## MANSLAUGHTER THE VERDICT IN THE DR. SAMSON CASE

Judge Sentenced Prisoner to Serve Two Years In Penitentiary—Council and Judge's Address to Jury. MUCH EVIDENCE TAKEN.

**PERCE**, Oct. 22—Several doctors examined today swore that it was quite possible to make the mistake the prisoner made and that the antidote he administered to his wife after the poisoning were the right ones.

Dr. Joseph Arthur Pigeon, of Perce, declares that on the evening of March last, before the coroner's inquest on the body of Clémence Lafontaine, the prisoner, in a state of high excitement with tears streaming down his eyes, spoke to him as follows:

"My dear confrère, I made a terrible mistake. I gave to my wife a teaspoonful of tincture of nuxvomica instead of tincture of colombo which I thought I had given her. Fifteen or twenty minutes after my wife had convulsions, which I took for nervous crisis. As the crisis increased and one convulsion followed another, I came to the conclusion that my poor wife was poisoned. Then I tasted the bottle, a dose out of which I had given my wife. It was very bitter, I saw it was a case of poisoning by strychnine. I immediately consulted my books to see which antidote I should administer. I gave her tannic acid and bromide of potassium. To control the convulsions I made her inhale chloroform. The whole thing produced no effect, as my poor wife died in two hours. That is why, my dear confrère, I would not last night to come and hold an inquest and see if I was guilty or not."

The witness says that the antidotes administered by prisoner to his wife are the best he knows of under the circumstances.

The prisoner also told witnesses before inquest that the fall previous he had some medicine in his other house. The moisture had caused the labels to fall off the bottles. He prepared new labels for them and through mistake labelled a bottle of nuxvomica, tincture of colombo and vice versa. Witness says it is quite possible to make a mistake in these circumstances. According to him, if we take a bottle of tincture of colombo, which is a harmless substance and a similar bottle of nuxvomica, which is a violent poison, both unlabelled, it is practically impossible to know one from the other without opening the bottle.

Dr. Jos. Emile Bernier, Grand Juror is the following witness:  
The tenth of March last, between five and six o'clock in the afternoon, he was summoned to Dr. Samson's house. When he arrived Mrs. Samson was dead. The prisoner asked him if the woman was not in a state of catalepsy. Witness made sure she was dead. Prisoner then suggested to give his dog the same quantity of the same liquid he had given his wife, in order to see if it was poison or not. Prisoner prepared the dose which the witness put in the dog's mouth in half-an-hour the dog was dead.

Dr. Wm. J. Marchal, Port Daniel, examined by Mr. Flynn for the defence declares that he knows both substances, tincture of colombo and tincture of nuxvomica, and it is very easy, even for a doctor, to mistake one of these substances for the other. It is also quite possible, especially for a country doctor, who is not familiar with cases of poisoning to mistake the initial stage of the attack resulting from poisoning by strychnine for nervous crisis, especially if he does not know that strychnine has been administered.

Dr. S. Grenier, of Perce, is called to the stand. He is called to the stand to give his opinion on the evidence, and at 6 p. m. the jury retired to deliberate.

At 9 p. m. the jury rendered a verdict of manslaughter against Dr. Samson, tried for murder. Mr. Flynn presented two motions to quash verdict on technical grounds and asked that the jury be discharged.

JOHN DAY, Ore Oct. 20.—Rodney Williams, aged five, son of Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Williams, who live on a ranch in Fox Valley, is dead and two other children are lying at the point of death from the effects of eating something on the sheep range near the house. The parents think they nibbled poisonous weeds, some of which exist in that part of Grant county and which occasionally caused the death of stock.

The children were in the pasture where a band of sheep were ranging, and it is believed they started to play sheep and imitated the grazing stock.

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### THE COMPULSORY SCHOOL ACT.

The attention of parents and employers is directed to Section 31 of the Compulsory School Act, which reads as follows:—

"No child under the age of fourteen years shall be employed in the city or town by any person to labor in any business whatever during the school hours of any school days unless such child has attended some public school or some approved private school, or has been otherwise instructed by a teacher qualified to instruct in spelling, writing, geography, composition, and arithmetic for at least six months of the twelve months next preceding such employment, and in every year in which such child is employed, and at the time of such employment delivers to the employer a certificate signed by the secretary of the Board, certifying to such attendance, or a certificate signed by the City Superintendent of Schools and that such child has passed a satisfactory examination in grade seven of common school work."

"Any person who employs any child contrary to the provisions of this section shall, on each offence, be liable to a penalty of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty."


