



# **EARLY TRANS-ATLANTIC STEAMERS**

Francis C. Bradlee, of Marblehead, Mass., is a collector of prints, engravings and photographs of old steamers and has much information regarding trans-Atlantic steamship navigation. He has agents abroad and in the United States hunting up prints and pictures and from the material in his possession an article was written on the development of transatlantic steam navigation and has just been published.

According to this article the Savannah was the first steam vessel to cross the Atlantic and she was built at New York, being a ship rigged paddle vessel of 380 tons and 130 feet in length. Her 90 horse power engine cost \$3,500. She sailed from New York on May 24th, 1819 for Savannah and proceeded thence to Liverpool making the passage in 18 days, during 7 of which she was under steam.
