a number of brethren who had abandoned their obedience to that Supreme Council and foresworn their allegiance. This was the more necessary as many, if not all of these, were in possession of diplomas or patents signed by the illustrious brother himself. It is well to emphasise the fact that our Supreme Council has no sympathy with rebellion against constituted authority. Calm discussion, moderation in agitation, the exercise of judgment, will ever, among men who speak the English tongue, secure the redress of any real grievance, and rapidly dispel the illusion of an imaginary one, Rebellion in Freemasonry suggests a bad cause-an effort to secure by force that which sound reasoning will not justify. In some instances apparently the great success of the two legitimate Supreme Councils in the United States has excited the enmity of a few men and the dishonorable ambition of others. A small thing will arouse the worst feelings of persons so influenced. Both of our sister Supreme Councils are too secure in the general confidence of their subordinates, and in the affection of the legitimate governing bodies of the Rite everywhere, to make necessary further action by them than the withdrawal of their protection from those who endeavor to prejudice their authority.

The year which has elapsed since we last met has been a prosperous one for our Rite in Canada. I would be justified in the statement that it has been a very prosperous one. I will not anticipate the reports of the Provincial Deputies turther than to say that if we have not made substantial advances in all of the Provinces, we have in most of them. Our subordinate bodies have increased in number; there is a fair addition to our membership, and the Secretary-General advises me that we shall have a fair increase in our funds, notwithstanding an unusually heavy drain upon them Above all, so far as I am aware, the best of feeling prevails through the entire jurisdiction. As usual, the Province of

Ontario leads actually and relatively, that Province having, in the well-equipped, harmonious and effective bodies in Hamilton, organizations which are models of themselves, and whose influence is felt throughout the whole Province.

The report of the Illustrious Treasurer-General will shew that a portion of

the balance of funds in his hands has been permanently invested.

Dispensations have been issued during the year to a Lodge of Perfection at Barrie and to one at Windsor. Doubtless these dispensations will be returned at this annual session, with a request from each body for a warrant. Both Lodges, I understand, have organized under very favorable circumstances, and are in the

hands of enthusiastic and capable members.

As a result of conversation and discussion in the Supreme Council last year, and of conference with brethren of the Rite in this city after the close of the

session, the bodies here resumed labor, and I am hopeful that a new era has

In March last, I was able to visit Hamilton and to partake on Maunday Thursday of the mystic banquet with the members of Hamilton Chapter of Rose Croix, a large number of whom were present. In that thriving city I spent a most delightful day in intercourse with the brethren, and saw in the prosperity of the Rite there, a condition of things that gave me much satisfaction. Besides the resident members of this Supreme Council, I was fortunate enough to have with me the Illustrious Treasurer-General, who was on a brief visit to his old

On the day following, with quite a number of brethren from Hamilton, including the Lieutenant Grand Commander and the Ill. . Secretary-General, a visit was paid to the Kingston Lodge of Perfection at Kingston. Nothing could exceed the cordiality of our reception, the genuine warmth of feeling displayed towards us all by the members of the Rite whom we there met. An official visit was made to the Lodge, and although we saw no work, we had the pleasure of meeting a large number of earnest and intelligent brothers, and we saw a Lodge well provided with all the requirements for the effective conferring of the degrees. I am sure that I only express the natural sentiments of all who accompanied me when I say that ir our reception, in our subsequent hospitable entertainment, in the kindly display of fraternal feeling, in the splendid body of men composing our Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix, we saw ample grounds on which to base the belief that the Rite at Kingston is well placed. Possibly it is in the nature of things in that historic city, that there will not be rapid growth, but the conditions appear to be favorable to moderate prosperity

Applications have been made during the year, and-when strong representation has followed-I have given authority to residents of Canada to go out of the country to take degrees of the Rite. I have, however, done this with considerable feeling of hesitancy. I am not sure what power the Sovereign Grand Commander possesses or the Supreme Council claims in a matter of this kind. I am not satisfied that he has authority to exercise at all. Personally, I do not look

with favor on Masons who live in Canada going outside of the country to take degrees which can be secured without doing this; and I am embarrassed at the idea of a brother holding allegiance to one Supreme Council in the degrees to the 18°, and to another in those to the 32°. If the Sovereign Grand Commander, acting for the Supreme Council, has the right to permit a brother to go outside the jurisdiction of the Supreme Council to receive degrees, does the waiver of jurisdiction over the candidate confer upon a subordinate body holding from another Supreme Council the right to give him the degrees, without the authority of the superior. Years ago a man could seek admission into the fraternity and advancement where he pleased. The natural right to do this yet exists, but it is modified in the case of the Craft Grand Lodges in the United States and Canada, by a well known rule. As respects our Rite, the old and more liberal principles might be allowed to prevail, but our Supreme Council by its statutes has declared otherwise, and in view of the continued attacks made upon the authority of the Supreme Councils, it would seem better that each should confine itself to a membership actually resident, as nearly as possible, within its jurisdiction. No doubt a full understanding between all of the Supreme Councils upon some general system applicable to this principle would be a desirable thing. The Supreme Council for England appears to act upon the idea that it has the right to give its degrees to anybody. The Sovereign Grand Commander of the Supreme Council, Southern Jurisdiction, has enunciated his belief that the individual has the right to go where he pleases to take the degrees of this Rite, but the Supreme Council has not found it advisable to sustain this broadly stated theory. Even Bro. . PIKE himself modified his theory so far as to apply a principle of what in the language of the day is called "retaliation," when the Supreme Council for England acted upon his view in regard to persons living within his jurisdiction. I quote his circular, as it contains an idea which it may be well to place upon our records :--

#### OR. OF WASHINGTON, DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, THE IST DAY OF MAY, 1888, C. E.

## THE SUPREME COUNCIL, BY THE GRAND COMMANDER :

#### To the Inspectors-General, its Active Members, and to its Deputies and the various Bodies of its Obedience :

The Supreme Council of England and Wales and the Dependencies of the British Crown having lately asserted and exercised its power and right to confer, and to authorize its Chapters to conter the Degrees of the Anc. and Acc. Societish Rite upon native-born citizens of the United States domiciled within our jurisdiction, you are hereby advised that there is, as between that Supreme Council and ours, no rule of international law, and no rule of comity, to prevent your conferring our Degrees upon subjects of the British Crown, who may be temporarily within our jurisdiction, if they be English by birth or blood, and resident in England or in any of the British Colonies or Provinces, except British America ; but that you are not at liberty to confer any of the same upon Masons of Scottish or Irish birth or descent, subjects of the British Crown, and resident in Scotland or Ireland, or of any birth or descent if resident within the jurisdiction of the Sup.'. Council of Canada ; between which and those of Scotland and Ireland and our Supreme Council, the rule of comity which forbids it is recognized.

Any brother, bearing a Brief or Patent of the Supreme Council of England and Wales, will be recognized by you and received as a visitor in accordance therewith, and his Brief or Patent will be *vised* by any one of our Inspectors-

Given at the Or. . of Washington, under the hand of the Grand Commander, and the petty Seal of the Supreme Council hereunto affixed, and these presents countersigned by the Secretary-General, the day and Seal aforesaid.

Perhaps you may wisely conclude that beyond this statement nothing is at present needed.

The Supreme Council acted with wisdom last year in deciding to give the Sovereign Grand Commander power to place the Province of British Columbia in charge of an active member of the Supreme Council, and to abolish the local Deputyship, in view of its limited powers. The Secretary-General, to whom I entrusted the Province, has taken a great deal of trouble to procure information as to the state of the Rite in that Province. Our duty will be, in view of what has been ascertained, to satisfy the just aspiration of the brethren of that Province, consistent with our duty to the Craft generally. They must rely upon us that this is our desire. Brethren who have, in the past, filled up their measure of duty, should have their work and their merit recognized; looking to the future, we must build upon sure foundations, and secure assistance from willing hands. As soon, then, as we can-and that will depend upon the brethren themselves-we should give one brother or more the highest grade and a seat in this Supreme Council. But greater activity in the Lodge and Chapter at Victoria would make it more easy to bring this about. I hope that before the next year has passed away some active member of our Supreme Council will be able to visit that Province, and assure the brethren personally, as I do now from this position, that our sincere desire is to fulfil all their reasonable requirements.

The constitution, as revised at our last annual session, has been printed, under the supervision of our Secretary-General, and is issued in a style creditable to the Supreme Council.

While endeavoring to discharge as effectively as possible the duties which came to me to do, I have been quite unable to give to the work of the Rite as much attention as I would like to give it. I am fully conscious of my deficiencies, but can justly plead that little, if any, ot my time is wittingly spent in

Our particular duties at this annual session may not prove to be very onorous, although we have some important work before us. What we have to do will be,

I am confident, done with zeal for the interests in our care, with fidelity, and in that spirit of harmony and true brotherhood which has made our meetings so pleasant to anticipate and so delightful to remember.

The Supreme Council was then closed in the Degree of Perfection, and labor resumed in the Thirty-third Degree.

On motion of Ill.: Bro.: DANIEL SPRY, the address of the Sov.: Gr.: Commander was referred to a special committee.

The Sov.: Gr.: Commander appointed the following brethren as the committee: Ill.: Bros.: DANIEL SPRY, ISAAC H. STEARNS and DAVID MCLELLAN.

The Special Committee on the Revision of the Ritual reported as follows:

MONTREAL, October 24th, 1888.

To the Supreme Council, 33°, A.:. & A.:. S.:. Rite of Freemasonry, for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :---

1888.]

Your special committee, appointed to examine into the Ritual used by this Supreme Council, and if necessary, revise the same, have to report as follows :

That from the fact that some members of the committee live long distances apart, it has been impossible to get them all together. That the members of the committee residing in Hamilton have had the question before them, and have given all the time they could well spare to this important subject.

They report that they have very carefully examined the Ritual which obtains here, and compared the same with those of other jurisdictions, and while they cannot recommend any radical changes, as they are thoroughly convinced that, as a whole, their own is superior to others, yet they have made some emendations of parts which appear to them objectionable, and are prepared to recommend some additions taken from the work of  $N_{\cdot}$ . J.., U. S, which they think of decided worth, and are ready now to exemplify them before the Supreme Council.

Your committee have only dealt with the Degrees of Perfection, Council of P. . of J  $\cdot$ , and Chapter of Rose Croix, leaving the remainder, those about which there seems to be more difference of opinion, viz., from 19° to 32° inclusive, to be revised further on, and for which purpose ask the Supreme Council to grant them another year to enable them fully to complete their duties.

#### NEW BODIES.

Shortly after the last session of the Supreme Council I received a petition from several leading Masons of Barrie praying for a dispensation to open a Lodge of Perfection, which I had pleasure in forwarding to the Sovereign Grand Commander, with my recommendation that the request be granted.

The memorialists included the Hon. Senator Gowan and other gentlemen of high standing in the town, and of considerable influence in public life and Masonic circles. The Sovereign Grand Commander issued his dispensation authorizing the formation of the Lodge, and on Nov. 17th, 1887, Illustrious Brothers JOHN W. MURTON, 33°, Lt. . Grand Commander, HUGH MURRAY, 33°, Sec'y-Gen'l, HUGH A. MACKAY, 33°, Treas. -Gen'l, WILLIAM REID, 33°, G.: M. . of Cer. ., DAVID MCLELLAN, 33°, and a large number of Hamilton brethren visited Barrie-the N. & N. W. R'y having placed car No. 33 at their disposaland opened a Lodge of Perfection, and conferred the degrees from 4th to the 14th upon the necessary number of candidates. The prospects of the Rite in Barrie are very good, and a fair increase in membership may be expected during the coming year, but as the Masons of the northern part of the Province do not, as a rule, take much interest beyond the M : M : Lodge, it cannot be expected that a large number will avail themselves of the advantage of the Scottish Rite. As I am a member of the Lodge, I have been present at most of the meetings.

#### WINDSOR.

I visited Windsor last October and consulted several of the most active Masons regarding the introduction of the Rite into that town. They entered heartily into the proposal, and shortly afterwards I received a petition from Bro.<sup>4</sup>. GEO. D. #### SUPREME COUNCIL.

The situation of Windsor as a frontier town, immediately opposite Detroit, Mich., is a peculiarly appropriate place for the establishment of the Rite. Those who become members in Windsor will have the advantage of associating themselves with the Detroit brethren, and may frequently witness the exemplification of the Ritual. I visited Palestine Lodge of Perfection on the 25th of July last, and was much pleased to learn of the excellent prospects of the Rite. There were no candidates to receive degrees on the occasion of my visit, but the Lodge was opened in a correct manner by Ill.'. Bro.'. GEO. D. ADAMS,  $32^{\circ}$ , T.'. P.'. G.'. M.'., and his efficient officers. The Lodge has had 15 meetings this year. The brethren of Windsor are desirous of having a Rose Croix Chapter, and as I consider it would be in the interest of Scottish Rite Masonry in the western part of this Province, I respectfully recommend that a Warrant be issued without delay.

#### LONDON.

Not much progress has been made during the past year in London. The brethren have not yet seen that it would be to the interest of the Rite in that city to separate the Lodge of Perfection from the Rose Croix Chapter, and to have separate Warrants and a different set of officers for each. This is to be regretted, as the brethren in all other portions of our jurisdiction have conformed to the recommendation of the Supreme Council Statutes. While there should be no coercion used, I earnestly hope the brethren in London will soon find it is to their advantage to conform with the wishes of the Supreme Council, and to separate the Lodge of Perfection from the Rose Croix Chapter, as I am satisfied that by so doing they will add greatly to the interest and progress of the Rite in the Forest City.

#### GUELPH.

Royal City Lodge of Perfection has held 12 meetings and admitted 7 members. This is most gratifying, and affords ample evidence of the earnestness of the members of the Lodge. The prospects of the Rite in Guelph, I am assured, are excellent, and there are no obstacles in the way which are likely to retard its progress.

#### HAMILTON.

The Consistory has made great progress as usual, and has added 19 members to its roll of membership. The Rose Croix Chapter and Lodge of Perfection have also done considerable work under the guidance of able and efficient officers. The eighth Annual Re-union of the Rite was held in Hamilton last January, and there was a large attendance of active and prominent members of the Rite from various parts of Canada and the United States. I deeply regret that owing to ill health I was unable to be present.

On the 16th October I visited Murton Lodge of Perfection, accompanied by Ill.. Brothers D. F. MACWATT, 32°, S. J. SANFORD, 32°, and Bro.. J. McL. STEVENSON, 14°, of Barrie, and had much pleasure in witnessing the conferring of

several degrees. I cannot speak in terms sufficiently commendable of the work of the brethren of Hamilton on that occasion, and it would be invidious to name any of the officers when all did so well. Ill . Bros. J. W. MURTON, 33°, HUGH MURRAY, 33°, WM. REID, 33°, DAVID MCLELLAN, 33°, and J. M. GIBSON, 33°, of Hamilton, and Ill . Bros. . T. F. BLACKWOOD, 32°, E. T. MALONE 32°, and several brethren from Toronto were in attendance. The brethren of the Rite in Hamilton maintain the proud position of being the most energetic and active promoters of Scottish Rite Masonry in our jurisdiction.

#### TORONTO.

The Rose Croix Chapter in Toronto has had four meetings during the year. Its membership is two less than at the former report. Ill. Bro. E. T. MALONE, 32°, the present M. . W. . Sovereign, informs me that the delay in changing the place of meeting, and in securing suitable quarters, has prevented the admission of several candidates. The Lodge of Perfection has added three to its roll of members. We should have a larger membership in Toronto than we have, and I trust soon to hear of more activity in the Rite in that city.

#### KINGSTON.

The Rose of Sharon Rose Croix Chapter has conferred the degrees upon two candidates, and the Lodge of Perfection has held 12 meetings and admitted two members. The prospects of the Rite in the Limestone City are very fair, but the brethren labor under the disadvantage of not having seen the degrees conferred elsewhere, and they experience some difficulty in clearly understanding the

#### DISPENSATIONS.

I have granted several dispensations to permit degrees to be conterred within shorter periods than is permitted by the Statutes, and the fees have been paid to the Secretary-General.

#### CONCLUSION.

I deeply regret my inability to visit all the Lodges and Bodies under my supervision, owing to the want of time, but as it is absolutely necessary that I should promptly attend to the duties of the office which I hold under the Government, I have little time to devote to other purposes. The interests of the Rite have received as much of my attention as I could conveniently spare, and I am gratified to be able to report that, in the Province of Ontario, Scottish Rite Masonry is making steady progress among the intelligent and educated Masons.

#### BRITISH COLUMBIA.

#### HAMILTON, ONT., 22nd October, 1888.

To the Sovereign Grand Commander of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry for the Dominion of Canada.

Having been appointed Special Deputy for the Province of British Columbia, and finding that the Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix, situated in Victoria, were in a dormant condition, I addressed letters to Ill.. Bro.'. ELI HARRISON, Sr., 32°, who has been Special deputy of that Province since its introduction by Ill.'. Bro.'. PIKE, and to Sov.'. Pr.'. ANDREW SARGISON, 18°, who has for many years been Secretary of the Lodge of Perfection and Registrar of the Chapter. In these letters I conveyed to these brethren the assurance that the

ĥ

appointment had been made solely in what was conceived to be the interests of the Rite in that Province, and requesting suggestions as to what in their opinion, could be done by me to revive interest in the Rite.

I received replies from these brethren, the contents of which I communicated to the Grand Commander. I also received information from other sources, and may, in general terms, report that the principle cause of the dormancy of the bodies there, is the trouble in craft Masony which occurred in that Province some years ago, when many prominent members of Grand Lodge and members of this Rite were suspended from Masonry by the Grand Master. Since that time it has seemed to be impossible to completely allay the bitter feelings then brought into existence, and it has been found, even after Bro. SARGISON has done everything that could be reasonably expected from a Secretary, and much more than he should have been expected to do, in the way of urging attention to the summonses, impossible to gather the brethren together for any purpose whatever in connection with the Rite.

A remark written upon the blank returns by Bro.<sup>\*</sup>. Sargison seems to cast blame upon the Supreme Council, attributing the condition of affairs there to the action of the Council last year. I cannot consent that the blame should be placed there. The cause, and the result, existed long before that time, and were the occasion of the recommendation of the Grand Commander that the affairs of the Rite be no longer placed in the care of a Special Deputy,  $32^{\circ}$ , but placed in charge of the Secretary-General.

I have promised the brethren in Victoria that within a year the Grand Commander will make an effort to visit that Province, and endeavour to place the Rite on a better footing. I would recommend that, at this session of the Sup.  $\therefore$ Council, one or more nominations for the 33° for the Province of British Columbia be made in blank, so that a year from now, after the return of the Grand Commander from that Province, we may be in a position to take such action as may be recommended by him, and approved by the Supreme Council.

It is most gratifying to be made officially acquainted with the facts, for which, however, we were not unprepared, that our body is making steady and thoroughly healthy progress, and that our finances are, in spite of the unusually heavy drain upon them, in a most flourishing state, a substantial proof of which is to be found in the permanent investment of a considerable portion of our funds With this matter, however, the Audit and Finance Committee will doubtless deal more par icularly. The "Universality of the Science" of Masonry being, perhaps, its most salient and important feature we can unfeignedly rejoice that the deliberations at the last annual session of the Supreme Council and the subsquent consultations have apparently opened the way for a settlement of the difficulties hitherto existing in the province of Quebec to the great injury of the A.\*. & A.\*. S. Rite, and we trust soon to learn of the rapid progress of our bodies in that part of the jurisdiction.

The brethren in Hamilton and Kingston did themselves honor in honoring our  $S \cdot G \cdot Com \cdot$ , on the occasion of his official visit to those cities; and should he find it convenient at any time in the future to visit the west, or, indeed, any portion of the jurisdiction, he may feel assured of a reception as warm, as spontanious and as enthusiastic as he has yet met, and in some slight degree indicative of his distinguished merit and of the high personal esteem in which he is universally held

Your committee recommend approval of the action of the G  $\cdot$  S  $\cdot$  Com  $\cdot$  in granting his dispensation authorizing brethren residing in Canada to receive degrees outside of our jurisdiction, as we feel assured that he would not have granted this great favor unless fully satisfied that such action would be advantageous to the Rite generally, and we have no doubt whatever that he is fully empowered to exercise his prerogative in that direction whenever he considers it necessary to do so. And, while we recommend concurrence in the views expressed by the S  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  Com  $\cdot$  as to the dangers that may arise from infringing upon the jurisdiction of other Supreme Bodies, we are aware that it has been customary for Masonic Bodies to confer degrees upon candidates from without their own territory at the request of the body having jurisdiction over such material The question raised by the S  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  Com  $\cdot$  is one that will admit of considerable discussion and, it may be possible, that the body conferring degrees should have the authority of the S  $\cdot$  G  $\cdot$  Com  $\cdot$  of their jurisdiction as well as

the consent or request of the S. G. Com. of the jurisdiction of which the candidate is a resident. We are firmly of the opinion that each Supreme Council should maintain undoubted and unquestionable right to all material within its jurisdiction. To surrender such a right or to quietly acquiese in such a dangerous doctrine as that other Supreme Councils can confer the A. & A. S. Rite degrees on persons domiciled in Canada would be to yield up a portion of the independence and undoubted sovereignty of the Supreme Council.

We are sure the Supreme Council heartily appreciates the courtesies extended to the G. S. Com. by the A. & A. S. Rite Bodies of the United States. Although he was unable to accept them they are none the less highly esteemed, and should opportunity offer by the presence of any of their officers or members at any of our annual sessions we will most cordially welcome them. We recommend approval of the S. G. Commander's course with reference to the proposed appointment of representatives by the Supreme Councils of Italy and Brazil. His suggestion, if acted upon, must be productive of undoubted benefit. Your committee recommend that all appointments of representatives from or to this Supreme Council shall be for a term of three years or until our next tri-ennial session, as it is highly desirable in the interest of the Rite that such appointments be revived from time to time. Should the conference at Brussels, Belgium, bring about a greater uniformity in ritual it will be a cause for sincere congratulation.

It affords us much pleasure to learn of the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the initation into Masonry of SENOR JACINTO DE CASTRA, S.:, G.:, Com.:, of San Domingo, and we join the S.: G . Com .: in the congratulations now being showered upon so distinguished a Mason. So warm a Masonic heart, so keen and trained an intellect, so perfect a devotion to true Masonic principles, merits the warmest approbation and holds up to us an example worthy of the closest imitation, and we heartily recommend that this distinguished and illustrious brother be elected an honorary member of this Supreme Council. But where so much is bright and encouraging we must look for some drawback. Amid so much sunshine and happiness a storm cloud must occasionally lower, and we join with the S . G . Com . in regretting that Ill . Bro. ALBERT PIKE, G. . S. . Com. . of the southern jurisdiction of the United States has been com pelled to issue a circular letter announcing that some brethren have been so lost to a sense of their Masonic duty as to prove recreant to their strongest obligations, and that for temporary advantages they have been content to barter Masonic truth and fealty. Loyalty to law and order, unswerving and unalterable loyalty to properly constituted authority is the mainspring of Masonic conduct and action, and we condemn in unmeasured terms those who





To the Inspector-General of the Thirty-Third Degree for Ireland and the several members of all other Masonic Bodies of the jurisdiction,

### VERY DEAR BROTHER,-

I have again to fulfil the painful duty of my office by notifying to you the death of a member of our Council. It has pleased the Almighty to call from this life the spirit of our esteemed brother, EDWARD C. F. HORNSBV, who died on the first of February, instant. On the previous day he had been apparently in the full possession of his usual good health and spirits

On such an occasion we should be silent. Who are we that we should speak? Let us rather bow in submission to the will of our Creator, and strive to throw ourselves more confidently on His inexpressible love and mercy, which never fail, although we cannot always distinguish them in the sorrow, darkness and ignorance of life Let us "watch and pray," for we know not the hour. It is a command often forced upon our attention, and, alas ! too often disregarded.

Our late brother had been employed in an important function as Secretary of the Board of Works. As such he was well known over all this kingdom, and respected as an intelligent and efficient public officer. After many years service he had retired to enjoy in private life the well earned honours of his public career. It seemed that of all men he was most likely to enjoy them long.

He was known amongst the Masonic Brotherhood as a zealous Mason, but chiefly as the active and indefatigable Secretary of the Original Red Cross Chapter It is not likely that any member of that Chapter can forget its obligation to the kind-hearted and genial gentleman who guided it so long and so well He was also a diligent and efficient member of our Supreme Council.

For myself. I lament his loss, not merely as a member of the Council, but as a valued friend. In the evening of life we cannot easily replace the companions of former years, who drop away so rapidly as time advances.

He has gone,—but he lived honoured and respected, and has died without previous suffering or decay. According to Thy mercy think Thou upon us, O Lord


