SCOURING BOSTON FOR WOMAN FAGIN

She Is Teaching Little Girls To Be Thieves

TAKES ALL THEY PILFER

Money For Candy Their Reward—
Twelve Year Old Child Arrested
After Operating Like Trained Criminal

Boston, Feb. 28.—Boston is being raked by the police for a female fagin, whose work in teaching little girls to steal is said to put the exploits of Dickens' notorious criminal character in the shade.

The officers, who have been looking about in a quiet way for some time for a West End woman "crook-master," through whose agency many small girls, too young to hold, have recently got into trouble, say they have been stimulated to greater activity by the arrest of twelve-year-old Jennie Dealord of 181 Levee street, who was charged with stealing the pocketbook of Mrs. John DeLong of Dorchester, in a Washington street department store.

The little girl operated with all the skill of a trained criminal. It was only by luck she was caught by Special Officer Carey. She had been arrested before on charge of stealing by balloons in a department store.

The story she told out to the police was that a "big girl" had threatened to kill her if she did not steal the balloons. Jennie used a muff to cover the movement of her hands in "switching" the pocketbook, in a way that showed she must have been cleverly instructed. She had the handling of Mrs. DeLong open and the pocketbook out before the latter realized what was happening.

Jennie's father and mother are aiding the police in their hunt for the woman, who, they believe, enticed their daughter into crime.

The cleverness of the mysterious woman thief teacher lies largely, according to the police, in her selection of her little human tools. She takes innocent little girls and teaches them stealing as kindergarten teachers instruct their charges in novel and fascinating games. They become so fascinated that they take delight in "playing the new tricks" they have been taught.

She takes everything they pick up and in return gives them money to buy candy. The little dips of the girls are so small that even when they are caught they do not get into serious trouble, all being forgiven and left free to be inveigled into renewed thieving, just as the Resivo girl was.

BARKER TELLS HOW HE CAME TO BE IN A FIGHTING CASE

William Barker and Edward Ramsay were arrested last night charged with fighting. The arrests were made by Sergeant Caples and Policeman Sullivan. They said that the men were fighting just beyond the Marsh bridge. Barker said that he had not been drinking. He said he saw Ramsay and another man in an encounter. He knew Ramsay and, seeing that the other man had him down, he interfered. Barker said he did what he would to defend himself, and consequently the two men were arrested.

Road Houses Closed

Officials Notify Proprietors, and The Hint is Accepted—This Time is Final, Is the Declaration

The lid is on and organized vice no longer flourishes in the suburbs of the city. Without blare of trumpets or unnecessary notoriety but quietly and effectively all the houses of ill-fame outside the city limits have been closed and this time, it is asserted, they will remain closed.

When the matter was brought before the Municipal Council at the last meeting of that body it was referred to a committee consisting of Warden McLellan, Councillor Shillington and County Secretary Kelly. Since then the committee has been endeavoring to bring the matter before the council in a battle, legal or otherwise, would be necessary. Before taking such steps, however, it

was decided that it would be better to dispose of the matter quietly if that method could be made effective and thus avoid the expense and unpleasantness of raids and unsavory court proceedings. With this in view the warden and county secretary drove around to the five houses last evening and notified the owners that they must close and that if they did not do so immediately vigorous steps would be taken to force them to do so. It was made clear that the authorities meant business and the hint was sufficient. All the houses were immediately closed and today most of the inmates left the city. A close watch will be kept and any attempt to re-open will be dealt with summarily.

Y. W. C. A. MAY BE ORGANIZED FOR ST. JOHN; SECRETARY HERE

Miss Kate Lane, city secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association, Toronto, has been in the city for the last three days for the purpose of arousing interest in the formation of a branch of the association here. Miss Lane, who is also of Toronto, was here about a year ago and it was a result of her report as to the necessity of an institution of this kind that Miss Lane came to St. John.

While here Miss Lane met members of the King's Daughters in the city of the Girls' Association and talked the matter over with them. She explained that so long as there was an institution

such as the King's Daughters in the city, the Y. W. C. A. would make no move toward establishing here, but it was the opinion of the ladies who met Miss Lane that should the Y. W. C. A. decide to open a branch here, the King's Daughters and the Girls' Association, which is associated with them, would give way to the new organization. No definite action has yet been taken, but it is found possible to organize here, it is expected that a building capable of accommodating sixty girls will be secured.

Miss Lane left on the noon train for Halifax on the same mission.

REFUSES TO DISCUSS THE APPLICATION FOR WINDING UP MAY QUEEN COMPANY

In the matter of the May Queen Steamship Co., Ltd., Justice McKeown gave judgment this morning, refusing to dismiss the application for the winding up of the company under the provisions of an act on account of its capital being impaired to the extent of 25 per cent, made on petition of Keith A. Barker, one of the shareholders, but allowing time to the shareholders to keep the application to offer evidence or determine whether or not they would appeal. The hearing was adjourned until March 18. J. B. M. Baxter, K.C., and Francis Kerr are appearing in support of the petition, and D. Mullin, K.C., and G. H. V. Belyea contra.

New Evidence In Becker Case

Schepps Said To Have Held Open Door of "Murder Car" While Rosenthal Was Shot

New York, Feb. 28.—That Sam Schepps held open the door of the "murder car," while gunmen shot down Herman Rosenthal, a gambler, is part of the newly discovered evidence that will be

presented at the second trial of Charles Becker, according to a statement made today by Joseph A. Shay, attorney for the former police lieutenant.

Schepps, it is said by Mr. Shay, stood on the running board of the automobile, while it was waiting across the street from the Hotel Metropole where the murder of Rosenthal occurred. Mr. Shay would not say definitely whether or not he hoped to prove that Schepps did not take part in the killing.

Lefty Louis Rosenberg, one of the four Becker gunmen, who will die in the electric chair on April 18, made a statement last night, through his attorney, in which he denied that he and his companions would try to throw the entire blame for the killing upon Becker.

Attorney Wable declared that he had but two moves left in the fight to save his client's life. After a death sentence has been affirmed by the court of appeals, said he, the only ways in which he can be saved from death is by a pardon or by executive clemency or through the agency of newly discovered evidence. "I will not say what the next move will be."

Railway Men Fear the Ghost

Say it Followed Them in Hoosac Tunnel—Boston Sleuths on Trail But With no Results

North Adams, Mass., Feb. 28.—A party of policemen and Boston & Maine railway detectives spent several hours yesterday seeking an alleged phantom in the Hoosac Tunnel. It says: "The adoption of this suggestion would be the conversion of the abbey into a scene of permanent, visible outrage upon all loyal inhabitants of Canada. Are we to have a monument to Washington and none to his victim? Let us be logical and erect another to Paul Kruger, the late president of the Transvaal republic. He had the same qualifications. Washington was the mortal enemy of England, and persecuted a British population."

PER CAPITA DEBT OF ST. JOHN'S SMALLEST IN DOMINION SAVE THAT OF TOWN OF GLACE BAY

Average of All Towns and Cities of Canada With 10,000 People or More is \$103, But St. John's is Only \$23—Halifax Three Times as Large

A striking illustration of the conservative methods which have governed the expenditure of civic funds in St. John and the soundness of the city's financial position is given by a study of the net per capita debt of the cities and towns of more than 10,000 population of Canada as prepared by John Appleton for McLean's Magazine. According to these figures St. John's per capita debt is less than that of any other city or town in the dominion, with the exception of Glace Bay, N. S., which is only slightly lower.

While the average sum for which each resident of an urban community in Canada, if the municipal debt were divided by the population, would be \$103 the residents of St. John would face an obligation of only \$23 each. In other municipalities the amount would be all the way up to \$280 per capita, the record at that figure being held by Port Grey, B. C.

The average debt of large cities in the United States is equal to less than \$50 a head, and therefore less than half the average for Canadian cities. In the figures given it will be observed that the lowest averages are in the west, where cities have sprung up rapidly and where they have been provided in a few years with public facilities which older communities have secured only after scores of years. The western spirit of rivalry and the desire to attract new residents by the material evidence of progress also helps to account for their large expenditures.

FEDERAL LEAGUE TO DIVIDE PLAYERS AMONG EIGHT CLUBS TODAY

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 28.—Division of about 200 baseball players among the eight clubs of the circuit, will be made today by the owners and managers of the Federal League.

About half of the 200 players who have been signed by the Federal League are already in the city. The other half are said to be many big league men.

Reports that Hal Chase, the Chicago Americans' first baseman, was wavering between re-signing with the White Sox and joining the Federals could not be confirmed. Stories from the coast indicated that Chase was a "hold out."

Cleveland, Ohio, Feb. 28.—The regular Friday, K. C. had \$1,000 and Raleigh Trites \$500 with the Queen on their law libraries.

The Canadian Courier pays a well deserved tribute to the chamberlain and controller of St. John in a reference to the public works department.

Their comment, under the heading "A model civic balance sheet" is as follows: "Every treasurer of a town or city should have a copy of this statement recently issued by the City of St. John, N. B., as a model."

Their statement is shown in seven different columns, which are headed as follows: 1. Amount expended; 2. Income; 3. Expenditure with income deducted; 4. Limit of expenditure over income; 5. Unexpected balances of appropriations; 6. Taxes collected against limit of expenditure; 7. Unexpected balances in cash. This table shows at a glance what is spent on each department, and how closely each department came to its appropriations. Every department showed a balance on hand at the end of the year. The total surplus for the year was over one hundred thousand dollars, showing that the city is well managed. Perhaps the fact that St. John was the first city in Canada to adopt the commission form of government may account for this splendid and exceptional showing. The New York experts who examined Toronto's accounts for 1912 found that nearly every department overran its appropriations during that year, and there was an overdraft or deficit of six or seven hundred thousand dollars.

DOCTOR FOX IS SCIENCE MARTYR

Dies of The Bite of Venomous Snake

BITTEN FIVE TIMES

Had Found Cure and Was Experimenting With It But Thought Skin Was Punctured in Only Four Places

Calcutta, Feb. 28.—Dr. Frederick Fox, an Australian scientist, who had devoted his life to the treatment of snake bites, died today as the result of a bite from a snake which he was using for experimental purposes.

Doctor Fox fell a victim while he was attempting to prove the efficacy of what he had said was a sure antidote to the virus of the snake. He had just finished treating a goat which had been bitten and he had succeeded in saving its life, when he was attacked by a deadly krait snake, which is peculiar to British India. The krait is a very venomous reptile, possessing grooved poisoned fangs and solid upper teeth behind them. During its attack on the doctor the snake inflicted five punctures.

The doctor, who had often voluntarily submitted to snake bites in order to demonstrate the efficacy of his cure, smilingly incised four of the punctures, but the fifth escaped his notice. Later in the day symptoms of poisoning developed. The antidote made by Doctor Fox himself was used, but it was too late and he was added to the roll of martyrs to science.

SUBURBANITES DEMAND JUSTICE

Spirited Meeting in Rothersey Last Evening — Committee to Co-operate With St. John Board of Trade

A largely attended meeting of indignant suburbanites was held at Rothersey last evening to protest against the injustice of the management of the government railway in taking off the I. C. R. suburban train. Spirited addresses were made expressing the determination of the people living along the line of the I. C. R. between St. John and Hampton to make every attempt to have not only the entire suburban service restored but up-to-date car accommodation as well. The gross injustice of Mr. Gutfless, the government's manager for the I. C. R., was strongly denounced.

Among those present at the meeting last night was J. M. Robinson, president of the St. John board of trade, a resident of Rothersey, who assured his fellow suburbanites that they were strongly supported in their protest by the members of the board.

Mr. Boyd explained the reason for the meeting, and called upon Mr. Puddington, who briefly reviewed the situation and expressed his disapproval of the arrangement. E. S. Carter pointed out that Mr. Gutfless had stated to the members of the board of trade that the morning and evening trains would not be disturbed, but they had been cancelled without warning. He showed, by figures supplied by Hon. H. R. Emerson, how much the suburban traffic had increased, and said that the action of the I. C. R. management was anything but courteous.

J. M. Robinson was given a rousing reception, and he handled the mismanagement of Mr. Gutfless without gloves. He said that a representative committee from the meeting would have the cordial assistance of the board of trade of St. John in the efforts to regain the rights of the suburban people. He spoke of sending a telegram explaining the situation to Mr. Hasen, and of setting a reply incorporated in which was a copy of a telegram from Mr. Hasen to Mr. Gutfless practically demanding that the suburban service should be restored. Mr. Gutfless' reply was evasive, stating that they hoped to get the first suburban train to the city on time.

There were strong speeches by H. G. S. Adams, of Brookville; J. H. A. L. Fairweather, of Rothersey; J. S. Gibbon, of Riverdale; Mr. Burnett, of Fairville; and others, and on motion of Mr. Carter, the committee referred to was appointed to meet the board of trade on Monday night to take up the question of the restoration of the suburban service, as well as a permanent and up-to-date suburban train accommodation. After the meeting the committee got together and made arrangements for the conference on Monday.



THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Premier Fleming informed the legislature yesterday that the expert who reported on the proposed Valley Railway bridge across the St. John river estimated that such a bridge at Dunham's wharf, a mile and a half below The Mistake, would cost over two million dollars.

The engineer, Mr. Montserrat, the chairman of the firm of engineers on the Quebec bridge, says that Dunham's wharf is the most desirable site for the bridge, or perhaps we should say the site where a bridge can be built at least expense; but even here the cost in his estimation would exceed two million dollars.

The Foundation Company were asked to give an estimate on the cost of the sub-structure for a bridge at this point, and they placed it at \$1,885,000, to which perhaps another ninety thousand should be added to provide ice-breakers on all the smaller piers.

The Dominion government had only undertaken to spend one million dollars for the construction of bridges across both the St. John and Kennebecasis. It now appears that more than twice this sum will be needed for the St. John river bridge alone.

Premier Fleming does not say what his government will do, further than that the reports of the engineer and the Foundation Company will be considered by the government, which is pledged, however, to complete the Gagetown-St. John section of the road.

The people of St. John are especially interested in this matter. The Foundation Company say that the bridge across the main river could be completed by the end of 1915. It is evident that a work of such magnitude could not be completed in so short a time unless a beginning were made at the earliest possible moment. Since both the legislature and parliament are in session, it should be possible to settle the question one way or the other without much delay.

If it is decided to rush the work on these bridges, there will be an additional reason to hurry the work at Courtney Bay, and see to it that terminals are in readiness by the time the first train of the Grand Trunk Pacific comes over the Valley Railway to St. John.

ATHLETICS AND CRIME

One of the most interesting series of ice sports that has taken place in St. John for many years was that of Thursday evening last. All of the competitors were young men and boys of this city, and the competition was very keen. So keenly contested was every race that the greatest interest was aroused among the cheering spectators.

The attendance at these sports was comparatively small. It has been said that if the promoters had put some paid skaters on the ice, and brought competitors from some other city, preferably Boston, the rink would not have contained the crowd which would be eager to see the events.

Is this true? Do the people of St. John care so little for the development of clean amateur sports that they would not encourage their own boys, but would crowd the rink to witness a competition not one whit more keen or interesting between athletes who were paid for their work?

We hear a good deal about petty crimes committed by boys and young men. If these boys and young men could be interested in athletic exercises, and thus brought into contact with others under healthy conditions, would there not be less complaint about youthful depravity?

A very notable feature of the sports on Thursday night was that there were probably less than fifty ladies in the whole audience. Why should not the ladies of St. John encourage exercises which make for the physical development of the boys?

Perhaps a change will come about when St. John has a great public athletic field fully equipped, and possibly an arena for winter sports. Let us at least hope that it may be so.

The Milltown magistrate who fined the Salvation Army for singing in the street on Sunday has peculiar notions of what constitutes a breach of the law.

The number of immigrants arriving at St. John this season has been noticeably smaller than usual. There appears to be a very considerable falling off in the movement of immigrants this way.

The people of Amherst, according to the News, are looking forward with a good deal of interest to the address of Commissioner Agar of this city, before the members of the board of trade and the Canadian Club, on Civic Government by Commission. Commissioner Agar is well qualified by experience to discuss the subject.

The meeting at Robtess last evening to protest against the withdrawal of the suburban service resulted in the appointment of a strong committee in which politics plays no part, to demand the rights of the people. The board of trade will take similar action. The people along the I. C. R. are being shamefully treated by the present management of that railway, and their representatives in parliament may as well understand that

the people's grievances must be redressed. The entire suburban service must be restored.

It has been denied at Ottawa that Mr. Gutelius made certain statements which he is credited with having made in St. John. Mr. Gutelius himself will hardly come to St. John and deny that he made those statements.

Premier Aquilino gave no encouragement whatever to the delegation of alarmists headed by Lord Roberts who went to him on Friday to urge greater expenditure on the army and navy. This will be sad news for the armament makers.

London is somewhat surprised to learn that Canada seeks another loan of £5,000,000, when a loan of £4,000,000 was sought in December last. The Borden government, however, must have money to spend.

The expedition to handle the ocean mails at the port of St. John this winter has shown that the work can be done more quickly at this port than it has been done in the past at the port of Halifax.

The way is now clear for the partial housing survey to be undertaken under the joint auspices of the board of health, the city council and the housing committee of the board of trade. It will doubtless be made during March, and should be of great value.

Financially there is no city in Canada which occupies a stronger position than the city of St. John. This does not suggest that there should be a lavish expenditure but it does suggest that if a considerable expenditure is called for to improve the public services St. John can better afford it than any other city in Canada.

Organized only a couple of weeks ago, the German Street Brotherhood already has a hundred members. One hundred intelligent and determined men can do a great deal to improve moral and social conditions in St. John, if they do not make the mistake of merely sitting down once a week to listen to speeches and let it go at that.

Premier Fleming says that ten million bushels of potatoes were produced in this province last year, and that in a few years the output will not be less than twenty million bushels. Premier Fleming should be an earnest advocate of wider markets, so that the farmers may get the greatest benefit possible from the increased production.

The report of Superintendent Anglin of the Provincial Hospital shows that there has been a decline in the per capita cost of keeping patients each year since 1910. This, in view of the increased cost of living, is an indication of careful management. It is a sad reflection, however, that there is a steady increase in the number of insane persons in the province.

Today's news reports another petty burglary. Conditions are steadily growing worse in this city, and they will continue to grow worse unless there is such a re-organization as will bring the police department and the head of the public safety department into complete harmony, and until those responsible for the administration of justice adopt a less lenient attitude toward violators of the law. Last night's assault case is another illustration of the need of a change.

Mr. Hazen in parliament yesterday frankly accepted the doctrine that to the victors belong the spoils. This is a remarkable statement to come from a colleague of Hon. R. L. Borden, who was solemnly pledged to reform the civil service and take it out of politics. It also appears from a statement submitted by Mr. Hazen yesterday that since October 10, 1911, there have been 510 dismissals in his department. This 510 of the faithful were rewarded, and there were 510 violations of Mr. Borden's solemn pledges.

Fertilizers should be free. S. C. Parker was sent with a Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' delegation to Ottawa a few years ago and that delegation met with a measure of success. Mr. Parker put up what seems a good argument. He said: "Protectionists admit that it is advisable to admit raw material free of duty. Now the fertilizers used by the farmers surely be recognized as the farmers' raw material! It isn't a party question. I am not going to argue for or against protection as a fiscal policy but I would like to see the six thousand tons of fertilizer to be used in 1914 by members of the United Fruit Companies duty free. It would mean at least a saving of \$6,000 and that would finance the pre-cooling experiment."



LICENSES FOR TEACHERS OF MUSIC IN MASSACHUSETTS

Boston, Feb. 28.—The legislators are considering a bill providing for the appointment of a board of registration in music. This bill will practically require the licensing of all music teachers.

Each applicant for registration must furnish satisfactory proof that they are 21 years old, of good moral character and of good standing as a musician. Applicants must be accompanied by a fee of \$10. Passing they shall receive a certificate signed by the chairman and secretary of the board.

Section 8 of the bill contains the provision that anyone not lawfully registered and authorized who holds out as a teacher of music or teaches under a false or assumed name or personates another teacher of like or different name shall for each offence be punished by a fine not less than \$50 or more than \$200.

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Should Be No Limit To Growth of St. John

London Graphic Special Commissioner Gives Prominence to City and New Brunswick in Splendid Number

The London Graphic of February 14th devotes thirty-four splendidly illustrated pages to Canada. It begins with an article by Leo Scheff on "The Call of Canada." Mr. Scheff, who is the Graphic's special commissioner, it will be remembered visited New Brunswick last year on his tour of Canada. That he is a painstaking and accurate observer is clear from the article on this province, which sets forth very clearly the advantages of the province and its claims upon the settler.

The importance of St. John, with three great transcontinental systems converging here is noted, and Mr. Scheff says: "There should be no limit to the growth of St. John." The article gives an excellent account of the resources of the province and especially its agricultural resources and good climate. There is a good description of the city and port of St. John, and of the great industries springing up in the province. In conclusion Mr. Scheff says:—

"There is no doubt that after being overlooked for a considerable time the province is now coming into its own. Attention is being centred upon it because of its temperate climate, its abundance of cheap and fertile land, its unexploited mineral wealth, its many railways, streams, beautiful valleys and upland slopes. Many who passed through to the west some years ago, not knowing of the inducements such a province could offer, are returning to New Brunswick to settle down."

The two pages devoted to this province have nine splendid illustrations, showing the fertile valley of the St. John with farm and orchard scenes, and views of other parts of the province which are very attractive. There is also an excellent portrait of Premier Fleming, showing such publicity as the Graphic thus gives New Brunswick cannot but be of great benefit.

There are also two page articles on Nova Scotia, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, with some special pages devoted to large cities in the west. There is also a splendid view of the parliament buildings in Ottawa, a page picture showing immigrants debarking at Quebec, two pages on immigration, and other matter of great interest and much value. The illustrations throughout are among the finest that have been used in any publication relating to Canada.

HON. MR. HAZEN HAD BUSY DAY

Trying to Excuse Government's Violation of Pledges in Adoption of Spoils System — Mr. Carvell's Rebuke

Ottawa, Feb. 27.—On the evidence placed before this house it has to be admitted that there has been a carnival of partisanship in connection with appointments to the civil service, and in connection with the administration of the civil service since the accession of this government to power such as Canada never saw before. The condition is one which should cause every Canadian to hang his head in shame.

"When the leader of a great party has time after time appealed to the electorate, presumably in good faith, on the promise that it would reform the civil service and keep politics out of it, and then when elected to power, has abandoned that policy, it is time for decent Canadians to show their indignation."

This trenchant criticism by Hon. Frank Oliver of the government's record of dismissals of Liberal civil servants and the appointment of Conservative workers to their place was one of a series which came from the opposition today in the discussion of the estimates for the marine service.

The house went into supply shortly after opening of the sitting, and Hon. J. D. Hazen was kept busy all day expounding his policy of dismissal, and apologizing for appointments of Conservative workers, who had been shown to be incompetent in performance of their duty.

In laying down a somewhat vague declaration of government policy as to the government's attitude in regard to civil service reform, Mr. Hazen said that while eventually no doubt, minor officials would be appointed by competitive examination, there was no question but that friends of whatever government happened to be in power were favored in the matter of appointments. But he added, any official who took an active part in politics ran a serious risk of dismissal.

E. M. MacDonald, Mr. Sinclair, Mr. Kyte, Mr. Carvell and other maritime province Liberals noted the wide divergence between the present attitude of the government in regard to appointments and dismissals and what Mr. Hazen had laid down in his Halifax platform.

Mr. Carvell, in dealing with the subject of dismissals, replied to an interruption by Hon. Mr. Pelletier with the statement, "You have dismissed with evidence and without evidence. You have dismissed the fatherless and the widows and you have even dismissed the dead."

PRIVATE CARS AND OTHERS.

P. E. Island Farmer.) It may be some satisfaction (perhaps) for those who have to wait in the cold for hours for trains and other means of transport, that the government has decided to discontinue the use of private cars for its officials. It may also interest those sectionmen who have been put off by the discontinue of the use of private cars, that according to a return brought down in parliament last week the revenue of the Intercolonial Railway from April to June inclusive, last year showed an increase of \$845,666, as compared with the corresponding period of the last year. complete all the substructure by Dec. 1, 1915, and could so arrange the construction of the pier that the steel work would be all erected by Dec. 1, 1915.

Hon. Mr. Fleming pointed out that the figures in the two estimates tallied very closely. The reports had been received yesterday and of course the government had no time to consider them but he had promised the information to the public at an early date as possible after it was received and had now given it to the house.

The report of a bill relating to repairs and equipment of the Jordan Memorial Sanitarium at River Glade the premier reported that the institution had been open since April and that the average number of patients had been about twenty. The superintendent was one of the ablest experts on tuberculosis in the country and no expense had been spared to provide the best equipment. The government had spent about \$85,000 and Mr. Jordan had spent more. He spoke very highly of the generosity of Mrs. Jordan and the interest she is taking in this work.

The report of the crown lands department, submitted by the premier showed that the government had received \$84,000 less than in the previous year, but the premier said that this was accounted for by the change in the system of accounting. If the cut were less the premier would welcome the fact as it would bring the cut nearer to the natural increase and prevent depletion.

The report showed that the game receipts were smaller than during the previous year.

DUNHAM'S WHARF SITE FOR BRIDGE

The Valley Railway Crossing—Stumpage Collection Shows Decrease—Eulogy For Mrs. Jordan

Fredericton, Feb. 27.—The house of assembly adjourned at 5 p. m. until 8.30 p. m. Monday.

The standing committee appointed today show few changes. James K. Pinder, M. P. P., retains his position as chairman of the public accounts committee, a fact which is not at all pleasing to that section of the government party in York which is opposed to him. John A. Young, M. P. P., is chairman of agriculture committee.

Premier Fleming, as minister of lands and mines, this afternoon presented the report of his department. In doing so he drew what satisfaction he could from a falling revenue, in the belief that the decision to build a bridge across the St. John river Premier Fleming drew attention to the fact that, while the preliminary estimates for the cost of the bridge were \$1,000,000 and \$1,500,000 and the federal government's guarantee of bonds only covers \$1,000,000, the cost of the bridge will be much greater. He related the steps taken to secure a report regarding the best site by Mr. Montserrat, chief engineer of the Quebec bridge who had recommended the site at Dunham's wharf as the only place where a good foundation could be secured. The premier concurred in the recommendation.

He would not recommend any earth or rock filling at this crossing, as any appreciable restriction of the high water level would be very likely to cause serious scour and endanger the foundations of the piers. He was satisfied that a bridge could be constructed across the river at this location which would cost approximately \$2,063,726 subdivided as follows: Superstructure, \$843,715; substructure, \$1,283,977; rock fill, \$47,000; track and telegraph, \$1,500; engineering and contingencies, \$187,044.

Mr. Montserrat gave it as his opinion that the Gorham's Bluff site would prove more costly and the only crossing he was prepared to recommend was that at Dunham's wharf, which would provide a crossing with the smallest initial cost.

The Foundation Company Limited, of Montreal who made a specialty of difficult foundation work, had been asked to make a complete examination and say what they would actually be prepared to do the work for. The report which he had received from that company, said that conditions found at Dunham's wharf would require a foundation of concrete crossing gave sufficient information for them to state that it was practicable to build a bridge at the site, and that the structure would be the cheapest and present less difficulties than at either Oak Point or Gorham's Bluff. They declared that they could build the structure for a bridge at that site for the sum of \$1,610,000.

These figures did not include ice-breakers on all the smaller piers, which were placed 80 feet apart in a plan which was submitted. To construct these ice-breakers would probably increase the cost by approximately \$90,000.

The company said there was a possibility of reducing the entire cost when further information was acquired. It awarded the contract for construction on May 1 next, they could

PER CAPITA DEBT OF ST. JOHN IS SMALLEST IN DOMINION SAVE THAT OF TOWN OF GLACE BAY

The compiler of the figures asserts that the high averages given do not imply that the cities have spent too much or that the debts are not represented by ample assets and adds that there are no better or safer securities to hold than the civic bonds. At the same time it is satisfactory to the citizens of St. John to feel that the city is not burdened with the debts that other cities are carrying and that large amounts can be spent for necessary public improvements and that the financial position of the city will still be far better than in almost any other municipality in the Dominion.

Halifax Debts Three Times Greater

As Halifax is a city of about the same population and about the same opportunities it is interesting to compare the figures for the city of Halifax. A comparison shows that the net per capita debt in the sister city is just three times as great as in St. John. It is almost more interesting to note that St. John is credited with a population of 56,000, while Halifax is shown as including only 46,000 residents.

It is difficult to discover on what basis the net total debt of St. John is placed at \$1,222,184 as this does not agree with the amount of bonds outstanding and if the assets and liabilities are compared it will be found that the city has a credit balance of more than \$2,500,000. As it is probable that the figures for all the cities are compiled on the same basis it is likely that the comparison between them is fair and that St. John's relative position is as indicated.

Reports and recommendations of the traffic bureau occupied a large part of the session of the board of trade council yesterday. Other matters were dealt with, and diagrams received from the Norton-Griffiths Company showing the future progress of the Courtenay Bay work as intended by the contractors.

A special committee reported on their investigations regarding the government subsidy for the steamer Granville. The committee recommended that the subsidy be increased from \$1,500 yearly to \$2,500. The council adopted the report and decided to request the government to grant the increased subsidy.

The traffic bureau also reported after investigation that they were of opinion that the removal of the "American rock" below Reed's Point was unnecessary in view of the present and proposed widening of the channel. No complaints, the bureau reported, had been made in recent years relative to the supposed danger of the rock. The report was adopted.

On the suggestion of W. Frank Hatheway it was decided that the traffic bureau should request the department of marine and fisheries to provide a relief lightship to take the place of the vessel at the Larcher when this should be removed for repairs.

The matter of appointing an agent-general for New Brunswick in London, Eng., was taken up by the immigration committee of the board of trade yesterday, and with the question of summer sailings from St. John was referred back to the committee.

The council was presented with a large new map of the city for use in the board of trade rooms by William Murdoch, city engineer.

POTATOES IN MAINE

Inspection Probably Necessary Before Export From Aroostook Allowed

A potato quarantine meeting was held on Tuesday evening in Presque Isle at which D. W. Corey explained to a large attendance of representative farmers and other citizens, what transpired at the meeting on last Monday in Augusta, and the probable action that will be taken by the national department of agriculture in dealing with the powdery scab problem.

Mr. Corey said that the Augusta meeting convinced him that the powdery scab exists in Maine as a distinct disease and is more or less widely distributed in Aroostook. It was evident to his mind that the national department had seriously contemplated imposing an embargo upon Aroostook potatoes, and he believed that but for the prompt and vigorous action of the Aroostook growers, aided by the state authorities, in securing further time, such an embargo would have resulted.

As it stands now, the probabilities favor the adoption of some practical system of inspection which the state will have exclusive direction and authority over. The inspection as outlined, contemplated both seed and table stock, and when its details are arranged all potatoes shipped out of the county must be subjected to a thorough inspection.

This involves among other things, the requirement that every car shipped shall have an inspector's certificate, and it is understood that the B. & N. railway, the Canadian Pacific and the Aroostook Valley railroad managements will comply with this regulation and will refuse to give a bill of lading to a car unaccompanied by an inspector's certificate.

The work in Aroostook is expected to be under the direction of Albert K. Gardner of Rockland, state horticulturist, whose headquarters will probably be in Presque Isle, from which point he will oversee the work of a staff of assistants.

It is roughly estimated that the cost of inspection will be \$2 a car. Mr. Corey says that the balance of the crop unsold in the neighborhood of 6,000,000 bushels, which at \$2 a car inspection fee, ought to leave a surplus.

Included in the work of inspection for the balance of the season, will be the rendering of aid to farmers in seed selection, and inspection. There will also be provided later, means of information for the farmers touching the nature of the powdery scab, through plant pathologists.

Mr. Corey laid very strong emphasis upon the duty of farmers to co-operate with the system of inspection adopted. He said that Aroostook must grow potatoes right, bring them to the dealer right, and the buyer must see that they are shipped right.

It must not fool ourselves with the idea that in the situation now confronting us, we can get by with the slipshod and less than honest methods of the past, for, if we do it simply means the destruction of the potato industry," said he.




