By a French law promulgated on the 27th February, 1882, it was declared that from that date goods of English origin or manufacture should be liable on their entry into France to the same treatment as those of the most favored nations with the exception of colonial produce, which it was declared would remain subject to the general customs tariff. France has two customs tariffs, one the general tariff which can be modified at the will of the Legislature and which is applied to the goods imported from such countries as do not enjoy most-favored nation treatment, the other the conventional of the various special tariffs granted by France and other countries. Corn, live stock and many raw products have not been included in these special tariffs, and have therefore to pay the rates of the general tariff even when imported from countries enjoying most-favored nation treatment. The conventional tariff rates are usually about 25 per cent. less than those of the general tariff, and Great Eritain enjoys the benefit

ventional tariff rates are usually about 25 per cent. less than those of the general tariff, and Great Britain enjoys the benefit of the lower tariff by law and not by the treaty of Fob. 28, 1852. It would seem that the higher tariff applies to imports into France irom Canada, and in addition there is, I understand, surtax dent epit on any merchandise imported into France via British ports. A LONDON PREACHER AND THE CAUSES OF PRESENT-DAY

Last night, in the Park Avenue Presbyterian Church, Rev. W. J. Clark, in an able sermon, referred at length to the terrible prevalency of political corruption in the Dominion, which has become the talk of the civilized world.

gospel have the courage to discuss great moral issues before their hearers, even though congregations and newspaper molders of public opinion may not always be ready to agree with the views enunciated in their entirety. To have any great question presented to the intelligent consideration of churchgoers in the light of Christian principles must always be a great

aid to attaining needed reform. Mr. Clark does not rail indiscriminately at political parties, no better arrangement for the management of public affairs having so far been discovered. But he holds that party government is not an ideal system and hopes that some improved method may yet be discovered. He affirms, however, that the extreme partisanship which prevails is the main source of the evils of public life. A party is apt to shield its friends when they are in the wrong and to magnify the shortcomings of its opponents. Thus the amprovement of public morals is thwarted, and the public conscience

considerable extent deserved. It seldom happens that one political party can become entirely corrupt, but it cannot be denied that the toleration and defense of corruption in a party must have a most prejudicial effect upon

the practically neutral voters in the community and to a certain extent upon the party in opposition to it. But that both of is too sweeping an assertion. The man who wishes to test this view can find the strongest and most conclusive proof in the records of Parliament. Ten years ago Hon. Edward Blake and his Liberal followers introduced legislation that would have had the effect of preventing the corruption of Ministers and members of Parliament by the agency of favor-seeking contractors, but the party in power, at the bidding of its leader, voted down the proposition. The evil growing, the legislation was offered again and again in recent years, and as often rejected. Not till the long, carefully concealed corruption was laid bare this summer was the rightfulness of the view that Ministers should not accept honor ariums from contractors agreed to by both

Mr. Clark is correct in holding as he does that parties as yet cannot be dispensed with. If the Church wants to set a good example to the State in non-partyism let it proceed to abolish its denominationalism which is simply partyism in religion.

There is one most fertile source of political corruption and demoralization of which the preachers have as yet not taken cognizance. The moral evils that grow out of the "protective" system cannot be denied. The manufacturers who enjoy monopolies, or who are averse to depending on their own resources for a living, as the large majority of us have to do, are not contented with acquiring a plant. They would not consider their outfit complete till they had purchased the Government of the day. These men hold to the view that the higher the tax imposed on imports corresponding to their products the greater will be their gains, and they do not scruple to share their profits with the Government, which, or example, when he called the proprietor \_\_ entirely.

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
