Mr. Gutelius' reply was evasive, stating that they hoped to get the first suburban to the city on time.

There were strong speeches by H. G. S. Adams, of Brookville; J. H. A. L. Fairweather, of Rothesay; J. S. Gibbon, of Riverside; Mr. Burnett, of Fair Vale, and others, and, on motion of Mr. Carter, the committee referred to was appointed to meet the board of trade on Monday night to take up the question of the restoration of the suburban service, as well as a permanent and up-to-date suburban train accommodation. After the meeting the committee got together and made arrangements for the conference on Monday.
