





British Headquarters in France, April 14 .-- (From a staff correspondent of the A.P.)-The British last night broke the German front for a distance of four miles. The Germans are in retreat.

The gaps in the German defences were made in two places. Positions on a front of three miles between the double crassier and Givenchy and another mile on the north of the flank of the H indenburg trench system, were captured. Advanced posts were pushed well tow ard Queant and Pronviile, important points in the German defences. The Germans are fighting as they retire from Loos southward and are being hard pre ssed.

Fires and explosions in the territory to the rear of the German lines continue. The weather today was favorable for campaigning.



London, April 14-The Turks have sustained another defeat at the hands of the British in Mesopotamia. The war office announces that the Turks -Brazil to Arm Merchantmen are in retreat after a battle in which they suffered heavy losses.

The Turks were driven from their positions near Ghaliyah, ten miles northeast of Deltawah. (Delta-wah is thirty-five miles north of Bagdad). Germans Spread Women Discuss Cost of Living White Plague? Infected French Civilians With Mass Meeting Under Auspices of Housewives League Hears Much

New York, April 13.—That the Ger-mans made a deliberate attempt to spread the white plague through France is the opinion of Dr. Theodore C. Beebe, distinguished Boston pathologist, who has charge of the laboratory of the Am-erican Ambulance Hospital at Neuilly, France. The staff correspondent of the New York World in Paris, summarizes re-suls of investigations made by Dr. Beebe, all tending to add this horrible trime of deliberately spreading tubercu-



Scheme for Gift of 160 Acres And L o a n of \$1,500 With Course of Training London, April 14.—The Canadian As-sociated Press is informed that the me-morandum submitted by the Hon. Rob-ert Rogers and Bruce Walker to the Empire Land Settlement committee, em-bodying the dominion proposals for the settlement of ex-soldiers in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, contains the following proposals: The Canadian minister of the interior would reserve large areas of suitable inads in the prairie provinces for settle-ment by ex-service men, the adminis-tration of which is to be in the hands of a settlement board. It is proposed to grant approved ex-service men 160 acres each of crown lands, and the following

grant approved ex-service men 160 acres each of crown lands, and the following under the auspices of Union Jack Lodge each of crown lands, and the following persons are entitled to participate in the free gift of land: Honorably dis-charged soldiers, sailors who enlisted for active service in the naval forces of Canada during the present war, soldiers and sailors domiciled in Canada at the outbreak of the war and afterwards en-gaged in active service, and widows whose husbands died during active ser-vice.
