SCHOOL TRUSTEES MEET.

Applications, Improvements and Changes in the Schools—The Attendence.

The board of school trustees met last night. Applications for appointment on the teaching staff were received from Miss Mary K. Tibbetts, R. A. Parker, Miss Lizzie B. Hughes, M. C. Donovan and Miss Mary Elliott. The committee on schools and teachers recommended the principals of the various schools located in rooms on the ground floor of their respective buildings, and, where possible, overlooking the play grounds; that Miss Ada Armstrong be appointed teacher of the seventh standard in the Indiantown school for the current year, at a salary of \$200; that all school prizes be awarded under the provisions of regulation 34 of the board of education; that the Douglas avenue school be officially pened on May 1st; that an assistant be employed in the first department of St. Joseph's school for the remainder of the current term; that the closing exercises of the grammar school and high school be held conjointly in the hall in the Centennial building. This report was adopted and the secretary was directed to confer with the board of education with regard to the question of one school session of less than four hours for standard one and two. The report of Superintendent Hayes was then submitted. It showed that the enrollment of pupils in March was \$6,221, and the average attendance 4,651. During the

To the attorney general and leader of the government:

Sir—having been notified that the government has in contemplation to ask my acceptance of a seat in the legislative council and to appoint me thereto at an early day I beg to assure you that in case my appointment shall take place I will accept the same upon the understanding that I will at all times vote for any measure or measures, introduced and promoted. by the government for the purpose of bringing about the abolition of the council and I bereby pledge myself to so vote accordingly, etc.

This pledge although it may have no value in point of law ought to be as binding in a moral sense as an oath. Mr. Blair was not bound to appoint any of these men to the council and the consideration for their appointment was their promise to assist him in carrying out the policy of the government and to vote for a measure for the abolition of the Legislative Council in whatever form it might come up. The bill which the government sent up from the House of Assembly to the Council was one abolishing that body immediately and all the members appointed by Mr. Blair were bound in honor to vote for it. Three of them refused to carry out their pledge and voted for an amendment which will extend the life of the Council three years and which will cost the province \$30,000. 




