ASOTIN, Wash., Aug. 5.—Despite the efforts of Sheriff Richards of Asotin county, father of the victim, who had sworn in twenty-five deputies to guard him, William Hamilton, a well-to-do farmer, the self-confessed murderer of little Mabel Richards, was foroibly taken from the Asotin County Jall shortly after midnight and lynched by a mob of over one thousand men, which had been congregating all day yesterday from all parts of Asotin County. The officers and guards were overwhelmed by the mob, and the keys were taken from the jaller. When Hamilton's cell was reached no key could be found and the mob sawed at the bars until the door could be opened, and after fifteen minutes delay the prisoner was dragged out of the cell and down into the yard. Meanwhile another company of masked men kept back the crowd which had filled the streets all night.

Shrinkage of that Amount in Consolidated Lake Superior

"In more than one direction inflated corporations have reached a point where they need reconstruction. The most aggravated case is that of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company, which makes its headquarters in Philadelphia. In a little more than one year's time the actual shrinkage in the market price of the two stock issues of this company has been \$47,-630,000.

"This loss has fallen upon innocent stockholders, who were invelgled into buying through glittering predictions by the officials of the company of the great future which was being worked out for their benefit. The preferred stock in April, 1902, soid at \$80.25 per share, and yesterday it was quoted at \$5, while the common, which was soid at \$35.60 per share, was quoted at \$1. At the high prices, the total valuation of both classes of stocks was \$49,710,000 and the present value only \$2,080,000.

"The original company to develop

"The original company to develop the water power at the "Soo" and establish or cause to be established variablish or cause to be established various manufacturing concerns to use the power, was chartered in 1897, under the laws of Connecticut, as the American Lake Superior Power Company. The capital was increased and the name changed to the Consolidated Lake Superior Company two years ago. The capital is now \$82,000,000 of common, of a par value of \$100, and \$35,000,000 of seven per cent, non-cumulative preferred stock. There is outstanding \$72,286,000 of common and \$27,400,000 of preferred.

"The preferred stock began to pay quarterly dividends of 1 3-4 per cent, on Sept. 15, 1899, and paid them regularly until Sept. 15 of last year. It is evident from present reports of the company's conditions that these dividends were never earned, but, on the contrary, the company was steadily spending moncy for development. The inference is clear that the dividends were merely paid to facilitate the distribution of the stock."

THE CUNARD AGREEMENT.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The agreement between the Admiralty, the Board of Trade, the postmaster-general and the Cunard Steamship Company, dated July 30, is issued in a parliamentary paper this evening. Accompanying the agreement is the draft of a trust deed, securing the debenture stock on which the government's advance of \$13,000,-600 for building the two new steamships is made.

The new mall carrying agreement substitutes for payments by weight; a fixed annual payment of \$340,000 during the life of the contract, which is for 20 years. It provides that the mails shall be carried more speedily than at present. 

NO. 4 WAREHOUSE.

Charles B, Foster of the C. P.
