NEWCASTLE'S RAPID STRIDES ELICIT FAVORABLE COMMENT.

Town Has Advantages Possessed By
Like Towns.

NOW SPARKLES IN ITS UP-TO-DATENESS.

Many Improvements Made Here During The Past
Year or Two.

While other towns are boasting of their progress it might be well to point out some of the strides made by Newcastle during the past year or two. There is probably not a town of a like size in Canada which can boast of the modern advantages which Newcastle possesses. The town has become almost as thoroughly modernized as pretentious cities and sparkles in its up-to-dateness.

To begin with Newcastle has water and sewerage and electric light systems equal to any in the country and superior to the majority. Its abundant flow of excellent water and its well lighted streets, stores and dwellings elicit very favorable comment from all visitors. During the past season, Newcastle's energetic Council undertook the work of laying permanent sidewalks. Granolithic was the material selected and the principal business street of the town is now able to boast of a sidewalk equal to any in the country. The work will likely be resumed next season and in time all the principal streets of the town will be able to boast of excellent walks. Besides one or two of the principal roadways have been macadamized and put in excellent shape for driving purposes.

Several months ago a substantial Opera House was completed by an energetic lodge of Orangemen. The building and its equipment have since been pronounced by visiting theatrical men as superior to any in the Lower Provinces outside of St. John and Halifax. The stage is large and well equipped with excellent scenery and mechanical appliances which go to make an attractive effect.

There is now nearing completion a hotel building which is generally regarded as superior to any in the province outside of St. John. It is a four story structure and many of its rooms contain private bath while all are fitted with telephones. This fine institution will probably have an auspicious

LOGGIE'S VICTORY SURPRISED MANY

Liberals In This County Score Once
More After Years of Defeat.

RAILWAY TRANSFER DID IT

Mr. Robinson: Not Discouraged—
Mr. Crockett's Victory In York.

For the first time in a dozen years the liberal-conservative party of the County of Northumberland has faced defeat. Mr. James Robinson, the candidate of that party, the hero of three successful campaigns is compelled to record one unsuccessful one. He was defeated here on Thursday, last by the liberal candidate, Mr. W. S. Loggie, whose majority was 281.

It was a fair fight and the most powerful influences won. Chatham, the home town of Mr. Loggie, gave him a substantial majority although one not as great as his supporters expected. The down river parishes also naturally gave Mr. Loggie a majority.

The chief canvass used against Mr. Robinson was the purchase by the government of the Canada Eastern Railway and the employment of men on that road for a few years before election. Although Mr. Robinson was largely instrumental in consummating the deal his efforts were not recognized and the vote of Nelson, Blackville, Ludlow and Blissfield—the principal parishes along the line of the Canada Eastern—seemed to ignore the efforts of Mr. Robinson and to give the credit of the transfer entirely to the government.

Mr. Robinson has been defeated after waging a gallant fight on behalf of the Conservative interests for the past ten years and he will doubtless be heard from when another election comes around. In the meantime it is up to Mr. Loggie to do something.

Perhaps one of the greatest surprises of the campaign was the victory of Mr. Crockett in York. Mr. Crockett had every possible influence that could possibly be brought to bear to bring about his defeat, notwithstanding he secured a substantial majority over the hitherto invincible Mr. Gibson.

He assured all that he would do his best to merit the confidence placed in him. He was indeed glad that the grand old county had been redeemed from the Conservatives to the government though it was to the best interests of the Miramichi.

He did not think it necessary to make a political speech as the issues were well threshed out during the election campaign. He again thanked the electors and trusted that he would merit a continuance of that confidence placed in him—Applause.

Mr. Robinson then took the platform. He thanked all his friends for the noble manner in which they had worked for him and although he had been defeated he would take his defeat as a man. During his political life he had been very successful in the seven campaigns in which he had run this was his first defeat, but he took it kindly and felt sure it was better so now he would have time to devote to his private business.

He trusted that Mr. Loggie would be able to carry out the policy laid down by him on Nomination Day. No doubt the Canada (Continued on page 8)

POTATO BLIGHT AND ROT.

Reports from many districts indicate that potato blight and rot are again this season causing serious loss to the farmers of Canada. This disease has been quite prevalent in many parts of Ontario and Quebec, and although a good preventive is known in Bordeaux mixture few growers seem to have sprayed their potatoes.

which is caused by the leaf tissues drying up where the spores have been feeding on them and causing dark brown spots. It is from this stage of fungus infection that the blight begins to appear, and the spores are carried rapidly by the wind and alight on the foliage. They are also washed below the surface of the ground and reach the young tubers, and cause the rot. The potato rot itself is a dry rot, the wet rot comes through decay of the tubers. It is when the tubers begin to rot that the blight begins to appear. This is because the rot has passed through the tubers and the stage when the tubers are rotting is blossoming and producing seed. At this stage the concentration of the plant is as much as which is made by the tubers.

There are two known blights which affect the potato in America the early blight Alternaria Solana and the late blight which causes the rot, Phytophthora Infestans. The early blight causes the spotting of the leaves early in July. These spots increase in size, unite and form large masses of diseased tissue. This blight does not attack the tubers and is not nearly as injurious as the other. If the leaves are punctured by beetles or from some other cause the disease gets a foothold easier.

The late blight is the one which causes by far the greater loss. Both by lessening the crop and by causing rot. According to Mr. W. T. Macoun, Horticulturist of the Central Experimental Farm, this disease passes the winter in the tubers and in the spring when the vines begin to grow it starts to develop, growing up through the tissues of the potato stem. During the latter part of July it produces on the undersides of the leaves myriads of tiny spores, which in the mass have a frost-like appearance. These spores make the rust stage.

without injury from tubers, blights or insects. Experiments conducted by the Vermont Experiment Station proved that over half the crop of potatoes was produced after August 22nd. In the early potato vines are usually done up in a matter that later. The greatest yield of potatoes was obtained after September 1st. Very marked results in spraying with Bordeaux mixture for blight have been obtained in the Vermont Experiment Station. The Vermont Experiment Station has shown an average increase in favor of spraying of 100 bushels of marketable potatoes and in 1902 with eleven varieties the average difference was 120 bushels per acre. With the Empire State variety there was a difference of 100 bushels per acre. In 1902 the vines were sprayed four times, on July 19th, 22nd, 30th, and August 13th the formula used being 6 lbs. Bordeaux, 1 lb. lime, 40 gals. water. While the Colorado beetles were active at the expense of Paris Green were added to each forty gallons of the mixture. The large areas the expense for blight would be in the neighborhood of \$1.00 per acre, and the expense probably not more than \$8. and \$9. Even at \$10 per acre the result of the above experiment for 1902 would show a profit of \$38. per acre.

more potatoes selling at 20 cents a bushel. These results show the importance of spraying their potatoes for the prevention of blight and rot. The work must be thoroughly done. Spraying should be begun by the middle of July and the vines left covered with the mixture until the close of the season.

It is generally recognized that some varieties of potatoes have greater power than others to resist this disease, and it is safer to cultivate only varieties which are susceptible in this respect. All diseased tubers from an infected field should be burned. It is also advisable to avoid using the seed of potatoes from diseased crops, although the tubers appear healthy.

Of Special Interest to Our Readers, Gathered By Our Reporters from Many Sources. Whirl of the Town.

The sale of the Y. M. C. A. furniture will take place on Friday evening.

There will be general surprise and regret over Mr. Robinson's defeat in Northumberland. A victory for him was very generally expected with confidence.

The Chatham World is responsible for the following:—It is whispered, softly whispered by Mr. Tweedie's particular friends, that he is to succeed Governor Snowball at the expiration of the present gubernatorial term.

Honorable Mr. Lemieux, the solicitor general already elected in Nicolet has been elected by acclamation in Gaspe where the polling was fixed for Dec. 5. It is reported that the solicitor general will sit for Nicolet and turn the Gaspe seat over to Mr. Aylworth the new cabinet minister who was defeated in Durham, Ontario.

Supt. Waddell and his assistants are installing a new 125 K. W. generator direct connected to a 250 horse power Ideal engine. With this installation the town will have ample electric power for years and there will now be no such things as blackouts in the service. The new generator is about twice the size of the one now in use. The installation will be completed this week.

Thomas Climo, who, while working on the wall of the new Roman Catholic Cathedral being erected at Chatham, was struck by a barrel which was being hoisted and knocked to the ground a distance of fifty-six feet, on Friday, died Sunday night at the Hotel Dieu hospital. He was thirty years old and leaves a widow who has been an invalid for some months. Deceased was highly esteemed and his sad death has caused much sorrow.

A hat belonging to James Kelly, a stevedore, was found on the Loggieville beach Saturday night and Sunday morning, his body was discovered near the mill wharf shore in about two feet of water. It is said that the unfortunate man was last seen about 1 o'clock the morning after the election when he tried to gain admittance into a house near the wharf, but walked away before the door was opened. It is supposed that on trying to get into a boat he lost his footing, fell into the water and was drowned. He was about 55 years old and leaves a grown up family at Loggieville.

Mr. Emmerson is understood to have left \$5000 behind him when he departed by special train in his palace car after his Masonic Hall speech, and that was only one of the items that helped to swell the Loggie committee's treasury. But all of this cash would not have carried the county for any other candidate than Mr. Loggie. A truly good man like him, sternly refusing to give a drop of liquor or a dime to anyone, and aided by a lot of thoroughly unscrupulous canvassers who stick at nothing to influence a vote and are well supplied with cash, is a mighty hard man to beat in an election. Elections are not won by prayers, but prayers help to win. World.

The Maritime Sulphite Fibre Company Properties have been purchased by the Bank of Montreal by a Massachusetts Company, The Nassau Paper and Pulp Co., formed by George Keyes, a large paper manufacturer, of East Pepperell, Mass. Negotiations for the purchase have been under way for some months. The town of Chatham has done its duty by the purchasers of the mill in granting them exemption from taxation for a number of years. The news of the sale and speedy operation of this pulp mill will be hailed with acclaim, as during the past two months many small lumber operators who during the former operation of the pulp mill made money out of the cutting of pulp wood, have anxiously been enquiring of the possibility of this mill being sold. To these and the woodmen who will receive employment from these operators, this news will be a source of gladness. The starting of the mill certainly means increased prosperity for Northumberland and an era of success for Chatham, which will make up for the years of depression. Supplies such as limestone, etc., have already been ordered and work of fitting up the mill will be started at once.

George Kerr, son of Mr. Wm. Kerr, was found dead in bed, Thursday morning at his father's residence on Chatham Hill. He was 27 years of age, and had been up town in his usual good health, Monday evening. His death is attributed to heart failure.

Rev. J. B. Ganong of Sussex, now Field Secretary for the N. B. Sunday School Association, is expected to visit the Sunday Schools on the North Shore in the near future and will devote ten days to Sunday School work in Northumberland county.

Although his opponent has large and important business interests in the county and was already a member of the legislature, the defeat of Mr. Robinson in Northumberland was a general surprise. St. John Times.

It is doubtful if any locomotive in the world has so many accidents to its credit as No. 239 of the I. C. R. It was while at the throttle of this engine that Driver Trinder went to his death in the collision at Belmont, N. S., about two years ago. It was on the same engine that Driver Billy Wall met his death at Windsor Jct. six months later. In that collision No. 239 seemed to be pretty well demolished but she was hauled out of the wreck and put together. About two months ago she was off the track at Humphreys and was badly damaged. She was again taken to the shops and repaired. Tuesday she made her first trip after coming out of the shops. And what was the result? She collided with a freight at Oxford Junction. Better cut No. 239 out.

Mr. David Bark, a young man about 28 years old, residing four miles above Blackville, was found dead on Monday near Forks siding. The young man started to meet the Fredericton express Saturday evening on which his sister was expected, and it being dark he took a lantern with him. As he did not return home that night or Sunday, a search party started to look for him, and found him dead about 4 o'clock Monday afternoon lying by the railroad fence with the lantern on his arm. The coroner was summoned and an examination showed heart failure to be the cause of death. The deceased leaves a widowed mother, four sisters and one brother. He was highly respected and the family have the heartfelt sympathy of the community. The funeral on Tuesday was largely attended.

The meeting called by the Mitchell Memorial Committee was to have taken place yesterday (Declaration Day) at 3 p. m. A number of County people who were in town waited to attend the meeting but there was an insufficient number present to make it worth while to hold a meeting. This is to be regretted. But as the Advocate pointed out some time ago the direct charge of the affair should be placed in the hands of some live, hustling man who would receive a substantial remuneration for his services. The Advocate does not propose to allow this matter to drop. It will again receive attention.

Rev. W. C. Gaynor, president of New Brunswick Historical Society, has received a parchment representing that he has been elected a corresponding member of the Wisconsin Historical Society. This is a famous organization and one which has done much valuable work. Its most notable achievement is the edition of the Jean Releves, with translations and notes, a set of which is in the Free Public Library St. John. This monumental work with which the name of Rueben Gold Thwaites is associated has brought the society into close association with Canadian historical scholars. Mr. Thwaites was in St. John and at Annapolis and St. Croix at the time of the recent celebration and took a leading part in the celebration. At that time he had associated with Father Gaynor, and the honor done the president of the local historical society has probably grown out of that acquaintance.
