SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 4.— The steamer Gaelic, from Hong Kong, brings news of a serious earthquake which took place in Java Dec. 12. The town of Joana suffered the most. The Chinese quarter was entirely wrecked and the European quarter rendered almost uninabitable. Twelve persons were killed and seventeen injured. All the districts of west and middle Java suffered more or less, some severely.

PERILS OF THE PIT.

Two Coal Mine Disasters in Pennsylvania,

Attended with Terrible Loss of Life-Eighteen Men Believed to Have

Been Drowned.

HAZLETON, Pa., Feb. 5.—A terrible accident, whereby a number of men lost their lives, occurred at Jennsville, yesterday morning, in Slope No. 10, operated by J. C. Hayden & Co. 

A Chinamen's Sharp Game. San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 4.—A scheme SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 4.—A scheme has just come to light whereby a sharp Chinaman has just swindled the United States Government out of some \$30,000 revenue. It is their custom here when goods are imported to take to the appraisers store 10 per cent. of them, from which the total duty is to be calculated. The custom house broker has to file a bond of \$400 for the payment of the duty and the owner is then allowed to take the other nine-tenths to his place of business. On Jan. 1 a Chinaman went through this routine, leaving 10 per cent. of a large shipment of opium with the appraiser. He is now wanted to pay the duty, but cannot be found. As the duty on the full amount of opium he imported will be about \$35,000, and the 10 per cent. left by him is only worth \$3,500, he makes a clear profit of over \$30,000.

Half an Inch of Wire in Her Eye. Hartford, Feb. 4.—A medical specialist of this city had a remarkable case a day or two ago, that of a little Norwichi girl who had been vainly treated by several phy. two ago, that of a little Norwich girl who had been vainly treated by several physicians for a mysterious trouble with one of her eyes. First her parents noticed that she rubbed her eye often, that its lid was slightly inflamed, but several doctors said they could find nothing the matter with it. The Hartford oculist put a powerful microscope over the eye, and saw a small piece of wire protruding a twentieth of an inch out of the iris. He gave the nation tan anosystetic extra with twentieth of an inch out of the iris. He gave the patient an anesthetic, cut an infinitesimal slit under the cornea, and with delicate forceps drew forth the wire, which was half an inch long, and so thin as to be almost invisible. Now the little girl is almost well. The Hartford physician said it was the most remarkable incident of the kind in his long experience, and he had never heard of one before just like it. It is a mystery, he added, how the wire got into the eye, and a marvel that the organ had not been destroyed.

### THE SITUATION.

The Dominion Government has dissolved Parliament a year in advance of the legal period, and a general election has been fixed for March 5 hext.

That the position of the party is critical may be gathered from the tactics pursued by its leaders

The Macdonald Government passed the N. P. high tax law with the avowed object of bringing the United States to its knees suing for reciprocity with Canada. Under one pretense or another, the Government has managed to prevent the policy of high taxation from being decided on its merits. For months past, the friends of the com bines have been concecting a dodge intended to once more humbug and deceive the people. First, hints were thrown out that reciprocity negotiations were in progress and it was represented to the Toronto Mail that the Imperial authorities were pressing the Government to begin the negotiation of a treaty. The Euxpire, which was started with sub scriptions collected from the protected combines, and which is still sustained by the money received from them, thereupon pretended to deny the rumor in this

"The Empire is authorized to give this statement an unqualified denial. Not only is it not true, but, on the contrary, it is learned from the very best sources that the Canadian Government has recently been approached by the United States Government with a view to the development of trade rewith a view to the development of trade re-lations between the two countries, and that our Government has requested the ad-vice of her Majesty's Government on the

This rumor had its intended effect. The story grew, it was elaborated by restricorgans; members of combines friends and patrons at Ottawa being able to "dish" the Liberals by their pretenses, while giving ample assurance that the high tax policy; so far as it favored the combines, would be left un-touched. This view was propounded by Mr. Chaplean at Kingston; it was sustained by Sir John Macdonald at a banquet in To-ronto last week, when he declared, "We are going to stand by our National Policy.'

But the bubble has been pricked. A Rochester Congressman, who has intimate trade relations with Canada, wrote to Mr. Blaine, asking him if the declarations of the Empire and of the Dominion Ministers Mr. Blaine is the chief spirit in the United States Government, and he wrote for it when he replied to that inquiry in this strain:

'I authorize you to contradict the rumors "I authorize you to contradict the rumors you refer to. Government House, Corrawa, Isec. 13, 1890. My Lord,—I have the honor to send your Lordship to-day a telegraphic message in cipher, of which the following is the substance:

With reference to my telegram of the 10th inst., this Government is desirous to propose a joint commission, such as that of 1877, with authority to deal without limitative to the standard of the sta tion, and to prepare a treaty respecting the following subjects:

London, Feb. 5.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Gladstone moved the second reading of the bill to remove religious disability, and said: When we undertook by this bill to remove from the statutes as injustice and an anomaly which are a discredit to us—(cheers)—we hoped it would be necessary to spend only a few minutes in introducing the bill. Now that we need to trespass at greater length upon Parliament, there are mutterings and mutterings. As Chancellor of the Exchequer in 1868, I pleaded for the opening of the most difficult offices to which the most objection was taken. It is seriously doubtful now whether Roman Catholies are legally disabled from holding the offices of Viceroy of Ireland and Lord Chancellor of England. The Catholic Relief Act did not impose in so many words disability to hold these offices. It provided that no Catholic should be entitled to hold them otherwise than as now legally entitled. Rev. A. C. Courtice's Lecture on This

Theme was a large audience in Dundas Street Center Methodist Church last evening. The choir was in attendance to lead the service of praise. The meeting was opened as an ordinary Sabbath service with hymn and prayer. While the stewards were taking the collection, Mrs. Courtice sang a stirring solo—"Jerusalem." The subject under discussion by the pastor, was General Booth's social schemes. The address was illustrated by a large chart in the

General Booth's social schemes. The address was illustrated by a large chart in the front of the church, prepared for the meeting by Mr. Carl G. Beal.

Mr. Courtice opened his remarks by saying: "It is remarkable how seed-germs of thought and action lie dormant for generations. These germs are like seeds laid away with the mummies of Egypt, and brought forth in our day to grow to living plants."

Then he proceeded to show how the leading principles of Gen. Booth's scheme were as old as Moses and Joshua. He traced them also in Isaiah, and referred to remarkable passages written by Carlyle that cut a clear road into the heart of the social and industrial problem. "Carlyle," said the speaker, "seems to be an old Hebrew prophet resurrected in the nineteenth century, and Gen. Booth promises to be an old Hebrew reformer, like Nehemiah, laboring to build again the waste places of Zion."

Chapter nine was passed rapidly in review, where the general discusses present methods of dealing with poverty, vice and crime. It is a spiendid chapter for fine strokes that leave a clean cut behind them. After reviewing briefly the seven principles laid down to be used as a rule and square, and plummet for the work, the rising structure of the scheme was traced from city colony to farm colony, and from farm colony to over-sea colony, clearly illustrated by the useful chart. In closing, Mr. Courtice offered one criticism and several reflections. The whole scheme is remedial and not preventive. 
