



The leader took rooms at the Grand Hotel, where he posed as a wealthy South American merchant.

The noise of the explosion awakened the concierge. The burglars fied, only to be arrested by the detectives, who were awaiting them outside. They left behind a complete burglar's outfit, with the latest appliances for safe-smashing, including a powerful steel drill operated by electricity, and a number of dynamite cartridges. Three supposed accomplices, two men and a woman, have since been arrested.

One of the men concerned in the robbery at M. Flammarion's shop was wearing a valuable gold watch set with diamonds. This was stolen two years ago from a jeweler's shop at Montmartre. Half a dozen big Paris burglaries are believed to have been carried out within the last three years by the members of the same organization.

now in the hands of U. S. District Attorney Bufferfield, the existence of a thoroughly organized gang of swindlers has been uncovered and arrests will be made within the next 24 hours in several cities by Federal officials. It was through the arrest and indictment of N. E. Cameron, of Milwaukee, that the existence of the alleged organization was brought to light. Prior to his arrest Mr. Cameron was an ostensible dealer in stocks and bonds and acted as promoter. It is claimed that the operations of Mr. Cameron have netted the organization fully \$50,000, with a probability that the sum may reach \$100,000.

Immediately after signing the confession Cameron accompanied by officels of the U. S. District Attys. office, went to the chamber of Judge Quarles, where the proceedings were held which resulted in Cameron paying a fine of \$1,000 and his being discharged. He was immediately rearrested on a minor charge, and will be held on that charge pending the examination of the cases against his accomplices.

Become a Bridegroom

PARIS, Nov. 20.—Andre Negro, who is under sentence of death in a Paris prison, is, with the permission of the authorities, shortly to become a bride groom. While being tried for burglary he attempted to kill the warder conducting him from the court to the prison van, and for this he was on September 12 last sentenced to death at the Seine Assizes.

He declined to petition the president for a reprieve, but shortly after his sentence applied to be allowed to marry the woman with whom he had been living, Eugenie Bosbocq. She was suspected of having handed him the knife with which he tried to kill the warder. The marriage is to take place in a few days.

It is stated that Negro, while in prison, has received a number of letters couched in very warm terms from another woman, who says that she admires his boldness in trying to kill the warder. This and his courageous attitude in court had attracted her toward him and she asked him to marry her.


