ALLIES TAKE OVER MILLION DUTCH TONNAGE

LONDON ELECTRIC READY TO CONTINUE PLANT'S OPERATION ON \$12,000 MONTH GUARANTE

Submits Proposal to City, Whi ch Will Consider It Tomorrow, Making Alternative Off er of Purchase by City Through A rbitration.

The London Electric Company has made a definite offer to the city, either for operation by the company or purchase by the city of the company's plant which, it was announced by the company, would suspend operations at the end of the month. The 1,800 patrons of the company have been anxiously waiting the outcome. It will not consider any proposition to rent the plant to the municipality. R. J. Fleming, general manager of the Toronto Electric Light Company, of which the London Electric is a subsidiary sent the offer this morning to Mayor C. R. Somerville, who has called a meeting for Friday morning to discuss it.

The first offer deals with the operation of the plant by the company. It states that the company will operate the London Electric for six months or less for a guaranteed gross income #1 312,000 a month. Mr. Fleming estimates that the average consumption is 200,000 killowatts a month, or an average of 6 cents a kilowatt kilowatts a month, or an average of 6 cents per kilowatt hour. The London Electric would sell after the expiration of six months, or at any period between now and then on the basis of arbitration. The city under this arrangement will name one arbitra-tor, the company another, and these two name a third.

BRITAIN DUTCH VESSELS

London, March 14.—Because of the long delays in the negotiations with Holland over Dutch ships in the Allied ports, and the slowness of the Dutch Government to act in this respect, Great Britain and the United States have reached an agreement to end the negotiations and take over all such ships next week for the use of the Allies. Every precaution will be taken to safeguard the rights of the owners. The ships will be insured and armed, and any ships sunk will be replaced at the earliest possible time after the war.

The amount of tonnage made available to the Allies through the Dutch arrangement is one million tons, of which 70 per cent is in the United States, 15 per cent in British ports, and 15 per cent in other Allies' ports.

TOMATO. Planting Table: Plant Indoors-March 1-15. Transplant Outdoors-May 20-June 5. Plant-3 to 5 inches deep. Harvest—July 15, frost,

The tomato is a native of South America, and is classed with tropical plants. For this reason it cannot stand cold weather, and must not be put outdoors until the ground has become thoroughly warmed, usually about the first of June. The great object in growing tomatoes in the garden is to have them early. It is very uncommon for the amateur gardenere to have early tomatoes, and this should not be if the directions for growing them are closely followed.

Procure good geed, and sow it in well-drained flats about the first of March. For the main crop of fruit the seed may

The object is to produce as sturdy and stocky a plant as possible, and this should be borne in mind when plants are bought. Do not buy small, spindly plants, for they will give but a poor yield, late in the season. An ideal tomato plant is from 6 to 8 inches long above the roots, half an inch through the stem at the base, with leaves of a dark green color. It is good to have the plant in flower, if not already bear-the plant in flower in this season will become complete for the community gardens and it is hoped this season
