To the Editor of the Advocate.

Sir:—From the expressions of opinion on this question which we read daily in the newspapers it seems that few have studied the judgments delivered by the Privy Council and without doing so it is impossible to discuss the question intelligently.

The Privy Council while affirming the validity of the act known as the Public Schools Act, decided that the act did not prejudicially affect any right or privilege which Roman Catholic's had by law or practice at the union, that the act referred to was effectual in repealing the acts estable.


