

ARTHUR MEIGHEN ANOTHER SIR JOHN A. MACDONALD

ROUSING OVATIONS GIVEN GOVERNMENT CANDIDATES AT TWO MONSTER CITY RALLIES

Hon. Dr. Baxter and Colonel Murray MacLaren Stir Electors to Highest Pitch of Enthusiasm — Tumultuous Cheering Greets Dr. Baxter's Announcement That Medical Unit for New Brunswick Was to be Established Here—Fallacy of Globe's Statement Again Brought Out—Honest Policies of An Honest Government Able Discussed by Both Speakers.

Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, Minister of Customs and Excise, and Colonel Murray MacLaren, received rousing ovations at the two Conservative rallies held yesterday evening in the Opera House and Palace Theatre which in attendance surpassed any political gatherings held in recent years in St. John. At the meeting in the Opera House, which started at nine o'clock, every seat in the theatre was occupied, and time after time the vast throng of electors grew more and more enthusiastic in their outbursts of applause as the speakers scored point after point. Last night's demonstration indicated the sweeping over New Brunswick, and the Dominion of Canada, in support of the Meighen Government.

Hon. Dr. Baxter delivered a forcible and eloquent speech at each meeting, and when the Minister of Customs and Excise made the announcement of the receipt of a telegram from the Minister of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, declaring that the establishment of a medical unit in New Brunswick had been authorized, and the personnel was being appointed, tumultuous cheering followed for several minutes. This is one of the numerous benefits for which Hon. Dr. Baxter has been responsible, and this matter was taken up by him recently in the interests of the returned soldiers, with the intimate assistance of his running mate, Dr. Murray MacLaren.

Bachelors Number Ten Thousand in City of Montreal Liable to \$10 Celibate Tax if Above the Age of Twenty- Five Years.

Montreal, Dec. 2.—Ten thousand notices are being distributed throughout the city informing bachelors that they are liable to the \$10 celibate tax if above the age of 25 years. Minister of Soldiers' Re-establishment Fights for Welfare of His Former Comrades.

Captain Robert James Manion, M.C., M.D., G.M., Trinity College, L.R.C.P., L.R.C.S., Edinburgh, L.R.C.P., and R., Glasgow, Fort William and Harrier, Barr., Dalrymple, Dalrymple, Nov. 19, 1881, son of Patrick Manion and wife Mary O'Brien, both Irish-Canadians. ONE HUNDRED TWENTY SEATS CLAIMED FOR RT. HON. ARTHUR MEIGHEN, CANADA'S PREMIER

Little Short of Landslide Against King and Crerar in Past Ten Days—Mendacious Campaign of King Reacts on Liberal Party—His Pussyfooting and Evasions Have Been Disgusting to the Public Which Has Turned to Premier Meighen Whom They Trust—Quebec Breaks from Liberals and West Repudiates Crerar—"Old Bleu" Party Rallying to Meighen as It Rallied to Cartier and MacDonald.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 2.—At the close of one of the most spectacular campaigns in the history of Canadian politics, the National Liberal and Conservative Headquarters tonight rested its case with a declaration of confidence in the result. As many as one hundred and twenty seats are claimed for Mr. Meighen, some of the shrewdest observers in the Capital going so far as to declare that the combined King-Wood-Crerar forces will not muster fifty seats out of one hundred and thirty-nine that lie west of the Ottawa River. The past ten days, indeed, has witnessed what has been little short of a landslide against King and Crerar in Ontario. Women, returned soldiers and labor, remembering King's war record and disgusted with his pussyfooting and evasions, have turned against him in solid masses; while the collapse of the Farmers' Co-operative Company, following upon the heels of the disaster to the Farmer movement in North Dakota, has shaken the ranks of politico-economic agrarians throughout the whole of the Dominion. Two months ago Mr. J. Morrison, United Farmer organizer, claimed 40 Ontario seats. Two weeks ago Mr. Crerar whitened this down to 30, but today, following Mr. Meighen's brilliant tour of the Province, Farmer leaders are admitting, privately, that they are not sure of more than 10 seats out of 82.

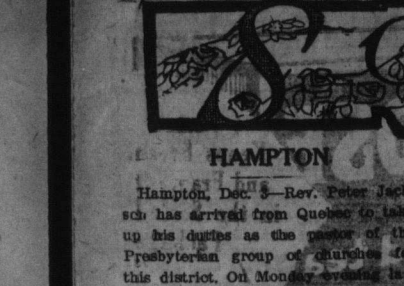

RADICALS HELD HUGE MEETING IN NEW YORK

Speakers Demanded New Trial for Convicted Anarchists, Sacco and Vanzetti.

New York, Nov. 29.—Communists, anarchists and Socialists of all shades of radical belief banded together under the call of the Third Internationale for the first time since the war at a great mass meeting last night in the Central Opera House, Sixty-seventh street and Third avenue, and demanded that Sacco and Vanzetti be given a new trial in Massachusetts on the charge of murdering a shoe factory paymaster and his guard and stealing \$18,000.

Denouncing American justice and courts, the radical speakers declared their belief that Sacco and Vanzetti were innocent of the crime for which they are sentenced to die, and that they were convicted because of their anarchistic beliefs. "This is the case which has stirred the radicals of all Europe. The cry 'Save Sacco and Vanzetti!' has become the rally slogan of the Internationale throughout the world."

No Arrests Made.

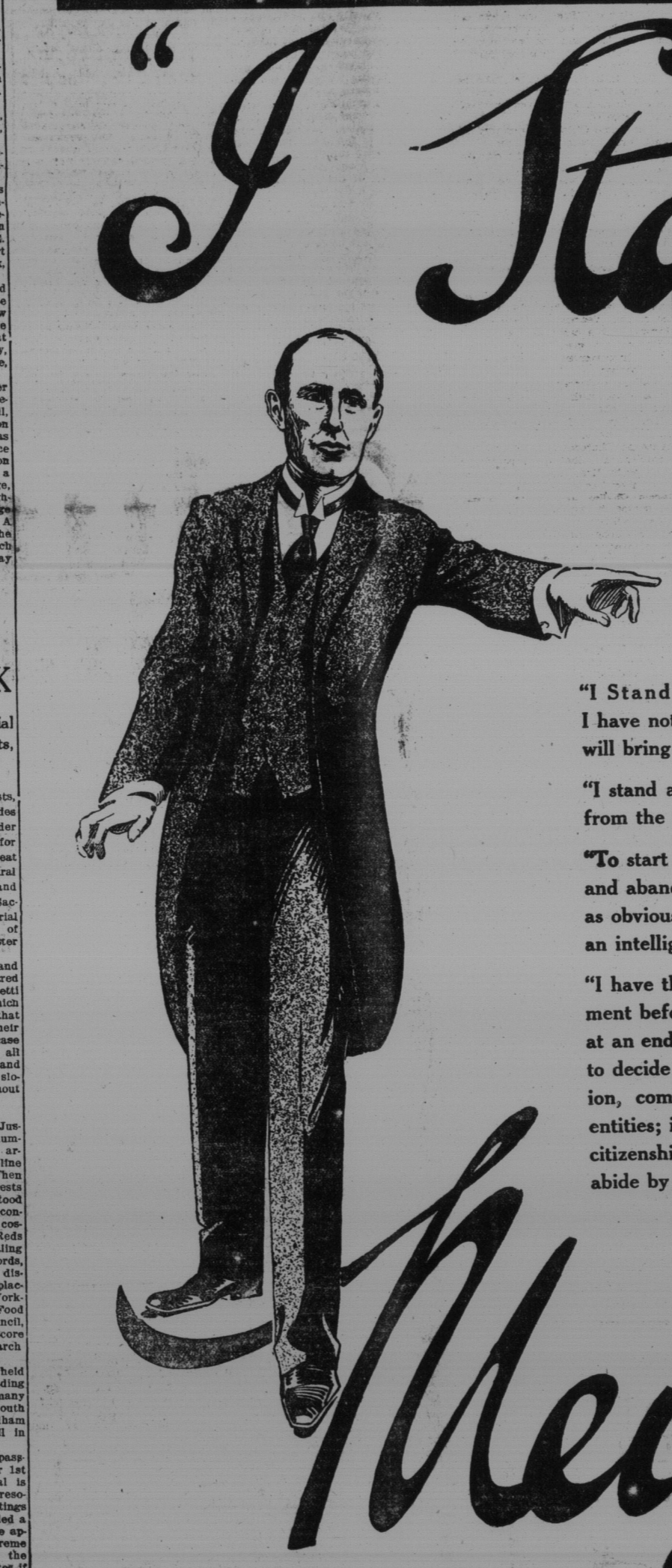
The police and Department of Justice agents were present in large numbers with special instructions to arrest any one who overstepped the line in denouncing the Government. When the meeting had adjourned no arrests had been made, but it was understood some of the statements would be considered by officials today. Girls in costume sold flowers. Tasty luscious Reds peddled all kinds of pamphlets dealing with the case; buttons with the words, "Save Sacco and Vanzetti," were distributed by the thousands. Big placards were carried in the Hotel Workers' Union, the Amalgamated Food Workers, the United Labor Council, the United Shoe Workers and a score of other unions, some of whom marched to the meeting in a body.

Similar demonstrations were held last night in about a score of leading American cities and probably as many more big cities in Europe and South America. Sacco is in jail in Dedham and Vanzetti in the Federal jail in Charlestown, Mass.

The sentence of death is to be passed on the two men on December 1st unless the appeal for a new trial is granted before that date. The resolutions adopted in all mass meetings in all countries last night demanded a new trial. If denied the plea, the appeal is to be taken to the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, then to the Supreme Court of the United States if a way can be found. Large sums have been raised by the defence committees. Contributions and subscriptions were taken last night in the New York
