AGREEMENT WITH GRAND TRUNK REACHED AT A SIX-HOUR SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Company Accepts Amended Liability Clause, and Agrees to Make Wharncliffe Road Messrs. Hyman, Aylesworth Subway Wider Than Was at First Proposed---Final Vote Was 7 to 3.

The city of London and the Grand Trunk Railway have arrived at an agreement at last as to the improvements to be made to the company's lines from Ridout street west to the

The agreement was reached at a meeting of the council which, beginning last night at 8 o'clock, did not come to an end until close on 2 o'clock this morning.

The city waived the indemnity clause for personal damages resulting through the placing of pillars or posts in the Wharncliffe subway. For land damages, etc., the company is still liable, however and is bound down by one of the strongest clauses it was possible for City Solicitor Meredith to

The agreement on all other clauses the one referring to the Wharnroad subway is the same as that at the meeting of a week ago. Big Improvement.

By the agreement reached last night, the Wharneliffe subway is vastly improved, the Grand Trunk showing a disposition to meet the wishes of the citizens and the street railway comthe roadway is to be made wider than at first proposed, and the sidewalks will be narrowed, though the ample care of pedestrians has been provided

There was the usual calling for yeas and nays on the part of Ald. Matthews, and the majority of the council always hastened to put themselves on record, declaring that the agreement, being an honest one, and one which will redound greatly to the benefit of South London they had no desire to conceal the stand they took on the different clauses.

Mayor Judd had occasion to call Ald Matthews to order on two occasions the aldermen using language which his worship thought reflected on the chair. The votes varied from 5 to 4, to 7 to 2, on the different clauses, showing that the cuncil voted as it thought bes on the several points of the agreement. In one instance, Mr. Biggar the Grand Trunk solicitor, vigorously protested against the language used in a certain clause, but the council took no notice of his protests and voted to allow the clause to remain as it was framed by Mr. Meredith.

Another meeting will be held on Wednesday night, when the amended liability ciaase will be submitted, as will also the bylaw, and the whole agreement will be finally ratified.

The following is a synopsis of the agreement reached by the City of London and the Grand Trunk Railway: Company assumes all liability in connection with the improvements save for the placing of pillars in the Wharncliffe

subway. Company elevate tracks from the Wharncliffe road to two feet west of Ridout street.

Work to be completed in ninety days. Works to be constructed to the satisfaction of the city engineer and the council

The Wharncliffe subway to be 66 feet in the clear, with a roadway of 38 feet, and spans of 13 feet each over the sidewalks. A row of pillars will support the girders on each side of the street, and will divide the roadway from the walks. The headway will be 14 feet 6 inches. Grade of approaches will be 1 foot

Wortley road to be 66 feet wide, with no piers, and a headway of about 20 feet.

Company must light subways on the Wharncliffe and Wortley roads Company to provide for all drainage made necessary by the

works.

Embankment to be seeded down and kept trim by the company within one year after the agreement is signed. Company to fence in its property within one year, between Ridout street and the city limits.
