MUST PASS BYLAW BEFORE POLICE CAN **COMMENCE CLEAN UP**







SECURE WHARFAGE FOR

Clarkson auditor, to the attorney-general, in which he sets forth the various sums invested by the hydro-electric commission of Ontario in the various radial propositions. The letter says in part:

AUDITOR QUESTIONS USE OF FUNDS FOR BUILDING RADIALS Copies of Sutherland Report Have Been Given To the Press. TORONTO, Sept. 8.—Copies of the complete Sutherland report condemning the hydro radial project have been in unauthorized." No cash advances have been made for the St. Kitts line by the province. 

Hume Cronyn Tells Kiwanis About National Research Project.

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—Ignorance, pique and intrigue were the causes scribed by Hume Cronyn, M. P., Lonion, Ont., in an address before the Ki wanis Club today, for the killing of the bill for the establishment of a nationa Senate at the last session. The great Senate at the last session. The greatest of these three reasons, however, added Mr. Cronyn, was ignorance. It was not so much a case of original sin and blind stupidity, he declared. The address was a plea to the Kiwanians to aid and foster the movement in favor of a research institute for Canada, which, he said, was absolutely imperative if the Dominion was going to keep industrial minion was going to keep industria pace with the other countries of the

needs for the carrying on of a research institute staff and a properly-equipped laboratory. Then they could wrest from hard-fisted Mother Nature the secrets for the advancement of industrial work. There was much popular miswork. There was much popular misconception regarding industrial science;
t was different altogether from pure
science, and for this reason the iniversities were not the proper places to
deal with industrial science. It would
mperil the better work the universities do in training the men. Mr.
Cronyn told of the work done in this
cirection by Germany, Britain, United
States and Japan, and stated that Canada must endeavor to keep pace with
these countries.

States and Japan, and stated that Canada must endeavor to keep pace with these countries.

Passed Unanimously.

Although leaders in both sides of the House supported the measure, and the bill was passed almost unanimously, "the dear old Senate" thought fit to throw it out. The reasons were ignorance, pique and intrigue. Ignorance, because there was a foolish idea that it would cost an enormous sum; pique, because the conservation commission had been killed, and intrigue by interested parties in Ottawa who got the ear of the Senate.

There was no question in Mr. Cronyn's mind that such an institution would repay the country a thousand-fold.
