

## Larm and Household POINTS IN THE FEEDING OF STEERS.

In the matter of feeding steers last winter at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, some information of great value to the farmers was brought out. Three sets of steers were put up to fatten. The ration of one lot was composed of bay, roots and meal. The ration of the second lot was made up of coin ensilage and meal; in the third lot. the ration was a mixture of hay, took it according to directions and roots corn, ensilage and meal. The meal, cost 19 cents each per day cost 11 6 cents per day. Those upon the mixture of hay, roots, corn ensilage and meal cost 15.6 cents each per day. The steers which were fed upon coin ensilage and meal gained over 30 pounds each more than the others, and the cost per head was only 11 cents per day against 19 cents as the cost of those that fed upon hay, roots and mea'.
