ARRIVAL OF THE "BATTLE."

New York April 5th-10 o'clock, a.m.—The steamer "Battle" arrived last evening with four days later news. Cotton has declined. Sales from Saturday to Tuesday were 17,000 bales, of which 4,500 were sold on Tuesday. Grain market dull. Corn declined 6d. Wheat, 2d. Flour was offered at 1s. decline. —*W. to Miss Row.*

We learn from Fredericton, that the Legislature is expected to be prorogued on Wednesday at 2 o'clock, after a Session of nearly three months, having commenced on Wednesday, 7th January. The Supply Bill was passed on Monday. The *Fredericton Reporter* of Friday last, returns as follows on the Session.

"The Legislature, which is now upon the verge of its three months' sitting, is rapidly drawing near its close, and it is nearly all the Bills intended to be passed during the Session, which are now in the hands of the Supply Bill and Contingencies will occupy the remainder of the Session. It would be unfair to accuse the House of idleness, for so far as concerns the progress of the Session, the bills of discussion are numerous, and they cannot be blamed. The great grievance which has arisen from long speeches and two weeks of time; and also from the absence of the members of the Committee of Privileges. We should imagine that another week will close the Session.

The Legislative Council has, from the new session which it has opened, as well as from other causes, given place to more lengthy debates, than at any former period. The Bills sent from below have all been discussed in that calm and dignified manner which has been the characteristic of the amount of parliamentary knowledge and judgment and talent in debate, which has been displayed in the Council during the present Session. From a pleasing and successful result, the Council has voted to the Ministers of the House of Assembly. Hitherto the official reports debate of both branches show that the Council has debated just half as much as the House of Assembly."

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DESTRUCTIVE ACCIDENT TO THE OPERATORS.
