Diomede, of the Trojan battle fields, had precisely the same cause of protest, but there is no record in Homer that ever, raised the point of order.

Thomas Morrison, "standing over me bellowing like one of the metaphor involved in his political nickname." Roaring Billows"—not to be confounded with bellows.

But Senator Cloran need not have thought of the bulls of Bashan." Capitain Morrison is said to have been animals of high repute. He might have thought of the tempest, and considered that he had been credited with breesey, or perhaps, stormy speeches such as he would be proud to make. There is no contemptuous reflection in the lines of Emerson deschibing the incident of his gathering a delicate shell on the shore, where something like this happened:—

"The bubble of the latest wave, "Press bloom to its enamel gaves

"Greeted its safe escape to me."

Or Mr. Cloran might have thought of that useful piece of machinery found in the blacksmith shop, whereby all is gathered in a large leather receiver which, being contracted, drives forth the blast to stimulate the flames and produce fervent and melting heat. Such bellows in a figure of speech would worthly apply to a senator who desires to soften the iron hearts about him.

But no such extenuations are now possible. The speaker has ruled out the bellows, taking the wind out of them as it were, and Senator Power has withdrawn them.

MR. BORDEN IS RIGHT.

A few sentences in Mr. Borden's speech on the nay bill sets forth the situation as it ought to be. The bill is the government programme. Mr. Borden's declaration is the loyal and popular programme. Loyalty by order-incouncil is not the loyalty of the people of Canada. They do not desire authority from a cabinet to be with the Empire in time of war. Who in Canada wants a cruiser, whose commander has to wait for official permission before he can assist a British ship attacked by an enemy in time of war? Even if we have only a "tin pot" navy, it should be British. There may be many fleets or squadrons, but there can be only one navy in an Empire that is to remain whole. The British Empire is not a loose group of allies, any of which may be neutral in time of war, which is to say it may give its moral support to the enemy. It is one state, one its moral support to the enemy.
