The war poetry was mediocre because the most talented of the younger Bulgarian writers also were serv-ing as soldiers. Stoilo Karavaloff, a high ly promising young writer, was killed in the first attack on Tchatalja. Another Bulgarian poet is among the few pris-oners taken by the Turks. One feature of the war was that it gave a great fillip to the women's liter-ary and journalistic movement in Bul-garia.
