Manchester, April 24—The bullet riddled body of 19-year-old Carmine 'Blackie' Stello, known to the underworld as a white salver, dope peddler and burglar, was discovered in the backyard of a shop in Chinatown yesterday, amid evidence which police say tells a grim tale of gang revenge. He was found beside a pile of egg crates, and had been dead for hours. In his head and chest were seven bullets. His right hand clutched a small flashlight, his left an empty pistofishell. Nearby lay an automatic with six exploded shells.

The body was identified by a patrolland whole the of his pals for robbing an aged watchman.

Police believe "Blackie" was double-trossed by members of his gang. As they reconstruct the story of his death, he was lured to a squalid place in the belief he was to be in on a "job." He was given the flashlight and, while he stood with it in his right hand his companions backed away and showered him with bullets.

Then on No. 7 needles, cast on 12 sts. each end of needle. Knit in ridges until yoke measures 6 inches. On following row, cast off 30 sts. in centre for neck. On one side now knit front. Knit 4 inches. Break wool. Repeat same for other front. Then cast on 36 sts. in centre for front and put all sts. on one needle. Knit 2 more inches. Then cast off 12 sts. each end of needle. Next with wooden needles, knit same as back. Then on No. 7 needles, knit band same as back.


Sleeves-With No. 7 needles and right side of work towards you, pick up and knit one st. in each ridge across sleeve. With wooden needles knit 4 inches. On No. 7 needles knit 3, purl 3, ribbed knitting for 18 rows. Then with Angora Wool, knit 3 ridges. Cast off.

RUBBER PAVING That it is again noticeable that no new hard-wood paving is mentioned as having been laid down during the year. Where wood has been put down preference has undoubtedly been shown for creosoted deal. Particulars are given of an experiment in rubber paving tried in the borough of Southwark. The rubber was laid in Borough High street, a traffic of 240 tons per yard width per hour.
