SCOURING BOSTON FOR WOMAN FAGIN

She Is Teaching Little Girls To Be Thieves

TAKES ALL THEY PILFER

Money For Candy Their Reward— Twelve Year Old Child Arrested After Operating Like Trained Criminal

Boston, Feb. 28.—Boston is being raked by the police for a female Fagin, whose work in teaching little girls to steal is said to put the exploits of Dickens' notorious criminal character in the shade.

The officers, who have been looking about in a quiet way for some time for a West End woman "cook-master," through whose agency many small girls, too young to hold, have recently got in trouble, they say they have been stimulated to greater activity by the arrest of twelve-year-old Jennie Desalvo of 151 Leveitt street, who was charged with stealing the pocketbook of Miss John DeJong of Dorchester, in a Washington street department store.

The little girl operated with all the skill of a trained criminal. It was only by luck she was caught by Special Officer Carey. She had been arrested before on charge of stealing toy balloons in a department store.

In the story she sobbed out to the police was that a "big girl" had threatened to kill her if she did not steal the balloons. Jennie used a muff to cover the movement of her hands in "snatching" the pocketbook, in a way that showed she must have been cleverly instructed. She had the handbag of Mrs. DeJong open and the pocketbook out before the latter realized what was happening.

Jennie's father and mother are aiding the police in their hunt for the woman, who, they believe, enticed their daughter into crime.

The cleverness of the mysterious woman thief teacher lies largely, according to the police, in her selection of her little human tools. She takes innocent children and teaches them stealing as kindergarten teachers instruct their pupils in novel and fascinating games. They become so fascinated that they take delight in "playing the new tricks" they have been taught.

She takes everything they pick up and in return gives them money to buy candy. "The little boys and girls are so small that even when they are caught they do not get into serious trouble, all being taken care of by their parents and left free to be inveigled into renewed thieving, just as the Desalvo girl was."

BARKER TELLS HOW HE CAME TO BE IN A FIGHTING CASE

William Barker and Edward Ramsay were arrested last night charged with fighting just beyond the Marsh bridge. Barker said that he had not been drinking. He said he saw Ramsay and another man in an encounter. He knew Ramsay and, seeing that the other man had him down, he interfered. After elevating his friend of the burden of the unknown man, he went to pick him up when Ramsay, thinking his rescuer was the man who had attacked him, turned on him. Barker said he did what he would to defend himself, and consequently the two men were arrested.

Miss Kate Lane, city secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association, Toronto, has been in the city for the last three days for the purpose of arousing interest in the formation of a branch of the association here. Miss Jamieson, daughter of the late Mr. Jamieson, who was here about a year ago and it was as a result of her report that the necessity of an institution of this kind that Miss Lane came to St. John.

While here Miss Lane met members of the King's Daughters, as well as of the Girls' Association and talked the matter over with them. She explained that so long as there was an institution such as the King's Daughters in the city, the Y. W. C. A. would make no move toward establishing here, but it was the opinion of the ladies who met Miss Lane that, should the Y. W. C. A. decide to open a branch here, the King's Daughters would be immediately closed and today most of the inmates left the city. A close watch will be kept and any attempt to re-open will be dealt with summarily.

MRS. OAKES OF P. E. ISLAND BURNED TO DEATH IN HER HOME

Rev. Mr. Bynon, Baptist Clergyman in New Brunswick, is Brother

Charlotte, P. E. I., Feb. 28.—Mrs. George Oakes, a widow aged sixty, was burned to death last night in her home on the island of P. E. She was alone, her daughter being in church. About nine o'clock a neighbor heard a woman's screams and saw fire through the kitchen window. He found Mrs. Oakes enveloped in flames. He fought to extinguish them with a mat but soon after the woman expired. Death was hastened by the shock as the body was not so badly burned as expected. The fire was evidently caused by the fall or explosion of a lamp. It lay in fragments on the floor.

Mrs. Oakes was formerly Miss Bynon and has a brother, a Baptist clergyman in New Brunswick.

REFUSES TO DISCUSS THE APPLICATION FOR WINDING UP MAY QUEEN COMPANY

In the matter of the May Queen Steamship Co., Ltd., Mr. Justice McKeown gave judgment this morning, refusing to dismiss the application for the winding up of the company under the provincial act, on account of the capital being impaired to the extent of 25 per cent, made on petition of Keith A. Barber, one of the shareholders; but allowing time to the shareholders opposing the application to offer evidence or determine whether or not they would appeal. The hearing was adjourned until March 18. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., and Francis Kerr are appearing in support of the petition, and D. Mullin, K.C., and G. H. V. Belyea contra.

HUSBAND GROOMSMAN AT MARRIAGE OF OTHER MAN TO HIS WIFE

Perjury, Bigamy and Conspiracy in Case Before Ontario Court

Brucebridge, Ont., Feb. 28.—Peter Stark was sentenced yesterday to eight years in the penitentiary for bigamy in marrying Mrs. Stark, who was already married to another man, and for conspiracy to have his wife and Stark married, was allowed out on suspended sentence.

THE MACKINTOSH SETS DOG WATCH ON SUFFRAGETTES

New York, N. Y., Feb. 28.—A London cable to the "Tribune" says that recent activities of the suffragettes in Scotland are being met by remarkable precautions. The Mackintosh of Mackintosh has initiated a system of dog guards at his home, Moy Hall, Inverness, where some of the finest Jacobite relics are kept.

The dogs raise the alarm on the approach of any person during day or night. Since the Mackintosh began this system of dog guards, other owners of houses have decided to do the same.

New Evidence in Becker Case

Schepps Said To Have Held Open Door of "Murder Car" While Rosenthal Was Shot

New York, Feb. 28.—That Sam Schepps held open the door of the "murder car" while gunmen shot down Herman Rosenthal, a gambler, is part of the newly discovered evidence that will be presented at the second trial of Charles Becker, according to a statement made today by Joseph A. Shay, attorney for the former police lieutenant.

Schepps, it is said by Mr. Shay, stood on the running board of the automobile, while it was waiting across the street from the Hotel Metropole, where the murder of Rosenthal occurred. Mr. Shay would not say definitely whether or not he hoped to prove that Schepps was in the car.

Becker's attorney also plans to have witnesses testify that several meetings spoken of by Schepps, Harry Vallon and Jack Rose, in their testimony at the trial, and at which Becker was said to have made the arrangements for the killing, were in fact held.

Witnesses will be produced, said Mr. Shay, who will testify that Becker was in the car at the time of the alleged conference.

Lefty Louis Rosenberg, one of the four Becker gunmen, who will die in the electric chair on April 18, made a statement last night through his attorney, which he denied that he and his companions would try to throw the entire blame for the killing upon Becker.

Attorney Walle declared that he had but two moves left in the fight to save the gunman's lives. After a death sentence has been affirmed by the court of appeals, said he, the only ways in which a man can be saved from death in the electric chair is by executive clemency or through the agency of newly discovered evidence. "I will not say positively that I have newly discovered evidence, but I have newly discovered evidence which I will not say what the next move will be."

Railway Men Fear the Ghost

Say it Followed Them in Hoosac Tunnel—Boston Sleuths on Trail But With no Results

North Adams, Mass., Feb. 28.—A party of policemen from Boston and Maine railway detectives spent several hours yesterday seeking an alleged phantom in the Hoosac Tunnel. John J. Long and Peter Rosco, railway engineers, found what they declare to be a ghost. They followed them for more than a mile and finally vanished near the central shaft, which is three miles from either end of the tunnel.

The experience was reported to headquarters. Officers made a thorough trip on an electric engine but no trace of the spook visitor could be found.

OPPOSES PLACING BUFG OF WASHINGTON IN THE ABBEY

London Outlook Says to Be Logical One of Kruger Also Should Be There

London, Feb. 28.—The "Outlook" opposes the suggestion made by the "Observer" that a bust of George Washington be placed in Westminster Abbey. It says: "The adoption of this suggestion would be the conversion of the abbey into a shrine of permanent, visible outrage upon all loyal inhabitants of Canada. Are we to have a monument to Washington and none to his victim? Let us be logical and erect another to Paul Kruger, (the late president of the Transvaal republic). He had the same qualifications. Washington was the mortal enemy of England and persecuted the British population."

AEROPLANE CARRIES TURKS TO DEATH IN HOLY LAND

Constantinople, Feb. 28.—Pethy Bey and Sadik Bey, two young officers in the Turkish military flying corps, were today charged with attempting to make a flight from Constantinople to Alexandria. Between Damascus and Jerusalem, the aeroplane broke down.

PER CAPITA DEBT OF ST. JOHN IS SMALLEST IN DOMINION SAVE THAT OF TOWN OF GLACE BAY

Average of All Towns and Cities of Canada With 10,000 People or More is \$103, But St. John's is Only \$23—Halifax Three Times as Large

A striking illustration of the conservatism which has governed the expenditure of civic funds in St. John and the soundness of the city's financial position is given by a study of the net per capita debt of the cities and towns of more than 10,000 population of Canada as prepared by John Appeltin for McLean's Magazine. According to these figures St. John's per capita debt is less than that of any other city or town in the Dominion, with the exception of Glace Bay, N. S., which is only slightly lower.

While the average sum for which each resident of an urban community in Canada, if the municipal debt were divided equally, would be liable is \$103 the residents of St. John would face an obligation of only \$23 each. In other municipalities the amount would be all the way up to \$280 per capita, the average figure being held by Port Grey, B. C.

The average debt of large cities in the United States is equal to less than \$30 a head, and therefore less than half the average for Canadian cities. In the figures given it will be observed that the highest averages are in the west, where cities have sprung up rapidly and where they have been provided in a few years with public facilities which older communities have secured only after scores of years. The western spirit of rivalry and the desire to attract new residents by the material evidence of progress also helps to account for their large expenditures.

FEDERAL LEAGUE TO DIVIDE PLAYERS AMONG EIGHT CLUBS TODAY

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 28.—Division of about 200 baseball players among the eight clubs of the circuit, will be made today by the owners and managers of the Federal League.

About half of the 200 players who have been signed by the Federal League have already been placed. Included in the roster are said to be many big league men.

Mordcai Brown of St. Louis, and George Glavin of Kansas City, the first managers to submit a complete list of ball players to the club owners.

Reports that Hal Chase, the Chicago Sox's first baseman, was wavering in his mind as to whether to join the Sox and joining the Federals could not be confirmed. Stories from the coast indicated that Chase was to go to Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 28.—The regulars of the Cleveland American League team left at noon for their spring training camp at Athens, Ga. PRaise FOR CHAMBERLAIN AND COMPTROLLER OF ST. JOHN

The Canadian Courier pays a well deserved tribute to the chamberlain and comptroller of St. John in reference to the publication of civic accounts. Their comment, under the heading "A model civic balance sheet" is as follows: "Every treasurer of a town or city in Canada might well take the statement recently issued by the City of St. John, N. B., as a model. Their appropriations for the year 1913 are shown in seven different columns, which are headed as follows: 1. Amount expended. 2. Income. 3. Expenditure with income deducted. 4. Limit of expenditure over income. 5. Unexpected balances of appropriations. 6. Taxes collected against limit of expenditure. 7. Unexpected balances in cash. This table shows at a glance what is spent on each department, and how closely each department came to its appropriations. Every department showed a balance on hand at the end of the year. The total surplus for the year was over one hundred thousand dollars, showing that the city is well managed. Perhaps the fact that St. John was the first city in Canada to adopt the commission form of government is accounted for this splendid and exceptional showing. The New York experts who examined Toronto's accounts for 1912 found that nearly every department overran its appropriations during that year, and there was an overhaft or deficit of six or seven hundred thousand dollars."

THE STEAMERS

Donaldson Line Lethia sailed from Glasgow this morning for St. John with fifty-six cabin and 150 third class passengers and a good cargo of general freight.

Allan Line Corinthia will sail this afternoon about three o'clock for London with cargo of deals, grain and general freight. The Mount Royal, of the C. P. R. fleet, is due to sail on this afternoon's tide for London and Antwerp with a full cargo of deals, grain and general freight. Royal Mail Steam Packet Line Chibucto will sail this afternoon for the West Indies via Halifax with mails and general cargo.

The Manchester Shipper arrived this morning from Manchester via Halifax with general freight. She docked at No. 6 berth about two o'clock. The Manchester Corporation is due to sail either this afternoon or Monday morning for Philadelphia to complete cargo for Manchester.

C. P. R. steamer Tyrolia will likely get away this afternoon about three o'clock for Avonmouth with general cargo. From Avonmouth she will go to Liverpool to take a sailing for this port.

DOCTOR FOX IS SCIENCE MARTYR

Dies of The Bite of Venomous Snake

BITTEN FIVE TIMES

Had Found Cure and Was Experimenting With It But Thought Skin Was Punctured in Only Four Places

Calcutta, Feb. 28.—Dr. Frederick Fox, an Australian scientist, who had devoted his life to the treatment of snake bites, died today as the result of a bite from a snake which he was using for experimental purposes.

Doctor Fox fell a victim while he was attempting to prove the efficacy of what he had said was a sure antidote to the virus of the snake. He had just finished treating a goat which had been bitten and he had succeeded in saving its life, when he was attacked by a deadly krait snake, which is peculiar to British India. The krait is a very venomous reptile, possessing grooved poison fangs and solid upper teeth behind them. During its attack on the doctor the snake inflicted five punctures.

The doctor, who had often voluntarily submitted to snake bites in order to demonstrate the efficacy of his cure, smilingly incised four of the punctures, but the fifth escaped his notice. The day symptoms of poisoning developed. The antidote made by Doctor Fox himself was used, but it was too late and he was added to the roll of martyrs to science.

WILL OF JOHN J. KANE

In the probate court today the will of John J. Kane of Beaconsfield, contractor, was proved. He gives to his son, Charles A. Kane, and to Gertrude, wife of his son, John T. Kane, two frehold lots of land in Carleton, fronting on the City Line Road, to his sons Michael F., James E., and Charles A. Kane, and to his daughter Edie B. Gertrude Kane \$100 each; to Rev. John J. O'Donovan \$100; to his son James E. Kane his interest in construction and holding plant, books, gear and material heretofore used by him in his business, but such not to effect any interest which he may have in deposits on account of contracts, nor profits whether earned or not, which he gives to his wife Rosa; he gives to his wife Rosa for her natural life the residue of his real estate for her support and maintenance, and upon her death to his children, and the rest of his personal property he gives to his wife. He nominates his son James E. executor, and he was accordingly sworn. Real estate consists of lots of land on the west side and in Lancaster valued at \$2,000; personally under \$10,000. Total estate \$12,000. Messrs. Baxter & Logan are probators.

THE WEATHER

After the long stretch of cold weather that has been experienced in the city during the last few weeks, the present warm weather caused a very heavy vapor, which at times last night was almost impenetrable. Between 10 o'clock and midnight a dead calm prevailed. The temperature last night went up as high as the freezing point, 32 degrees above, and the lowest registered last night was twenty-one above. The trees and wires this morning presented a very picturesque appearance. The fog disappeared this morning as soon as the sun appeared.

SUBURBANITES DEMAND JUSTICE

Spirited Meeting in Rothersey Last Evening — Committee to Co-operate With St. John Board of Trade

A largely attended meeting of indignant suburbanites was held at Rothersey last evening to protest against the injustice of the management of the government railway in taking off the I. C. R. suburban train. Spirited addresses were made expressing the determination of the people living along the line of the I. C. R. between St. John and Hampton to make every attempt to have not only the entire suburban service restored but up-to-date car accommodation as well. The gross injustice of Mr. Gutelius, the government's manager for the I. C. R., was strongly denounced.

A representative committee was appointed to meet the St. John board of trade, on Monday evening, to take up with them the whole question. The committee consists of B. C. Barclay Boyd, chairman; J. M. Robinson, H. F. Puddington, J. H. A. L. Fairweather, E. S. Carter, E. A. Schofield, W. S. Allison, Joseph Johnston, J. S. Gibbon, F. J. Nesbitt, H. G. S. Adams.

Among those present at the meeting last night was J. M. Robinson, president of the St. John board of trade, a resident of Rothersey, who assured his fellow suburbanites that they were strongly supported in their protest by the members of the board.

Mr. Boyd explained the reason for the meeting, and called upon Mr. Puddington, who briefly reviewed the situation and expressed his disapproval of the arrangement.

E. S. Carter pointed out that Mr. Gutelius had stated to the members of the board of trade that the morning and evening trains would not be disturbed, but they had been cancelled without warning. He showed, by figures supplied by Hon. H. R. Emerson, how much the suburban traffic had increased, and said that the action of the I. C. R. management was anything but courteous.

J. M. Robinson was given a rousing reception, and he handled the mismanagement of Mr. Gutelius without gloves. He said that a representative committee from the meeting would have the cordial assistance of the board of trade of St. John in the effort to regain the rights of the suburban people. He spoke of sending a telegram explaining the situation to Mr. Haas, and of getting a reply incorporated in which was a copy of a telegram from Mr. Haas to Mr. Gutelius practically demanding that the suburban service should be restored. 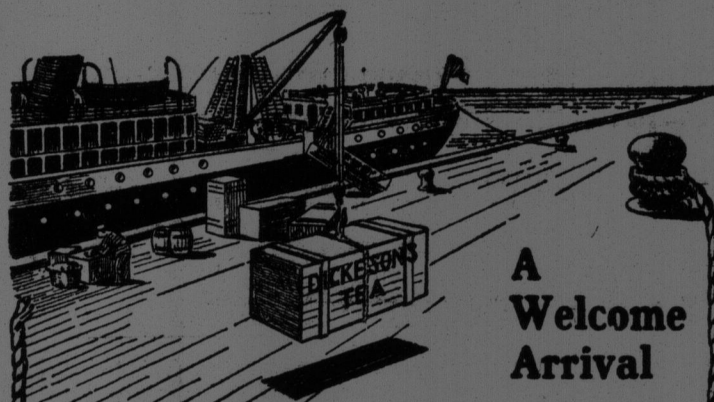

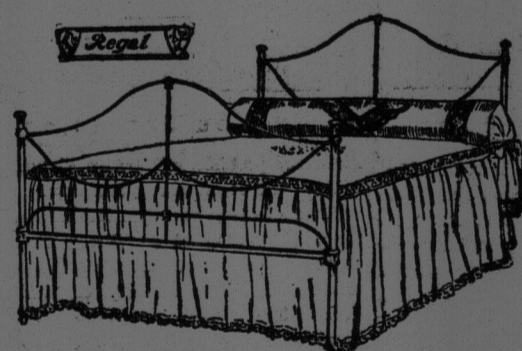

the people's grievances must be redressed. The entire suburban service must be restored.

It has been denied at Ottawa that Mr. Gutelius made certain statements which he is credited with having made in St. John. Mr. Gutelius himself will hardly come to St. John and deny that he made those statements.

Premier Asquith gave no encouragement whatever to the delegation of alarmists headed by Lord Roberts who went to him on Friday to urge greater expenditure on the army and navy. This will be sad news for the armament makers.

London is somewhat surprised to learn that Canada seeks another loan of \$5,000,000, when a loan of \$4,000,000 was sought in December last. The Board of government, however, must have money to spend.

The expeditious handling of the ocean mails at the port of St. John this winter has shown that the work can be done more quickly at this port than it has been done in the past at the port of Halifax.

The way is now clear for the partial housing survey to be undertaken under the joint auspices of the board of health, the city council and the housing committee of the board of trade. It will doubtless be made during March, and should be of great value.

Financially there is no city in Canada which occupies a stronger position than the city of St. John. This does not suggest that there should be a lavish expenditure but it does suggest that if a considerable expenditure is called for to improve the public services of St. John can better afford it than any other city in Canada.

Organized only a couple of weeks ago, the German Street Brotherhood already has a hundred members. One hundred intelligent and determined men can do a great deal to improve moral and social conditions in St. John. If they do not make the mistake of merely sitting down once a week to listen to speeches and let it go at that.

Premier Fleming says that ten million bushels of potatoes were produced in this province last year, and that in a few years the output will not be less than twenty million bushels. Premier Fleming should be an earnest advocate of wider markets, so that the farmers may get the greatest benefit possible from the increased production.

The report of Superintendent Anglin of the Provincial Hospital shows that there has been a decline in the per capita cost of keeping patients each year since 1910. This, in view of the increased cost of living, is an indication of careful management. It is a sad reflection, however, that there is a steady increase in the number of insane persons in the province.

Today's papers report another petty burglary. Conditions are steadily growing worse in this city, and they will continue to grow worse unless there is such a re-organization as will bring the police department into complete harmony, and until those responsible for the administration of justice adopt a less lenient attitude toward violators of the law. Last night's assault case is another illustration of the need of a change.

Mr. Hazen in parliament yesterday frankly accepted the doctrine that to the victors belong the spoils. This is a remarkable statement to come from a colleague of Hon. R. L. Borden, who was solemnly pledged to reform the civil service and take it out of politics. It also appears from a statement submitted by Mr. Hazen yesterday that since October 10, 1911, there have been 510 dismissals in his department. Thus 510 of the faithful were rewarded, and there were 510 violations of Mr. Borden's solemn pledges.

The number of immigrants arriving at St. John this season has been noticeably smaller than usual. There appears to be a very considerable falling off in the movement of immigrants this way.

The people of Amherst, according to the News, are looking forward with a good deal of interest to the address of Commissioner Agar of this city, before the members of the board of trade and the Canadian Club, on Civic Government by Commission. Commissioner Agar is well qualified by experience to discuss the subject.

The meeting at Rothesay last evening to protest against the withdrawal of the suburban service resulted in the appointment of a strong committee in which politics plays no part, to demand the rights of the people. The board of trade will take similar action. The people along the I. C. Joseph Warren, gives \$10,000 to Harvard University to be added to a fund created by her brother, Dr. Buckminster Brown, for the foundation of a professorship in orthopedic surgery, and the residue of her estate left in equal shares to the Industrial School for Crippled and Deformed Children and the Perkins Institution for the Blind. Miss Brown made many private bequests, and to an old servant, Minnie J. McCarthy, she left \$10,000. Miss Buckley and Margaret Dowd, who were also in her service, are each to receive \$200.

TOO MUCH FOR ONE MAN?

London, Feb. 27.—The novel suggestion is made by the Daily Mail that Great Britain should have two secretaries for foreign affairs, one to manage relations with Europe and Asia in accordance with the principles governing diplomacy rooted in the idea of force, the other to conduct negotiations with the United States, from which the element of force, whether actual or implied, has been expelled. The Mail argues that Sir Edward Grey's handling of the Benton affair in the old and formal diplomatic way has resulted in the voluntary casting aside of many of the benefits which should accrue from the happy and peculiar state of Anglo-American relations. "For there are sentiments, arguments and ideals," adds the paper, "that we can properly appeal to with regard to America which would be inappropriate and ineffectual in our dealings with eastern powers, and it is so rare as to almost be impossible to find a man possessing flexibility of mind and temperament enabling him to handle an European question in one spirit today and an American question in a totally dissimilar spirit tomorrow. That is why British diplomacy in its dealings with America has so often seemed stilted, inflexible, mechanical, and wanting in a real insight into the character of the American people. "President Wilson's Mexican policy is based on idealistic and unusual principles, and whatever case Great Britain submits to the judgment of the American government and people must be based on the same principles in order to be sure of a cordial and attentive hearing."

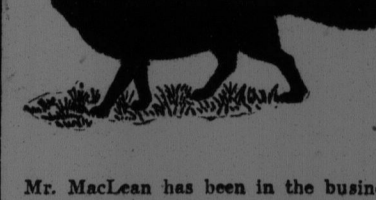
