Mrs. Madge Macbeth Gives Delightful Lecture To Canadian Club.

All the beauties of Ontario's hinteriand, jewelled with lakes and rich with the lore of early Indian tribes, were brought out in a delightful fashion yesterday afternoon when Mrs. Madge Macbeth of Ottawa spoke before the Women's Canadian club on "The Untravelled Byways and Waterways of Canada."

The lecture was delivered in Normal school to mark Canadian Book Week, and it was fitting that it should be given by one of Canada's distinguished novelists, the authoress of "The Patterson Limit." Special

In that talk, Mrs. Macbeth by meane of lantern pictures and her own vivid descriptions, took her audience with her through an amazing country, about which they had heard little.
