# - FACULTY OF INSTRUCTION. 

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## HISTORICAL SKETCH.

Acadia College was founded by the N. S. Falucation Society in 1838. In the following year application was made to the N. S. House of Assembly for a Charter of Ineorporation with the, title: The Trusters, Governors and Fellows of the Queen's College." An Aet ereating such a corporation with the powers of a University was passed in/1840. At the next meeting of the Legislature, this, Act was amended by chrnging the name to Aendin Colloge.

In 1851 the power of appointing the Governors was transferred from tha N. S. Falucation Society to the Baptist Convention of the Mafitime Provinces. The developments of succeeding years made it negessary that various amendments to the original Charter should be obtained. In order to avoid confusion and bring the Aet of Incorporation into more complete harmony with existing conditions, a general revision and consolidation of the different Acts relating to the College was proposed by the Board of Governors. The Report of the Committee of the Board, having been adopted by the Governors, was refurred to the Convention. That body at its meeting in Yarmouth, in August, 1891, after suggenting some modifications, approved the Report and instructed the Governors to apply to the Parliament of Nova Scotia for the necessary legislation. Accordingly a bill embodying the proposed alterations was passed by the two Houses at the Session of 1891, and received the signature of the Lieutenant Governor on the 19th of May in the same year: A copy of the Revised Charter is appended.

## An Act respecting Acadia University.

## Passed May 19, 1891.

## De it cnacted by the Gomerpor, Council, and Asermbly as follorrs :-

1. The persons now holding the offices of prosident and governors rospectively of Acadia College, and their suceossors in offiee, and six additional governoms and their succossors in office, shall be designated the Board of Governbrs, and they are hereby constituted a body corporate under the name of the Governors of Acalia University, with perpetual succession and a common seal, with power to broak, alter and change the same at plonsure, and by that name may sue and be sued, implead and be implesded, and be able and capable in law ta take, purchase and hold any personal property wliatnoever; and shall also be able and capable to take, purchase and hold to them

* and their sucoestors not only all such lands, buildings, heroditaments and premises as may from time to time be, used of ecoupied for the purposes of the said university, and of Horton Collegiate Academy and Acalia Seminary, and of any other preparatory or academical or other department and for rosidences of the prosident, profossors, principals, tutors, stuclents and officers of said university, academy and seminary, but alno any other lands, buildings, herodtaments and promisos, provided such lands, buildings, heroditamonts and premises shall not exceot in value eight hundrod thousand dollarn, any law or statute to the contrary notwithstanyling; and to nocept, on behalf of said university or any departments thereof, anf́ on behalf of said academy ahd seminary, and of any other proparatory or academical or other department, any gifts, devines or hequests of any property roal or personal and to assume and execute any trust which may acoompany such devises, gifts or bequents ; and they and their snecessors shall be able and capable in faw to grant, demise, alien, lease or otherwise dispose of all or any of the property, real or personal, at any time belonging to said university, and to invent the proceeds thereof upon such securitios or in such way as shall seem best to said Board of Governors and also to do ath othor matters and things incidental or appertaining to such body corporate.

2( All the real and personal property, rights, casementa, privileges and immunities of every nature or kind whatsoever, which are now held, occupied andsenjoyed by the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, or by any person in trust for them or in their behalf, are by this act vested in the corporation herely constituted, subject to all trusts attaching thereto respectively, and all leases and contrncts made by or with the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be dealt with in all respects an if the same had been made by and with the corporation hereby created, and all debte,
rents, interest and moneys due to the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be henceforth payable to and recoverable by the corporation hereby created, and all covenants, contracts and agreements made with or entered into by the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken in all courts of law and equity to have been made with and entered into by the corporation hereby created; and the president, professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and agents of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the president, professors, tutors, teachers, students, officers and agents of said university, and all tenants of the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be the tenants of the corporation hereby created, and the graduates of Acadia College, shall be deemed and taken to be graduates of said university and entitled to the rights and privileges as such, and all academical honors and degrees, and all rights, powers, privileges and authorities now had, held or exercised by any person by virtue of the acts hereby repealed except so far as they may be necessarily taken away, altered, abridged or affected by or in consequence of this act, shall be had, held and exercised in relation to the said university as fully as they now are had, held or exercised.
3. The said governors of Acadia University shall be entitled to receive and hold gifts, devises and bequests already made or hereafter coming into effect by any person or persons, to or for the benefit of Acadia College, Horton Collogiate Academy and Acadia Seminary, or any or either of them, or to or for the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College as fully and effectually as if the said corporation or university was named in such gifts, devises or bequests instead of Acadia College, Horton Collegiate Academy, Acadia Seminary, the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College or any or either of them, subject however to all the trusts in such gifts, devises and bequests provided, and shall have power and authority to sue for and recover all damages arising from any cause which the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College would have been entitled to recover but for the passing of this act; and all debts, damages or demands due or accruing or arising upon any bond, covenant, contract or agreement made to or with the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, and all persons shall have the power, any statute to the contrary notwithstanding, at any time to grant, devise, bequaath or convey by deed, will or otherwise, any real or personal property to the corporation hereby created, either for the purpos of the university generally or any department thereof, now flereafter to be established, or for Horton Collegiate Academy or Acnofa Seminary, or any other preparatory or academical or other department, or otherwise as may be provided by such grant, devise, bequest or conveyance.

4. All legal or other proceedings heretofore taken by or against the trustees, governors and fellows of Acadia College, may be continued under the same name or style of cause in which they have been instituted.
5. The Board of Governors may establish and manage professional and technical and other schools, and may support the same out of the funds of the university.
6. The Board of Governors shall have the power to grant degrees in theology and degrees of bachelor, master and doctor in the several arts, sciences and faculties, and any and all degrees which may properly be conferred by a university, and shall have the right to determine the courses of study, and the qualification for degrees and the granting of the same.
7. The Board of Governors shall have full power and authority to fix the number, residence, duties, salary, provision and emolument of the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may also appoint the president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and may from time to time remove the said president, professors, principals, teachers, tutors, instructors, officers, agents and servants, including those who at the passing of this act held any of said offices or positions under the acts hereby repealed.
8. The Board of Governors shall have the control and management of the property and funds of the said corporation and shall have power to adopt and carry into effect by-laws, resolutions and regulations touching and concerning the instruction, care, government and discipline of the students of said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department, and touching and concerning all other matters and things of every nature and kind within the scope of this act which to them may seem good, fit and useful for the well ordering and advancement of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or acaulemical or other department, provided the same be not repugnant to the provisions of this act or any law in force in this province, and they may from time to time alter, vary or rescind the same.
9. It shall be the duty of the Board of Governor to keep proper records and minutes of all their proceedings and to keep proper books of account of the financial affairs of the said university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or
other department, and to present a report of the work of the university, academy and seminary, and any other preparatory or academical or other department accompanied by a duly audited financial statement to each annual meeting of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces.
10. The persons now holding the offices of president and governors, respectively, of Acadia. College, and their successors shall exercise the powers and carry into effect the provisions of this act until the appointment by the said convention of the six additional governors of the said university herein provided for, after which the management and administration of said university shall devolve upon the president thereof for the time being, who shall be ex officio a governor thereof, the eighteen persons now holding the office of governors of Acadia College and six additional governors. Those now holding the office of governors of Acadia College shall be entitled to continue governors of Acadia University for the respective periods of their appointment, subject to the rules and regulationso of said convention, and their successors in office and the said six additional governors and their successors shall be appointed by said convention at such time and for such periods, and subject to such rules and regulations touching their appointment and removal as shall from time to time be aglopted by said convention.
11. Seven governors or such larger number as the board may fix shall constitute a quorum of the board, and all questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present at the meeting of the board.
12. The Board of Governors shall appoint a body to be known as the Senate, to consist of the president of the university and of such other persons not being governors as the said board shall appoint, whose duty it shall be to advise the beard from time to time upon all matters concerning the system and course of education pursued in said university academy and seminary, and the examination of all departments thereof, and concerning the courses of study and the qualification for degrees and the granting of the same, and concerning the establishment of additional branches of instruction, and the appointment of the professors, and generally concerning all matters relating to the literary welfare of said university, academy and seminary, which shall from time to time be committed to said Senate for their advice and recommendation or action, who shall report to said board at such times as. may be determined by the board. 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hereafter appointed governors of said university, shall be members of the Senate under this act for the, unexpired portion of the time for which they were respectively appointed. The Associated Alumni of said university shall have the right to nominate one-third of the members of such Senate.
13. The Board of Governors may appoint the members of the Senate for such period as they shall deem best and may remove them on account of non-residence within the bounds of said Convention, non-attendance at meetings of the Senate or for any other cause which they shall deem sufficient.
14. The proprietors of scholarships of Acadin College shall henceforth be deemed and taken to be proprietors of scholarship of Acadia University, with the same rights and privileges and subject to the same conditions as were attached thereto previous to the time of the passing of this act.
15. All acts and parts of acts of this Legislature in so far as they are inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

## Matriculation.

The regular examinations for admission to the Freshman Class will take place on Tuesday, October 2, beginning at $9 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{M}$.

Candidates for Matriculation will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :
1.-Latin. Cæsar, Gallic War, Book I., or Books II. and III. ; Vergil's Aneid, Book I.; Cicero, two Orations against Catiline, or the Manilian Law; Latin Grammar (Harkness' is preferred); Smith's Principin Latina, Part IV : Exs. 1-25, or the equivalent.

II --(a)-Greek. Dr. Smith's Initia Green, Part I.; Xenophon, Anabasis, Book I., or Book IV.; Greek Grammar, (Hadley's or Goodwin's is preferred.) or
(b)-French. Grammar as in Otto's French Grammar.

A thorough knowledge of the conjugations is especially insisted on. Translation, LaBelle Nivernaise, (Daudet), or an equivalent.
III.-Mathematics. Árithmetic ; Algebra to the end of Quadratic Equations ; Geometry, as in Hamblin Smith, Books I.-IV. (inclusive), or the equivalent thereof.
IV.-English. Grammar ; Writing from Dictation ; a short Coinposition upona subject drawn from one of the following works: Shakespeare's Julius Cesar or Merchant of Venice ; Longfellow's Evangeline; Macaulay's Lays of Ancient Rome ; Scott's Lay of the Last Minstrel. The composition must be exact in expression, in division into paragraphs, and in punctuation and spelling.

Graduates of Horton Collegiate Academy, of the St. Martin's Seminary, and of approved High Schools may be admitted without examination, upon presentation of certificates that they have completed the prescribed studies and passed satisfactory examimations thereon.

The holder of a certificate or license required of teachers of the first class in any of the Provinces of Canada will be exempted from examination in English, History, Geography, and Mathematics.

Students desiring to enter upon the full Course or to take general studies should report themselves to the President for registration on the day before the opening of the College. A fee of one dollar is charged for registration, and an additional foe of one dollar for matriculation.

Applicants for admission must be sixteen years of age and must present a certificate of good moral charaeter.

## COURSES OF INSTRUCTION.

## COURSES OF STUDY FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF ARTS.

The subjects of the Undergraduate Course form a system of preseribed and elective study. The subjects of the first two years have been selected madinly for their disciplinary value, and, with the exception that a choice is offered between Greek and F̂rench, are strictly prescribed. In the last two years the element of personal choice is more freely introduced, the prescribed studies occupying in the Junior year six of the fifteen hours of instruction each week, and in the Senior year four of the thirteeen hours.

In addition to the regular class instruction Honor Courses have been arranged for the advantage of students who may be able to do more than the ordinary assignments of their classes. These are open to the election of any undergraduate of first-class standing. The value of the work performed in these studies will be determined by examinations, and Honor Certificates of the first or second class will be given according to the results of these examinations.

Students cannot be admitted to the Honor courses if regular examinations are overdue. Any undergraduate, even though not having first-class standing, may, by vote of the Faculty, be permitted to give special attention to a particular study. Such student, and also one whose standing may have required his discontinuance of Honor studies, shall be entitled to a certificate of the work done.

## GENERAL STUDENTS.

The studies of the College are arranged with reference to the wants of students who intend to take the full course. Provision is also made to accomodate all who may wish to study for a short period in any department, if, after examination, they are found to be prepared to work with the regular classes. General students, on leaving the College, can have certificates of proficiency according to their attainments.

## EXAMINATIONS AND STANDING.

At the end of each Session all the Classes will be examined on the studies of the Session. These examinations will be conducted for the most part by written papers ; but oral examinations will be introduced at the discretion of the Faculty. The results of these examinations will be combined with the record of the daily exercises to determine the standing of the student. An average of 75 per cent. of the maximum must be made to admit a student to first-class standing. In addition to these regular examinations the Faculty may, at their discretion, require special examination of any class or member of a class upon any subject included in the course of study.

Supplementary examinations will be held at the opening of each College Year on a day named in the Caleudar. Any student who, at the close of these examinations, shall be deficient in more than one of the subjects of the previous part of his Course will not be permitted to enter upon the studies of the year.

In order to maintain standing, a student must make 45 per cent. in each subject taken, both in term work and examinations. Absence from class appointments will affeet the students standing.

At the close of each Session the standing of each student will be reported to his parent or guardian, if desired.

## COURSE OF STUDY FOR THE DEGREE OF II. A.

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The Degree of Master of Arts will be granted aceording to the following regulations passed by the Senate at its meeting in June, 1892 :

1. That the M. A. Degree be given only after the candidate has passed a satisfactory test in a prescribed cousse of study.
2. That such course of study be equivalent to a full year's course of advanced study ; i. e., something more in quantity and higher in quality than the requirements of the Senior year.
3. That the assignments be armanged so as to secure $a$ large aequaintance with some one subject, rather than a slight acquaintance with several.
4. That the mamer of testing be, by writton examinations, by the presentation of a thesis on some assigned subject, and by the preparation of a critique or review of some author included in the course selected.
5. That the thesis and critique be placed in the hands of the President on or before the first day of April, and the returns from the last examinations be in his hands befors, the tenth day of Ma, of the year in which the Degree is ode be conferred.

A full Course is required for this Degree ; but the applicant is at liberty to choose any two half Courses.

The times for Rxaminations on these studies will be determined by the Professor under whose direction the Course is taken.

These fees must be paid before the meeting of the Senate for granting the Honors and Degrees.

If a student is excused from a regular examination, he may have a special examination, for which a fee of two dollars for each subject will be charged.

## GENERAL REMARKS.

The financial year of the the University dates from the first of August.

The Academic year of the University opens on the Wednesday nearest the first of October and ends on the first Wednesday in Jume.

In April of each year occurs an Elocutionary Reeital, in which all the members of the Sophomore Class take part. A record is kept to indicate the excellence of the respective members of the class in this exercise.

The Junior Exhibition is held in December, at which time orations prepared by members of the Class are delivered in a public assembly.

On the first Wednesday in June the anniversary of the College is commemorated, at which time the ceremonies connected with the graduation of students and the conferring of degrees, are observed by the Authorities of the University.
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## LIBRARY.

The College Library contains a valuable collection of books especially selected for the use of students. Books can be taken from the Library-room subject to proper regulations. The Library is also open at convenient times under the supervision of the Librarian for consulting works of reference. The leading Canadian, American and English periodicals are kept in the Library for the use of students.

The Library receives donations both of money and of books; additions are also made to it by means of the annual income of the DeWolfe Library Fund.

## SOCIETIES, \&c.

Acadia Athenfeum. - The object of this Society is the improvement of the students in debate and public speaking. The laws and regulations of the Society are subject to the approval of the Faculty. Besides its weekly meetings arrangements are made for a course of Public Lectures during each College year. The Society has under its control a Reading Room furnished with a selection of newspapers, provincial and foreign, and other periodicals.

College Young Men’s Christian Assoclation.-A branch of this Society has been formed and is in a flourishing condition. At present there aqre about ninety members. Addresses are delivered monthly before this Society by clergymen invited for the purpose.

Acadia Missionary Society.-This Society holds public monthly meetings. Its aim is to cultivate interest in Missionary work, and especially to gain information respecting Christian Missions in foreign lands.

The Propyleum is a Society composed of the young ladies in the Arts course. The meetings are held on Friday afternoon. The exercises consist of studies and discussions on assigned topics. Occasional public entertainments of a social and literary character are Eiven by the Society.

A large and convenient campus gives abundant opportunities for Athletic Games in the spring and autumn. There is also on the University grounds a large and well-equipped Gymnasium. From the first of November to the first of April, the students have regular gymnastic drill under the Director of the Gymnasium. Experience has shown that this practice is highly conducive to the health of the student. In May of each year a public field day is held under the auspices of the Acadia Amateur Athletic Association.

Prayer Meetings, conducted by the students, are regularly held on Lord's Day morning and on Wednesday evening throughout the College year. These religious meetings have been maintained ever since the founding of the College.

Special classes are formed for the study of the Bible on the Sabbath and at other times. All students are required to be present at morning prayers, and also to attend public worship regularly on the Sabbath. Parents and guardians are requested to give instructions as to the place of worship which they wish the students under their care to attend. Religious services are held every Sabbath in the townin connection with the Baptists, Church of England, Methodists, and Presbyterians.

Special rules concerning conduct and good order will be announced from time to time, as circumstances may require. It is assumed that students are in attendance for the purpose of intellectual and moral improvement, and that they will readily comply with all regulations that, in the judgment of the Faculty, are helpful in the accomplishment of this object. Inattention to study, or misbehaviour of any kind, will subject the offender to reproof or suspension, at the discretion of the Faculty.

## CURRENT EXPENSES.

Students occupying rooms in Chipman Hall are charged $\$ 2.60$ per week for board. If two students occupy a room, the rent will vary from $\$ 6$ to $\$ 18$ per year, according to the location of the room. Board and lodgings can be obtained in approved places in the town at reasonable rates.

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## 1.-SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE ENDOWV- <br> MENT FUND.

The Governors hold a few Scholarships, which can be assigned to needy and deserving students subject to the following regulation :
"The Scholarships owned by the University shall not be granted for a longer period than one year, and only on a written application to the Scholarship Committee, through the President, before the 5th of November in each year."

A certificate from a Scholarship-holder, accompanied by satisfactory evidence that such Scholarship-holder is legally qualified to grant the use of the Scholarship, may be presented to the President, to be forwarded to the Committee on Scholarships ; and if such certificate is satisfactory, the student presenting the same will be credited with the proper sum on account of the Scholarship. All certificates from Scholarship-holders granting to students the privileges of Scholarships, must be in the hands of the President of the University before the 5 th of November of each year.

## II.-THE DEWOLFE SCHOLARSHIPS.

There are tive of these Scholarships,-one of the value of $\$ 25.00$ a year, two of $\$ 30.00$, one of $\$ 40.00$, and one of $\$ 50.00$. The nomination to these Scholarships, which by the terms of the bequest can be granted ouly to male students, will be determined by the Senate, according to the class-standing, needs and general conduct of applicants.

## III.-MINISTERIAL, EDUCATION FUND.

Students who have the Christian Ministry in view, and are approved by the churches of which they are members, may, in case assistance is needed, receive an annual appropriation from the Board of Ministerial Education.
