

TOWN PLANNING

Among other bills introduced in the Nova Scotia legislature last week was one Dy Hon. Mr. Faulkner, which will be known as the Town Planning Act of 1912. The bill provides for the adoption of a town planning idea along the most modern lines, and may be adopted by any city or town in the province. 
