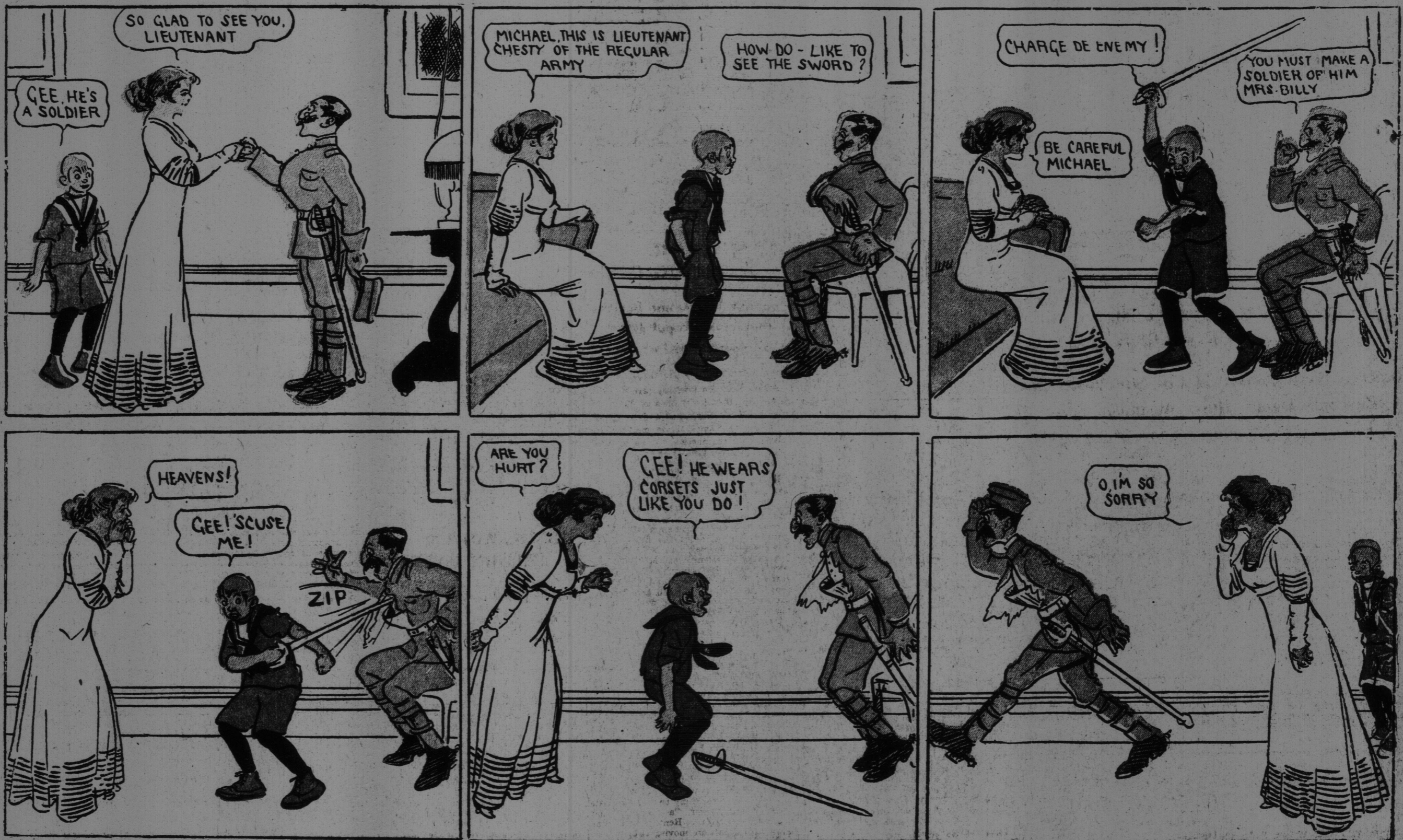

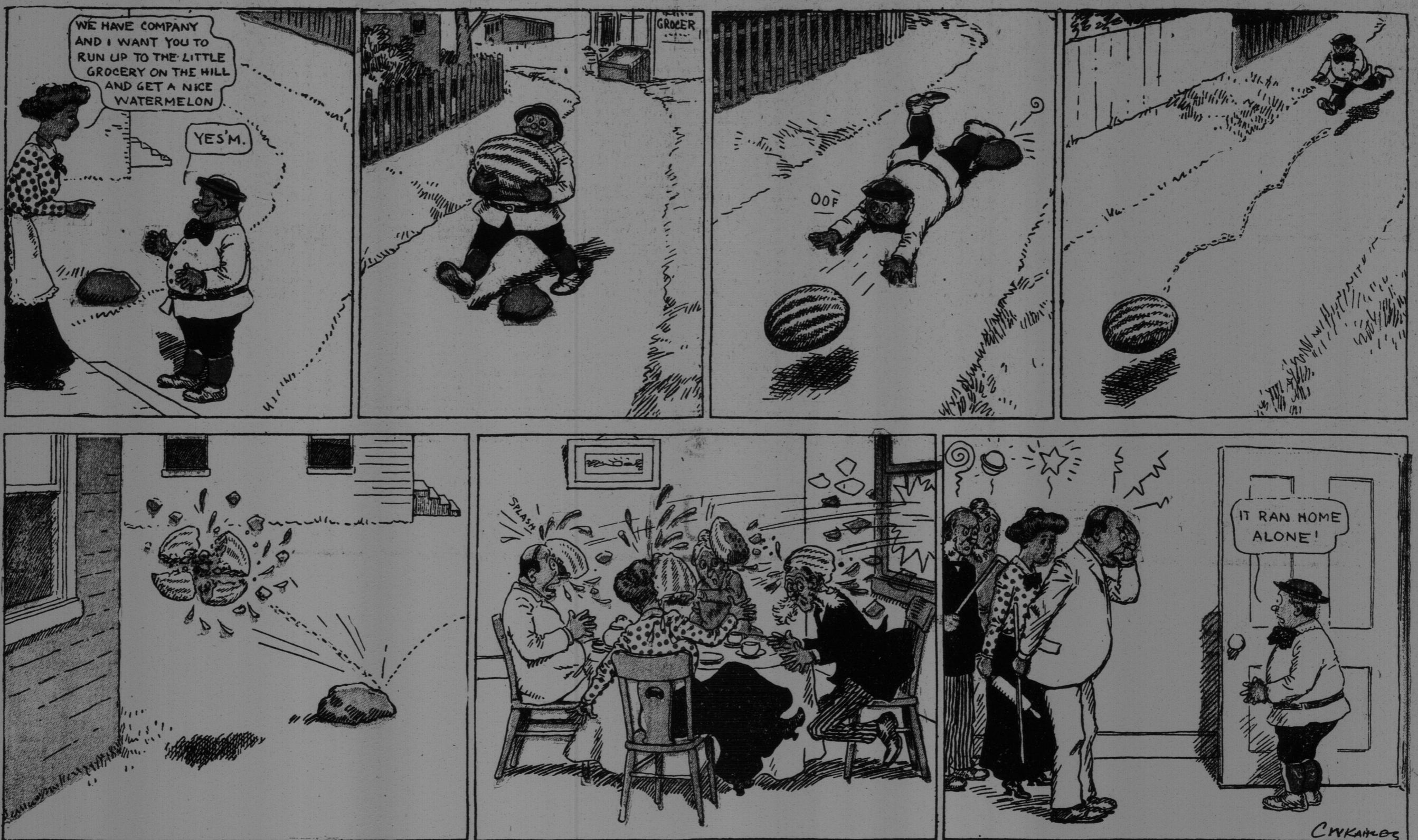

BOSTON-HAVANA SERVICE

The Boston Chamber of Commerce, in announcing the details of the new Boston-Havana direct steamship service, says: "The trade here should be benefited very much by having a direct line, as it is understood that the rates will be higher from Boston than from New York, and the sea to New York, which is now charged at the steamer rate from that point will be saved. The transfer from the railroads to the steamer dock at the port of New York has always been a handicap, and the cause of more or less dissatisfaction."

THE BADDECK IS WRECKED

Petawawa, Ont., Aug. 13.-Shortly after 6 o'clock this evening Baddeck No. 1 was again wrecked out. A breeze sprung up from the west so the drome was left standing on the plain for an hour or more until the wind died down. About 7.15 it was wheeled away to the north-west end of the field. Aviator McCurdy sitting with his back to the slowly setting sun. Soon the word was given and McCurdy started the propeller. Like a bird the drome started off high and fast. "She's too heavy behind," was his exclamation and this was borne out by the position in which the machine was on the ground. The bow was pointed skywards, the propeller broken in two and the rudder torn clear off. The upper plane was bulged in the centre and a great hole was taken in the lower. The large wings escaped without any breakage and will be kept intact while repairs are being made.

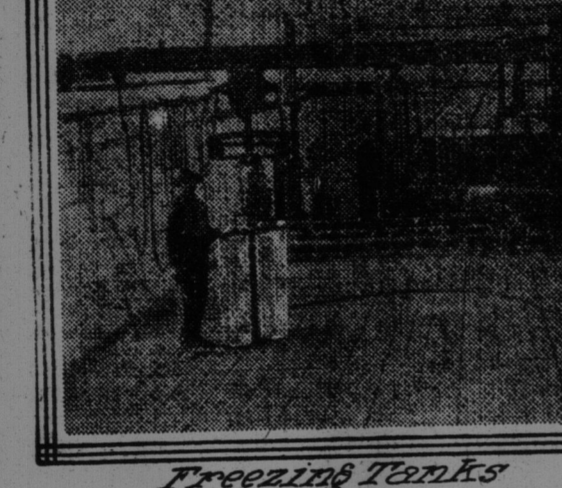


A Huge Plate of Ice

Few American industries have grown as rapidly in recent years as has artificial ice-making and refrigerating in its various phases. In the manufacture of ice articles there have been enormous, while the conditions of the supply and the demand that is always increasing indicates that there is to be an even greater extension.

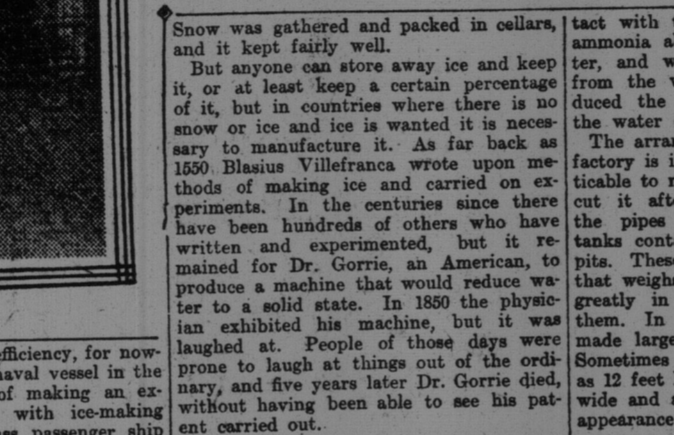
It was but a century ago when the shipping of natural ice became a business, and in Frederick Tudor, of Boston, originated the idea of shipping the natural product from the north to sections of the south, where the chances for harvesting a crop of ice in the winter were slight.

Freezing Tanks

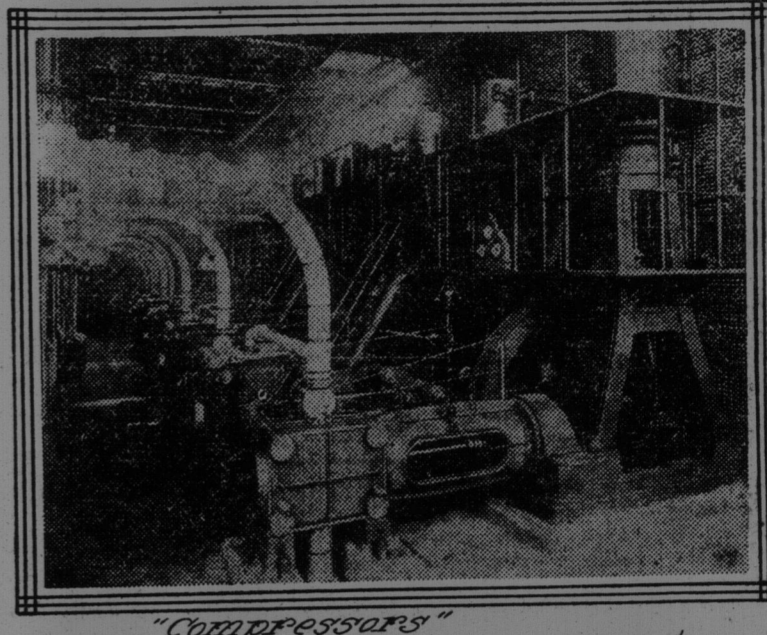


Through New England, and indeed in the Middle Atlantic States, every farmer had his own icehouse, which he filled in winter for his use in summer, and while those who had more than they needed sold it to their less fortunate neighbors the transaction was confined to neighborhoods.

Where Ice Stock is Stored



Snow was gathered and packed in cellars, and it kept fairly well. But anyone can store away ice and keep it, or at least keep a certain percentage of it, but in countries where there is no snow or ice and ice is wanted it is necessary to manufacture it.



Compressors

of ice made are sent into a storage room and packed away, one on top of the other, but between each layer are thin strips of wood. In the ordinary ice-houses sawdust or straw is used, but in the storerooms of the factory this is not necessary, for the temperature of the room is maintained by refrigeration.

There are many interesting stories told of methods used in the introduction of ice in the tropics where the most of the natives never heard of it. It is said that when a plant in a South American country was opened and the natives bought the beautiful crystal blocks to carry them into the interior they were astonished at the lightness of their burden when they reached their destination.
