





GUELPH STRIKE OFF

President Lynch Orders Printers Back to Work.

Guelph, Jan. 16.—The printers' strike here has been settled. At noon President Lynch, of the International Union, telegraphed Toby James, provincial organizer, stating he had ordered the men to return to work last Saturday and that he would not do anything until the order had been complied with. Mr. James and the president of the local union interviewed the employers and asked them to allow the men to return to work. The employers consented to this and the men commenced work at 1 o'clock. President Lynch, in accordance with section 120 of the constitution, thus disavowed the strike.

JOHN MITCHELL'S PROBLEM

How To Be Friendly With Both Anthracite and Bituminous Operators.

Indianapolis, Jan. 16.-John Mitchell. president of the United Mine Workers of America, is in the tightest place of his career, figuring how to force soft coal contracts as a club and without abusing the long-standing friendship of bituminous operators.

Strategy would seem to require that contracts would not be concluded with bituminous operators in advance of an understanding being reached with the hard coal companies, as in the event of that being done soft coal would be poured into the eastern markets, should a hard coal strike follow the refusal of anthracite companies to recognize the Miners' Union, as demanded by the Shamokin convention of last month.

The miners demand a restoration of the wages paid previous to the reduction of 5.5 per cent which they accepted two years ag.



Counsel Says Should Be Protected From Missouri.

"Are you sure there is time," Madge FIGHT OVER TECHNICALITIES

Attorney for Standard Oil Head Says Hadley Deliberately Annoyed His Client.

New York, Jan. 16.-Justice Gildersleeve in the New York State supreme court today heard briefs by Attorney-General Hadley, of Missouri, and William V. Rowe, counsel for Henry H. Rogers, on the question which the vicepresident of the Standard Oil Trust refused to answer.

At the last hearing, Justice Gildersleeve said that his decision would depend upon whether the materiality of the same question is now before the Missouri supreme court. Attorney-General Hadley declared that it was not. Rowe declared that it was.

The brief presented by Rowe today was in the main a plea to the court "to jealously guard the personal rights" of Mr. Rogers. He said there had been a tendency to treat his client with contempt, and asked "that in this great metropolis, men of large affairs and important business connections and association should not be treated," because of their general importance, "with less consideration than is due others."

Mr. Hadley's brief was submitted by Henry Wollman, his local counsel. In it Mr. Hadley declares, with reference to the action in the case in Mis-

DPENING OUTLOOK IS FOR PEACE

The Best of Feeling Prevails-The Crucial Question To Be Left Until the Last.

Algeciras, Jan. 16.-The opening of the Moroccan conference was notable spirit of conciliation mani-

The events of the day were the gathering of the ambassadors with their extensive staffs, and the one hour's session in which the Duke of Almodovar, Spanish minister of foreign affairs, was unanimously elected president of the conference.

The duke's speech of acceptance breathed concord and peace. He counselled the nations to adjust their differences, and emphasized the essential principles of the sovereignty of the Sultan, the territorial integrity of Marocco and the open door.

It was significant that both the French and the German delegations heartily seconded the remarks of the PSHAWFOOR OR CHAWFER-R? senate by the doyen. duke, thus foreshadowing the amelloration of Franco-German relations.




